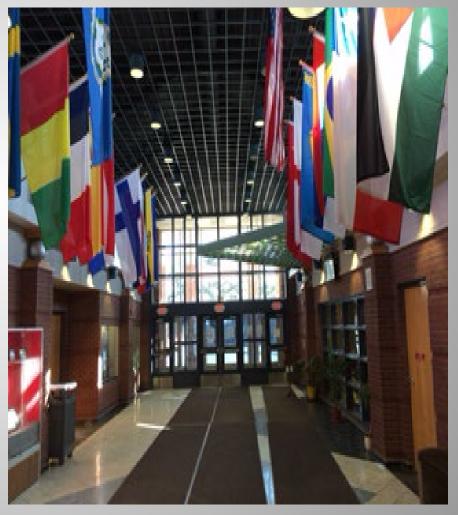

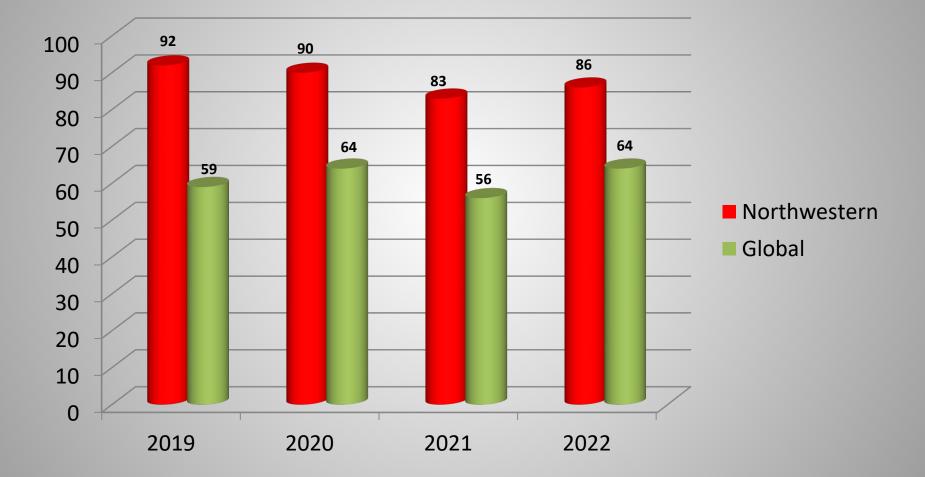

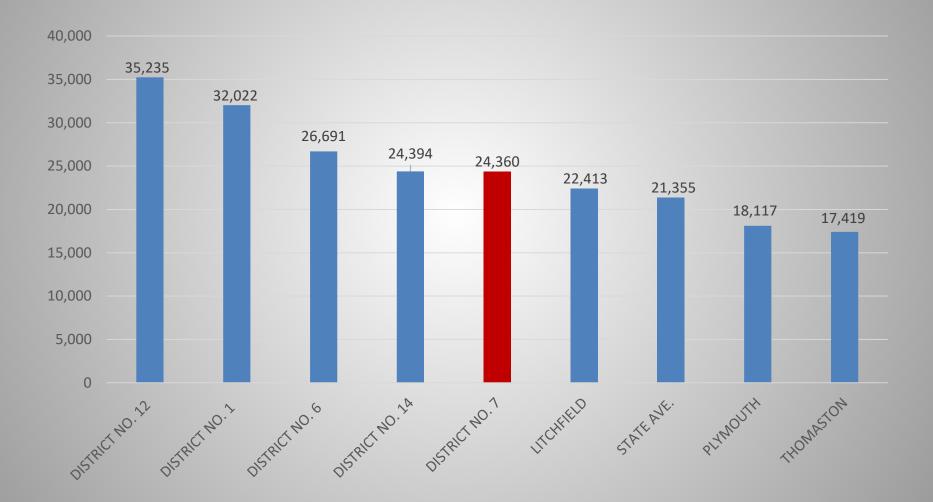

### % of Total AP Students with Scores of 3+ 106 Northwestern students took 168 AP exams

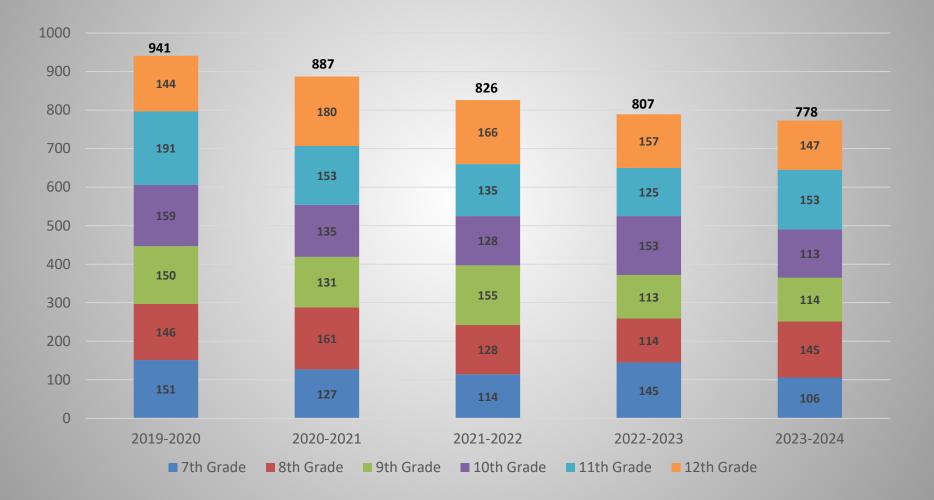


### Range of Net Current Expenditures Per Pupil Berkshire League\*

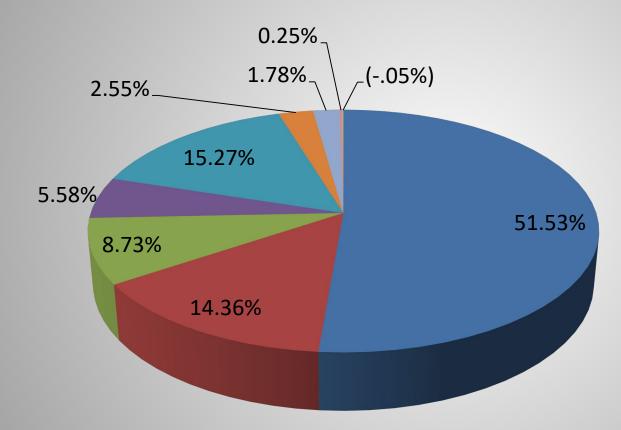

# Salaries

## Increase of \$299,228 or 2.54%

#### Increases:

- Contractual salary increases
- NEW Proposed Middle School Math Teacher
- NEW Proposed High School Special Education Teacher

#### **Budget Mitigation Actions:**

- Agriculture, Science, Technology Education (ASTE) Grant revenue offsets costs
- EdAdvance School Based Mental Health Grant used to replace SEL/Academic Support in MS
- High School English teacher will not be replaced

# Benefits Increase of \$92,829 or 2.83%

#### **Increases:**

• Health insurance renewal: 4.90%

#### **Budget Mitigation Actions:**

- Life insurance: 0%
- Unemployment: 0%
- Workers' Compensation insurance renewal: 0%
- Reduced benefits for one staff member

# Professional/Technical Services Increase of \$15,185 or 0.75%

Increases:

• Shared Services Assessment up 2.69%

#### **Budget Mitigation Actions:**

- Many accounts held to current funding levels
- Use of \$30,000 in Excess Cost Grant to offset Special Education expenditures through Shared Services
- Use of \$55,000 in Excess Cost Grant to offset Special Education professional and technical services
- Legal fees reduced

- Districts are reimbursed by the state for the expenses associated with educating special education students with a cost above 4.5x the per pupil expenditure (\$24,360)\*. For us, that cost is \$109,620\*. If a student's educational costs do not reach that threshold, the district pays the full amount.
- The state covers the amount over \$109,620. New legislation has increased the reimbursement percentage. We have budgeted 80% reimbursement for the costs over the threshold. The actual amount the state set aside for Excess Cost for the 2023-2024 school year is unknown and unpredictable.

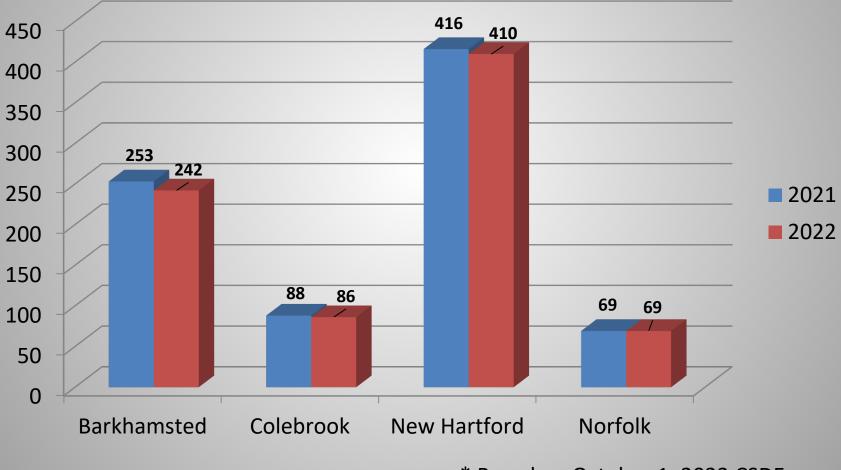

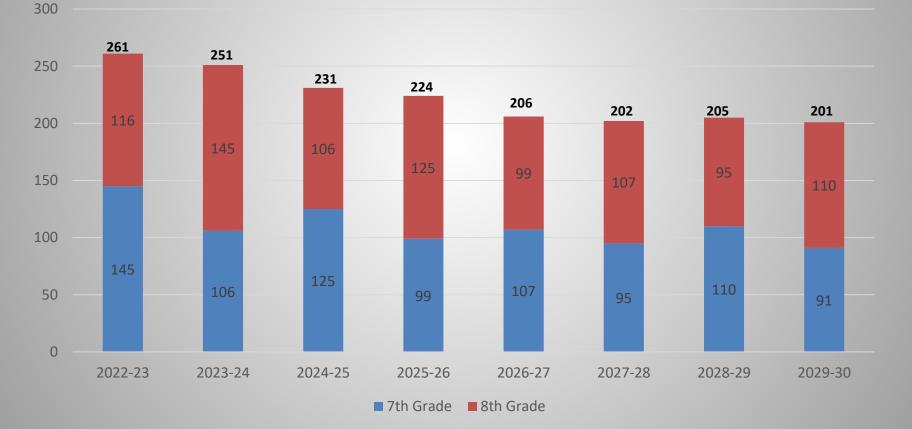
