Board OKs Raise for TALB, CSEA, Non-Reps

The Long Beach Unified School District Board of Education has unanimously approved a 2 percent ongoing salary increase and onetime "off schedule" 1 percent increase for qualifying teachers, classified employees and non-represented employees. The increases are retroactive to July 1, 2016.

The raises for teachers and classified employees were part of bargaining agreements approved by the school board, the Teachers Association of Long Beach, and Long Beach Chapter 2 of the California School Employees Association.

Health care costs have been contained so that employees will again avoid paying monthly premium payroll deductions for health

benefits.

Retroactive checks for the 2 percent increase are scheduled to be disbursed June 16. The ongoing 2 percent increase will appear on paychecks starting June 23. The one-time, offschedule increase will be issued as early as Sept. 8 in a lump sum as 1 percent of the employee's annual salary.

TALB's K-12 membership ratified the agreement with about a 98 percent yes vote, while CSEA ratified with a 99 percent yes

Graduations Planned for 5,700 Students

The Long Beach Unified School District will award diplomas to about 5,700 students at 13 ceremonies from June 7 to 16.

The estimated number of graduates at each school are: 990 at Poly High School and Poly PAAL; 900 at Wilson Classical High School; 813 at Millikan High School; 800 at Lakewood High School; 740 at Jordan High School and Jordan Plus; 565 at Cabrillo High School; 300 at Educational Partnership High School; 174 at California Academy of Mathematics and Science; 162 at McBride High School; 100 at Reid Continuation High School; 99 at Renaissance High School for the Arts; 53 at Avalon High School; and 22 at Beach High School.

U.S. News Honors Seven High Schools

U.S. News and World Report's 2017 list of America's best high schools includes seven schools here, an all-time high for the Long Beach Unified School District.

The California Academy of Mathematics and Science earned a gold medal, while five other schools here earned silver, and one earned bronze.

McBride High School, which will graduate its first class of seniors this year, joined the list for the first time.

The ranking includes data on more than 22,000 public high schools. The schools were judged on state assessments, graduation rates and how well they prepare students, including disadvantaged students, for college.

Fewer than 2.5 percent of high schools earned gold medals. Only the top 10.3 percent won silver, and 16.8 percent earned bronze. Local schools on the list are:

- Avalon (silver) state ranking of 126; national ranking of 751
- Wilson (silver) state ranking of 240; national ranking of 1,301
- Millikan (silver) state ranking of 256; national ranking of 1,370

McBride Earns Full 6-Year Accreditation

One of the Long Beach Unified School District's newest high schools, McBride High School, has earned a full six-year accreditation from the Western Association of Schools and Colleges, the highest accreditation possible.

WASC teams recently visited the school to

observe how well it serves students.

"All indications are that the school, with support from the district, will continue to address students' needs," the visiting committee wrote in its accreditation report.

McBride opened in September 2013 offering college-prep curriculum and an emphasis on career pathways. This month, the school's name also appeared for the first time among U.S News and World Report's list of top high schools in America.

"I am extremely proud of our staff and excited about our growth," Principal Steve Rockenbach said.

WASC is a world-renowned accrediting association that collaborates with other organizations such as the California Department of Education to align accreditation with the planning process for California public schools.
