# Lelek Receives Prestigious Questbridge Scholarship

Among the 5,613 finalists, Anna Lelek was one out of 1,755 finalists to be named a Questbridge scholarship recipient and has been matched to the University of Notre Dame.

Anna, who plans to study Chemical Engineering at Notre Dame, hopes to become a biomedical engineer specializing in cancer research and nanotechnology.

She is a STEM-oriented student with meaningful goals for her future, stating, "I'm hoping to come out of college with a valuable set of skills to support cancer research and be a valuable addition to a team of researchers. This is important to me because I want to have a purpose in this world and make a difference, and what better way to do that than by fighting the deadliest disease?"

The Questbridge National College Match is an equity program that connects high-achieving high school seniors from economically disadvantaged backgrounds with a full four-year scholarship to 50 of the nation's elite institutions.

This scholarship has enabled Anna to hold gratitude for the journey her parents took to give her this life. She often ponders her many struggles, and she greatly awaited the arrival of this grant.

"I felt like a weight had been lifted off my shoulders after I opened my acceptance letter. My parents risked everything to leave their home and family to come to America to give me a better life. They came here with no money, the inability to speak the [English] language, and no family, but here they are raising two kids with a house and jobs, making the most of it. They showed me if there is a will, there's a way," she states.

According to Questbridge, 17,900 applications were received. The average profile consisted of a 3.92 GPA, with 87% of applicants ranking in the top 10% of the class and 75% scoring 1290+ on the SAT or 27+ on the ACT. An estimated 78% are also first-generation students.

However, because of the burden of imposter syndrome and the many difficulties in attaining such a scholarship, Anna faced rigorous challenges.

"My relationship with Questbridge started my junior year when I applied to their College Prep Scholar Program. This program gave rising seniors the resources to educate themselves about the college application process and help them figure out what they want in their college. And I was lucky enough to be a College Prep Scholar! This gave me a leg up in the college application process and made it ten times easier, but of course, throughout the process, there were multiple times I got in my head about my abilities and started to doubt myself."

Despite her challenges, many of her Fenton mentors and teachers can attest that she is fit and deserving of this opportunity.

Counselor Sarah McDougal is delighted to have had their student matched and highly exclaims Anna's passionate personality.

"Anna has excelled academically during her four years here and has done a lot outside of the classroom as well. Aside from extracurricular activities, Anna did a summer program for female students interested in computer science, and with other students from across the country, she created her website. She [advocates] for female students interested in entering the STEM field."

Additionally, McDougal goes to talk about Anna's curiosity about the world. "Anna has been curious about the world and has always been excited about learning, and those characteristics helped her write some amazing essays about her experiences, her outlook on the world, and her dreams for her future."

Ms. Kelly Torres played a vital part in Anna's match. She too has strong words to represent Lelek as a student and individual by adding, "Anna truly embodies what [this] scholarship means. When she first started APUSH, she struggled with the rigor of the course. She struggled with some personal issues as well, but always made time to do what she needed to do to be successful in my class. What I loved about her is that when she would fail, she would not give up. As the course continued, Anna slowly but surely worked her way up through her dedication and perseverance to one of the top AP US




students in the course. I am so proud of her!"

"Notre Dame is a school filled with tradition and spirit, and I know Anna is looking forward to being a part of it all," says McDougal. It's safe to say that Anna Lelek embodies a scholarship made for many high school students across the nation with the same burdens, but what sets Anna aside from other high achievers is her vision to change the world and her spirit.

Anna is looking forward to participating in laboratory research at Notre Dame.

"Namely, the Harper Cancer Research Institute, where they use nanoparticles for drug delivery to cancer cells, which is [precisely] what I want to do in my career."

"I can't wait to create a life in a new place!" Anna exclaims with her valuable scholarship that will extend her dreams and chances she couldn't have dreamed of.

"Visiting the EPCOT World Showcase and immersing myself in a variety of cultures was absolutely lovely. It was the day I spent the most money, treated myself to the most delicious food, and fangirled over everything presented- it was an unforgettable day," Calderon explained.

Walking through the park and stopping at stores with designated cultures made me feel deeply connected to the natural world. The average American student spends 14,342 hours in school throughout their lifetime. That excludes time in extracurricular activities or longer school days. Today's students are more involved in school than ever before; however, today's students also have higher mental illness rates. According to the CDC, more than 1 in 3 high schoolers report having a mental illness. Though some argue that mental health is just now a more familiar topic, we can see how much it impacts our students.

According to recent studies, high school students have the same anxiety as patients in insane asylums in the 1950s. Many students share their stories on TikTok about the pressure we are exposed to in school and how it has affected their self-esteem, increasing their hopeless and suicidal thoughts. However, though this is a dominating issue within schools, students are still never taught to deal with the issues that affect them. The mental health of students across the nation is not a priority.

Mental health care in the United States can cost anywhere from \$65-\$250 per hour, which many insurances won't cover. Still, even if you can afford the steep cost, you must overcome the stigma of being mentally ill in today's society. Unfortunately, overcoming the stigma is the 3rd hardest part next to the price and finding time to go to therapy. Students today have the world at their fingertips, which many say is very beneficial because we have access to information, but what isn't considered is how often negative information is being spread to us.

According to ChildMind, learning about school shootings can increase anxiety and frustration while feeling unsafe.

Ms .Melissa To, one of our counselors at Fenton, explains the fear that goes along with the actual shooting and the threats we receive. This causes a lot of panics because we quickly have access to visual information.

Fenton social worker, Ms. Peggy Mellenthin, adds, "Students are affected greatly because you are now finding out hard information at school rather than at a place you trust with a supportive adult."

She also adds how social media displays more graphic cases of what

is happening where earlier generations sometimes didn't even know what was happening. If they did, it was less explicit because it was on TV, which censors things.

Everyone talks about how we are so scared because of social media because social media is the root of all evil; however, many students feel the opposite; they use it as an escape from the real world.

Elmer Escobedo responded to the question: how do you think social media affects you with, "Overall, it improves my mental health a little because I'm distracted, and that allows me to lose some stress."

Though there are times in which social media can harm us Giselle Garcia reminds us that "it's not always true and it just comes down to challenging yourself not to devalue your mentality."

As students grow older, we've learned not to believe everything is true on social media, so nowadays, social media allows students to take a break and destress. We have taught ourselves ways to deal with our mental health because if you want to fix your mental health in school, you have to lose class time.

Though Fenton offers counseling, it can take a lot of work to get an appointment when needed. As a student, you must also decide if your grades matter more than your mentality. Today's schools are not meeting the needs of students, especially those in lower-income areas, as not everyone can afford mental health care. Rather than teaching kids from a young age that their feelings don't matter because they are in school, we should implement classes such as Leadership For Life earlier to give students these fundamental skills for loving themselves.

Students are faced with a lot of stress and anxiety from having all this information instantly, but is it the instant information that affects us, or is our world today not keeping us safe in places we should trust? The next time you scroll through social media, remind yourself it is a place where people escape reality from our messed up world. Though we cannot fix the world, teaching kids how to better their mental is a life skill that not only improves their futures but also would undoubtedly lead to an improvement in societal ills stemming from poor mental health people currently suffer from.

## Bison Scripts: Written, Directed, Acted by Students

On the 9th of December, students, staff, family, and friends huddled into the auditorium to watch a collection of theater performances which were completely studentproduced. The pieces were written, directed, staged, and performed completely by students. The shows ranged from lighthearted comedies, to psychological thrillers.

Bison Scripts is a chance for students to explore new activities, polish their talents, and express themselves through the theater.

I spoke to Senior Jessica Vanleeuwen, a writer and director for Bison Scripts, about what inspired her to write her show about life in a halfway house.

"This is a story about building up her successful life. It's like seeing the inside of a halfway house that people don't normally see. Yeah, there's drama but there's also good points in someone's life story that build up to it," Valnleeuwen states.

Director and writer senior Mia Silva states, "I wanted to do a murder mystery but then I thought that was cliché. It was originally gonna be a killer story, but that was kind of gory and too crazy. So, I turned it into a repeating day at a psych ward because it still has a spooky vibe."

Bison Scripts "is a very low-key way to join a theater. It's a chill, low-pressure way to join and get to know people in the theater program," states senior Delilah Johnson, a director for Bison Scripts.

"I really enjoy this time of the year because it's a time to step into the director's shoes and understand what it's like to manage teenagers. It's exciting to put my creative mind on the stage and take something that someone else has written and bring it to life. It's really fun," Johnson said.

Many students, such as Junior Jessica Urbanio, took the lowstakes opportunity to try their hand at theater.

"I wanted to get myself out there," stated Urbanio on the night of the performance.

"I'm having a lot of fun. It's really fun. It's just really nerve racking."

Silva states, "It's kind of cool to see all the aspects of theater since I'm only used to being on the stage. Now I can see what goes on in the booth, what goes on in the director's minds, and what goes on in casting, costume, and stage crew. I see all of the work that gets put in. If anyone's timid about joining theater, then Bison Scripts is a great leeway into getting involved. It's a very low time commitment and the stakes are really low. Everything is done by students."

Dr. Mike Mitchell, one of the Bison Scripts Sponsors, states, "I think that there's just something about the student ownership of the shows that gives [the students] a certain kind of motivation that they don't get in the other shows."

Michell recalls, "Not too long ago I saw an interview with Lin-Manuel Miranda and he talked about how they had a program at their school where kids got to write and direct their own shows, and I said, 'Oh my gosh, that's exactly what I've been doing for years!' That's when [Miranda] realized he could do what he does today. Which I think is just really really important and a powerful story to share with students: 'Hey, if he can do it, you can do it. Why not?'''

George Dr. Mussman, another Bison Script Sponsor, states, "We like the idea of giving students the opportunity to have some leadership experiences. Although it can be frustrating at times, we think that it's a really valuable experience. And, we think that students have a lot of fun with it. The shows always end up being really fun. Although, we have had some serious topics that students wanted to deal with in their writing and that gets translated to the stage. But overall, I think it's been a very positive experience. Students learn a lot from it."

Mussman continues, "One of the things that is really cool about theater is that it's about working together to create something. It's not in competition. Nobody has to lose. Everybody gets to win. We do that by working together. I think that's why [theater] is such an accepting environment and why a lot of people feel really comfortable in drama programs. Whether it's musicals or plays, I think that it's because they are welcomed and it is an environment where everybody gets to come together and work together."

"I'm always impressed with students who take the chance and take the risk because it's scary to put yourselfout there. Whether it's getting up on stage or being responsible for things that are happening backstage. That is something that is not easy for students to do. I'm always impressed with students who do it. But, it is something that everybody who wants to can do. It's an education program. We're not professionals. We really do want everybody to be able to come and make whatever contribution they can and learn from it," Mussman concludes.

""The cool thing is that

there is a place for anybody who wants to do [Bison Scripts]. What I mean by that is that if you're not comfortable with being on stage, we need people on crew. If you aren't interested in being on crew and you aren't interested in being on stage, you could be a writer. There are so many different ways that you can be involved," Mitchell says.

"And if you don't want to be involved that way, just come out and watch them. There's involvement in that regard, we need an audience. It's not a play without an audience."

### Criminal Justice Classes Present Projects on Corrections System

On December 20th, Ms. Kelly Torres's Criminal Justice class put on a student-created, student-led presentation which provided insights and modifications to our community's current corrections system. Suggestions included remodeling the system to get easier access to health and hygiene services, focusing on rehabilitation and learning, and helping inmates come back into the community.

Unlike previous years, students had a special guest Larry Lawton speak via video call. Lawton is an ex-convict but is now a motivational speaker, author, and influencer on social media. Since his release from prison in 2007, he's been advocating for prison reforms as well as reforms to the society that puts youth on a path to incarceration. Students were invited to the 131st episode of Lawton's podcast *The Real Deal w/ Larry Lawton* where they discussed their project.

Torres states, "We invited people from our local newspaper all the way to Former President Obama and a bunch of people in between. Anyone who was involved in Criminal Justice reform in any aspect made our list. The students reached out to a bunch of different celebrities and [Lawton] responded. From there it took on a life of its own. [Lawton] was really gracious for letting us be on his podcast and speaking at the presentation. Working with him was really awesome. I've spent, now, hours on the phone with him. He gave me probably 3 hours of his time, probably more, outside of the podcast. He's just been really great, and he was really invested from the beginning."

In his podcast, Lawton described Torres as "a dynamite teacher." Also noting that Torres was always there to back her students whenever they needed.

Torres comments, "The purpose of the assignment was to understand the issues facing the corrections system in America and teach students the skills needed to affect changes for those issues."

One of two project leaders, Ryan Peterson (Senior), states, "I think this project is the start of some meaningful changes in the community. Our ideas from that presentation are going to be condensed and sent to Congress to hopefully change some things."

Leader of the Rehabilitation division, Junior Febe Reyes, comments, "When I signed up for Criminal Justice, I did not expect to be part of such an important presentation. Nevertheless, I'm certainly glad we were able to organize such an event. We had an amazing turnout of teachers and community leaders as our audience; many of them asked great questions to us the students as well as to Larry Lawton on video call."

Torres continues, "My role was basically just to push them to do everything. I'm facilitating more than I'm actually teaching. I assigned the overall project "Design a correction system" and I designed the avenues that they would focus on. I put them in their groups according to their interests. From there I had a checklist for each group on what they needed to get done. But how and where it goes from there is up to each individual group." Reyes notes, "This project helped me experience what professionals do in their everyday lives, like great presentation and research skills, as well as group cooperation and having higher roles. Although I don't plan on studying a career in the criminal justice field, my desired career (astronomy) will require many of these skills."

"There were many people that are important to the community in attendance, as well as Larry Lawton. With these people, we are able to bring attention to these issues and make a change. Hopefully as small as a local law, or as big as an act!" Reyes continues.

Torres comments, "I hope students gain compassion for their fellow man, realizing that the current system sets newly released citizens up for failure. I want them to come away from the class understanding how to make changes in whatever areas they are passionate about, knowing that they are the future leaders of America."

Overall, this book was okay. If you like fairy tales mixed with queer representation, it's a nice read. However, I didn't find this story very complex or deep. 

It happens every fourth year; the world comes together to enjoy a game that has been around for decades. The World Cup is a tournament for which everyone globally tunes in. This year has been rocky, from small teams making it far (Croatia getting 3rd after beating Morocco 3-1) to surprising losses (Brazil lost to Croatia in the quarter-finals).

Livakovic's saves helped kick the 5-time Brazilian World champs out of the Cup. The Croatian goalkeeper also set the record for most penalty kick saves in the World Cup with four penalty shootout saves. Croatia's victorious run finally ended with a loss to Argentina in the semi-finals.

Morocco placed fourth in the World Cup with a devastating loss to France in the semi-finals. Now the powerhouses of soccer. In the finals, Argentina faced off against France. In this ultimate showdown, the win came down to penalties. Despite an early loss to Saudi Arabia, Argentina quickly defeated its opponents.

France's Kylian Mbappe scored two of the three goals to tie the game, leading to a penalty shootout. Mbappe is only the second player in World Cup history to score a hat-trick and win a Golden Boot award. The Golden Boot award is given to the player who scores the most goals in the World Cup; Mbappe scored twelve goals.

The Golden Glove went to Argentinian goalie Emi Martinez, who also has a bit of controversy about the trophy due to the number of saves during the penalties he had. The Golden Ball went to Lionel Messi; this award goes to the MVP of the game. Messi won this due to his outstanding performance in the penalty shootout, which led to the ultimate win by Argentina. The biggest win of the night went to Argentina as they won 3-3, 4-2 penalties.

The World Cup this year was full of surprises and was entertaining. It is an estimation that four billion people watched the players hit the pitch on the world stage.

In the 2026 World Cup, it will happen a little differently. Instead of being held in one arena in one country, the games will be held across three countries, the U.S., Mexico, and Canada.
