# 2.2 - Resolution in Support of Clean Air for Communities Near the Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF) Railway Yard

Simon Washburn, community organizer for Center for Community Action and Environmental Justice, urged the Board to adopt the resolution. Mr. Washburn invited Board members to attend a Clean Air Now Community Forum on September 4, 6:30 p.m. at the Home of Neighborly Services.

Upon motion by Member Savage, seconded by Member Ayala, and approved by the affirmative vote of Members Ayala, Brown, Parra, Savage, Tillman, and Valdez (Noes: None; Absent for Vote: Penman), the following was adopted:

- **WHEREAS** the San Bernardino City Unified School District has designated school safety a priority; and
- **WHEREAS** the safety of students and staff must be maintained at all times at every District location; and
- WHEREAS the Health Risk Assessment conducted by the California Air Resources Board indicates that communities adjacent to the San Bernardino BNSF Railway yard face a greater rail yard-related cancer risk than communities near any of 15 other rail operations examined in state studies; and
- **WHEREAS** the District serves students living near the BNSF Railway yard, and educational research indicates students need a healthy environment in order to grow and learn; and
- **WHEREAS** railroad locomotives and trucks are known to emit diesel exhaust, and are a known carcinogen and toxic air contaminant; and
- WHEREAS the proximity to the diesel source determines the level of risk to public health, studies from the South Coast Air Quality Management District show that the first 1,500 feet from a source of diesel emissions, the higher the levels of health risks; and
- **WHEREAS** recent University of Southern California studies show children who are exposed to higher levels of mobile sources of pollution have a significantly reduced lung function and stunted lung growth; and
- WHEREAS analysis by the California Air Resources Board shows that fine particulate (PM 2.5) pollution from diesel emissions in California is responsible annually for 24,000 premature deaths; and
- WHEREAS the severe conditions of PM 2.5 emissions in the South Coast Air Basin and the associated health impacts give rise to a state of emergency given the extreme peril placed upon the public's health, safety, and welfare, requiring immediate action by all levels of government; and
- WHEREAS the South Coast Air Quality Management District and Southern California's Association of Governments have recognized the need by all levels of government to address the situation relating to PM 2.5 exposure; and

- WHEREAS the movement of goods through Southern California's ports is projected to triple in growth, increasing toxic diesel pollution from goods movement industries, such as locomotives, rail yard operations, and trucks unless more protective control actions are undertaken; and
- **WHEREAS** the San Bernardino community bears a significant exposure to diesel pollutants from locomotives, rail yard operations, trucks entering and exiting the BNSF facility;

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Board of Education of the San Bernardino City Unified School District strongly urges the California Air Resources Board to take swift actions to eliminate harmful pollutants from the BNSF Railway yard in San Bernardino; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the School Board urges BNSF Railway to take immediate steps to rectify the existing conditions that pose extreme health risks to its neighboring communities.

## 2.3 - Commemoration of Dieciseis de Septiembre

Upon motion by Member Brown, seconded by Member Tillman, and approved by the affirmative vote of Members Ayala, Brown, Parra, Penman, Savage, Tillman, and Valdez (Noes: None), the following was adopted:

- **WHEREAS** the 16<sup>th</sup> of September is an important date in the history of Mexico that marks the anniversary of the issuance of the *Grito de Dolores* in which Fr. Miguel Hidalgo defied Spain and called for freedom and justice for the common man; and
- **WHEREAS** such concern for the rights of all people as exemplified in *El Grito de Dolores* are in keeping with the precepts of this country and the aspirations of people of good will throughout the world; and
- WHEREAS this date of historical significance is respected and celebrated by many members of this community, including students of the San Bernardino City Unified School District; and
- **WHEREAS** knowledge and understanding of this Mexican holiday, its meaning, and its relationship to the history of the western hemisphere is a fit object of study within the discipline of history; and
- **WHEREAS** the knowledge and understanding of history is an important aspect of a complete education;

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Board of Education of the San Bernardino City Unified School District duly notes the celebration of *Dieciseis de Septiembre* and directs appropriate activities for its observance take place in the schools of the District.

# 2.4 - In Recognition of Native American Day

Upon motion by Member Parra, seconded by Member Tillman, and approved by the affirmative vote of Members Ayala, Brown, Parra, Penman, Savage, Tillman, and Valdez (Noes: None), the following was adopted:

- **WHEREAS** the Southern California region was home to many generations of native peoples long before the arrival of the European explorers; and
- **WHEREAS** the native peoples of the region each held distinct cultures and traditions that bound them to the Earth and all its inhabitants; and
- WHEREAS September 26, 2008, is Native American Day, which has been celebrated in California for many years by its 107 federally recognized Indian tribes; and
- **WHEREAS** the Multicultural Education Policy of the California State Board of Education recognizes that each student deserves the opportunity to understand the common humanity fundamental to all people; and
- WHEREAS the history-social framework for California public schools, Kindergarten through Grade 12, states that the history curriculum of community, state, region, nation, and world must reflect the experiences of men and women of different racial, religious, and ethnic backgrounds; and
- WHEREAS educational leaders throughout the San Bernardino region are encouraged to involve themselves and their schools in a statewide focus on improving the education provided to our children about the local indigenous tribes of Southern California;

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Board of Education of the San Bernardino City Unified School District duly notes the celebration of Native American Day and encourages all educators to commemorate this occasion with appropriate instructional activities.

# 2.5 - Recognition of Hispanic Heritage Month

Upon motion by Member Valdez, seconded by Member Ayala, and approved by the affirmative vote of Members Ayala, Brown, Parra, Penman, Savage, Tillman, and Valdez (Noes: None), the following was adopted:

WHEREAS Hispanic Americans have roots in Europe, Africa, South and Central America and have close cultural ties to Mexico and the Caribbean. This diversity has brought variety, invaluable perspectives, experiences, and values to the San Bernardino City Unified School District; and

- **WHEREAS** Getting Involved: Our Families, Our Community, Our Nation is the 2008 theme for Hispanic Heritage Month; and
- **WHEREAS** the San Bernardino City Unified School District joins others across the state and nation in recognizing the contributions of Hispanic Americans; and
- WHEREAS the San Bernardino City Unified School District celebrates the vibrant Hispanic-American spirit that influences our Nation's art, music, food, and faiths, and we also celebrate the practices of commitment to family, love of country, and respect for others, virtues that transcend ethnicity, reflect the American spirit, and are nobly exemplified in the Hispanic-American community; and
- **WHEREAS** the San Bernardino City Unified School District has a responsibility in promoting the knowledge and understanding that can be gained by all, regardless of race, through appropriate ceremonies and activities celebrating Hispanic Heritage;

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Board of Education of the San Bernardino City Unified School District declares September 15 through October 15, 2008, Hispanic Heritage Month and duly notes the celebration of Hispanic Heritage Month and directs appropriate activities for its observance take place in the schools of the District.

#### 3.0 - Administrative Presentation

## 3.1 - Cadet Corps Programs Update

Narciso Cardona, Assistant Superintendent, Student Services, and Dr. Joann Tortarolo, Director of Alternative Programs, presented an update on the District Cadet Corps program. They were joined by Major Kris Knutson and Helen Maduena, Cadet Brigade Commander, 11<sup>th</sup> Brigade, SBCUSD (see page \_\_\_\_).

Narciso Cardona stated that the program benefits all students. Danny Tillman asked if there were any statistics available comparing their suspension/expulsion rates, graduation rates, etc., and how many Cadet Corps students enlist in the military. Ms. Maduena stated that a small percentage of Cadet Corps students enlist. Mr. Tillman asked of those, how many become officers. Major Knutson stated that eight percent of military officers were cadets.

Elsa Valdez stated she was pleased with the program's goals and objectives. Dr. Valdez asked if students are required to pay for their uniforms. Mr. Cardona stated that the state provides the uniforms. Dr. Valdez asked why the number of Cadet students declined last year. Dr. Tortarolo stated there was a morale problem when the Cadet Corps program was facing possible budget cuts.

Teresa Parra stated that the District should consider an alternative school for the Cadet Corps program when building new schools. Dr. Delgado stated that he is proud of our Cadets and this Board supports the program.

The Board of Education recognizes that students need adequate, nourishing food in order to grow, learn, and maintain good health. Foods and beverages available through the district's food service program shall:

1. Be carefully selected so as to contribute to students' nutritional well-being and the prevention of disease

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Nutrition Services shall develop strategies designed to encourage the participation of students in the selection of foods of good nutritional quality for school menus.

The Board desires to provide students with a minimum amount of time to consume a meal (45 minutes for elementary students and 35 minutes for secondary students). To achieve this goal multiple meal services will be determined by Nutrition Services in cooperation with the site administrator. Students will be provided with adequate space in which to consume meals. School and transportation schedules shall be designed to encourage participation in school meal programs.

This will better assist the school kitchen/cafeteria in complying with the sanitation and safety requirements of the California Uniform Retail Food Facilities Law Retail Food Code as set forth in Health and Safety Code 113700-114455. 114437

# 4.2 - Amendments to BP 3551 Nutrition Services Operations (First Reading)

San Bernardino City USD

**Board Policy** 

BP 3551

**Business and Noninstructional Operations** 

**Nutrition Services Operations** 

The Board of Education intends that, insofar as possible, school food services shall be a self-supporting, nonprofit program. Upon recommendation of the Superintendent or designee, Nutrition Services shall review and approve meal prices.

Non-Student Meal Service

Meals may be served to employees, Board Members, adults other than employees, and non-students who are on campus during meal times. Since these meals may include federally donated food commodities, their price shall be set by Nutrition Services.

## Purchasing

To ensure that food and related items are purchased in a manner meeting the requirements of the Nutrition Services Department while maintaining a competitive price comparison system, wherever possible, as provided for by Education Code <u>38083</u>, the following procedures shall be followed:

#### Bids

\* Nutrition Services will follow district Board Policy/Administrative Regulation 3311.

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(cf. <u>3311</u> - Bids)
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\* Formal bids shall be initiated for the procurement of Paper Products for Foodstuffs and other nonperishable items in accordance with Public Contract Code 20111.

#### Bids Not Required

\* Nutrition Services will follow district Board Policy/Administrative Regulation 3311.

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(cf. <u>3311</u> - Bids)
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\* Formal quotations or negotiated contracts for the procurement of perishable products shall be in the best interest of the district when it is determined that a competitive field of two or more providers is available. These items shall include but are not limited to: Grocery Products, which include canned products, spices, and condiments, Milk and Dairy Products; Bread Products; Bakery Products; Meat and Frozen BP Products; Produce; Snack Items; Pizza; Non-Carbonated/Carbonated Beverages; Tortilla Products.

- \* Other perishable foodstuffs and seasonal commodities not meeting the criteria above shall be purchased at the best price meeting the requirements of the Nutrition Services Department. (Education Code 38083)
- \* Nutrition Services' student surveys and/or taste testing are used to help determine specific menu items, brands, and specifications.
- \* Menu items, brands, and specifications may be established by Nutrition Services based on the department's research and expertise, and popularity of the food item. This may result in shipments being purchased direct from the manufacturer or vendor.
- \* Nutrition Services may purchase surplus federal government commodities offered by the Child Nutrition and Food Distribution Division, State of California, in any amount needed for the operation of the schools of the district without competitive bidding in accordance with Education Code 17602.

## **Requisition Procedures**

The Nutrition Services Requisition Form is an authorized request to Nutrition Services' purchasing staff for materials or services not available through the district warehouse. It also serves as a means of budget control and account classification.

- \* All Nutrition Services Requisition Forms will be sent to the Nutrition Services Director and the Assistant Superintendent of Facilities/Operations for approval.
- \* Nutrition Services Requisition Forms should be fully completed, including source of funding, taxes, etc.
- \* Materials and equipment to be purchased should meet district and safety (OSHA) standards.
- \* Only after full approval has been received, by following these procedures, may the district assume financial responsibilities. Nutrition Services' staff members who purchase items directly are not authorized to obligate the district. Revolving cash fund purchases may be made per Board Policy 3314.2.

## **Purchasing Authority**

Purchasing Authority is delegated to the Nutrition Services Assistant Director, Nutrition Services Program Manager, Administrative Analysts, and Buyers with various levels of dollar amounts.

The Board reauthorizes the purchasing authority on an annual basis.

#### Relations With Vendors

Nutrition Services will follow Board Policy Administrative Regulation 3315.

Contracts For Sales of Carbonated and Non-Nutritious Beverages

It is the policy of the Board to meet the conditions of Education Code <u>35182.5</u> (as amended by Senate Bill 65), prohibiting school districts and schools in the district from entering into or renewing a contract that grants (exclusive or nonexclusive) sale of carbonated and non-nutritious beverages unless the Board meets two conditions. The two conditions are:

- \* Adopt a policy that ensures the district has internal controls in place to protect the integrity of public funds, funds raised benefit public education, and the contracts are entered into on a competitive basis pursuant to standard contracting procedures.
- \* Provide to parents/guardians, students, and members of the public the opportunity to comment on the contract by holding a public hearing on the contract during a regularly scheduled board meeting. The contract to be discussed shall be clearly identified in the agenda.

The Board will make contracts discussed accessible to the public.

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#### Finance

Cash Handling

**Revolving Cash** 

Authorized signers on this account shall be established by the Board.

The custodian shall be responsible for all payments into the account as well as expenditures subject to the restrictions established, as follows:

- \* Payments from the Revolving Cash Fund is limited to services or materials that are legal charges against the department.
- \* Each expenditure will be substantiated by a receipt which contains the date, description of the item(s), and the amount expended.

At the request of the Board, County Auditor, or County Superintendent of Schools, the Nutrition Services Department shall give an account of the fund.

Revolving Cash shall be deposited in a bank doing business locally, whose deposits are insured by an agency of the US Government. Nutrition Services shall be responsible for all payments into the fund as well as expenditures subject to the restrictions established by the board.

#### **Commercial Warrants**

Authorized signers on the Nutrition Services bank account shall be established by the Board.

All checks require two signatures to be valid:

- 1. Primary Signers- Nutrition Services Director, Nutrition Services Business Manager, and Assistant Superintendent Facilities/Operations.
- 2. Alternate Signers- Director of Accounting and Assistant Superintendent Business and Finance.

Nutrition Services desires to have invoices paid on time in order that the department may take advantage of available discounts and avoid finance charges. Nutrition Services shall not be responsible for unauthorized purchases.

The Board of Education recognizes that adequate nutrition is essential to *the development*, *health*, *and learning of all students*. *The Superintendent or designee shall facilitate and encourage the participation of students from low-income families in the district's food service program*. child development and learning and that some families may be unable to provide breakfast and lunch for their children. In accordance with current Education Code, the San Bernardino City Unified School District will provide free and reduced price meals for students whose families meet federal eligibility criteria.

The district shall provide at least one nutritionally adequate meal each school day, free of charge or at a reduced price, for students whose families meet federal eligibility criteria. (Education Code 49550, 49552)

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Nutrition Services shall ensure that meals provided through the free and reduced-price meal program meet applicable state and/or federal nutritional standards in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

Nutrition Services will develop a plan which ensures that eligible students are not treated differently from other students or easily identified by their peers.

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The San Bernardino City Unified School District has entered into agreement to participate in the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs, and/or to receive commodities donated by the United States Department of Agriculture and accepts responsibility for providing free and reduced price meals to eligible children in the schools under its jurisdiction.

#### Confidentiality/Release of Records

All applications and records related to eligibility for the free or reduced price meal program will be confidential except as provided by law. (Education Code 49558)

The Board further authorizes the Superintendent or designee authorizes designated employees to use individual records pertaining to student participation eligibility in any free and reduced price meal program for the purpose of (Education Code 49558):

1. Desegregation Disaggregation of academic achievement data.

2. In any school identified for program improvement under Title I of the No Child Left Behind Act, identification of students eligible for school choice and supplemental educational services. in any school identified program improvement.

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The School Food Authority assures the State Department of Education, School Food Service Program, or Food Nutrition Service Regional Office where applicable, that the school system will uniformly implement the following policy with respect to determining the eligibility of children for Free and Reduced Price Meals in the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs under its jurisdiction.

In fulfilling its responsibilities the School Food Authority:

- 1. Agrees to serve free and reduced price meals to children from families: (a) whose income is at or below the free limit of the income eligibility guidelines; or (b) currently receiving food stamps, Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF), or Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservation (FDPIR), and provide a case number; or (c) who received documentation directly from the local food stamp/TANF Office that the children are from families currently receiving food stamps or TANF. Nutrition Services shall determine students' eligibility for the free and reduced-price meal program based on the criteria specified in 42 USC 1758 and 1773 and 7 CFR 245.1-245.13 and made available by the California Department of Education.
- 2. When authorized by law, participants in other federal or state programs may be directly certified for enrollment in the free and reduced-price meal program. (Education Code 49561)
- 3. 2. Agrees to serve reduced priced meals to children from families whose income is at or below the reduced price limit of the income eligibility guidelines at no charge. (School District Board approved July 1, 1993)
- **4.** 3. Agrees to serve free and reduced price meals to foster children when eligibility requirements are met.
- 5. 4. Agrees that there will be no physical segregation of, or any other discrimination against, any child because of his inability to pay the full price of the meal. The names of the children eligible to receive free and reduced price meals shall not be published, posted, or announced in any manner and there shall be no overt identification of any such children by use of special tokens or tickets, or by any other means. Further assurance is given that children eligible for free and reduced price meals shall not be required to:

- a. Work for their meals
- b. Use a separate eating area
- c. Go through a separate serving line
- d. Enter the eating area through a separate entrance
- e Eat meals at a different time
- f. Eat a different meal from the meal sold to children paying full price of such a meal
- 6. 5. Agrees that in the operating of child feeding programs, no child shall be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, or age.
- 7. 6. Agrees to prepare meals with texture modifications and/or provide menu substitutions as medically prescribed, at no additional charge to children whose disability restricts their diet.
- 8. 7. Agrees to establish and use a fair hearing procedure in cases of appeal by parents of the school's decisions on applications and in cases where the school official challenges the correctness of information contained in an application or of the continued eligibility of any child for a free or reduced price lunch or breakfast. During the appeal and hearing the child will continue to receive free or reduced price meals.

A record of all such appeals and challenges and their dispositions shall be retained for three years.

The hearing procedure shall provide:

- a. A simple publicly announced method for a family to make an oral or written request for a hearing
- b. An opportunity for the family to be assisted or represented by an attorney or other person in presenting its appeal
- c. An opportunity to examine, prior to and during the hearing, the documents and records presented to support the decision under the appeal
- d. That the hearing shall be held with reasonable promptness and convenience to the family and that adequate notice shall be given to the family as to the time and place of the hearing
- e. An opportunity for the family to present oral or documentary evidence and arguments supporting its position

- f. An opportunity for the family to question or refute any testimony or other evidence and to confront and cross examine any adverse witnesses
- g. That the hearing shall be conducted and the decision made by a hearing official who did not participate in making the decision under appeal
- h. That the decision of the hearing official shall be based on the oral and documentary evidence presented at the hearing and made a part of the hearing record
- i. That the family and any designated representative shall be notified in writing of the decision of the hearing official
- j. That a written record shall be prepared with respect to each hearing, which shall include the decision under appeal; any documentary evidence and a summary of any oral testimony presented at the hearing; the decision of the hearing official, including the reasons therefore; and a copy of the notification to the family of the decision of the hearing official
- k. That such written record of each hearing shall be preserved for a period of three years and shall be available for examination by the family or its representative at any reasonable time and place during such period
- 9. 8. Agrees to designate the Nutrition Services' Central Office as the determining official who will review applications of eligibility. The department will use the criteria outlined in this policy to determine which individual children are eligible for free and reduced price meals.
- 10. 9. Agrees to develop and send at the beginning of each school year and whenever there is a change in eligibility criteria, to the parent or guardian of each child a letter as outlined herein, including a form on which to make application for free and reduced price meals.

Parents will be requested to complete the application and return it to the determining official (named in #8 #9 above) for review. Such applications and documentation of action taken will be maintained for three years after the end of the fiscal year to which they pertain.

Applications may be filed at any time during the year and any parent enrolling a child in a school for the first time, at any time during the year, shall be supplied with such documents.

If a child transfers from one school to another under the jurisdiction of the same School Food Authority, his/her eligibility for a free or reduced price meal will be transferred to and honored by the receiving school.

Parents and guardians will be notified individually within ten working days of acceptance or denial of their applications. Children will be served meals immediately upon the establishment of their eligibility.

11. 10. Agrees to establish a procedure to collect from children who pay for meals and to account for the number of free and reduced price meals served.

In order to protect the identity of the children receiving free or reduced price meals, the following meal count procedures have been implemented:

All students will be issued an I.D. number which is randomly selected by the computer. In the master file of the computer, a meal code will be assigned to all students based upon their eligibility. The meal code will not appear on the I.D. card, but will be recorded when the I.D. number is entered. The computer will then record each meal count by category.

Students not meeting eligibility requirements for free or reduced meals will pay the computer operator for the breakfast and/or lunch before school or during the meal service.

12. 11. Agrees to submit to the State Agency or Regional Office where applicable, any alterations or amendments to the policy including eligibility criteria, applications, public announcements, etc., for approval prior to implementation. Such changes will be effective only upon approval and all changes in eligibility criteria be publicly announced in the same manner that was used at the beginning of the school year.

Competitive Food Sales

The Board of Education believes that foods and beverages sold to students on school campuses during the school day should promote student health and reduce childhood obesity. Any food and beverage sales conducted outside the district's food service program shall meet nutritional standards specified in law, Board policy, and administrative regulations and shall not reduce student participation in the district's food service program.

The Board of Education believes that sales of foods and beverages at school during the school day should be aligned with the district's goals to promote student wellness. Any food sales conducted outside the district's food service program shall meet nutritional standards specified in law, Board policy, and administrative regulation and shall not reduce student participation in the district's food service program. Nutrition Services will assist by providing a list of approved food and beverage items that can be sold.

The sale of food and beverages outside the district's Nutrition Services' Program is prohibited during school hours, and at least one-half hour before (Middle/High Schools), and one-half hour after school (Elementary/Middle/High Schools) unless by a student organization for fundraising purposes. All food and beverages sold must comply with the district's Coordinated School Health and Wellness Procedure (AR 3550).

Coordinated School Health and Wellness Policy/Nutrition Services Program

The Board of Education believes that health education should foster the knowledge, skills, and behaviors that students need in order to lead healthy, productive lives. The district's health education program shall teach personal responsibility for one's own lifelong health, respect for and promotion of the health of others, the process of growth and development, and informed use of health-related information, products, and services.

Goals for the district's health education program shall be designed to promote student wellness and shall be developed in accordance with Board policy. Such goals shall include, but not be limited to, goals for nutrition education and physical activity.

The Board recognizes the link between student health and academic success, and believes that a Coordinated School Health and Wellness Program will foster the knowledge, skills and behaviors that individuals will need to lead healthy, productive lives. Therefore, to insure a high quality of life, an efficient use of internal and external resources and an effective program of interconnected experiences, the Superintendent or designee will address the health and wellness of the students, staff and community members of the district by using a Coordinated School Health Program model to promote healthy eating, physical activity, and comprehensive nutrition and health education for district students. The eight components of a coordinated school health program include:

- \* Comprehensive School Health Education
- \* Physical Education
- \* Parent/Community Involvement
- \* Healthful School Environment
- \* Health Services
- \* Counseling, Psychological and Social Services
- \* Nutrition Service
- \* Health Promotion for Staff

The WIC Reauthorization Act of 2004, Senate Bills 677 and 12, California Education Codes and California Department of Education Framework for Health and Physical Education have been

used to develop administrative procedures for the implementation of this policy. The four goals of this policy, as recommended by the California Department of Education are:

- 1. The support of high-quality instructional programs in health education and physical education that provide students with the skills, knowledge, and confidence to develop and maintain active, healthy lifestyles.
- 2. The implementation of nutrition standards for all food and beverages sold or served on campus by any group or individual that will aid in the promotion of health and the reduction of childhood obesity.
- 3. Increased student participation in school meal programs so that no child goes hungry.
- 4. The creation of a school environment that supports the health of students in the school and community environments.

To help oversee, implement and evaluate this policy, a district wellness team, consisting of representatives from elementary, middle and high schools, district departments, parent groups, and community-based organizations will be established. In addition, school site wellness teams will be established to implement and integrate the wellness efforts of their school and to communicate their progress to the district wellness team.

## Nutritional Guideline for Foods Available at School

The Board believes that foods and beverages available to students at district schools should support the health curriculum and promote optimal health. Nutritional standards adopted by the district for all foods and beverages sold to students, including foods and beverages

provided through the district's food service program, student stores, vending machines, fundraisers, or other venues, shall meet or exceed state and federal nutritional standards.

The Superintendent or designee shall encourage school organizations to use healthy food items or non-food items for fundraising purposes. He/she also shall encourage school staff to avoid the use of non-nutritious foods as a reward for students' academic performance, accomplishments, or classroom behavior.

School staff shall encourage parents/guardians or other volunteers to support the district's nutrition education program by considering nutritional quality when selecting any snacks which may donate for occasional class parties and by limiting foods or beverages that do not meet nutritional standards to no more than one such food or beverage per party. Class parties or celebrations shall be held after the lunch period when possible.

#### Guidelines for Reimbursable Meals

Foods and beverages provided through federally reimbursable school meal programs shall meet or exceed federal regulations and guidance issued pursuant to 42 USC 1758(f)(1), 1766(a), and 1779(a) and (b), as they apply to schools. (42 USC 1751 Note)

# 4.6 - Amendments to BP 6030 - Integrated Academic and Career Technical Instruction (Second Reading)

In order to maximize the learning and application of skills that will allow students to succeed in life, the Governing Board believes that the instruction of academic and career technical subjects should be combined and fully integrated during all their years of schooling. The Board is confident that achievement will rise when students are routinely called upon to apply their classroom learning to real life and workplace situations.

The Board recognizes that integrated academic/career technical instruction will require new forms of community involvement and a new level of collaboration among schools and staff members. Representatives of all disciplines and grade levels will need to collaborate in developing a curriculum that offers school-based and work-based learning experiences in well-articulated sequences. Career awareness, exploration and guidance should be an integral part of this curriculum.

Visual And Performing Arts Education

The Board of Education <u>believes</u> recognizes that by studying visual and performing arts <u>are</u> <u>essential to a well-rounded educational program, and should be an integral part of the course of study offered to students at all grade levels</u>. , students learn to develop initiative, discipline, perceptual abilities and critical and creative thinking skills that extend to all areas of life. The Board believes that a comprehensive arts education program should be an integral part of the basic education offered to all students in all grades. The Board encourages all teachers to use the arts to facilitate learning in the subjects they teach.

The district's <u>arts education program shall provide opportunities for appreciation, creation, and performance of the arts</u>. comprehensive arts education program shall include a written, sequential curriculum in dance, music, theater and the visual arts. Students shall have the opportunity to continually improve artistic skills, create and/or perform original works, acquire an appreciation of arts from many eras and cultures and develop an intellectual basis for making aesthetic judgments.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop a sequential curriculum for dance, music, theatre, and visual arts which is consistent with the state curriculum framework and includes the following strands:

- 1. <u>Artistic perception: processing, analyzing and responding to sensory information through</u> the use of language and skills unique to each arts discipline
- 2. <u>Creative expression: composing, arranging, and performing a work and using a variety of means to communicate meaning and intent in one's own original works</u>
- 3. <u>Historical and cultural context: understanding the historical contributions and cultural dimensions of an arts discipline</u>
- 4. <u>Aesthetic valuing: analyzing and critically assessing works of dance, music, theatre, and visual arts</u>
- 5. <u>Connections, relations and applications: connecting, comparing, and applying what is learned in one arts discipline to learning in other arts, other subject areas, and careers</u>

The Board shall adopt standards-based instructional materials for visual and performing arts in accordance with applicable law, board policy, and administrative regulation. In addition, the Board encourages teachers to incorporate a variety of media and technologies into lessons, presentations, and explorations in each of the arts disciplines.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide a standards-based professional development program designed to increase teachers' knowledge of and ability to teach the arts and to implement adopted instructional materials.

In addition, the <u>The</u> Superintendent or designee shall encourage, <u>as a supplement to teacher</u> <u>instruction</u>, the integration of community arts resources into the <u>school educational</u> program. <u>Such resources may include</u> Students shall have opportunities to attend musical and theatrical performances, observe the work of accomplished artists and work directly with <u>visiting artists</u> <u>artists-in-residence and volunteers</u>. <u>In addition, the Superintendent or designee may collaborate</u> <u>with community organizations to share resources and seek grant opportunities</u>.

The Board supports a collaboration with community arts agencies through the Local Arts Education Partnership Program and is committed to providing the necessary time, staff and financial resources in order to fulfill the district's part in this school-community arts agency partnership.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly evaluate and report to the Board regarding the implementation of arts education at each grade level and program effectiveness in enagling students to meet academic standards.

The Superintendent or designee shall appoint a local steering committee to work with the district on this program. This committee shall represent the ethnic and cultural composition of the district and provide a balance between the education and the arts communities. (Education Code 8813)

Any state funding received through arts and music block grants shall be used only for hiring additional staff, purchasing new materials, books, supplies, and equipment, and/or implementing or increasing staff development opportunities as needed to support standards-aligned arts and music instruction. (SB 77, Item 6110-265-0001, Statutes of 2007).

The Board shall distribute block grant funds to all district schools on the basis of an equal amount per student or the minimum school site allocation specified in the state budget, whichever is greatest. (SB77, Item 6110-265-0001, Statutes of 2007).

However, the Board may allocate block grant funds for districtwide expenditures that support program purposes on behalf of all district schools. If the Board elects to do so, it shall adopt a resolution at a public meeting which specifies how the funds will be allocated among schools and for districtwide purposes and the reasons for those allocations. Prior to the public meeting, the Board shall inform school site councils, schoolwide advisory groups, or school support groups, as applicable, of the content of the proposed resolution and of the time and location where the resolution is proposed to be adopted. ## **Supplemental Instruction**

The Board of Education recognizes that high-quality supplemental instructional programs can motivate and support students to attain grade-level academic standards, overcome academic deficiencies, and/or acquire critical skills.

#### Required Supplemental Programs

The district shall offer direct, systematic, and intensive supplemental instruction for students in grades 2-9 who have been retained or recommended for retention pursuant to Education Code 48070.5. (Education Code 37252.2)

The district shall offer direct, systematic, and intensive supplemental instruction for students in grades 7-12 who do not demonstrate "sufficient progress" toward passing the state exit examination required for high school graduation. (Education Code 37252, 60851)

"Sufficient progress" shall be determined based on a student's grades and the following indicators of academic achievement:

- 1. Performance at the basic level on unit, chapter, theme assessment, or benchmark assessment.
- 2. Performance at the basic level on progress monitoring tools and, if applicable, progress in language acquisition as defined on the <u>district's SBCUSD</u> Progression Timeline.

In addition, students who do not possess sufficient English language skills to be assessed shall be considered students who do not demonstrate sufficient progress towards passing the California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE), and shall receive supplemental instruction designed to help them succeed on the CAHSEE. 3. Students who have not passed one or both parts of the exit exam by the end of grade 12, for up to two consecutive school years after the completion of grade 12, or until they have passed both parts of the CAHSEE, whichever comes first. (Education Code 37254)

4. Eligible students from low-income families, whenever the District or a District school receiving federal Title-1 funds has been identified by the California Department of Education for Program Improvement for two or more years. (20 USC 6316)

- 4. Students in grades K-4 who need or desire intensive reading opportunities that meet standards for a research-based comprehensive reading program, including appropriate support to address the needs of English Language Learners (Education Code 41505-41508)

- 2. <u>Students in grades 2-9 who are retained or recommended for retention pursuant to Education Code 37252.2</u>
- 3. <u>Students in grades 2-6 who are "at risk" of retention pursuant to Education Code</u> 37252.8
- 4. <u>Students in grades 2-6 who are deficient in mathematics, reading, or written expression pursuant to Education code 37252.8</u>
- 5. <u>Students in K-12 participating in enrichment programs in core academic subjects pursuant to Education Code 37253</u>

The Superintendent or designee shall obtain written parent/guardian consent for a student's participation in the supplemental instructional program.

### 4.9 - District Appropriations Limit Calculations for Fiscal Year 2007-08

The passage of Proposition 4 (Article XIIB of the Constitution of the State of California) in November 1979, established constitutional limits on appropriations (Gann Limits) for fiscal years beginning July 1, 1980. These limitations apply only to unrestricted state and local income.

Beginning in 1989-90, the State redefined the state aid that counts toward school district Gann limits to be "the amount which fills up a district's Gann limit." Consequently, only districts with extremely high levels of property taxes will be over their Gann limits.

Education Code sections 1629 and 42132 specify that by September 15 (districts) of each year, the governing boards of districts and county offices of education shall adopt a resolution identifying their estimated appropriations limits for the current year and their actual appropriations limit for the preceding year.

The District's actual appropriations limit for the 2007-08 fiscal year is \$268,216,356.79. The District's estimated appropriations limit for the 2008-09 fiscal year is \$271,918,571.30.

Upon motion by Member Savage, seconded by Member Ayala, and approved by the affirmative vote of Members Ayala, Brown, Parra, Penman, Savage, Tillman, and Valdez (Noes: None), the following was adopted:

# SAN BERNARDINO CITY UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT RESOLUTION FOR ADOPTING THE "GANN" LIMIT

**WHEREAS**, in November of 1979, the California electorate did adopt Proposition 4, commonly called the Gann Amendment, which added Article XIIB to the California Constitution; and

**WHEREAS**, the provisions of that Article establish maximum appropriation limitations, commonly called "Gann Limits," for public agencies, including school districts; and

**WHEREAS**, the San Bernardino City Unified School District must establish a revised Gann limit for the 2007-08 fiscal year and a projected Gann limit for the 2008-09 fiscal year in accordance with the provisions of Article XIIB and applicable statutory law;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the San Bernardino City Unified School District Board does provide public notice that the attached calculations and documentation of the Gann limits for the 2007-08 and 2008-09 fiscal years are made in accord with applicable constitutional and statutory law;

President Parra moved Session Six – Reports and Comments forward on the agenda.

### **SESSION SIX - Reports and Comments**

### 6.0 - Report by Board Members

Board members reported on school-related activities they have attended during the past few weeks and announced upcoming events they believe will be of interest to their fellow Board members.

Marlin Brown reported that while he was in South Dakota last week he learned that schools in Sioux Falls have a Spanish immersion program for Kindergarten students. Dr. Brown stated that former *Sun* publisher Arnold Garson is now the publisher and president of a newspaper in Louisville, Kentucky. Dr. Brown commented on the positive growth District schools are showing on test scores.

Judi Penman stated that a for-profit business is in the process of opening a homeless shelter next to the Lincoln II site. The project is going before the City Planning Commission on September 16, and Mrs. Penman stated that she is not in favor of it. Dr. Delgado reported that the District was asked to write a letter of support of homeless shelters in general terms. We weren't aware that it would be located so close to a school. We will monitor this and John Peukert has already expressed a concern to the City. Mrs. Penman stated that the City assumes the District supports the project because of our letter of support. Dr. Delgado stated that we will resend the original letter to the City and indicate it was meant in general terms and that we have a concern about the proposed location. Dr. Delgado stated that we will agendize this topic for the September 16 Board meeting so the Board can discuss it further if they wish. Louise Ayala stated that homeless shelters can only be a disaster for our city. They are dangerous for students and ruin

the city. Elsa Valdez stated that we need to move with caution because we have homeless students in the District whose families would have a place to stay. Dr. Valdez would like to get all the facts before taking a position.

Teresa Parra stated that the Colonel Joseph Rodriguez Prep Academy was built at a cost of \$24 million, of which, \$14 million was paid for with Measure T funds. This new school has improved the area. Mrs. Parra stated that the District's BESTILL program helps our homeless students and cautioned not to stereotype students.

Mrs. Parra reported that she received a letter from Gary Wallace who has some interesting ideas. Mrs. Parra gave the letter to the Superintendent to share with his staff. Mrs. Parra requested a report on how funds for the Arts, Music, and PE grant funds were disbursed.

Mrs. Parra stated that charter schools have good intentions, but fall short. Mrs. Parra requested that the topic of charter schools be agendized to determine if they are effective. Danny Tillman stated that charter schools are unique to fit the needs of students. Mrs. Parra stated that not monitoring their budgets or criteria would be a detriment to the District and students. Marlin Brown stated that the Board does have oversight responsibility of charter schools. It was the consensus of the Board to agendize this topic for a future Board meeting. Mrs. Parra recommended the District contract with the State Charter Association to do an audit. Judi Penman agreed with Mr. Tillman. There needs to be a place for all students.

Teresa Parra stated that she was not aware that the District had hired a web site company. Mrs. Parra requested the cost for maintaining the site and if the Communications Office was paying for it. Danny Tillman stated that the District's website has been lacking for a long time. Mr. Tillman asked if grades and assignments are accessible to parents. Paul Shirk stated that elementary, middle, and high schools have been piloting a program before they open it to all schools. Mrs. Parra stated that the Board needs a report on this and asked that Staff relook at how schools give out information.

### 7.0 - Report by Superintendent and Staff Members

Dr. Delgado reported that he attended a farewell reception for Dr. Fischer and presented a resolution on behalf of the Board. Dr. Delgado announced that the next Operation Student Recovery event will be held on September 10. Dr. Delgado stated that the CSEA barbeque was a nice event. Dr. Delgado wished a speedy recovery to the worker who fainted.

### **SESSION FIVE – Other Matters Brought By Citizens**

### 5.0 - Other Matters Brought by Citizens

Ken Holt thank the Superintendent and Employee Relations staff for their help with the barbeque held last week for CSEA members. Approximately 800 CSEA members and managers attended.

Jason Terkeurst reported that everyone enjoyed the BBQ and the employee who was ill is now doing well. Mr. Terkeurst asked the Board to pull the dismissal of a classified employee from the Personnel Report and review the facts in Closed Session before taking action.

Gil Navarro, County School Board member, reported that Gary Thomas will be sworn in as County Superintendent. Mr. Navarro stated that he sees an obligation to hold the District accountable. Mr. Navarro challenged Danny Tillman to ask hard questions about County Schools. Mr. Navarro stated he is asking for a county Counsel opinion for changing the County Superintendent from an elected to an appointed position. Mr. Navarro stated he will ask how County Schools can help our district. Danny Tillman stated that Mr. Navarro's previous comments were condescending about our students. We are all trying to be fair and help all students. Teresa Parra stated that she doesn't support County Schools. Marlin Brown stated that he views Mr. Navarro's role as supporting the District, and slamming us doesn't support it. Dr. Brown asked Mr. Navarro to find funding to spotlight our programs to the County. It is confusing to the public of what his role is.
