TALB Ratifies Deal, CSEA to Vote Soon

Teachers Association of Long Beach members ratified a tentative contract with the Long Beach Unified School District recently by a 96.3 percent yes vote, and members of Chapter 2 of the California School Employees Association will vote on a tentative contract next week. Both tentative agreements are pending the Board of Education's approval and include an ongoing salary increase of 1 percent, plus a one-time increase of 1 percent.

The vote by CSEA's membership is scheduled for Tuesday, April 17 from 10 a.m. to 6:15 p.m. at the Teacher Resource Center.

The school board is likely to consider the TALB contract along with compensation for nonrepresented employees at its regular April 18 meeting. Consideration of the CSEA contract by the school board would happen at a subsequent meeting once CSEA's membership

State Names Eight Distinguished Schools

Eight schools in the Long Beach Unified School District earned the California Distinguished School Award this month for exceptional gains in student achievement.

"These schools implement outstanding educational programs and practices that help California students realize their potential, and put them on the path to achieve their dreams,' State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlakson said.

Elementary schools and secondary (middle and high) schools are recognized in alternate years. This year's awards focused on the elementary grades. LBUSD's Alvarado, Los Cerritos, Lowell, Madison, Naples, Riley, Signal Hill and Tincher schools were among 287 schools statewide earning recognition.

The awards honor schools that demonstrate educational excellence and progress in narrowing achievement gaps. Winners must meet a variety of criteria including exemplary performance on state accountability measures.

Torlakson highlighted Los Cerritos Elementary as one example of schools' efforts to close achievement gaps. Los Cerritos teach-

ers look at school data regularly and decided that a top priority was closing the achievement gap for African American students in math and English. After finding studies showing greater success for minority students when offered more opportunities for student collaboration, teachers began building a more collaborative classroom culture. The school's efforts resulted in a 10 percent increase in math scores and a 6 percent increase in English scores for African American students.

Board Election

Two Long Beach Unified School District Board of Education incumbents will return to their seats after running unopposed, while a third seat appears to be headed for a runoff election. That third seat represents District 3, where the winner will replace Board Member John McGinnis. He completes his second fouryear term in July, when he plans to retire from the board.

None of the three candidates for District 3 surpassed the 50 percent vote needed to avoid a runoff on June 5, according to this week's unofficial results. Candidate Juan M. Benitez received 46.7 percent, while Cesar A. Armendariz received 33.2 percent, and Eduardo Lara received 20 percent. The top two candidates, Benitez and Armendariz, will vie for the

The school board's five districts are divided by geographic area. In District 1, incumbent Board of Education President Megan Kerr retains her seat after running unopposed. Likewise in District 5, Board of Education Vice President Diana Craighead retains her seat after running unopposed. Districts 2 and 4 were not up for election during this cycle.

Keller is Regional Trash-Free Lunch Champ

After months of sorting lunchtime waste, hosting educational assemblies on waste reduction, and packing trash-free lunches, several local schools have earned honors in Grades of Green's 7th annual Trash-Free Lunch Challenge - including the grand prize and \$1,000 awarded to Keller Dual Immersion Middle School.

Participating schools diverted more than 460 tons of waste from local landfills.

Robinson, Prisk and Whittier schools each received special awards of recognition.

"Once again, Long Beach schools did amazingly well in this competition," said Allie

Bussjaeger, director of regional programs for the nonprofit Grades of Green. "We are so impressed with the student leadership at our Trash-Free Lunch Challenge schools."
Lindbergh STEM Academy won the grand

prize last year. This year, Robinson won the Green Leaders of Tomorrow Award, Prisk won the Super Sorters Award, and Whittier was Most Inspirational.

Top winner Keller built a school culture of environmental stewardship in just four months, starting a Green Team that instituted a classroom recycling program and paired each (Continued on next page)

Keller also implemented lunch sorting to recover recyclables and unused food to be donated to the local non-profit FoodFinders. The school worked with the City of Long Beach to compost fruit and vegetable scraps, and Green Team students trained peers to act as liaisons in each science class to share waste reduction information. Keller used its website, bulletin board, posters, flyers and daily announcements to keep everyone apprised on eco-efforts.

Twenty schools in the greater Los Angeles area entered this year's challenge to see which school could divert the most waste and best inspire lifelong waste reduction habits.

Earthwatch (earthwatch.org) has awarded
California Academy of Mathematics and
Science teacher Crystal Davis a Project Kindle
Fellowship for the upcoming summer. She will
conduct research on forest owls in relation to
climate change in the Chiricahua mountains of
southeast Arizona. Last year Davis earned a
senior fellowship with Earthwatch and studied
the effect of climate change on huckleberries
and grizzly bears. The new fellowship allows
her to expand on the skills she learned last
summer and will culminate in Davis taking a
group of CAMS students on an expedition.

Seniors Avey Songco and Shavonna Jackson at the California Academy of Mathematics and Science were recently named 2018 Edison Scholars, and each awarded \$40,000 scholarships by Edison International to pursue STEM studies. The students were awarded the scholarships during a surprise presentation by Edison officials at the school. Each year, Edison International awards the \$40,000 scholarships to 30 high school seniors.

Three Poly High School students recently earned honorable mention awards for their videos in C-SPAN's national StudentCam Competition, which receives nearly 3,000 videos submitted from middle and high school students all over the country.
