Equity Interest Leads to Equal Opportinity Schools Program

Fenton High School, in partnership with Equal Opportunity Schools (also known as EOS), has commenced their participation in the AP Equity and Excellence Project. This project will be in place for 2 years, looking to create a self-sustaining environment for every year after, and is designed to serve historically underrepresented students. This specifically refers to students from a low-income background, who are ethnically diverse, or who have the capacity to achieve in AP classes- but do not have the confidence to attempt a class.

Fenton was awarded a matched grant from EOS, a non-

profit organization, which means that Fenton has agreed to invest \$14,500 in making our AP courses feel more accessible to students, and in return, the organization will invest (or match) \$14,500.

The masterminds behind this operation include Dr. Jill Kingsfield, curriculum director; Dr. Kathie Pierce, superintendent; and Mr. James Ongtengco, principal.

Dr. Kingsfield has been especially involved in working with our EOS partner, Mr. Luke Justice, to work through the application process, coordinate the data collections (in other words, the survey that was provided during Bison Time last Wednesday), and set up site visits. The main motivation for such a program is meant to disrupt the exclusive feel of AP classes and encourage students who have the capabilities to perform well in AP classes, but are not currently participating (whether it be lack of confidence, or just not understanding how to get into AP classes), to try at least one AP class.

AP courses offer many advantages and benefits that smooth the transition between high school coursework and college coursework. Not only that, but depending on how well a student does on an AP test, it is possible to earn college credit for a class and potentially save thousands of dollars on that class. When asked why students should consider taking an AP class at Fenton, Dr. Kingsfield remarked, "I would rather you all learn to tackle college level work in a nurturing environment like Fenton high school."

The only guarantee students will receive at Fenton more so than a college campus is that the teachers truly want them to succeed, and so they will do everything in their power to make sure you have a fundamental understanding of the curriculum and help to advance them in their studies. After the AP Equity and Excellence Project is in place, there is an estimate that at least 50 students will be joining the AP track.

If you're a fan of Jeopardy! or simply are full of trivia then Academic Team is the team for you. Coached by Coach Laudermith, Coach Aguilar and Coach Decardo, Academic Team is a really fun club. It doesn't matter which grade level you are. From freshmen to seniors, students learn new things or expand their knowledge through questions asked at matches and practices.

The way a match works is students are divided into two teams by school and grade level.

Then they are asked a series of 20-24 questions. If a team member correctly answers a question, they are rewarded ten points and then the team is given a chance to answer bonus questions. Bonus questions are a series of three questions linked by a common topic. A team has a chance to score 30 points if all parts are answered correctly. At the end of a match, the team with the highest score wins.




