# Teachers Voting On 3% Salary Increase

Members of the Teachers Association of Long Beach are voting this week whether to ratify a tentative agreement reached with the Long Beach Unified School District. The tentative contract agreement includes a 3 percent salary increase retroactive to July 1, 2013.

Subject to Board of Education approval, the tentative agreement would provide the school district's teachers with their first raise in more than five years.

"We're pleased that the bargaining teams have arrived at this tentative agreement," said LBUSD Superintendent Christopher J. Steinhauser. "We believe this contract will help us to retain the best and brightest teachers, which is so vital to student success."

After the tentative agreement goes to TALB's membership for ratification, LBUSD's Board of Education could approve the agreement as early as Dec. 17.

The contract also includes some new language on K-12 shared decision making, days and hours, and evaluation.

The term of the new contract runs through June 30, 2015, with reopeners for next year regarding salary, health benefits, evaluation, plus three articles selected by each party.

# **CAMS Wins U.S. Cyber Forensics Contest**

A team of tenth graders from the California Academy of Mathematics and Science surpassed 570 teams from throughout the nation, including high school juniors and seniors, to capture the top award in a recent cyber forensics contest at New York University. The competition and accompanying conference are billed as the world's biggest cyber security event.

The victory included \$63,000 in scholarships to NYU for each of the three students on the CAMS team.

Sponsored by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security and various corporate partners including Facebook, Qualcomm and Raytheon, the Cyber Security Awareness Week Challenge began with a month-long, online preliminary round during which the CAMS team earned an all-expenses-paid trip to Brooklyn's NYU-Poly campus to compete against 11 other finalist teams.

During the finals, CAMS students Lujing Cen, Oskar Wirga and Lani Matsumara competed in a seven-hour challenge in the NYU-Poly gymnasium. CAMS fielded the youngest team in the Nov. 14 finals and one of only two teams to feature a female participant. The CAMS team was the first from California ever to win the competition. The team's coach was CAMS teacher Sandra Barnett.

# Sister City Celebrates 50 Years with LBUSD

The Long Beach-Yokkaichi Sister City Association presented Long Beach Unified School District President John McGinnis with a plaque recently commemorating 50 years of partnership between the Japanese city and LBUSD.

The nonprofit sister city organization is made up of volunteers who work to improve and maintain good relations between Yokkaichi and Long Beach through the exchange of cultural and education information and opportunity. Programs include Yokkaichi English Fellows, which allows Long Beach teachers to teach in Japan, and the Trio Exchange, which allows teachers and students from long Beach to visit Yokkaichi for a three-week cultural exchange. Located in downtown Long Beach, Renaissance High sits on the site of the original Long Beach High, opened in 1898 as the first high school in Los Angeles County outside of the City of Los Angeles.

In 1911, after Long Beach Polytechnic High was opened, the campus was converted to a grammar school, which was subsequently destroyed by fire in 1918. The school rebuilt on the site became George Washington Junior High, but it too was destroyed, this time by the 1933 earthquake.

After the quake, the junior high was relocated elsewhere and the rebuilt school was designated Trade Extension Evening High School/John Dewey School, a vocational education facility.

In 1966, the school on the corner of 8th Street and Long Beach Boulevard received another name change. It then became Will J. Reid High School, after the famous oilman and conservationist.

In 2004, the campus became home of the new Renaissance High School for the Arts, designed to provide students with both a challenging visual/performing arts program and a rigorous college preparatory curriculum.

With a budget of \$40 million, the Renaissance project will be funded by Measure K school bonds that were overwhelmingly approved by local voters in 2008. on the edge of their seats while trophies were awarded to the teams who had done well," CAMS Principal Christopher Brown said. Hosted by NYU-Poly's Information Systems and Security Laboratory (ISIS Lab), the competition's hands-on challenges are created and managed by NYU-Poly graduate and undergraduate students in consultation with NYU-Poly faculty and industry leaders. Many of the students' coaches came to NYU-Poly for summer training sessions funded by the National Science Foundation.

The high school competition tests computer forensic knowledge and students' abilities to analyze and inspect various pieces of electronic evidence related to a hypothetical crime. (Continued on next page)

(Continued from first page) At the start of the competition, the high school students were provided with a murder case and some background information leading up to the case. The victim was the head of a multinational cyber crime organization.

An SD card (a tiny memory card) was found at the crime scene along with the victim's body. Competition participants were pro-vided with the contents of the SD card. Although an ordinary computer user might have thought the SD card's content innocuous, participants were expected to use various cyber forensics techniques, from steganography (whereby messages can be hidden in sound and picture files) and file carving (a method for recovering files that have been deleted or are in a damaged computer). As students discovered hidden pieces of information, the apparently simple murder turned into a much more complex story involving hacking, financial embezzlement and betrayal.

NYU-Poly was one of the first universities to introduce a cyber security program, and it is

designated as both a Center of Academic Excellence in Information Assurance Education and a Center of Academic Excellence in Research by the National Security Agency.

CAMS is run by LBUSD on the Cal State Dominguez Hills campus in Carson. Students at CAMS have the top SAT scores in the state, according to a ranking of America's Best High Schools released in May by Newsweek. CAMS also boasts the fourth highest SAT scores in the nation, according to the ranking. CAMS students on average scored 2,168 on the SAT, out of a possible score of 2,400.

CAMS has repeatedly earned both the California Distinguished School Award and the National Blue Ribbon Award. U.S. News and World Report, The Washington Post and Newsweek all named CAMS among America's top high schools this year. The Class of 2013 at CAMS earned \$13.5 million in scholarships.

LBUSD's Board of Education approved a plan in November to replicate the CAMS program at the current site of Hill Classical Middle School in East Long Beach, starting in 2015. The existing CAMS program also will remain in place in Carson, where the school regularly receives applications from twice as many qualified students as the school can accept.

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# DonorsChoose.org Helps Local Schools

A nonprofit website where teachers describe projects for students - and where donors choose the projects they want to support – is proving helpful to local schools.

Among those schools is Stevenson Elementary School, where 35 projects totaling \$18,000 have been funded since January.

Stevenson's teachers are among almost 164,000 public and charter school teachers who have used the DonorsChoose.org website to secure funding for \$206 million in books, art supplies, technology and other resources that have supported 10 million students.

In Stevenson's case, the school partnered with Horace Mann Educators Corp., a national insurance company focused on educators' financial needs. As an agency that focuses on teachers, the company's agents have been educating teachers about how they can post a project on DonorsChoose.org and receive free supplies. The agency also has donated more than \$2 million nationally to projects posted on the website.

Stevenson teachers have received storage bins, athletic equipment, electronic tablets and classroom rugs where students sit in assigned spots for group activities.

# Lakewood Nonprofit **Gives \$48K in Grants**

The nonprofit Lakewood Education Foundation recently awarded \$48,000 in grants to teachers in schools located in Lakewood, including Cleveland, Gompers, Holmes, Lakewood, MacArthur and Madison. The grants will pay for art supplies, physical education equipment, document cameras, iPads and underwater robotics supplies.

The foundation has provided more than \$275,000 in grants to teachers over the past decade.

# **Firefighters Donate Bicycles to Bethune**

Long Beach Firefighters Local 372 and its Honorary Association donated 22 shiny new bicycles to high schoolers during a ceremony at the Bethune Transitional Center for homeless students this week.

Bethune Program Coordinator Rhonda Haramis said the students - two from each local high school – earned the Huffy beach cruisers by exhibiting outstanding effort at school despite difficult challenges.

"They have all these obstacles, yet they're about to graduate and they're persisting," Haramis said of the students. "They all gave me thank-you notes and big hugs. They made me cry.

The students also received helmets and bike locks.

Active and retired firefighters have donated about 300 new and slightly used bicycles to Bethune over the past four years.

Bethune opened in 2006 and serves as a hub for homeless students who attend local schools but rely upon the center for referrals to services, counseling and other support.
