27. Salary Adjustments for Employees

As reported at the November board meeting, salary adjustments will occur for represented employees, non-represented employees, and management employees, due to SBCEO's increase in its Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) base.

For 2022-23, the salary increase will be an additional 4%, retroactive to July 1, 2022, bringing the total salary increase for this year to 5%. The originally negotiated salary increase for 2022-23 was 1%.

For 2023-24, the salary increase will be an additional 4%. The originally negotiated salary increase for 2023-24 was 0%.

SBCEO and our two bargaining units, the Santa Barbara County Education Association (SBCEA - certificated employees) and the California School Employees Association, Chapter 817 (CSEA - classified employees), have agreed on the language in the memoranda of understanding (MOUs) for salary adjustments, attached.

SBCEO is also completing its salary schedule adjustments that began in 2018-2019. At that time, classified and certificated salary schedules were restructured, integrating longevity and adding additional steps to allow for salary growth over time. We are now in the process of finalizing adjustments to management schedules. This will result in salary adjustments for managers, with 6 positions increasing \$10,000 or more (Education Code section 1302).

Superintendent's Report December 9, 2022

Student Enrollment in SBCEO Schools and Programs

Curriculum and Instruction (C&I) Division

Accountability – CA School Dashboards

After a two-year hiatus, the CA School Dashboards (Dashboard) will publish state indicators for the first time since December 2019. They are expected around December

15. The state indicators will reflect results from the 2021-2022 school year and are reported at the state, district, and school levels for all students and for statistically significant student groups. Indicators available this year include High School Graduation Rate, Suspension Rate, Chronic Absenteeism, ELPI (English Language Proficiency), Mathematics and ELA. The College and Career Readiness Indicator will not be available until December 2023.

Historically, the Dashboard has used a 5x5 matrix, combining both status and change, to provide a performance color for each indicator. This year, the Dashboard will report status only for each indicator, and will use purple bars to show one of five levels, from very low to very high.

Dashboard results will be used to determine which districts are eligible for level two differentiated assistance (DA) support and which schools will receive federal funds for comprehensive and targeted improvement support. These lists will be released in late December/early January. The results in ELA and Mathematics will be based on the same scores released last month, with two differences: instead of the percent of students at each achievement level, the Dashboard uses a measure called Distance from Standard, which is essentially an average scale score.

The other major difference is that this is the first year, the new federal penalty for participation rate will be calculated into the results. While there has always been a 95% participation rate expectation, the new penalty assigns the lowest obtainable scale score (LOSS) to the number of students needed to meet the 95% rate, thus significantly skewing the results for some schools, districts and student groups. The C&I team has been meeting with district and school leaders with lower participation rates to analyze the impact of and the genesis of the lowered rates.

The division has also been providing support through Curriculum Council to reorient everyone to the Dashboard and its methods for calculating and interpreting indicators as well as the use of additional local indicators and data to analyze the impact of post-pandemic recovery and growth efforts.

Accountability – LCAP, Data, Educational Partner Engagement, and Plan Alignment

We have offered our second workshop for district teams in the series: LCAP Professional Learning: Operationalizing Equity on December 8. Workshop two focused on data analysis and included the following outcomes: Clarifying expectations for the use of data to support the development of a data culture; Identifying state and local data that is available to measure progress toward LCAP goals; Making meaning of data to inform current practice and explore areas of inequity; Preparing and presenting data that is relevant and accessible to all families. The follow-up workshops with each team to apply cycles one and two are taking place in December and January. The C&I team has also been working with our regional partners to align the processes for the Special Education Plan (CIM) and the DA process for LEAs that qualify for support through the various accountability agencies and processes.

Universal Pre-Kindergarten – Workforce and Professional Learning

SBCEO received the grant notification award and has already identified the 20+ teachers who need between 6 and 24 units to be eligible to teach TK (and who are not qualified by district analysis and policy or are not grandfathered in). We are processing their applications and providing access within our partner Institutes of Higher Education to provide choice of in-person, hybrid, or online opportunities to learn and earn the credits. Teachers will receive reimbursement for tuition, books, and class materials. Additionally, we have begun to offer trainings in several of the required areas for Preschool and TK instructional staff. We just received from the state each LEAs UPK plan and are in the process of analyzing the data to further customize supports. New data, plan and reporting requirements are being released, and we are supporting districts with these additional reports.

Curriculum Council and Superintendents' Council

Curriculum Council was held on Friday, December 2, and Superintendents' Council on Monday, December 5. Topics addressed at different altitudes at both meetings included: Data and Dashboards as described above. Other topics included: Overview training on the Science of Reading and opportunities for customized training at various levels by our team, who are fully trained in LETRS (Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling); State and Federal Updates; Items related to Curriculum, Instruction, Assessment, Accountability, Planning, Continuous Improvement, Professional Learning and new laws going into effect in January; Support for the Art, Music, and Instructional Material Block Grant, and Support for the Expanded Learning Opportunity grant planning.

Social Emotional Learning

As part of our Social Emotional Learning Community of Practice, several school and district teams are implementing their plans with support from our Instructional Support team. Additionally, we are welcoming back, by local educational agency demand, Ricky Robertson, author of Building Resilience in Children Impacted by Adverse Childhood Experiences. We have invited many of our community partners for this training, because it is essential for all folks who work directly with young people in the regular instructional day and in expanded learning programs. The January 24th session will focus on strategies for supporting healing in both youth and staff, with the May 17 date focused on building systems resilience.

Educational Services Division

Early Care & Education (ECE)

Supporting the ECE Workforce: In partnership with the Santa Barbara Foundation, the Early Care and Education (ECE) department received \$250,000 of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to support ECE professionals with the acquisition of units specific to caring for infants and toddlers. The goal of the program is to increase the number of early educators certified to care for this age group. The ECE department will collaborate with local licensed childcare facilities, community colleges, and the ECE

community to advertise and market the program. Additionally, once individuals are certified to care for infants and toddlers, ECE along with their partners, the Santa Barbara Foundation and Children's Resource and Referral, will support the individuals by referring them to local ECE job opportunities.

Juvenile Court & Community Schools (JCCS)

FitzGerald Community School Thanksgiving Break: FitzGerald Community School was closed for Thanksgiving break November 21-25, 2022. On Friday, November 18, 2022, the FitzGerald school staff prepared a homemade Thanksgiving feast for the students and support staff. This long-standing tradition provided the students and staff an opportunity to celebrate the holiday together.

Special Education Division

Each year, the National Association of School Psychologists (NASP) designates a week to highlight the work of school psychologists. During the week of November 7-11, 2022 schools throughout the United States celebrated National School Psychology Week (NSPW) to highlight the important work school psychologists do to help all students thrive. From the NASP website, "This year's theme was 'Together We Shine,' which is derived from how we see hope after several challenging years." The SBCEO Special Education Division honored our school psychologists with a lunchtime gathering to express our appreciation for their ongoing commitment to our students and families throughout the year.

Human Resources Division

The Human Resources Department is currently planning two February countywide Employee Recruitment Fairs for all districts and SBCEO – one in north county and one in south county.

A summary of select changes in law 2022 related to governance

Brown Act. As boards and committees begin preparations for meetings in 2023, there are two changes to the Brown Act that further modify virtual participation rules:

1. Assembly Bill 2449

This bill was signed by the governor on September 13, 2022, and will go into effect on January 1, 2023. Changes to Cal. Gov. Code § 54953 will allow a board member to participate remotely in certain emergency situations without having to comply with the pre-COVID Brown Act notice requirements for teleconferenced meetings. The options for virtual participation added under this law will only be in effect for 2023.

Under the new law, a member can participate remotely in either of the following situations:

(1) if they notify the board of their need to be remote for "**just cause**" at the earliest possible opportunity (which may include at the start of the meeting), with a general description of the circumstances necessitating the remote participation. A board member may only use this option twice per year. "Just cause" is defined to mean a childcare or caregiving need, a

contagious illness, a need related to a physical or mental disability, or travel on official business for a legislative body.

2) the member requests the ability to participate remotely due to "**emergency circumstances**" and the board takes action approve the request. "Emergency circumstances" are defined as a physical or family medical emergency that prevents inperson attendance. The member should provide a general description for their request without disclosing medical diagnoses. The request and approval should happen at the earliest possible opportunity but may occur at the beginning of the meeting.

In both circumstances, members are required to participate remotely via both audio and visual feeds. Additionally, if a board member will be participating remotely under this provision, then the public must also have the option to access and offer public comment remotely, with instructions identified on the agenda.

2. Formal End of State of Emergency Declaration

The state of emergency will formally end on February 28, 2023. Since the Fall of 2021, AB 361 gave boards and their committees the ability to conduct meetings virtually without following the pre-COVID Brown Act's notice provisions, so long as the board passed a resolution every 30 days acknowledging the State of Emergency and that social distancing was recommended. When the State of Emergency ends on February 28, 2023, conducting a meeting virtually without a physical quorum will no longer be an option.

SB 955. Students in grades 6-12 granted one excused day for political engagement.

One excused absence per year to participate in a civic or political event provided that the pupil notifies the school ahead of the absence. These activities may include, but are not limited to, voting, poll working, strikes, public commenting, candidate speeches, political or civic forums, and town halls. Additional excused absences may be granted to students in grades 6-12 at the discretion of the school administrator.

AB 1655. Juneteenth added to the list of state holidays.

June 19, known as Juneteenth, added to the list of state holidays on which K-12 schools and community colleges must be closed. Juneteenth commemorates emancipation of enslaved African Americans in Texas, which occurred on June 19, 1865. This law goes into effect on January 1, 2023, and will be in effect for the current school year. We recommend that you review your calendars now to make any changes that might be required. AB 1801 also adds April 24 as Genocide Remembrance Day, and permits school districts to be closed to commemorate if the governing board reaches a memorandum of understanding for that purpose.

AB 1925. County and district offices: qualifications.

Current law generally provides that a person is not eligible to hold a county or district office unless the person is a registered voter of the county or district of that office. Current law authorizes the board of supervisors or any other legally constituted appointing authority in a county or district to waive the registered voter requirement in certain circumstances. This bill removes that waiver authority and, instead, applies the registered voter requirement.

AB 2158. Local educational agencies: ethics training.

This bill requires officials at school districts, county offices of education, and charter schools to take ethics trainings every two years. This bill applies to school board members, county board members, and charter school governing board members, whether or not the member receives any type of compensation, salary, or stipend or reimbursement for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of official duties. The bill requires all members in service as of January 1, 2025, except for members whose term of office ends before January 1, 2026, to receive that ethics training before January 1, 2026, and at least once every 2 years thereafter.

SB 1100. Open meetings: orderly conduct.

This bill authorizes the presiding member of the legislative body, or their designee, to remove an individual for disrupting the meeting. The bill generally requires removal to be preceded by a warning that their behavior is disrupting the meeting and that their failure to cease their behavior may result in their removal. The bill authorizes the presiding member or their designee to then remove the individual if they do not promptly cease their disruptive behavior.

A summary of select changes in law 2022 related to safety

AB 452. Pupil safety: parental notification: firearm safety laws.

AB 452 requires school districts, COEs, and charter schools to annually inform parents and guardians of pupils at the beginning of the first semester or quarter of the regular school term of California's child access prevention laws and laws relating to the safe storage of firearms. By imposing additional duties on school districts, COEs, and charter schools, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. The bill requires the CDE, on or before July 1, 2023, to develop and subsequently update, in consultation with the DOJ, and provide to school districts, COEs, and charter schools, and, upon request, to provide to private schools, model language for the notice regarding those child access prevention and safe storage of firearms laws. The bill makes school districts, COEs, charter schools, private schools, and the CDE immune from civil liability for any damages relating to the notice.

SB 906. School safety: homicide threats.

This bill requires, commencing with the 2023–24 school year, local educational agencies (LEAs) maintaining kindergarten or any of grades 1 to 12 to, informed by the model content, include information related to the safe storage of firearms in an annual notification provided to the parents or guardians of pupils. The bill requires a school official whose duties involve regular contact with pupils in any of grades 6 to 12, as part of a middle school or high school, and who is alerted to or observes any threat or perceived threat to immediately report the threat or perceived threat to law enforcement. The bill requires, with the support of the LEA, the local law enforcement agency or school site police, to immediately conduct an investigation and threat assessment. The bill requires the investigation and threat assessment to include a review of the firearm registry of the DOJ and, if justified by a reasonable suspicion that it would produce evidence related to the threat or perceived threat, a school site search. By imposing additional duties on local educational agencies, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

AB 1406. Law enforcement agency policies: carrying of equipment.

This bill requires a law enforcement agency that authorizes peace officers to carry an electroshock device, such as a taser or stun gun that is held and operated in a manner similar to a pistol, to require that device to be holstered or otherwise carried on the lateral side of the body opposite to the side that that officer's primary firearm is holstered. Chapter 945, Statutes of 2022

AB 2879. Online content: cyberbullying.

This bill requires a social media platform, subject to specified exceptions, to disclose all cyberbullying reporting procedures in the social media platform's terms of service, and requires a social media platform to establish a mechanism within its internet-based service that allows an individual, whether or not that individual has a profile on the internet-based service, to report cyberbullying or any content that violates the existing terms of service.

ACR 166. Child Abuse Prevention Month.

ACR 166 acknowledged April 2022 as Child Abuse Prevention Month and encouraged Californians to work together to support youth-serving child abuse prevention activities in their communities and schools.

10. Presentation on the Current State of Juvenile Court Schools as a Result of SB 823 and AB 2471

Assistant Superintendent of Educational Services Bridget Baublits provided a presentation to the board about SB 823 and AB 2471, the formation of the Office of Youth Community Restoration and its role in the realignment of the Division of Juvenile Justice, and the impact on Juvenile Court Schools.

SB 823 shifts the responsibility for managing all juvenile offenders from the state to local jurisdictions, a process known as realignment. AB 2471 clarifies that the Youth Bill of Rights applies to youth confined in any juvenile justice facility. Mrs. Baublits addressed what that meant for SBCEO JCCS programs.

Recommended Approval of Rules and Regulations Governing the Purchase of Standard School Supplies and Equipment by School Districts

Annually, the Santa Barbara County Board of Education establishes rules and regulations under which a purchasing cooperative is made available for use by school districts to purchase standard school supplies and equipment.

In an effort to decrease the cost of standard school supply expenditures to districts within our county, the Santa Barbara County Education Office provides information regarding government purchasing consortiums that offer these types of supplies and equipment to districts at a discount. The primary organization our office has engaged to provide these services is **EdBuy**.

Overview - EdBuy is a cooperative purchasing program operated by the *California County Superintendents (CCS)*. EdBuy goes to bid on behalf of both county offices of education and school districts. The organization uses proven practices to obtain best pricing on a wide range of commodities.

In addition to EdBuy, our office has compiled the following list of cooperative purchasing entities that offer other contracts that may be useful for the purchasing benefit of school districts in our county. These resources include:

- CalSAVE Education and Government Purchasing
- DGS-CMAS Department of General Services, California Multiple Award Schedules
- PEPPM Cooperative Purchasing
- US General Services Administration Cooperative Purchasing Program
- CDW-G Multi-brand provider of information technology solutions to education, government, and business

Purchasing consortiums do not have everything that a school district may need to purchase, but they include many of the items that a district would benefit from purchasing through cooperative bidding.

It is recommended that EdBuy be accepted as the primary cooperative purchasing source for standard school supplies and equipment by the Santa Barbara County Board of Education for the benefit of all school districts in the county.

SBCEO conducted a salary survey to provide data to the Santa Barbara County Board of Education Salary Committee to inform discussion regarding the salary for the Santa Barbara County Superintendent of Schools.

History of Superintendent base salary:

Below is a chart of the base salary for the Santa Barbara County Superintendent of Schools since July 1, 2017. The historical practice has been that the Superintendent is eligible for a graduate degree stipend, the same longevity models offered to certificated management staff, and a paid Association of California School Administrators (ACSA) membership. In addition, the County Board of Education has applied the same annual salary increases to the Superintendent as that which have been negotiated for SBCEO employees.

Comparable COE and LEA data:

The attached summary includes data from other county offices of education (COEs) and the larger local educational agencies (LEAs) within Santa Barbara County for comparison.

The data show that the salary for the Santa Barbara County Superintendent of Schools is not commensurate with comparable COE superintendent salaries or with the larger school districts within Santa Barbara County.

The most up-to-date information was obtained through both salary schedule searches online and direct conversations with the human resources personnel to gather information on any forthcoming changes this fiscal year.

The data includes total students served by the COE or LEA, total employees, total budgets, and for COEs, the total number of districts countywide. This allows for a more detailed comparison with entities that are most similar to SBCEO such as those COEs highlighted in blue that have similar budgets, numbers of students, number of employees, and numbers of LEAs served.

Local educational agencies included were Santa Barbara Unified School District, Santa Maria-Bonita School District, Santa Maria Joint Union High School District, and Lompoc Unified School District.

Highlighted in green is the data for SBCEO and just above that line are several calculations for reference including the means and medians for the comparable COEs and larger LEAs.

As discussed in the Board Salary Committee meeting, **\$273,168** is the exact middle between the local LEA superintendent salary mean (\$264,361.24) and the superintendent salary mean of the most comparable COEs (\$281,975.52). **\$273,168** would bring into alignment the Santa Barbara County Superintendent's salary with comparable educational entities.

Finally, it is important to note that all of these LEAs and COEs continue to negotiate and increase salaries this year, next year, and going forward.

WHEREAS, the Santa Barbara County Board of Education is conducting virtual meetings by way of telephonic and/or internet-based services as to allow members of the public to fully participate in meetings and offer public comment.
