## LBUSD Alums Advocate at White House

For Poly High School alum Dominique Vera and Cabrillo High School alum Keyon Anderson - both of whom graduated from Cal State Long Beach - advocating for increased college access during a recent White House summit was a highly personal achievement. The two spoke about the Long Beach College Promise program at First Lady Michelle Obama's "Beating the Odds: Ladders of Opportunity Summit."

The Long Beach College Promise is a nationally renowned partnership among the Long Beach Unified School District, Long Beach City College and CSULB. The College Promise offers Long Beach's youth pathways from pre-K through college and onto careers, including one tuition-free year at LBCC and guaranteed admission to CSULB for qualified Long Beach students.
"The Long Beach College Promise saw me through many experiences - good and bad over the course of my youth," said Vera, who graduated from CSULB in 2014 with a bachelor's degree in business administration. It was the College Promise that gave her the support she needed to achieve her dreams of a college degree. So when she received an invitation from the first lady inviting her to testify before

White House and Capitol Hill officials about how the College Promise gave her an opportunity to "beat the odds," she was thrilled.
"The guarantee of an affordable college education helped me to stay strong and persevere," said Vera, who now hopes to give back to her community. "Although the theme of Ms. Obama's summit was 'beating the odds,' I came to the conclusion that I should be changing the odds and challenging the odds so I can enable everyone."

In addition to partnering with the first lady in developing successful strategies for helping youth climb ladders of opportunity, the Long Beach College Promise partnership has been hailed by President Obama as a national education model, and promise partners have been engaged in his efforts to make community college universal for all responsible students via his America's College Promise campaign.
"My favorite part of the summit was being with other people who are actually trying to move the needle," Anderson said. "I'm able to see how different my life is with my education. I can't imagine what my life would be like without it."

## Educator by Day, World Champ on Weekends

Derek Pye doesn't talk about his national and world records much at school. As a paraeducator helping special education students at Millikan High School, and as a track coach at Bancroft Middle School, he prefers to keep the focus on the academic and athletic accomplishments of his students.

But the Wilson High School graduate has quietly amassed an array of international honors in track and field. Last month Pye, 48, set a new world record for his age group in Albuquerque at the USA Track and Field

Master's Indoor National Championships in the 60 meter hurdles, completing the race in 8.16 seconds. Other recent age group honors include:

- National record in 2015 in the outdoor 110 meter hurdles
- USATF Male Athlete of the Year in 2014 and 2015
- Indoor National Champion in the 60 meter dash in 2014
- Indoor World Champion in the 60 meter hurdles in 2014

"We get a chance to see a lot of former athletes do well and get to go to college, which is really big for their families as well," Pye said.

Upcoming competitions for Pye include events in Australia, Spain and South Korea, but first there are the prestigious Penn Relays from April 28 to 30 at the University of Pennsylvania. If he wins big, his students probably won't hear it from him, whether on the track or in the classroom.
"It's not about me at school. It's their time," Pye said. "I just tell the students to give themselves a chance."
