Long Beach Leads Nation in AP Access

Data from the Washington, D.C.-based Council of the Great City Schools depict Long Beach as a national leader in providing students greater access to Advanced Placement college preparatory courses.

CGCS is a coalition of 74 of the nation's largest urban public school systems, including Long Beach. A 235-page "Academic Key Performance Indicators" report looked at 48 of the nation's largest school systems and found that the Long Beach Unified School District:

- Ranked first nationally on the percentage of African American male students who took one or more AP courses;
- Ranked second on the overall percentage of students who took one or more AP courses;
- Ranked second on the percentage of Hispanic male students who took one or more AP courses;
- Ranked second on the percentage of reduced price lunch students who took one or more AP courses (students receive free or reduced price meals when they live in lower-income households);
- Ranked second on the percentage of students with disabilities who took one or more

Celebrating Renaissance High's Renovation

A \$40 million renovation of Renaissance High School for the Arts is officially complete. Students, staff and parents celebrated their refurbished campus during a re-opening ceremony this week, with several dignitaries helping to mark the occasion.

Attendees enjoyed vocal, dance and drama performances by Renaissance students. Speakers included Board of Education Member Juan Benitez, Principal Kimberly Holland and former Principal Mark Zahn.

"I want to thank everyone in the district who made sure this campus is open for the academic year. This really should be a jewel for our community," Benitez said. "Thank you to everyone who made this day possible."

"It's an amazing, amazing change," said former Renaissance Principal Mark Zahn. "The Long Beach Unified School District has always supported Renaissance. They have now invested millions of dollars in this campus, and it is fantastic. Renaissance is back, and I'm sure it's back well into the 22nd Century."

Funding for the project came from school bonds approved by local voters. The major renovation includes a new two-story performing arts building, a physical education building, an open amphitheater in the center of campus, a new parking lot, perimeter fencing, marquee, signage and exterior sculpture. Buildings were retrofitted for earthquake safety, energy efficiency and accessibility by people with disabilities. New paint, ceilings, doors and floors were included, and portable classrooms were removed. The Office of Multimedia Services building on the campus also was renovated.

With about 500 students, the small high school's pathway, or emphasis, is Arts Media and Entertainment including instrumental music, vocal music, costume design, graphic arts, visual arts, stage technology and drama. The school was refurbished specifically to accommodate this pathway while offering rigorous college preparatory courses, including

numerous Advanced Placement classes. Renaissance has been listed as a top high school in the nation by the Washington Post and U.S. News and World Report for seven years in a row.

The arts high school opened in 2004 on the site where the first high school in Los Angeles County (outside the City of Los Angeles) was built in 1898. The school was rebuilt after it was destroyed by fire in 1918 and again after the 1933 Long Beach earthquake.

Independent Audits Rate LBUSD Highly

Detailed, independent audits of the Long Beach Unified School District's finances and its school bond program have resulted in the highest possible rating from certified public accountants

The results of the audit of the school district's finances by a team of independent auditors were presented to the school board recently by the Clifton Larson Allen LLP firm. The auditing firm deemed that the school district has earned the coveted unmodified opinion, meaning the financial statements are materially correct, provide all of the appropriate disclosures, and follow all the proper accounting standards.

The accounting firm also examined the school district's Measure K and Measure E school construction and modernization program. The audits verify that expenditures made with bond funds are aligned with the voter-approved ballot measure. Auditors reviewed millions of dollars in expenditures, and there were no findings. In all cases, the expenditures were being used in alignment with voter-approved bond purposes.

(Continued from first page) against the progress of others," states the report, which examined AP data from the 2016-17 school year.

Last spring, LBUSD students registered for nearly 15,000 Advanced Placement college level exams, an all-time high for the school district and a 6.1 percent increase over the prior year. The number of AP exams taken last year was nearly double the amount take five years before.

LBUSD has made a concerted effort to boost access to AP courses and tests. The school district provides students greater access to AP exams by covering the cost for families. AP exams usually cost \$92 each, but students here pay only \$5 per exam for an unlimited number of exams. The school district also expanded course sections on subjects such as AP Computer Science, AP Calculus, AP Seminar and AP Research. AP coordinators and "pathway" coordinators have been added to help guide students toward college and career readiness.

Forms Requested for Leaves, Resignations
