## Longfellow Earns National PTA Honor

National PTA has recognized Longfellow Elementary School as a National PTA School of Excellence for building effective family-school partnerships. Only 170 schools nationwide were designated as 2014-16 recipients of the award.

"Longfellow Elementary School and Longfellow Elementary PTA have put strong practices into place that involve families in the life of the school, and we are pleased to recognize them as a National PTA School of Excellence."

National PTA launched its National PTA School of Excellence program to help strengthen family-school partnerships across the nation and make measurable progress in the areas of education, health and safety, and arts and cultural exploration.

families feel welcomed and empowered to support student success, and PTA is a key partner for continuous school improvement. To be recognized as a National PTA School of

Excellence, PTAs evaluate their current family engagement strategies and submit a goal for school improvement that families, teachers and administrators have set together. They improve upon their family engagement strategies throughout the year,

while focusing on their goal. The National PTA School of Excellence designation is awarded for demonstrated improvement in the family-school partnership and significant progress toward their goal.

Longfellow Elementary PTA has helped to implement various school-wide family engagement programs such as the "PTA Family Reading Experience, Powered by Kindle" and "Reading At Home." These programs give families the tools to help improve reading skills for students between kindergarten and fifth grade. Other programs include the Longfellow Green Team recycling efforts to reduce waste while teaching students about the positive effects of recycling. This program helped Longfellow to earn a National Green Ribbon Award from the U.S. Department of Education in 2012. The school also offers the Uniform Exchange, an opportunity for parents and community members to share and encourage re-use of gently used school clothes.

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## High School Exit Exam

### 96% of Seniors Pass Math, English Tests

About 96 percent of students in the Class of 2014 here passed either the math or English portions of the California High School Exit Exam, with 94 percent passing both. The overall pass rate represents a 1 percent increase over the prior year.

The Long Beach Unified School District's pass rates on the exit exam remain competitive with California's pass rates even though Long Beach has a greater percentage of disadvantaged students than California as a whole. The statewide pass rate for the Class of 2014 was 95.5 percent, matching the record high passage rate from last year.

"I am pleased California's high school students continue to pass this graduation exam at record rates," said State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlakson. "Dedicated educators have worked hard in difficult times to prepare students for college and careers, but we must keep striving for higher levels of achievement so all students have the skills and knowledge they need to be successful."

State law authorized the development of the exit exam in 1999. The law requires students in California public schools to pass the test – in addition to meeting other graduation requirements – to earn a high school diploma.

## National Review

### LBUSD Lauded For Common Core Prep

National Review Online reports that the Long Beach Unified School District is the most prepared large school system in the state, in terms of providing the technology needed for the latest academic standards known as the Common Core State Standards. National Review says a case study of the five top school districts in the state was conducted by State Budget Solutions, a national nonpartisan, non-profit research group.

SBS found that of the five California districts, "the Long Beach Unified School District is the most prepared, primarily because it has accepted outside funding from foundations, including the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. LBUSD has also opted to establish computer labs rather than give individual devices to students."

SBS said that Long Beach committed to providing all of its schools with wireless access, high bandwidth and updated computing devices for Common Core testing. To achieve greater wireless access and bandwidth, the district used funds from its Measure K school bond program, which raised \$1.2 billion in property taxes to build and renovate schools. For computing devices, LBUSD chose not to buy tablets for individual students. Instead, the district invested \$6 million in state technology funding to install 109 new computer labs, giving larger schools two or three labs.

LBUSD Director of Research Christopher Lund told researchers, "Basically, Long Beach Unified decided to go with a pretty conservative approach with the testing. We chose to go with the lab setting because it was a little safer,

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## Plum Assignment: Snacks at Recess

Students at Stevenson and Lee elementary schools are snacking on fresh fruits and vegetables during recess thanks to significant grants from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The grants of nearly \$53,000 for Lee and \$43,000 for Stevenson enable schools to provide fresh fruits and vegetables as a free snack outside of breakfast and lunch.

The two schools kicked off the program last week by lining up for fresh California plums. For some students, it was the first time they had tasted a plum.

"The Long Beach Unified School District understands the importance of creating a healthier school environment for our students, and we know that there is a direct correlation between good nutrition and academic success," said Darlene Martin, LBUSD director of nutrition services. "The Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program provides a healthy snack to fuel students' minds, while introducing them to new fruits and vegetables. That is something we truly value here."

A recent School Lunch Report Card by the nonprofit Physicians Committee for Responsible Medicine ranks LBUSD's meal program as one of the best nationally for serving healthful lunches.

The fruits and vegetables grant is just one way LBUSD is helping to create a healthier school environment. Breakfast and lunch menus provide whole grains, fresh fruit and vegetables, and healthy, kid-friendly favorites. Many of the menu items are made from scratch daily in the Nutrition Services production kitchen.

"We make our own sauces and other favorites like chicken chile verde, macaroni and cheese, sweet potato spiced bread and beef taco filling," said Tiffanie Bas, a registered dietician for the school district. "Making our own items from scratch allows us to control the fat and sodium content but still make kid-friendly foods."

The school district also provides nutrition education programs such as Harvest of the Month, which features a new fruit or vegetable each month and incorporates food with library and classroom activities.

In addition to the labs, one Long Beach high school and three middle schools are receiving tablet computers to experiment and see what platform works best.

"We've been given a gift," LBUSD Superintendent Christopher J. Steinhauer stated in the report, "and we owe it to taxpayers to spend it efficiently and effectively."

The SBS report further states, "Recognized as one of the world's top 20 school systems and one of the top three in the U.S., LBUSD has been one of the most progressive school districts statewide in preparing for the Common Core. While the state's \$16.4 million (for Common Core) has helped cover some costs, the district primarily funded the CCSS through private grants and funding requests that started before state money for Common Core flowed into the district. LBUSD has been a leader in transitioning to Common Core, and it has been working on implementing the new standards during these past four years."

The Common Core standards, adopted by 45 states, were developed by teachers, parents, school administrators and other experts across the nation to establish a set of clear educational standards for kindergarten through 12th grade. The standards are designed to make certain that students graduating from high school are prepared for college and careers.

Other school districts included in the report were Los Angeles, San Diego, Fresno, and Elk Grove.
