Overview of Sexual Health Education

We teach comprehensive sexual health education in alignment with **state law** (RCW 28A.300.475) and **district policy** (Policy 2125).

FLASH (Family Life and Sexual Health) is our curriculum that meets **state requirements for sexual health education**.

FLASH is taught in **grades 4-12**. No sexual health content is taught in grades K-3.

Comprehensive Sexual Health Education

In grades 4-12, <u>instruction must be consistent</u> with Health Education K-12 Learning Standards, must be inclusive, using language and strategies that recognize all members of protected classes, and must include age-appropriate, medically/scientifically, inclusive information about:

- The physiological, psychological, and sociological developmental process experienced by an individual
- The development of intrapersonal and interpersonal skills to communicate, respectfully and effective, to reduce health risks and choose healthy behaviors and relationships based on mutual respect and affection, and free from violence, coercion, and intimidation
- Health care and prevention resources
- The development of meaningful relationships and avoidance of exploitative relationships
- Understanding the influences of family, peers, community and the media throughout life on healthy sexual relationships
- Affirmative consent and recognizing and responding safely and effectively when violence or a risk of violence is or may be present, with strategies that include bystander training

Overview of Health Education in Highline

Grades K-5: Health is taught by the classroom teacher.

Grades 6-8: Health is integrated into other subjects (Physical Education, Science, Advisory)

Grades 9-12: Health is required for one semester (0.5 credits) as partial fulfillment of WA State graduation requirements.

FLASH (Family Life and Sexual Health) is the district curriculum for sexual health education, developed by King County Public Health.

Why is Sexual Health Education Important?

According to the 2018 Healthy Youth Survey, **12.3% of 8th graders**, **18.9% of 10th graders**, and **25.2% of 12th graders** had been **forced** into kissing, sexual touch or intercourse when they did not want to.

Research shows comprehensive sexual health education is an important and **effective sexual abuse and violence prevention strategy**.

When students learn about and develop skills related to affirmative consent, they are more able to **set personal boundaries, to feel respected, and to respect the boundaries of others**.

FLASH aligns with state law and Highline policy

- FLASH teaches content and skills that are developmentally appropriate across grade levels.
- FLASH was developed in the 1980s and has been updated over time to be medically and factually up-to-date.

Goals of the FLASH Curriculum

FLASH is designed to support young people in making **healthy choices**:

- Abstaining from sex
- Using protection when they do have sex
- Seeking health care when they need it
- Communicating effectively with their families
- Respecting others' decisions not to have sex



FLASH & Families

One goal of the FLASH curriculum is to **improve communication with families** about relationships and sexual health.

This includes optional family homework assignments so that students can have **short**, **focused conversations with family members** to learn more about the **values** and **expectations** of the important adults in their lives.



What do students learn in FLASH?

*FLASH is aligned to WA state learning standards for health



Grades K-3

No sexual health content is taught in grades K-3.

Instruction focuses on life skills to help students understand their feelings, set goals, solve problems and get along with others (social emotional learning).

Grades 4-5

Comprehensive sexual health education occurs one time in these grades. HIV/AIDS prevention is taught annually.

- Self-Esteem & Decision-Making
- Friendship & Gender Roles
- Consent & Bystander Skills
- Reporting Sexual Abuse
- Reproductive System & Puberty
- Pregnancy & HIV/AIDS

Grades 6-8

Comprehensive sexual health education is taught two times during these grades. HIV/AIDS prevention is taught annually.

- Reproductive System & Pregnancy
- Sexual Orientation & Gender Identity
- Rules of Dating & Saying No
- Preventing STDs & HIV/AIDS
- Condoms & Birth Control Methods

Grades 9-12

Comprehensive sexual health education occurs two times during high school.

- Climate Setting
- Reproductive System & Pregnancy
- Sexual Orientation & Gender Identity
- Undoing Gender Stereotypes
- Healthy Relationships
- Coercion & Consent
- Online Safety & Preventing Sexual Violence
- Abstinence & Birth Control Methods
- Condoms & Preventing Pregnancy, HIV & STDs
- Testing for HIV & other STDs
- Communication & Decision Making
- Improving School Health

What Are My Rights as a Parent/Guardian?

Parents and guardians must be notified by the school 30 days before planned instruction and be able to review all instructional materials.

Parents can opt their children out of some or all sexual health education instruction (HIV / AIDS must be previewed first).
