# CAMS, McBride Celebrate New Certifications

McBride High School and the California Academy of Mathematics and Science have earned key certifications for providing students specialized academic and career pathways. The certifications by independent reviewers affirm the high quality of college and career preparation programs at these schools.

McBride earned Linked Learning Gold pathway certifications for its Engineering pathway and its Criminal Justice and Investigations pathway. Meanwhile CAMS earned the Project Lead the Way Distinguished School honor for providing students "broad access to transformative learning opportunities" in computer science, biomedical science and engineering. CAMS is one of only 64 high schools across the nation to receive that award.

"It is a great honor to recognize CAMS for their commitment to students," said Vince Bertram, President and CEO of PLTW. "They are a model for what school should look like, and they should be very proud of ensuring students have the knowledge and skills to be

## Jordan AP Coordinator Nationally Published

Jordan High School Advanced Placement Coordinator Sondra McNair has published an article titled "Advanced Placement for all" on the national Smart Brief website. The website serves nearly six million senior executives and industry professionals nationwide.

McNair is a National Board Certified Teacher who has taught English for 20 years. In her recent article, McNair describes efforts by Jordan and the Long Beach Unified School District to provide students greater access to AP college prep courses and exams.

With about 80 percent of Jordan students receiving subsidized meals, and many of the students among the first in their families to go to college, the AP initiative is especially important for this school. McNair works with students, colleagues and the community to support students who might not otherwise participate in AP courses.

In her article, McNair details some of the strategies and tools that she and her colleagues

PLTW is a leading provider of science, technology, engineering and math curriculum. To be eligible for the honor, CAMS had to:

Offer at least three PLTW courses;

• Have 25 percent of students or more participate in PLTW courses, or of those who participated in PLTW, at least 33 percent had to take two or more PLTW courses during their high school tenure;

• Have 70 percent of students or more earn a proficient score or higher on PLTW end-ofcourse assessments, or 10 percent of students earn the Advanced Placement + PLTW Student Achievement, which offers a pathway providing both types of classes.

McBride is one of the first schools to earn the Gold Certification after participating in a pilot effort. Linked Learning pathways (Continued on next page)

use. The school's AP Café, for instance, is a dedicated student space with computers, whiteboards and flexible seating. "No coffee is served



"No coffee is served but the café gives students a place where they study, get tutoring, complete make-up work, sign out a Chromebook or print out an assignment," McNair said. "Or, they can decompress and play some Uno. The goal is to foster a sense of community and let students know they have a place to get help if they need it."

describes the digital learning resources – Khan Academy, Google Classroom and more – that augment classroom instruction and help students to prepare for AP exams. She discusses ways in which the school makes Wi-Fi and computer hardware more accessible to students.

As with the other LBUSD high schools, Jordan offers affordable AP exams. The exams typically cost \$94 each, but students pay just \$5 per exam for an unlimited number of exams. A rewards program includes yard signs for Jordan students who pass AP tests.

The AP effort at Jordan is getting results. From 2013 to 2017, the percentage of students in grades 11 and 12 who enrolled in one or more AP course increased from 34 percent to 46 percent.

"We're proud of our progress," McNair said.

The club first formed in 1921 in Oakland at a time when women were not permitted to join service organizations. The name Soroptimist, loosely translated from the Latin, means "best for women."

## Summer Internships

The nonprofit Long Beach Career-Linked Learning's Summer 2019 Internship Program connects Long Beach students to internships at businesses in Long Beach and surrounding areas. The goal of the program is to help people ages 16 to 18 to develop personal and professional skills that contribute to their success in the workforce.

Long Beach CaLL is a partnership among the Long Beach Unified School District, Long Beach City College and Cal State Long Beach. Internships are work-based learning experiences with direct supervision and evaluation by an adult. At least 60 hours are required for the internship, 120 preferred, over a minimum of six weeks from June 17 to Aug. 24.
