## It's Official: I'm Retiring in 2020

I have been superintendent of this great school district for 18 years. I love my job. But the time is right to announce that I will be retiring at the end of this academic year.

I have remained connected to this school district ever since I began as a kindergartner here 56 years ago. I started as a teacher at Roosevelt Elementary School 38

graduated from our schools. I want to publicly thank my family for their support.

I also thank our teachers, support staff, labor partners, administrators, parents and community partners for everything they've done to ensure that our students are ready for college and careers. I thank our Board of Education and the other board members who preceded them during my time as superintendent.

### Names in the News

Cynthia Bater, program administrator for Linked Learning and Career Pathways in the High School Office, was invited by the Washington, D.C.-based Education Writers Association to speak at their recent conference in Chicago. The conference theme was "Education and the American Dream: Pathways from High School to College and Careers." Bater spoke on "Mapping Career Pathways in High School." Afterward, a reporter wrote, "I really appreciated this crash-course on the high school to post-secondary transition. I'm already using the information here to evaluate programs I run across, come up with story ideas and inform my work."

Wilson High School senior Gabriel Sanders was awarded a four-year, full tuition scholarship from the Posse Foundation to attend the University of Wisconsin-Madison. The Posse Foundation identifies, recruits, and trains students with extraordinary leadership potential for this scholarship. Sanders underwent a series of panel interviews with Posse officials and staff of the University of Wisconsin. His goals include studying political science, attending law school and then pursuing a career in criminal law and/or environmental justice.

## **State Names 3 Distinguished Schools Here**

Three schools in the Long Beach Unified School District earned the California Distinguished School Award recently for exceptional gains in student achievement.

"These outstanding schools don't just educate students; they also provide the young people of California the tools they need to be successful after graduation," State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Thurmond said. "Thanks go to all the staff at these schools – teachers, administrators, classified employees – and parents, who are working together to provide high-quality educational experiences for all of their students."

Elementary schools and secondary (middle and high) schools are recognized in alternate years. This year's awards focused on the elementary grades. LBUSD's Alvarado, Lafayette and Twain elementary schools were among 323 schools statewide earning recognition. The award is a first for Lafayette, while Alvarado and Twain are repeat winners.

The awards honor schools that demonstrate educational excellence and progress in narrowing achievement gaps. Winners must meet a variety of criteria including exemplary performance on state accountability measures.

"Distinguished School awardees represent examples of not just excellent teaching, learning and collaboration, but also highly successful school climate efforts ranging from real-time conflict resolution to positive behavior intervention," CDE's announcement stated.

The winning schools will be honored Monday, Feb. 10 during a ceremony at the Disneyland Resort in Anaheim.

## **Jordan Pathway Earns Silver Certification**

Jordan High School's Media and Communication pathway (JMAC) is the latest to earn Silver Certification from the Linked Learning Alliance. The honor validates that key components of a specialized academic and career pathway are in place.

Following a Linked Learning Certification for JMAC back in 2013, the latest Silver honor reaffirms the continued development of the pathway, which focuses on digital art, video and stage technology, and TV production.

"We are so proud, and we want to let everyone know," Jordan Pathway Coordinator Wendy Ili said.

Certification is based on a series of standards identified by leaders in the Linked Learning field. Schools seek certification from the Linked Learning Alliance to validate the quality of their college and career pathways. The pathways gain Silver certification when they establish the core components of Linked Learning, or Gold certification when they demonstrate advanced implementation of these components and equitable opportunities for all students.

Linked Learning pathways integrate rigorous academics with technical coursework that is relevant to the needs of local employers. The pathways offer students work-based learning experiences aligned with their classes, and provide support services to help students graduate ready for entry into college and career.

The Long Beach Unified School District also has some of the first Gold certified pathways in the nation, including the Academy of Law and Justice at Cabrillo High School, and two pathways at McBride High School: the Engineering pathway and the Criminal Justice and Investigation pathway. Three pathways at Cabrillo earned Silver designations in earlier months: The Academy of Global Logistics
