# 4 High Schools Rank Highly in U.S. News

The newest ranking of America's best high schools by U.S. News and World Report

includes four schools in the Long Beach Unified School District. Among the four is a gold medal winner, the California Academy of Mathematics and Science, and three silver medal winners.



The four high schools earned the following rankings among thousands of public high schools:

- CAMS state ranking of 13; national ranking of 94; gold medal
- Renaissance state ranking of 313; national ranking of 1,380; silver medal
- Millikan state ranking of 379; national ranking of 1,632; silver medal
- Lakewood state ranking of 388; national ranking of 1,678; silver medal

To determine the rankings, schools were first analyzed on how well their students performed on state assessments, taking into account the test scores of disadvantaged students. High schools that made it through this analysis were then eligible to be ranked nationally in terms of college readiness.

U.S. News awarded 4,805 gold, silver or bronze medals to the top schools. Learn more by searching for "best high schools" at **usnews.com**.

# **CAMS Again Named Distinguished School**

The California Academy of Mathematics and Science is among 218 public high schools and middle schools named Distinguished Schools recently by the California Department of Education.

"It's always exciting to see the hard work of our students, teachers, support staff, parents and community partners recognized," CAMS Principal Janice Filer said. "We are delighted to be listed among some of California's finest schools. CAMS is fortunate to be named a California Distinguished School again. We also received this honor in 2009. I am proud to be part of such a great school and an outstanding district."

CAMS also has won the National Blue Ribbon Award twice from the U.S. Department of Education. The Class of 2012 at CAMS earned more than \$9 million in scholarships.

# 7 High Schools Make Washington Post List

A list of the nation's most challenging high schools, released by the Washington Post recently, includes seven schools in the Long Beach Unified School District.

The 2013 rankings include schools that surpass 91 percent of other high schools nationwide in terms of their ability to offer rigorous college prep courses.

"We're delighted to see the high quality of our high schools recognized again on a national stage," said LBUSD Superintendent Christopher J. Steinhauser. "We've maintained a consistent focus on college and career preparation, and that work is reflected in these latest rankings."

The Post divides the number of Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate or other college-level tests a school gave in 2012 by the number of graduating seniors. Only 9 percent of about 22,000 U.S. public high schools

earned a place on this year's list.

The report by the Post includes the percentage of students receiving subsidized lunches, a figure illustrating the poverty challenges that schools face

Local schools' national rankings on the report (with the percentage of students receiving subsidized lunches) are:

- 750 California Academy of Mathematics and Science (48% subs. lunch)
  - 1,141 Wilson (57% subs. lunch)
  - 1,147 Millikan (58% subs. lunch)
  - 1,406 Poly (64% subs. lunch)
  - 1,527 Renaissance (63% subs. lunch)
  - 1,772 Lakewood (52% subs. lunch)
  - 1,824 Avalon (72% subs. lunch)

Each of these schools has repeatedly appeared on the Post's annual rankings.

# **Hughes Earns National Green Ribbon Award**

Hughes Middle School is among 64 schools named this week by the U.S. Department of Education as National Green Ribbon Schools. The schools were honored for their exemplary efforts to reduce environmental impact and utility costs, promote better health, and provide effective environmental education.

The announcement on Earth Day came from Washington, D.C., where U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan, along with the Chair of the White House Council on Environmental Quality Nancy Sutley, and Acting Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency Bob Perciasepe revealed the winners of the second annual award.

"We're thrilled to be recognized with this high honor," Hughes Principal Sally Gregory said. "Congratulations to our Green Team parent volunteers, teachers, staff and students who have worked so hard to reduce our impact on the environment. They've set a national example, and we couldn't be prouder."

Secretary Duncan said the winning schools are modeling a comprehensive approach to being green.

"They are demonstrating ways schools can cut costs; improve health, performance and equity; and provide an education geared toward the jobs of the future," Duncan said. "In fact, the selected districts are saving millions of dollars as a result of their greening efforts."

The announcement marked the second year in a row that a Long Beach school has won the (Continued on next page)

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Stanford middle schools; and the California Academy of Mathematics and Science.

The second tier is Scholar Schools, or those that are showing significant levels of academic achievement without a significant population of disadvantaged students. That list includes Carver, Emerson, Fremont, Gant, Lowell, Naples and Prisk elementary schools; Newcomb K-8 Academy; and Rogers Middle School.

(Continued from first page) national honor. Last year, Longfellow Elementary School, located adjacent to Hughes, earned the award.

Hughes earned a U.S. Department of Energy and U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Energy Star 2012 award for energy conservation, with a perfect score of 100. Since 2007, students have built 12 themed gardens and planted more than 40 campus trees. New landscaping on the campus perimeter includes plants known to capture particulate matter, in an effort to improve air quality for the school and its neighbors.

Hughes' Student Green Team publishes the Green Gazette, a schoolwide eco-newsletter that includes healthy recipes using produce from the school's gardens. Interpretive signs outline the environmental principles in the school's landscaping, like composting, vegetable gardening, xeriscaping, butterfly gardening, recycling, biodiversity, beneficial herbs, and labyrinth walking. Hughes partners with a local bike store to host monthly bike repair and safety workshops on campus, encouraging ridership throughout the community.

Hughes supports environmental service projects by students, staff and community members, resulting in hundreds of students actively participating in eco-service projects each year.
