# Students Outperform State, County in P.E.

A greater percentage of physical education students in the Long Beach Unified School District are passing the state's physical education tests compared to students in Los Angeles County and California as a whole, according to the newest data from the California Department of Education.

#### State Physical Fitness Exam

<sup>\*</sup> The state considers meeting five of six Healthy Fitness Zones to be a passing score.

Students take a series of six separate tests that measure aerobic capacity, body composition, abdominal strength, trunk extensor strength, upper body strength and flexibility. Meeting five of the state exam's six Healthy Fitness Zone requirements is considered to be a passing score. By state law, high school students who meet this standard qualify for exemption from physical education classes in their junior and senior years (though many of these students still opt to take P.E. electives such as yoga, dance, basketball, soccer and weight training).

## Lakers Commend Student at Halftime

A budding environmentalist, Millikan High School junior Isaiah Williams has done enough earth-friendly deeds to make Al Gore green with envy. The Los Angeles Lakers recognized his good work by giving him a Community Champion of the Month award on the Staples Center court during halftime at a recent Lakers vs. Sacramento Kings game.

"It was very exciting. I was in the center of the court. It was something I'll never forget," he said.

Isaiah has been a part of the Grades of Green Youth Corps Eco-Leadership program for more than three years. The nonprofit Grades of Green organization provides schools with free access to tools and information to help students care for the environment.

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# Cabrillo's 'Outstanding Teacher of America'

Cabrillo High School math and engineering teacher Kenneth Fisher has received \$20,000 as a recipient of the Carlston Family Foundation Outstanding Teachers of America Award.

He accepted a check for \$5,000 at last week's Board of Education meeting, having already received \$15,000 for the honor. The \$5,000 will be used at the school as Fisher sees fit.

The awards are given each year to exceptional California public high school teachers, nominated only by former students who believe their teachers made a lifechanging impact. Fisher was one of five teachers h

was one of five teachers honored by the foundation in recent weeks.

Presenting the latest check was Timothy

Allen, executive director of the foundation.

"From my conversations with Ken's former students, it was exceptionally clear that his instructional skills and techniques, as well as his personal guidance, significantly contributed to both their academic and personal success," Allen said. "They shared with me how he impacted their lives by giving of his personal time, sharing his passion for calculus and engineering, creating interesting and relevant lessons and activities to enhance his instruction, challenging them to always do their best work, and supporting them even when they did not believe in themselves."

As he accepted the check, Fisher's voice broke slightly with emotion when he acknowledged his family for allowing him to work long days so that he can support students.

"I want to thank my lovely wife and children. Throughout my time at Cabrillo, I spend 12, 13, 14 hours a day there, very often going

in on Saturdays, tutoring kids until eight, nine, 10 o'clock at night. And my wife and kids sacrifice their time away from me, for me to be able to help the children of Long Beach, so I greatly appreciate it." Fisher said.

He also credited the school district for supporting teachers.

He once hosted a birdwatching event at the Dominguez Gap Wetlands, and he has partnered with the creative writing club at his school to create a book featuring poems and student crafted artwork to celebrate local birdlife. He also created a custom coloring book called "Danny the Dolphin,"which he printed and gave to students to teach them about ocean pollution and how they can prevent it.

His interest in the environment started when he joined the Green Team at Hughes. The Green Team supports environmental service projects among students and helped Hughes to win a National Green Ribbon award for environmental excellence in 2013.

"I ended up really enjoying the Green Team," he said. "It opened my eyes about what was happening in the environment, and I guess the passion grew from there.

Grades of Green partners with Green Teams at several local schools, sponsoring an annual trash-free lunch contest and other activities. Schools donate uneaten food to local shelters daily, and they compost fruit and vegetable scraps on campus, in some cases reducing waste by as much as 90 percent.

#### Summer Jobs

As of Jan. 29 the Personnel Commission will accept applications from employees interested in Extended School Year (ESY)/Summer Employment for 2018. To qualify for summer employment, applicants must be permanent/ probationary classified employees working on less than a 12-month calendar.

ESY/Summer Employment dates are July 2 to 27 for Buffum Total Learning Center, Roosevelt Elementary School, Prisk Elementary School, Nelson Academy (middle school) and Tucker Transitional. The summer employment dates for comprehensive high schools (Cabrillo, Jordan, Lakewood, Millikan, Poly and Wilson) are June 25 to July 27.

# Leaves, Resignations

Article VIII in the K-12 Teachers Agreement between the Long Beach Unified School District and the Teachers Association of Long Beach states that "to facilitate the staffing process, employees are expected to make known their leave, resignation or retirement requests by March 1."

Certificated employees planning to resign, retire or request a leave of absence for the 2018-19 school year should submit the appropriate form to their site administrator. Leave of absence request, resignation and retirement forms are available from site secretaries or at lbschools.net (go to Human Resource Services-Current Employees).

Recent CalSTRS legislation limits retirees from substituting during the first 180 days of retirement. Contact CalSTRS at calstrs.com for more information.
