National Blog Details K-16 Global Ed Here

A blog on the national Education Week website details how the Long Beach Unified School District's partnerships with its hometown, higher education institutions are providing greater opportunities for students to pursue global studies in high school and beyond. Cal State Long Beach's Richard Marcus, a

Cal State Long Beach's Richard Marcus, a professor and director of The Global Studies Institute and the International Studies Program, and Tim Keirn, a full-time lecturer in history and education, director of the Yadunandan Center for India Studies, and coordinator of the university single subject credential program at CSULB, authored the guest blog exploring how the university has merged the nationally recognized Long Beach College Promise initiative with efforts to develop global competence in its students. CSULB has the largest secondary (middle and high school) history-social science teacher credentialing program in California and one of the largest in the nation. Virtually all history teachers recently hired by LBUSD have come through this program, the blog states, and university faculty regularly provide in-service professional development, or training, for all world history teachers in the district.

The number of LBUSD students coming to CSULB with Advanced Placement World History credit (and global historical understanding) has increased, as has the number of students arriving at the university with AP credit in our courses with international content, including comparative government, human geography, Spanish literature, Spanish (Continued on next page)

\$1.5 Billion in Local Bonds Pass Easily

Voters in the Long Beach Unified School District this week approved Measure E school bonds by a decisive 73.37 percent yes vote, providing \$1.5 billion, and the possibility of hundreds of millions of dollars in state matching funds, to upgrade classrooms and other school facilities.

"What a great day for our students and schools. Our sincerest thanks go to our parents, teachers, administrators, support staff and many business and community supporters who made this huge victory possible," LBUSD Superintendent Christopher J. Steinhauser said. "Thank you, voters, for choosing to invest in our schools. We appreciate the trust that you have placed in us. We will do everything we can to make the wisest use of these bonds for the benefit of our students. We plan to continue earning the confidence and trust that voters have expressed with this historic decision."

With all precincts counted, Measure E garned 84,217 yes votes and 30,569 no votes. The 73.37 percent yes vote far surpasses the 55 percent threshold for approval.

Proceeds from the school bonds will be used for health and safety-related repairs such as electrical upgrades to add energy-efficient air conditioning systems. Science labs, computer labs and libraries will be upgraded. Deteriorating bathrooms and plumbing, leaky roofs and old wiring will be repaired. Outdated structures will be improved to meet handicap accessibility and earthquake standards. Fire alarms and security systems will be upgraded. Indoor and outdoor athletic facilities will be expanded and improved with features such as all-weather fields and new aquatics facilities.

Many local schools were built 60 to 70 years ago and need basic health and safety upgrades.

The passage of Measure E culminates many months of planning, with ample input from the community, including surveys and seven public meetings held at local high schools. The Board of Education decided in June to call for the bond election after approving an updated Facility Master Plan.

The recently updated Facility Master Plan includes a school-by-school project list and is available at **lbschools.net**. The school district will continue to communicate regularly with the local community regarding school facilities planning and progress.

School Psychologist Earns State Honor

Bridgette Myers has earned the Outstanding School Psychologist Award from the California Association of School Psychologists.

"I feel so blessed to have received the award," said Myers, who works at Jordan High School in Long Beach and at Holmes Elementary School in Lakewood.

In her role as school psychologist, Meyers has developed and conducted groups for students and helped teachers in developing positive behavior management systems for

their classrooms, said Tom Sopp, CASP president. Sopp also is a psychologist at Alvarado Elementary School in Signal Hill and at Hughes Middle School in Long Beach. He spoke about Myers during last week's Board of Education meeting, noting that Myers developed a group for girls to build empowerment, she conducts assessments for children with varied disabilities, and she is able to interpret test results in a clear manner that parents and teachers can understand.

Other colleagues also sing her praises. "I have had the pleasure of knowing and working with Bridgette over the past 17 years, 10 of them as her immediate supervisor," said LBUSD Assistant Superintendent Tiffany Brown, a past recipient of the same honor. "She has a calm demeanor that lends itself to the role of a school psychologist. She is an innovative thinker and continues to search for ways in which she can extend herself into the school community and beyond the realm of an assessor."

Olivia Nieto Herrera Elementary Dedicated

Olivia Nieto Herrera Elementary School, formerly Lee Elementary, dedicated its campus in honor of the school's new namesake last week to the cheers of students, staff, parents, community leaders and members of the Nieto Herrera family.

Olivia Nieto Herrera was an educator and highly respected advocate for disadvantaged families. She established Centro Shalom, which provides support - including food, housing, clothing and legal aid - to families in the neighborhood surrounding the school.

'She loved children, and everything she did was for the betterment of the people around you," Amelia Nieto, daughter of Olivia Nieto Herrera, told the student body during a bright fall morning on the school playground.

Daughter Amelia led the student body in a chant of the phrase "Sí, se puede" (Spanish for "Yes it can be done," the motto of the United Farm Workers and Cesar Chavez). She encouraged the students to repeat the phrase once more, loudly. "Sí, se puede!" the students shouted.

"Now I know my mother heard you, and that's music," Nieto said. "My brothers and I are very excited about having the school named for my mom. We hope it will inspire you to help our community like my mother wanted to.

The blog also discusses dual enrollment opportunities, LBUSD's new Sato Academy of Mathematics and Science - including Sato's Chinese language classes held in partnership with the university - and the popular new Ethnic Studies courses that local high schoolers are taking for university credit. There are also international pathways for students at several local high schools, and efforts are under way to create complementary programming where foreign language acquisition is central to the pathway.

The renaming ceremony included the recitation of a student poem and the "Husky Pride Cheer" based upon the school's newly chosen mascot. Board member McGinnis recognized Stanton's well received nomination and told the students, "We are very honored to have a school named after someone you can emulate."

New menu items include chicken and chile tamales cooked in traditional corn husks, strawberry and yogurt parfaits with housemade granola, Salvadoran style bean and cheese pupusas, croissant breakfast sandwiches, enchilada burritos with house-made sauce, freshly cut watermelon, fresh jicama with tajin (seasoning) and more. Entrée salads also received makeovers with the introduction of a BBQ chicken salad with house-made BBQranch dressing, Greek salad with house-made vinaigrette, and whole grain garlic-infused croutons.

New products were sourced for current favorites such as hamburger patties, hot dogs and chicken tenders. As always, menus include a healthful variety of fresh fruit, fresh vegeta bles, house-made entrees and whole grains.

She participated in a ceremony with Los Angeles Mayor Eric Garcetti to see a portion of the machine lowered 45 feet into a pit in Little Tokyo.
