# **Hundreds of Grads Earn Biliteracy Seals**

The Class of 2018 in the Long Beach Unified School District earned 821 State Seals of Biliteracy. The seals recognize high school graduates who have attained a high level of proficiency in speaking, reading and writing one or more languages in addition to English.

LBUSD's high school graduates this year earned 578 seals for Spanish, 85 for Japanese, 75 for French, 28 for German, 22 for American Sign Language, 21 for Chinese, six for Italian, and six for Khmer.

A record 55,249 students statewide in the Class of 2018 earned the bilingual seal, the California Department of Education announced recently. The distinction is marked by a gold seal affixed to students' diplomas.

# City, Schools Offer **Voter Registration**

Long Beach's Office of the City Clerk recently teamed up with local high schools on National Voter Registration Day to register or pre-register hundreds of students.

City Clerk Monique De La Garza praised schools for their participation.

'On behalf of our office, we want to thank you for your commitment in helping us work with your high schools on National Voter Registration Day," De La Garza said. "Our team had enormous success working with your faculty and student volunteers. I want to commend the efforts of your faculty and administrators for their cooperation and teamwork.'

Nearly 600 local students registered or preregistered to vote, and almost 1,400 students were contacted during the effort at six schools in Long Beach.

# **Prestigious AP Capstone Diplomas Awarded**

New data show that 49 students in the Long Beach Unified School District earned the prestigious Advanced Placement Capstone Diploma, and 54 students earned the AP Seminar and Research Certificate during the 2017-18 school year.

AP Capstone is a diploma program from the College Board based on two yearlong AP classes: AP Seminar and AP Research, courses that LBUSD began offering in 2016-17. Both courses prepare students for college and career success through the development of critical thinking, academic research, collaboration, presentation and time management skills. Only 4,800 students worldwide earned the AP Capstone Diploma, and 2,400 earned the AP

Seminar and Research Certificate last school

year.
"We are proud to recognize the outstanding achievements of students who participated in the AP Capstone Diploma program, and we continue to look forward to providing students with opportunities to explore their passions while building college-level academic and collaboration skills," LBUSD Superintendent Christopher J. Steinhauser said.

Earning the AP Capstone Diploma is no easy feat. Students must earn scores of 3 (out of 5) or higher in AP Seminar, AP Research, and on four additional AP exams. To receive the AP Seminar and Research Certificate,

## Early Childhood Education Plan Launched

The City of Long Beach and the Mayor's Fund for Education unveiled an Early Childhood Education Strategic Plan last week that was developed in collaboration with the Long Beach Unified School District and other local agencies.

We know from experience that the sooner we can bring children into a high-quality learning environment, the more likely they are to succeed in their later years of schooling and life," LBUSD Superintendent Christopher J. Steinhauser said. "This plan is a big step toward making full equity and access to early childhood programs a reality. I look forward to seeing significant and lasting results as the plan moves forward.

Speakers and panelists at the launch event included LBUSD Deputy Superintendent Jill Baker, who oversees the school district's early childhood education programs. Mayor Robert Garcia kicked off the event, held at Long Beach Day Nursery.

"As an educator, I believe there is no better investment in a child's future than an investment in early childhood education," Garcia said. "This plan will expand our educational and social commitments to our youngest residents, their families and the professionals who support them so that all children will enter school ready to learn and be positioned for life-long success.

The plan has seven overarching goals with objectives and activities organized under each.

(Continued from first page) students must earn scores of 3 or higher in AP Seminar and AP Research. More than 1,100 schools participated in the AP Capstone program worldwide last school year.

The AP Capstone program provides studentcentered learning while incorporating performance-based assessments. Throughout the program, AP Seminar and AP Research students study a variety of topics across multiple disciplines and have the flexibility to choose topics of personal interest to show mastery of critical thinking, research and presentation skills. Official AP Seminar and AP Research assessments also go beyond a single AP exam to include academic papers, multimedia presentations and defense of findings.

"Congratulations to the AP Capstone award winners, who conduct, present and defend academic research on topics they are passionate about," said Trevor Packer, College Board senior vice president. "Their ability to manage long-term projects, collaborate with teams and deliver effective presentations will accelerate not only their academic careers, but their professional careers as well."

LBUSD students took a record high of 14,786 AP exams last school year, passing a record 6,624 tests. Even as the number of attempted tests increased, so did the pass rate, improving by 4 percent over the prior year.

(Continued from first page) them for the global economy, and broaden their horizons and understanding of other cultures and nations," State Superintendent of Public Instruction TomTorlakson said.

California began the biliteracy seal program in 2012. Since then, more than 20 other states have adopted similar programs. In 2016, California received an award from the U.S. Department of Education in recognition as a national leader in promoting multilingualism. The state seeks to more than triple the number of biliteracy seals earned by 2030.
