Academics

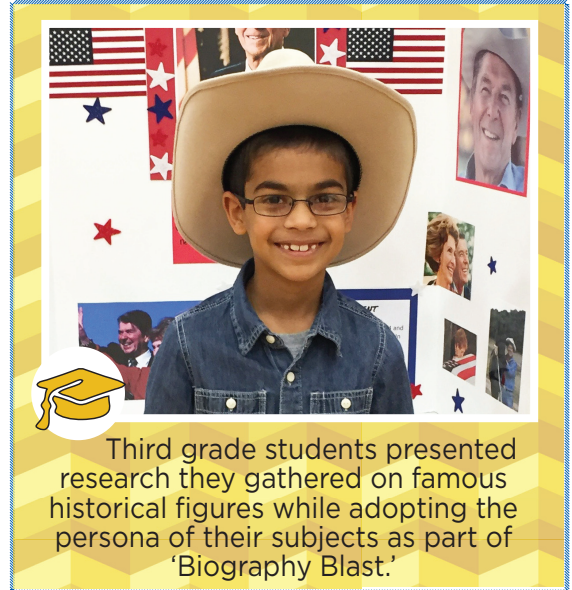
With a purpose of providing the knowledge, care and passion necessary for every child to reach their individual potential, Madeira City Schools' academic program is anchored in excellence.

• 35 members of the Madeira High School (MHS) Class of 2016 were named Top Seniors for graduating with a 4.0 or above GPA. Our annual **College Profile**, highlighting more accomplishments of each year's graduating class, can be found on our website.

• 20 middle school students participated in the Madeira Middle School (MMS) Spelling Bee in conjunction with the Scripps National Spelling Bee competition. Maddie Luther qualified for the regional bee sponsored and televised by WCPO News Channel 9, and placed in the top ten.

• Thirty-seven juniors and seniors exemplifying the National Honor Society (NHS) pillars of Leadership, Service, Character and Academics were formally inducted into Madeira's Olive M. Gregory chapter of the NHS. Mr. Brett Becker was also inducted as an honorary faculty member. NHS provided holiday gifts for eight needy families through the Salvation Army's Adopt a Family program with proceeds from the annual Father Daughter Dance.

• Spanish and Chinese classes were offered before school for elementary school students.



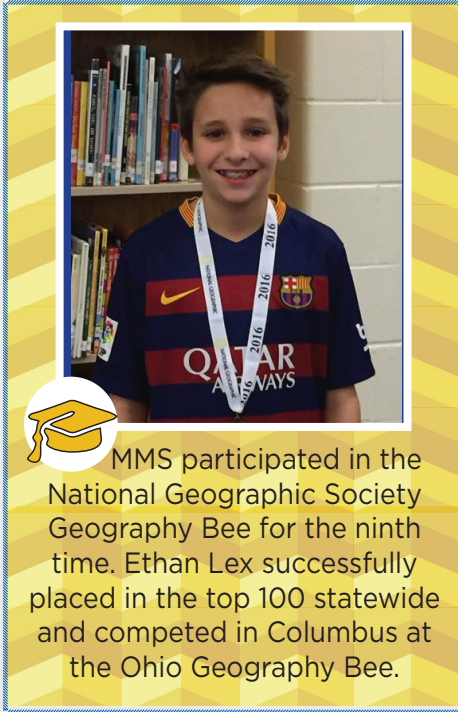
Third grade students presented research they gathered on famous historical figures while adopting the persona of their subjects as part of 'Biography Blast.'



Twelve MHS Personal Finance students were each awarded \$20,000 scholarships in the H&R Block Budget Challenge, a national financial literacy competition that involved more than 100,000 high school students. The challenge simulates life as adult in which students invest, manage bills, save for the future and pay taxes.

• 25 eighth grade students and 30 seventh grade students were inducted into the National Junior Honor Society, a national organization established to recognize outstanding middle school students who have demonstrated excellence in the areas of scholarship, leadership, service, citizenship and character. This was the first year that seventh grade students were inducted.

• 89 MHS students who took AP exams in Spring of 2015 earned AP Scholar awards for demonstrating college level achievement. 30 were named AP Scholar (scored 3 or higher on 3 or more exams); 16 were named AP Scholar with Honor (scored an average score of at least 3.25 on all AP exams taken, and 3 or higher on 4 or more of these exams); 36 were named AP Scholar with Distinction (scored at least a 3.5 on all AP exams taken, and 3 or higher on 5 or more of these exams) and 7 were named National AP Scholar (scored at least 4 on all AP exams taken, and 4 or higher on 8 or more of these exams).



MMS participated in the National Geographic Society Geography Bee for the ninth time. Ethan Lex successfully placed in the top 100 statewide and competed in Columbus at the Ohio Geography Bee.

State Level Competition:

- The MMS Math Counts team traveled to the state competition after placing sixth in Cincinnati in a photo finish. The team placed in the top half with Zhuo-Nan Huang placing eighth in Cincinnati and twelfth in Ohio.
- Eight MMS Personal Finance teams qualified to compete in the Ohio Personal Finance Challenge Exam with over 500 students across the state. MMS students swept the state competition taking all of the top eight spots. Four students represented the state of Ohio at the National Personal Finance Challenge in Kansas City and placed ninth in the nation.

- The Madeira Engineering Teams competed in the annual **TSA Engineering competition** at the University of Cincinnati. Madeira's Grade 9 & 10 team placed second in the region, and the Grade 11 & 12 team finished fourth.
- Madeira Middle School offered six courses eighth grade students can take for high school credit; Algebra 1, Health, Physical Education, French 1, Latin 1 and Spanish 1. The students are bused to Madeira High School to take the foreign language classes.
- Held every other year, Around the World Day introduced food, clothing and items native representing the countries Madeira Elementary School (MES) students visited. After learning about each culture, students had their 'passports' stamped.



Madiera High Schools' composite ACT scores for students taking the test in 2015 were the highest since 2011 in all four subject areas. The average composite was 26.3.

- Live Oaks Computer Service Technician & Networking student Ryan Kamp passed both parts of the Computer Certification Exam and became A+ certified.
- MMS had seven National Merit Commended students based on their scores



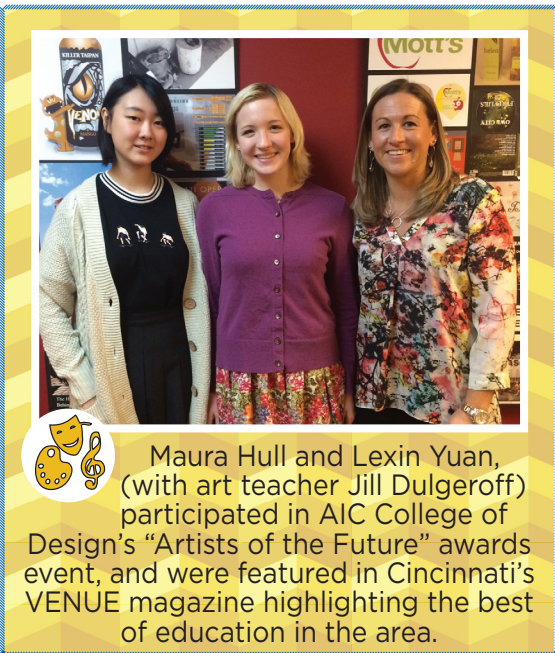
Arts

Driven by a passion to inspire creativity and enhance learning, Madeira City Schools is committed to providing strong visual and performing arts experiences throughout the school district.

- MHS senior Rachel Chambers received a Silver Medal in the Scholastic Art & Writing Award for her work in Photography. This year's awards had nearly 320,000 submissions from students in Grades 7-12, placing Rachel among the top 1% of all submissions in the nation.
- Lexin Yuan had two pieces of digital artwork selected for the Ohio Governor's Youth Art Exhibition out of 11,500 regional entries from 15 regions.
- Original student artwork was submitted for the district's 10th annual Holiday Greeting Card Contest 'Kindness Grows'. An assortment of cards sent out by the school board was printed from the winning entries. Additional entries were made into 'Welcome to Madeira' and 'Congratulations' cards to be used throughout the year.



MMS Art Club students designed and painted a rain barrel for the Saving Local Waters / Cincinnati Zoo Rain Barrel Art Contest. Their entry, "Up, Up and Away," came in 2nd place after an online vote. Designs were later auctioned off at the zoo.



Maura Hull and Lexin Yuan, (with art teacher Jill Dulgeroff) participated in AIC College of Design's "Artists of the Future" awards event, and were featured in Cincinnati's VENUE magazine highlighting the best of education in the area.

- Art students from MES and MHS partnered with the United Service Organization *Tribute Cincinnati* for the "Stars and Stripes" event which raised funds to support critical services for wounded veterans and their families. Madeira students' artwork was displayed in the lobby of Cincinnati's Music Hall, then sent to brighten and bless the lives of wounded service men and women at hospitals and medical centers after the event.
- MES' "Got Art?" week immersed students in the arts through art, music and dance workshops, 'Meet the Artist' day featuring artists Mary Cassatt, Charley Harper and Joan Miro and a visit from author David Fitzsimmons. "Got Art?" concluded with Young Author Night where books written by each student were displayed, and the Grade 4 musical at Medert Auditorium.
- Middle school students received Gold, Silver and Honorable Mention in the Scholastic Art awards.
- Teachers and students at MES collaborated to create door decorations for the theme "Let Our Branches Grow" to kick off Right to Read Week. Local author **Loren Long** visited to share his newest book *Little Tree* with the students.

- Madeira Middle School hosted May Fest, an open house to showcase student art, band and choral performances.
- MMS students Courtney Culp, Jacob Cooper, Macy Hyatt and Sophia Gugino were selected to participate in the Ohio Music Education Association (OMEA) District 14 Junior Honor Choir.
- Madeira High School singers Erica Hobbs and Bella Ferguson were selected to participate in the District 14 Honor Choir.
 - Four MHS choir members, Rachel Chambers, Trey Adams, Zoe Smith and Alyssa Laake participated in the district level solo and ensemble competition. They received a Superior rating based on their performance of a memorized vocal solo.
 - MMS students Anna Rau, Lexi Born and Nathan Born participated in the Junior Honor Band.



Arts *at Madeira*

Driven by a passion to inspire creativity and enhance learning, Madeira City Schools is committed to providing strong visual and performing arts experiences throughout the school district.

State Level Competition:

- The Madeira High School Choir received a Superior rating at the state competition.
- The MHS Concert Band received a Superior at District and qualified for state concert level where they earned an Excellent .
- Adelaide Young was selected for the all state honor band.
- Seven MMS students competed at the Power of the Pen Districts, two qualified for the Regional competition, and 7th grade student Kate McDonough qualified for the state competition. Power of the Pen is an educational enhancement program devoted to excellence in creative writing.



The MHS Marching Mustangs qualified for and competed in the OMEA State Marching Band finals. The band and colorguard earned an 'Excellent' rating for their performance of "New World Symphony" at state.

- Summer on Stage presented Music Theatre Camp at Madeira High School for students in Grades 5-9. The camp provided a safe, fun, and educational environment for Madeira students to experience theatre and grow as a performer and individual through exploration into the performing arts. A showcase was held at the end of each week.
- Madeira Theatre Arts' Department presented the theatrical performance of *Play On!* In the fall, and the musical *You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown* in the spring. Over 80 Madeira Theatre Arts students acted, sang, and worked on the stage or technical crew and presented a total of ten performances. Student Leadership & Activities

We are focused on preparing students to be college and career ready, and are intentional about equipping tomorrow's leaders.



The 8th annual MHS Day Of Service provided opportunities and transportation for every high school student to one of 40 sites within the Greater Cincinnati Area.

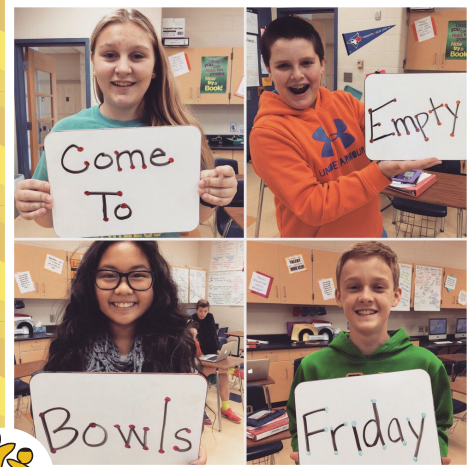
- Madeira Elementary participated in **The Great Kindness Challenge** through the Kids for Peace Organization and was officially designated as a 'Kindness Certified School.' The week was devoted to performing as many acts of kindness as possible, decorating the halls with "kindness matters" posters, and completing classroom lessons about the importance for being kind.
- MHS students joined over 600 other high school students exchange service leadership ideas, programs, and activities at the **Mayerson Foundation Service Learning Program**. The students learned the importance of community service and how to implement it at MHS after spending a week understanding the needs and assets of people living in Cincinnati's inner-city communities.
- Each student is required to complete 40 hours of community service before graduation - 11 members of the Class of 2016 each completed over 150 hours.

• Focus groups of Madeira students who were involved in athletics, student council, clubs, and marketing were directly involved with the school's **new athletic logo project**. Their vision into what it meant to them personally to be a Madeira Mustang or a Madeira Amazon means was the basis for the designs. After meetings with parents, community members, alumni and staff members, the students' input was the impetus for the final logos.

• The Madeira Latin Club & Madeira Theatre Art hosted dinner before opening night of the fall play. 'An Italian Dinner' was hosted by the Madeira Latin Club before Opening Night of Madeira Theatre Arts' production of *Play On!*

• Hannah Gottesman was honored as the Good Citizen of the Year by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

• Every member of the senior class was invited to have lunch with the Superintendent, courtesy of the Board of Education. Students shared their high school experiences, opinions, and future plans.



7th graders hosted the 4th annual **Empty Bowls Dinner Event**. Students provided salad, soup, and dessert in exchange for a \$5 donation per person or a \$10 donation per family. All proceeds went to organizations that aid the fight against poverty, homelessness, and hunger. Students created ceramic bowls in art class which guests were invited to take at the end of the evening.

- All MES students participated in a service learning project through The Lifetime of Giving Grant. This was a student-driven initiative to give back to our community. The students collected toiletry items to create care packages for a local public school pantry. The students hand painted large flower pots, and the 4th grade student leaders planted flowers in their 'Clean Up Madeira' park beautification project. The flower pots are on display at Sellman Park.
- The MMS student council traveled to Camp Kern for team building, discussions about leadership and working together for the common good. See page 12 of this QP for more about "LIGHT" - a student driven and student owned initiative that was developed after the trip to Camp Kern. Student council members presented their new school climate focus to the student body during a pep rally prior to their annual dodgeball tournament to support Josh Cares - an organization that helps families of seriously ill children by 'standing in the gap' to provide young patients with consistency during their hospital stay.

- Greta Davis, Cameron Finke, Angela Hunt, Joseph Kirby, Ryan Lienhart, Anna Rusk, Trey Waltz, Mia Wyrick, Maggie Bartson, Spencer Cox, Kyle Homan, Rachel Schiller, Ava Bruffey, Maddie Faris, and Erin Parker represented MHS at the Anthony Munoz Youth Leadership Seminar at Xavier.

- Ally Week was held by the MHS student council in support of the LGBT community. Students and staff were encouraged to wear purple and Purple Day wristbands were sold.

- MHS students Erin Parker and Alex Miller were selected to represent Madeira at the **Student Global Leadership Summit** in Amsterdam during the summer of 2016.

- The French Club held their annual Crepe sale to support the the Restavek Foundation to end child slavery in Haiti.

- The MHS Art Club and RSW/US sponsored a gently worn shoe collection drive with Indian Hill School district and local 45 companies across Cincinnati benefiting Soles4Souls, an international not for profit global social enterprise committed to fighting poverty.

- 15 Madeira seniors participated in the Madeira MSA Architects Design Partnership Program. The students studied various aspects of working for an architectural firm including branding, trend research, design, and teamwork. Working closely with mentors from MSA and their MHS advisors, the students created an appealing and highly functional transit hub culminating into a final project proposal for the Madeira Metro Bus Stop. They presented their research and final design solutions to a panel of Madeira administrators, MSA designers and parents.

- A Madeira Middle School team raised awareness for Down Syndrome at the annual Buddy Walk. Both staff and students walked in the march.

- MHS Key Club participated in Project Linus, a food drive for Needs Pantry and pictures with Santa in conjunction with the City of Madeira.





Student Leadership & Activities

at Madeira

We believe that extracurricular activities and community service are a vibrant and vital part of the total Madeira educational experience and play an important role in the development of our students.

- On behalf of the Magnified Giving Program, 8th grade students presented grants to three organizations; Cancer-Free Kids, Our Daily Bread, The Center for Holocaust and Humanity Education, EPIC House.

- MMS raised \$1,189.25 for The American Heart Association and \$576 for Josh Cares.

- Eleven sixth grade girls completed the twelve week Heart and Sole program through Girls on the Run.

- Understanding the impact of a positive school culture

and strong social skills on a student's personal and academic success, the Madeira Elementary Care Committee developed Care Kits. The kits included a book, talking tips for parents, and an activity related to the quarterly themes of Kindness and Empathy, Celebrating You, Respecting Differences and Friendship. The project ensured that every child is exposed to the same concepts and language for building a culture of kindness at Madeira Elementary School.

- MHS Entrepreneurship students created and executed business plans for three non-profit companies, and held fundraisers for each. Profits from CARE, Inc. raised over \$2,100 for the Alzheimer's Association from a powderpuff football game, Elevate Enterprise hosted a football game and donated over \$1,000 to Diego's Boys and Still Standing's product sales raised \$1,900 for Autism Speaks.

- In the MES after school 'Culture Club,' Madeira families with roots in different countries shared their culture with 3rd and 4th grade students.

- Five varsity athletes signed to participate in sports at the college level.

State Level Competition:

- Sophomore Ethan Snyder qualified to compete in the state golf tournament.

- The boys Track and Field 4x800 relay team of Nick Cedillo, Jacob Waters, Chet Dobson and Adam Mahler qualified for the state competition and set a new school record with 8:16.01.

- Alex Fortman, Braden Kane, Peter Nelson, Chet Dobson, Jake Waters and Emma Fortman qualified to compete at the state swimming and diving finals. Jake Waters broke the Madeira School record in 500 free style with 4:44.0.



Alex Fortman won the OHSAA swimming championship in the 100 free.



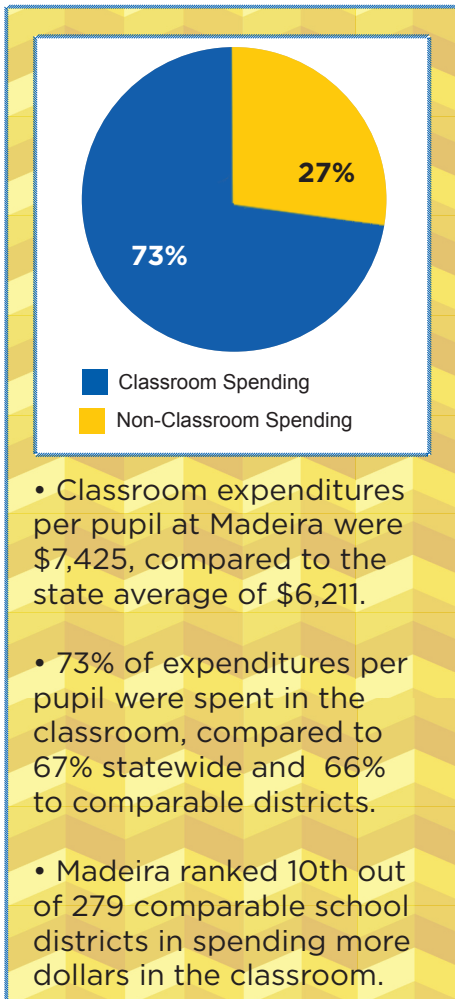
Nick Cedillo was the champion in the 800 meter state Track and Field competition.

- The MMS and MHS Latin Club attended the 66th Ohio Junior Classical League Convention and placed third overall out of 22 schools in the state.

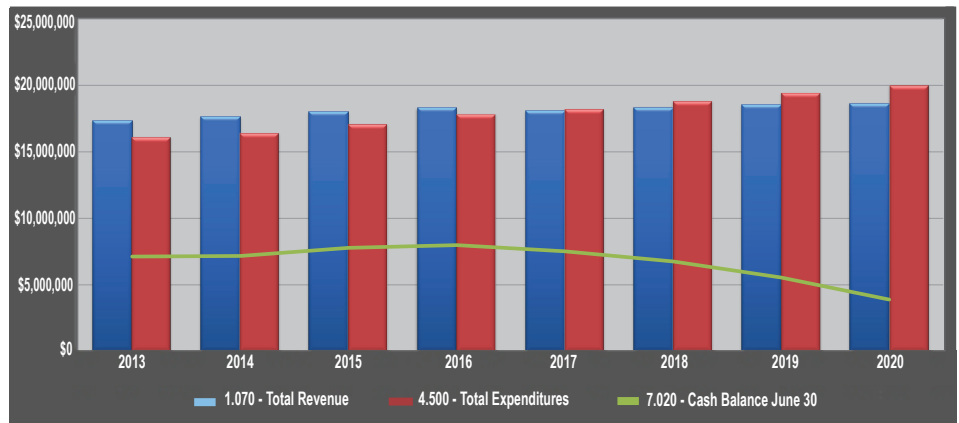
\$ Fiscal Stewardship

With a commitment to pro actively manage district resources in a cost efficient manner, Madeira City Schools works to ensure that resources from federal, state, and local levels are aligned with district goals and forecasted for the future. Financial responsibility ensures that the majority of funding is spent on classroom instruction.

- The community approved an operating levy in November 2011 that the district forecasted would last for a minimum of three years. The district has managed its resources with positive revenue over expenditures each year since that date.
- A permanent improvement strategy was developed to provide short term and long term plans to maintain district facilities.
- The 2015 'Auditor of State Award' was awarded to the district's **Treasurer's office**.



- Operating expenditures have been held to a 2.9% annual average increase over the past five years.
- Through participation in a health consortium and by managing staff costs, health care costs were held to an annual average increase of 2.1% over the past five years.
- Madeira is a member of several consortiums that assist in receiving services and sharing costs with other districts:
 - Hamilton County Educational Service Center provided educational services and programs.
 - Greater Cincinnati Insurance Consortium, a 14-member school district consortium, helps manage health insurance costs.
 - Hamilton Clermont Cooperative provides technology services and support.
 - State Purchasing Cooperative provides state approved vendors contracts for materials and services.





Parent & Community Involvement

The essence of our district is the interwoven connection between our schools and our community.

- A group of parents, community members and staff continued work throughout the spring and summer on an overhaul of the **MHS weight room** funded entirely by private donations. In the fall of 2016, the Madeira High School Fitness Center is set to open with more space, better ventilation and improved safety measures to help our students achieve their sports and fitness goals in a bright, healthy environment. The new fitness center will benefit not only athletes, but all Madeira High School students participating in physical education classes.
- “Marchtoberfest,” the **Madeira Schools Foundation’s** 31st annual auction, raised over \$95,000 to support extras for many of Madeira’s programs. MSF funds go toward technology purchases/upgrades, arts and athletic enhancements, funding for educational experiences such as the Day of Service and Global Leadership Summit, and scholarships.



- The new Perin Learning Commons Courtyard, built by community volunteers, was officially dedicated with a ribbon cutting ceremony. Administrators, student government members and the Marching Mustang Band helped show the district’s appreciation to community member and alumnus Tom Walter ‘74 for his dedication to the project. Staff and students immediately began using the new outdoor academic space for classes, group meetings and independent study.
- A free Saturday self defense workshop, led by Madeira parent Chris Nachtrab was held to equip girls for college and life.
- MES held ‘Doughnuts with Dad’ and ‘Muffins with Mom’ before school several mornings during the school year to create opportunities for parents to be present at the school and enjoy a special morning with their child.
- A Community Open House was held celebrating the retirement of Superintendent Steve Kramer who served 34 of his 40 years in education at Madeira.



Parent & Community Involvement *at Madeira*

Madeira City Schools recognizes the need for a total support system and values parent involvement, seeks community partners and celebrates opportunities to showcase excellence.

• The **Planning Commission** (PC) is a group of volunteer Madeira residents and teachers who routinely research, report, and make recommendations to the Board of Education on a variety of topics. PC researched the following topics during the 2015-2016 school year:

- One to World: How best to get more devices into hands of students?
- MES & MMS Student Offerings: What are additional innovative “encore” opportunities that our students should be exposed to?
- Annual Salary & Benefits Study
- Global Classroom Programs: How can we expand and be more proactive as a district in providing international travel opportunities for students?

The district's annual Senior Citizen Day was held with breakfast before a free performance of the spring Theatre Arts production *You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown*. Bob and Ronna Gardner were recognized as Honored Guests and rode with the Board of Education in the 2016 Homecoming Parade.

- MHS maintains multiple business and nonprofit partnerships through contacts within the Madeira community. Partnerships that resulted in intern and learning opportunities for students included MSA, DJJ, Magnified Giving and Beacon Ortho.
- Several times a year district administrators and a board member hosted leaders from local churches, the city and businesses. The group discussed city and school funding, economic development projects, upcoming events, and safety.
- Local veterans and community members were invited to Madeira Elementary and Madeira Middle Schools' Veterans Day programs. Students at each school honored the veterans through music, prose and art.
- Family and friends of students were invited to preview the MHS 2016 Circle Prom “The Real After Prom of Madeira.” The Circle Prom ensures a safe and substance free evening by providing charter buses for dinner and dancing and their return to the high school until the next morning.

• Superintendent Steve Kramer met twice with local senior citizens over coffee to discuss what's happening in the district. The fall coffee was the first event to be held outside in the new Perin Learning Commons Courtyard at Madeira High School and the spring coffee was held at Madeira's Depot Barbecue.

• First graders invited a special relative or friend to Madeira Elementary School on Grand Day. Visitors were entertained with a slide show, singing, and a visit to the students' classrooms.



Student Services

Madeira City Schools is committed to ensuring the success of each student by providing a continuum of services personalized to meet each learner's needs.

In addition to providing a continuum of support and services to help students identified with special needs in the areas of special education, enrichment and English as a Second Language, the following school climate & bullying prevention programs were continued or instituted.

- MMS developed a school-wide culture theme around the word LIGHT in conjunction with student council to foster and develop student leadership in the school. LIGHT focuses on Leadership, Integrity, Generosity, Honesty, and Teamwork in conjunction with 'Mustangs Must' at the elementary school and 'Madeira Strong' at the high school. Teacher conversations with students became 'LIGHT' conversations with students, and teachers sent home LIGHT cards to let parents know the great things their children were doing.

- MHS promotes empowerment and utilizes first line intervention by counselors and administrators as the first step to resolving or solving a conflict, followed by employing a district 'bully flow chart' to determine if the conflict is an incident of bullying. A Safe School Line is provided for students and parents to report issues anonymously. Staff members were trained to prevent bullying within the school, given tips to spot bullying behavior and trained to recognize and address 'bully bystanders'. MHS hosts programs and speakers on the pitfalls, dangers, and legalities of social media, providing supports for social-emotional and mental health wellness. The school culture of being 'Madeira Strong' to promote positive behavior and recognition for students continued.




MES continued with its building-wide positive behavior program 'Mustangs Must,' which reinforces expectations that students take care of themselves, others and their environment. Students are encouraged and expected to be 'bucket fillers' and 'up-standers'.



- In collaboration with the three district PTOs, a community meeting was held to promote drug prevention and awareness with a speaker from "Start Talking! Building a Drug-Free Future." Governor John R. Kasich and First Lady Karen W. Kasich launched the program to give parents, guardians, educators and community leaders the tools to start the conversation with Ohio's youth about the importance of living healthy, drug-free lives. Parents, mentors and peers can make a difference just by talking to the young people in their lives about drug abuse.

- MHS is part of a research-based program implementing the Adolescent Depression Awareness Program (ADAP). Developed at Johns Hopkins University in 1999, ADAP's

goal is to de stigmatize the illness of depression through education, while addressing suicide as a potential tragic consequence of mood disorders. High School Counselors presented the ADAP curriculum in Sophomore English classes to help students recognize the signs of depression, and encouraged them to share concerns with a parent, teacher, or counselor so that appropriate action can be taken.



Staff & District Recognitions

We take pride in the recognition our district receives thanks to our expert and caring staff, highly qualified administrators, committed board of education members, involved parents and supportive community. There are the assets that shape Madeira's success.

- Madeira High School was again named to **Newsweek's Top High Schools** list, which determines which schools do the best job of preparing students for college. MHS was also named one of the 'Top Schools that are Beating the Odds' by helping low-income students score at or above average on state assessments.
- In Cincy magazine's "**Best Schools**" edition, Madeira was named the number one high school for the second year in a row. Cited was Madeira's strong performance index, increase in average ACT score from 25 to 26, and more students taking AP courses.
- For the 4th time in 7 years, CINCY MAGAZINE has named the Madeira community the **#1 'Burb in Greater Cincinnati'**.
- Cincinnati Enquirer again ranked Madeira City Schools as a top midsize company in its 'Top Workplaces' listings based on anonymous employee feedback.
- The Washington Post's listing of '**America's Most Challenging High Schools**' ranked Madeira #8 in the state, up from #13 the year before. The challenge is designed to identify schools that have done the best job in encouraging students to take college-level courses and tests.
- **U.S. News & World Report** ranked MHS #6 in Ohio, #242 in the nation, and #187 in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math), garnering their Gold Medal status. Out of 890 Ohio high schools in 733 districts, 18 were awarded gold medals, 137 earned silver medals and 243 received bronze medals.
- The Madeira Schools Foundation's Distinguished Awards were presented to Jack and Barb Buchholz (Friends of the Foundation Award), Steve Kramer (Lifetime Achievement Award), Tom Ashmore '81 (Distinguished Alumni/Citizen Award), and John F.
