### **SESSION FIVE**

- 5.0 Public Hearing(s)
- 5.1 <u>Public Hearing for the College Readiness Block Grant Plan</u> A public hearing was held.

The College Readiness Block Grant (CRBG) provides funding to county offices of education, school districts and charter schools to provide California's high schools pupils with additional supports to increase the number of 9-12 grade students that enroll at institutions of higher education and complete an undergraduate degree within four years. Language governing the allocation and use of the College Readiness Block Grant can be found in Senate Bill (SB) 828.

San Bernardino City Unified School District is eligible for the College Readiness Block Grant from the California Department of Education and has been awarded \$1,793,987.00 to be spent by the end of fiscal year 2018-2019.

SBCUSD has had numerous meetings with teachers, SBTA representatives, principals, district staff and parents to discuss the possible use of the College Readiness Block Grant. The grant

requires that the local plan for use of the CRBG funds be heard in a public meeting of the Governing Board prior to its adoption at a subsequent board meeting. The following outlines the proposed plan for the allocated funds:

- 1. Providing professional development opportunities for teachers, administrators, and counselors to improve pupil A-G course completion rates, pupil college-going rates and college readiness of pupils.
- 2. Provide counseling services to pupils and their families regarding college admission requirements and financial aid programs.
- 3. Provide comprehensive advising plans to support pupil completion of A-G course requirements.
- 4. Provide support to schools by covering the cost of students fees for taking Advanced Placement exams (AP) and purchase material that support college readiness
- 5. Implementing collaborative partnerships between high schools and postsecondary educational institutions that support pupil transition to postsecondary education, including San Bernardino Valley College and California State University, San Bernardino.
- 6. Expanding access to coursework or other opportunities to satisfy A-G course requirements to all pupils.
- 7. Provide support to programs aligned with A-G completion; support a cross-section of programs and activities that directly support pupil matriculation to institutions of higher education, including community and four-year colleges/universities.
- 8. Purchase materials that support college readiness and A-G coursework.

All CRBG funds must be expended on or before June 30, 2019. The CRBG directly aligns with the District's Community Engagement Plan with the following strategies:

Strategy 1: Applied Learning

Strategy 2: Learning Beyond the Boundaries

Strategy 6: College and Careers

In addition, CRBG directly aligns with the District's Local Control and Accountability Plan, specifically referenced in:

#### Goal 1: Academic Achievement

Student academic performance, including English proficiency, will be at a "standards met or greater" level based on rigorous core content standards, resulting in a high school diploma. Emphasis will be placed on A-G coursework and college and career pathways.

**Strategy VII**: Provide linked-learning opportunities for students about College/Careers.

- a) Expand support of College/Career and Linked Learning program in high schools.
- b) Provide opportunities for at risk student groups to connect classroom content to real world applications through academic field trips, college tours, summer conferences, and career experiences.

- c) Expand College Career/Linked Learning, beginning at the elementary level, and develop a program to support a college going culture.
- d) Host college and career fairs.
- e) Provide qualified staff to support the college/career and linked learning programs.
- f) All students have access to A-G courses based on program needs.

#### **SESSION SIX**

### 6.0 Student Achievement

### 6.1 <u>Later School Start Times for Secondary Schools Update</u>

On August 15, 2017, members of the Later School Start Times committee presented information to the Board of Education on adolescent sleep and later school start times. The information was gathered from the Adolescent Sleep, Health and School Start Times Conference in Washington, D.C. in April, 2017. As a result of the presentation, the Board tasked District staff with presenting and gathering input from a variety of stakeholders in the community (parents, students, employees and community). Members of the Later School Start Times committee presented an update on the input gathered from various sources for the Board's consideration.

The Board discussed the possibility of having a pilot at a high school and letting students have the ability to choose their classes, similar to how it's done at colleges, noting that the Board would need to take action and it would have to be negotiated with the union. They discussed the surveys that went out to the community and verified that all parent groups were included and surveys were also in Spanish; also noted from the surveys that many students did not want a later start time. It was decided to look at other school districts that have this in place already and to bring back for further discussion.

### Public Comment:

Speaker: Erika Delgado de Ramos

Ms. Delgado de Ramos said the District should ask students and parents in a new survey if they are interested in a zero period. Give them the opportunity to choose.

### **SESSION SEVEN**

### 7.0 Public Comments

Speaker(s): Steve Pontell, National Community Renaissance

Topic: Arrowhead Grove. Mr. Pontell spoke on recent developments. The next phase of the project: 184 units, \$24 million grant; will generate 300 new students. \$1.2 Million grant from

Dignity Health; improvements along Olive Street; safe routes to schools; 36 units of market rate housing.

Speaker(s): Kathlene Valdez, parent

Topic: Establishing a relationship between the city and county libraries. Ms. Valdez said that libraries have summer reading programs; used book sales and suggested putting information on the District website with links to the libraries.

Speaker(s): Amanda Fitzpatrick, parent

Topic: Special Education completion certificate program and teaching students about finances. Ms. Fitzpatrick shared her concern regarding her Special Education student and having them merge into regular class. She said she was told that her child was on track for a High School completion certificate, but said that she had no idea of this. She wanted her child to be exposed to higher academics; the more he is exposed the more opportunity to succeed. As she learned more, she understood about the two different programs and was able to get him transferred to Mild to Moderate where he is now succeeding. Ms. Fitzpatrick said that there is a gap and that kids need to be evaluated and not just told they would get a certificate and parents need to know information and have it ex.

Ms. Fitzpatrick also suggested teaching students about finances. Dr. Marsden said the District is building towards this.

Speaker(s): Dr. April Clay, Clay Counseling

Topic: Dr. Clay provided a North Park Elementary update on general education services for students and parents, all sub-groups; offered parenting classes; wraparound approach; synergy activities; worked with individuals on a weekly basis; crisis interventions.

Speaker(s): Anthony Howard, employee (Cole Elementary School)

Topic: Importance of AAPAC. Mr. Howard said he sees it being prevented in our community. Parents deserve to have clear information provided to them. Asked that the District support it. He would like to promote a different energy; need more volunteers at elementary level.

Speaker: Taylion Charter. Rather than a public comment, Taylion withdrew their charter petition and will re-petition in the near future.

Member Hill congratulated the summer school graduates and to teachers and administrators, as school starts, be prepared to give them your best.

Member Flores welcomed back teachers and administrators. She reported she visited King Middle School for their mural unveiling and said it was great ceremony; she asked that they be recognized because their scores went up double digits and suspensions went down. Dr. Flores requested updates on Community Schools Grant and career pathways, including budgets (District and CTA) and needs. She invited the Board and Cabinet to the CLSBA Unity Conference in October and asked that the District submit a proposal for the African-American Taskforce.

Member Wyatt asked for information related to parent advisory group for special education, Community Advisory Committee (CAC) and asked to consider re-naming it.

Vice President Rodgers asked where we were with Footsteps2Brilliance; provide information o ideas to decrease trespassing citations; provide RCS guidelines/process; look into what steps need to be taken regarding bullying and parent training; ensure Board is informed on upcoming special events and encouraged Board members to attend events when possible, the Board needs to represent District; asked to add the cost of middle school gymnasiums to the Facilities Master Plan.

The Board desires to communicate with parents/guardians and students regarding the educational programs and services that are available in the district.

The Board Superintendent or designee may enter into an agreement with any other school district, may approve interdistrict attendance agreements with other districts on a case-by-case basis to meet individual student needs for a term not to exceed five school years, for the interdistrict attendance of students who are residents of the districts. (Education Code 46600)

The interdistrict attendance agreement shall specify the terms and conditions under which interdistrict attendance shall be permitted or denied. It also may contain standards agreed to by both districts for reapplication and/or revocation of the student's permit. not exceed a term of five years and shall stipulate (Education Code 46600)

Upon receiving a permit for transfer into the district that has been approved by the student's district of residence, or upon receiving a written request from the parent/guardian of a district who wishes to enroll in another district, T—the Superintendent or designee may shall review the request and may approve or deny applications the permit subject to the terms and conditions of the interdistrict attendance agreement for interdistrict transfers because of overcrowding with district schools or limited district resources.

Students

The San Bernardino City Unified School District recognizes the harmful effects of bullying on student learning and school attendance and desires to provide safe school

environments that protect students from physical and emotional harm. District employees shall establish student safety as a high priority and shall not tolerate bullying of any student.

No individual or group shall, through physical, written, verbal, or other means, harass, sexually harass, threaten, intimidate, retaliate, cyberbully, cause bodily injury to, or commit hate violence against any student or school personnel.

Cyberbullying also includes breaking into another person's electronic account and assuming that person's identity in order to damage that person's reputation.

Strategies for addressing bullying in district schools shall be developed with involvement of key stakeholders, including students, parents/guardians, and staff, and may be incorporated into the comprehensive safety plan, the local control and accountability plan, and other applicable district and school plans.

As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee may collaborate with law enforcement, courts, social services, mental health services, other agencies, and community organizations in the development and implementation of joint strategies to promote safety in schools and the community and to provide services for alleged victims and perpetrators of bullying.

### **Bullying Prevention**

To the extent possible, district schools shall focus on the prevention of bullying by establishing clear rules for student conduct and implementing strategies to promote a positive, collaborative school climate. Students shall be informed, through student handbooks and other appropriate means, of district and school rules related to bullying, mechanisms available for reporting incidents or threats, and the consequences for

engaging in bullying.

As appropriate, the district shall provide students with instruction, in the classroom or other educational settings, that promotes effective communication and conflict resolution skills, social skills, character/values education, respect for cultural and individual differences, self-esteem development, assertiveness skills, and appropriate online behavior.

Staff shall receive related professional development, including information about early warning signs of harassing/intimidating behaviors and effective response.

Based on an assessment of bullying incidents at school, the Superintendent or designee may increase supervision and security in areas where bullying most often occurs, such as classrooms, playgrounds, hallways, restrooms, and cafeterias.

#### Intervention

Students are encouraged to notify school staff when they are being bullied or suspect that another student is being victimized. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall develop means for students to report threats or incidents confidentially and anonymously.

School staff who witness an act of bullying shall immediately intervene to stop the incident when it is safe to do so. (Education Code 234.1)

When appropriate based on the severity or pervasiveness of the bullying, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians of victims and perpetrators and may contact law enforcement.

The Superintendent, principal, or administrative designee may refer a victim, witness, perpetrator, or other student affected by an act of bullying to a school counselor, school psychologist, social worker, child welfare attendance personnel, school nurse, or other school support service personnel for case management, counseling, and/or participation in a restorative justice program as appropriate. (Education Code 48900.9)

### **Reporting and Filing of Complaints**

Any student, parent/guardian, or other individual who believes that a student has been subjected to bullying or who has witnessed bullying may report the incident to a teacher,

the principal, administrative designee, or any other available school employee. Within one business day of receiving such a report, a staff member shall notify the administrator or administrative designee of the report, whether or not a uniform complaint is filed. In addition, any school employee who observes an incident of bullying involving a student shall, within one business day, report his/her observation to the principal or administrative designee, whether or not the alleged victim files a complaint.

Within two business days of receiving a report of bullying, the admin or admin designee shall notify Student Wellness & Support Services Department. Uniform Complaint Procedures shall also be used when addressing complaints alleging failure to comply with state and/or federal laws as identified in BP 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

When the circumstances involve cyberbullying, individuals with information about the activity shall be encouraged to save and print any electronic or digital messages that they feel constitute cyberbullying and to notify a teacher, the principal, administrative designee, or other employee so that the matter may be investigated. When a student uses a social networking site or service to bully or harass another student, the Superintendent or designee may file a request with the networking site or service to suspend the privileges of the student and to have the material removed.

When a report of bullying is submitted, the principal or administrative designee shall inform the student or parent/guardian of the right to file a formal written complaint in accordance with AR 1312.3. The student who is the alleged victim of the bullying shall be given an opportunity to describe the incident, identify witnesses who may have relevant information, and provide other evidence of bullying.

### **Investigation and Resolution of Complaints**

Any complaint of bullying shall be investigated and, if determined to be discriminatory, resolved in accordance with law and the district's uniform complaint procedures specified in AR 1312.3.

If, during the investigation, it is determined that a complaint is about nondiscriminatory bullying, the principal or administrative designee shall inform the complainant and shall take all necessary actions to resolve the complaint.

### **Discipline**

Corrective actions for a student who commits an act of bullying of any type may include counseling, behavioral intervention and education, and, if the behavior is severe or pervasive as defined in Education Code 48900, may include suspension or expulsion in accordance with district policies and regulations.







