Molloy Stops Lions



Redmen Win in Overtime

The Redmen also defeated the Lions at the St. John's court Jan. 12. The game went into triple overtime and St. John's scored the "sudden death" basket to call the win 43-41.

Tyrone Pannell scored an upset over Herman Johnson of Planfield High in the 60-yard high hurdles, as his teammates went on to clinch the Cardinal Hayes track meet staged at the 102nd Engineers' Armory, January 15.

Pannell set a new meet record of :07.6 and also tied for first place in the high jump to accumulate 9 of Loughlin's 121/2



points. M. Schimmenti copped third place in the shot put, behind G. Gubner, of DeWitt Clintcn, who set a new meet record. A fifth place by the 880-yard relay team consisting of P. Regan, J. O'Connor J. Hack and K. Moran to upleted the Lion rally.

Novice Win Title

The Novice boardmen won the CHSAA Novice Championship, run at the 132nd Engineers' Armory, January 9. The Novice Lionmen tallied 25 points of clinch the title.

Lion tracksters earned first place in the National A.A.U. Meet, February 20, and the N.Y.U. Meet, February 12. The boardmen also proved themselves second only to Hayes, in the C.H.S.A.A. Sophomore Meet, February 6.

Attain National Title

After a thirteen year absence, the Lions, under Mr. Miles and Brother C. John, came back to win the National A.A.U. Track Meet, staged at Madison Square Garden.

Ty Pannell and Matt Schimmenti led the Lions to victory. Pannell scored first in the 60-yard hurdles, with a 7.5 clocking and also tied with P. Whitehouse, of St. Peters, Staten Island, for first in the high jump, with a leap of 6'4". Schimmenti placed second behind G. Gubner, of DeWitt Clinton, tossing the shot 58' 1 3/4".

Gain N.Y.U. Title

In the N.Y.U. Meet, run at the 102nd Engineers' Armory, Lion runners captured first place scoring 16 1/2 points. Pannell placed first in the 60-yard high hurdles and tied for second in the high jump, with a 6' 2" effort. Schimmenti, tossed the shot 56' 3 1/2" while Ricky Christopher clocked 10.3 in the 100-yard dash to win himself a gold medal,

Sophs Place Second

Loughlin's younger track members tallied 26 points to place second behind Hayes in the C.H.S.A.A. Sophomore Meet,

P. Haffner captured first in the shot put, tossing the lead ball 49' 11", the old record was 49' 10 1/2". J. McKenna and R. Christopher also broke records in the high jump (5' 10 1/4"), and the 100-yard dash (10.5), respectively. K. Coniglio clinched first in the 60-yard high hurdles setting a new meet record of 8.0.

Tracksters Evince Power; Schimmenti Equals Record

Lion cindermen earned second place behind Mount St. Michael in the All Hallows Meet, April 2. In the CHSAA Relay Carnival, April 9, the Queens-Iona Relays, April 23, and the Mount St. Michael's Frosh Meet April 20, Loughlin scored successfully. All meets were staged at Randall's Island Stadium.

Schimmenti Equals Record

Matt Schimmenti tied his own school record for the shotput of 58' 134" in the Queens-Iona Relays. He had previously set the mark in the National A.A.U. Track Meet, February 12.

T. Pannell and J. McKenna placed second and fifth respectively in the high jump. In the classified mile relay, a team of T. Bast, B. McClintock, J. Flaherty and J. Leporati garnered fourth place.

Lions Place Second

Mount St. Michael High School compiled 30 points to edge Loughlin out of the first place trophy in the All Hallows Track Meet.

T. Pannell scored first in the 120yd. high hurdles and tied for second in the high jump compiling 81/2 points for Loughlin as M. Schimmenti secured five more points by tossing the shot 56' 834". A half-mile relay team composed of T. Bast, J. Buondelmonte, P. McGrath and K. Moran clocked 1:35.4 to win themselves a silver medal.

Klink garnered third position in the shot put relay.

Lions End Track Season Clinch Second In CHSAA

Looking back on the past few meets, Leo, the Loughlin mascot, finds that the Lion tracksters have captured second place in the CHSAA Championship, June 4, the Englewood Meet and the Essex Catholic Meet, both held during the weekend of May 21.

Defending Champs

Loughlin, the defending CHSAA champs, fell into second place this year behind Mount St. Michael's, who tallied 27 points, only 4½ points ahead of the Lions.

A new meet record of 14.7 was set by Ty Pannell in the 120 yd. high hurdles as K. Coniglio placed fourth in the same event. M. Schimmenti attained a double victory by winning the shot put and taking fifth in the discus. The 220 yd. dash was won by K. Moran who clocked 22.3 while his teammate T. Babor received a silver medal for his efforts in the 180 yd. low hurdles.

Second Best

In the Catholic division of the Englewood Meet, Lion cinderman thrashed all opponents and secured first place but were edged out by Plainfield, who won the meet crown.

Two meet records were set by T. Pannell, who also won the high jump, as he skipped over the high hurdles and low hurdles in record times of :14.2 and :20.1, respectively. Matt Schimmenti





tossed the shot 56'1114" to secure second place in this event and also went on to garner third in the discus.

Twenty-one points enabled Leo's men to nab second place in the Essex Catholic Meet in which M. Schimmenti copped the shot put and E. Pare danced to second position in the hop, step and jump. T. Pannell raced to a first place win in the 100 yd. dash.

Mr. Miles Sums Up Season

When questioned about the team's present, past and future status, Mr. Miles replied, "The outdoor season, while not as successful as the indoor season, still was good because of the great improvement of those boys who will be back with us next year. The accomplishment of our sophomore group was indeed fantastic. The outdoor meets we lost were only lost by a few points and mainly due to the injury of one of our key runners. The future of the track team looks bright on paper but those returning next year must realize that, to win championships an athlete must be dedicated to his work."

Mr. Miles then gave this as the formula for being a good athlete: 1.) spirit-working together; 2.) practice-perfect attendance; 3.) conditioning-clean living; 4.) sacrifice of time and other pleasures (dances, staying out late etc.); 5.) the will to win.

Alumnus Killed in Vietnam Big Track Star at Loughlin


On November 29, Tyrone S. Pannell, a former Loughlinite, was killed in Vietnam. An officer in the Marine Corps, the twenty-four year old former track star apparently stepped on a Viet Cong mine. He is survived by his parents, brother, wife and six month child.

Pannell was best known during his years at Loughlin for his track achievements. When he graduated in 1960, he had established many track records and had gained numerous awards. In the Nationals he had won two events, the high jump and the hurdles. Making three varsity track records of his own, he went to Manhattan College in September, 1960 with an \$8,000 track scholarship. He graduated in 1964 with a BA in Political Science.

After he had taken a reserve training program while at college, he was commissioned as Second Lieutenant. The week he was killed in ac-

tion he was scheduled to have become a First Lieutenant; he also was to have made the Marine Corps a lifetime career.

When word of his death reached Loughlin, a special Requiem Mass was offered on December 7 for him. The entire student body attended the service at which Father McGuiness was the celebrant. Manhattan College also held a Requiem service for their alumnus on December 1.
