McBride Has State's Top Engineering Teacher

McBride High School teacher Charise Williams accepted the statewide Engineering Teacher of the Year Award recently from the nonprofit Project Lead the Way.

The curriculum is used at McBride as well as at Cabrillo High School and the California Academy of Mathematics and Science. Williams worked at Cabrillo for 10 years and then at CAMS for seven years before arriving at McBride when the school opened last fall. She's a nationwide master teacher for PLTW, and she's the Long Beach Unified School District's lead PLTW engineering teacher, training teachers here and throughout the nation on how to teach Introduction to Engineering Design.

"She has done a remarkable job at McBride, starting from scratch, and she helps support teachers throughout LBUSD," said McBride Principal Steve Rockenbach.

Williams was nominated by her peers and accepted the honor at the California PLTW State Conference in Sacramento, where nearly 500 educators, administrators, business leaders and policymakers attended.

"I was totally shocked when I found out," said Williams, whose colleagues from Cabrillo and CAMS were on hand to watch her receive the honor.

"That was the best," Williams said, "because these teachers were there with me, and we've all done this together."

State Business Group Honors 14 Schools

Fourteen schools in the Long Beach Unified School District are listed on the California Business for Education Excellence Honor Roll for academic excellence and reducing achievement gaps among student populations.

"Having high standards, effective school leadership, and staying focused on academic achievement have paid off for these Honor Roll Schools," said Lee Blitch, CBEE Chairman and past CEO of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce. "These schools are an inspiration."

The Honor Roll consists of three parts, the first being "Star Schools," or those with significant populations of disadvantaged students who have shown high achievement. Making this list were the California Academy of Mathematics and Science and Franklin, Hughes, Los Cerritos, Madison and Stanford schools.

The second tier of recognition is "Scholar Schools," or those that show significant levels of academic achievement without a significant population of disadvantaged students. That list includes LBUSD's Carver, Fremont, Gant, Henry, Lowell, Naples, Newcomb and Rogers schools.

The business group recognized a subset of the Honor Roll that has both high percentages of low-income students and high levels of math and science achievement. Among these 100 STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) Honor Roll schools was CAMS.

CBEE has identified a common set of success factors in higher performing Honor Roll schools and districts. These factors include high expectations for all students; ongoing collaboration among teachers to improve practice; targeted use of data to pinpoint challenges and monitor progress; continual intervention for

Poly Wins National C-SPAN Competition

Three freshmen in the Poly High School PACE program have won a \$5,000 grand prize from C-SPAN for their documentary, "Earth First, Fracking Second."

Each year since 2006, C-SPAN has invited middle and high school students to produce short documentaries on an issue of national importance. This year, students used video cameras to answer the question, "What's the most important issue the U.S. Congress should consider in 2014?"

The winning Poly students – Emma Larson, Michaela Capps and Sarah Highducheck – competed against 4,800 students nationwide who submitted 2,355 documentaries. Poly economics and government teacher Jeff Montooth gave students the assignment of creating a current events film.

Fracking, or hydraulic fracturing, frees up pockets of oil and natural gas trapped in shale by using injections of water mixed with chemicals. The students interviewed a representative from Long Beach Gas & Oil and talked to a farmer affected by fracking on his property. The resulting documentary details the economic benefits of fracking but also calls upon Congress to develop regulations to protect the environment from potential harm.

"StudentCam serves as a yearly reminder that young people are not only passionate about issues of national significance, but their ideas and opinions are also worthy of our consideration," said Craig McAndrew, C-SPAN Manager of Education Relations. "The level of critical thought, effort and initiative that students have demonstrated in creating their documentaries is inspiring, and we are thrilled to share this year's winning videos with both Congress and the public."

The Poly students' documentary will air on C-SPAN at 6:50 a.m. E.T. and throughout the day on Monday, April 28. Created by the cable TV industry, C-SPAN is now in 100 million TV households. The winning video also can be viewed at studentcam.org/winners14.htm.

One of the winning Poly students, Emma Larson, is the sister of Samantha Larson, a 2006 Poly graduate who became the youngest person to scale the Seven Summits, the tallest mountains on each of the seven continents.

Other Poly students earned honors in this year's C-SPAN contest, including:

• Sophomore Destin Bigsby, third prize and \$750 for his documentary, "Mental Illness in America."

• Juniors Mara Koval and Asa Mazor-Freedman, third prize and \$750 for their documentary, "Polarization: The Looming Downfall of American Politics."

• Freshmen Nhi Cao and Natalie Pin, honorable mention and \$250 for their documentary, "It's Foster Care."

No School for Entire Thanksgiving Week

Newly approved calendars for next school year include a break for the entire week of Thanksgiving.

The Board of Education approved the calendars for traditional and year-round schools at its last regular meeting.

Under the new calendar, the traditional school year will end June 17 for students and June 18 for teachers, slightly later than in previous years.

The new calendar also moves the Admission Day holiday to April 3. The holiday was previously observed in late August.
