27 Teachers Attain National Certification

Twenty-seven teachers in the Long Beach Unified School District recently earned National Board Certification, the highest professional distinction in teaching.

More than 170 teachers here have earned the honor over the years. The rigorous certification is a year-long process that involves submitting portfolios, videotaping classroom instruction and participating in a day of written exercises. National Board for Professional Teaching Standards Certification is the nation's only advanced teacher certification.

A National Spotlight on Principal Support

This month's edition of *Principal Leadership* magazine, published by the National Association of Secondary School Principals, includes an extensive Q&A section with two Long Beach Unified School District administrators regarding school leader preparation and support.

"The Evolving Relationship: Principals and their Supervisors," features LBUSD Deputy Superintendent of Schools Jill Baker and Riley Elementary School Principal LaShell Diggs. Also featured in the Q&A is Mikel Royal, director of school leader preparation and development for Denver Public Schools.

The three educators discuss ways in which the relationship between principals and those who supervise them have changed over the past decade.

"One of the things that's become really clear over the last several years of focusing on principal supervision and support is redefining the role of a principal supervisor," Baker states in the article.

Principal Diggs agreed. "I've been a principal for 18 years. One shift that I've experienced is the significant increase in the amount of time principal supervisors spend on the school campus alongside the principal – supporting, teaching and learning," Diggs stated. "Our visits are focused primarily on instruction rather than operational items."

The article also delves into evaluation of school culture and climate, and issues related to diversity, equity and school communication.

"I look forward to my visits with my principal supervisor," Diggs stated. "I don't have

that sense of nervousness that one may get when their boss is coming to visit. Instead, I am anticipating the support, feedback and professional collaboration that I will receive.

"I prepare my list of things to share, questions to ask, classes to take her to, or items I would like to collaborate with her on to help me to grow in my leadership."

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Submit Requests for Transfer by March 31

Human Resource Services is accepting transfer requests from teachers who wish to change school sites for the 2019-20 school year. Refer to the Teachers Association of Long Beach agreement, Article VIII for guidelines. Applications are now available and are due March 31.

The application can be completed and submitted online via the myLBUSD portal at lbschools.net (go to Employees > myLBUSD). Log in with your username and password. From the applications menu, select My Employee Information, then Certificated Transfers.

Request for Transfer forms are also available at schools and the TALB office, and they can be downloaded and printed from the lbschools.net public website (select Human Resource Services in the A-Z index, then For Current Employees). Computers also are available for use in the HRS lobby.

Teachers may submit requests for transfer whether or not that position appears as a vacancy. Transfer requests are valid through the end of the first seven student days of the following traditional school year. Call ext. 8658 for more information.

Summer Jobs for Classified Workers
