LAST DAY OF SCHOOL!

Dr. Brigman joined us during WIN for an exclusive one-on-one interview. We are very appreciative of the time he took to sit down with our newspaper students!

You may not know that Dr. Brigman was in the Navy before deciding to become a teacher. His mother influenced him greatly as she was a teacher for over thirty years. Throughout his career in education, Dr. Brigman has worked with elementary, middle, and high school students in various roles. At one point, he was able to plan and build a brand new middle school "from paper up." He will soon celebrate his 16th year as a superintendent.

What is your philosophy on education?

"You can't determine a young person's, or child's future based on their current circumstances. Their circumstances are temporary. I was raised by a single parent and grew up in a mobile home park. My mother was earning a wage below the poverty line. But I was blessed with a good mother who worked hard to fill in the gaps. I've been very blessed; none of us (Brigman and his siblings) have been jailed, and we all have good jobs."

Where were you serving previously?

"I have served most of my superintendency in Tennessee and in Decatur, Alabama."

What has been the biggest change between those locations and Laurens County?

"Well, I've worked in inner city environments, and I have worked in very rural environments. And, Laurens County is similar to those rural environments. That has been the biggest change. Believe it or not, it is a blessing to pull out of the parking lot and see cattle across the road. We (my wife and I) are blessed to be here."

Brigman interview continued

What inspired WIN?

“When I first got here, I asked the principals this question: ‘Are we happy with our test performances?’ And, of course, we are never happy with our level of performance. So, instead of planning everything based off of lunch periods and athletics, we decided to turn the philosophy around and give students time for remediation and enrichment activities instead of expecting students to stay after school.”

What is the reasoning behind the loss of exemptions?

“There were several things. One reason was growth and accountability for testing. But, this isn’t an open and shut case. The loss of exemptions is still under review.”

Do you feel as though arming teachers has been successful?

“I do. We know that, in the case of an emergency, we are prepared to defend ourselves against a potential threat, and we are blessed that we have not had to use this precaution yet.”

What is your proudest accomplishment for Laurens County?

“If I had to pick a specific accomplishment, it would be how hard we have worked to put child literacy as a priority; we have made huge progress in a short amount of time.”

What is a future goal for Laurens County?

“My main goal, for the future, is to see the class of 2023 with a 100% high school graduation rate.”



Look *Whooo's* Moving to the OWL 6th Grade Academy



Many people are wondering why the 6th grade is being moved to the OWL. Mr. Waldrep told the newspaper staff all about this situation. He said that it was a space issue and would be very beneficial for us to use the three halls that would be left. These halls and classrooms can be used for meeting rooms, possible WIN classes, special education spaces, labs for science experiments, etc. The 6th graders will have the same connections and same classes but in a different location and possibly different teachers. These students will not have to leave campus or switch campuses at any time of the day. The Board and Mr. Waldrep are still working out a car rider line and bus plan for the 6th Grade Academy and for WLMS to create a smooth drop-off and pick-up for parents. There are some decisions still left to be made about this new venture for the Laurens County School System; however, these changes will ultimately provide a better educational experience for students in our county. The following is some specific information provided to parents and students at the 6th Grade Academy meeting at Southwest Laurens Elementary, which was held Tuesday, April 23.

- All clubs and sports offered at WLMS available to 6th, some club meetings may require walking to the middle school
- Same agendas, rules, and routines as 7th and 8th
- Three busses will leave SW, two busses will leave NW (6th grade only on the busses that go from academy to SW and NW and vice versa), route for car riders is being mapped out but will be available for the **Open House May 21 at 6pm**
- Full cafeteria capabilities, all kids eat free breakfast and lunch
- Full technology capabilities
- WIN will continue at the academy
- Media center will be overhauled, nontraditional, "fully functional learning center," Mrs. Cindy Crawford will be the media specialist
- Full-time resource officer
- Nurse is shared between schools (golf cart transport)
- School hours the same
- Mrs. Kemp (principal) hinted that the name of the school is still negotiable if students would be interested in naming the school something other than "6th Grade Academy."
- Alternative school and Heartland Academy is moving out, but the Career Academy will still occupy the other end of the building. 6th will be using 1st, 2nd, and 3rd hallways only.
- Subject-based hallways instead of team-based hallways
- All connections coming to OWL, band too
- 13 homerooms, 27 students per class, 350 students (These are estimates.)
- Everything new, all old things out (A/C, carpet, etc.)
- There are plans for a new middle school to be built in the next three years!

His plans are to eat most of the produce, but he may also sell some it at the Market on Madison in Dublin. 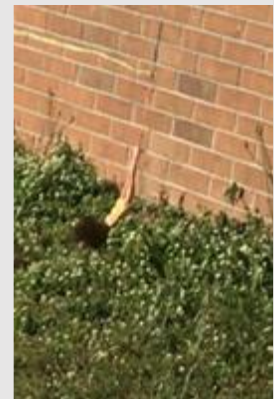
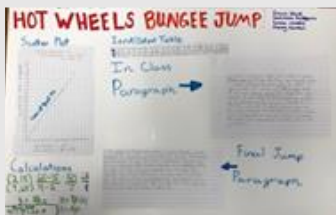

WEST LAURENS HIGH SCHOOL: The Next Step

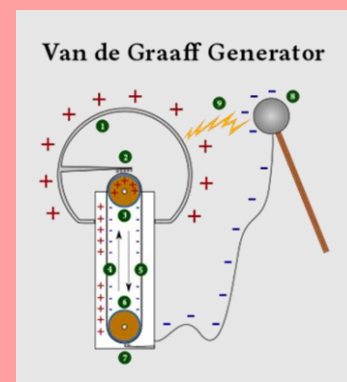
- No more than 2 office referrals

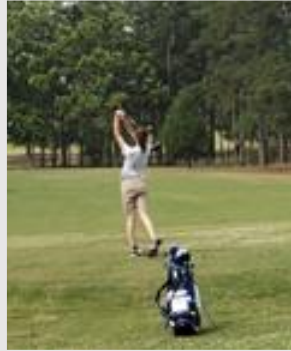

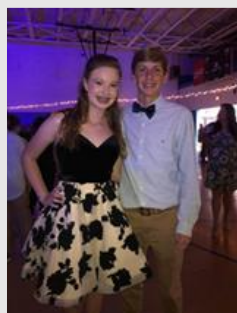
