## GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY COMES TO AN END

Northern Highlands' 50th Anniversary is about to come to a close and it has been golden through and through. Since our Alumni Open House in the fall, our celebration has continued throughout the year.

On October 5, Highlands welcomed home one of our most famous and distinguished alumnus, FBI Director James Comey '78. Director Comey conducted a student assembly in which he recounted his rise through the Justice Department, as well as the qualities that he observed in the most



successful people along the way. His presentation extolled the virtues of civic and social responsibility and was enjoyed by all.



In addition, the school plans to design and create a new mural in the Main Cafeteria. This mural is to be placed on the opposite wall from our existing mural painted in the early 1970's. The student body will be surveyed to give direction to its designers on what content to include. From there, students enrolled in Advanced Placement Art classes will enter a design contest to commemorate the school's Golden Anniversary. A winning design will be selected and the mural

will be completed over the course of the next school year.

Members of the Class of 1967 will lead our current graduates onto the field and will be recognized during the ceremony. ## Northern Highlands Welcomes 1-to-1

After almost 2 years of preparation, Northern Highlands will implement its 1-to-1 device initiative in which all students will be provided a Microsoft Surface tablet/laptop starting with the 2016/2017 school year.

The district's 1-to-1 initiative started during the 2015/2016 school year with all teachers receiving the same device in order to allow them a full year of use prior to the students receiving theirs. After almost a full year of preparation and training, we are closing in on full implementation of this exciting educational endeavor.

As a part of the 1-to-1 rollout, a presentation was made to the community at the February 22 Board of Education Meeting. A full copy of the PowerPoint presentation from this meeting can be found on the district's website at [www.NorthernHighlands.org](http://www.NorthernHighlands.org).

In addition to the BOE presentation, all students will be required to attend a 1 hour summer training which will provide them with instruction on the hardware, rules/policies, digital citizenship, and MS OneNote. The dates and times of these summer sessions will be provided to parents and students in May.

We, as a district, are extremely excited and pleased with the educational advantages that these devices will bring both our students and staff. We look forward to improved communication, collaboration, ability to provide individualized instruction, technology standardization, flexibility, innovation and 24/7 access to all curriculum.

These times are indeed exciting at Northern Highlands and we continue to look forward to what educational advantages and opportunities these devices will bring to both our students and staff.

## Northern Highlands Teacher of the Year

Mr. Dean Rayside, member of our Mathematics department, was named as the Northern Highlands 2016 Governor's Educator of the Year. After a selection committee's careful and diligent review of the criteria set by the NJ Department of Education, Mr. Rayside was worthy of the recognition. ## Social Studies Teacher Chosen for National Endowment

History Department Teacher Mr. John Cornell was chosen for a National Endowment of the Humanities Landmark of American History and Culture Workshop in Long Beach, California that will be presented in late June. The workshop, *Cold War Home Front*, examines the economic, social, and cultural patterns that developed on the home front during the Cold War in southern California. It begins in 1941, addressing the crucial World War II roots of Sunbelt dynamics. Most of the workshop focuses on sub-urbanization and the growth of the aerospace industry during classic Cold War space age of the 1950s.

We currently have 8 full dome digital shows that are integrated into curricular offerings, can be used for birthday parties, clubs, scout field trips and more! The system allows the user to explore the night sky, constellations, planets and more with the click of a button.

## New Courses for 16/17

For the 2016-2017 school year, we are making changes to enhance the freshman course requirements, as well as the Basic Skills program. The high school has created a new interdisciplinary course called Foundations of Literacy and Technology. This course will be mandatory for all incoming ninth graders and will be replacing the two half year courses: Contemporary Business Technology and Freshman Rhetoric.

The high school Basic Skills program will be using a new program beginning in the fall called IXL. IXL is an immersive learning experience that provides comprehensive, standards-aligned content for math, language arts, science, and social studies. This program can be used for all grade levels from K-12 and will be a great tool for students. They can access this program, on their personal device anywhere, at any time. It is a fun, interactive way to reinforce new concepts.

## Science League

Thirty students in grades 9-12 are on Northern Highlands Science League. Teams of four students, competing at two levels (First-Year and Advanced Placement) contend with other local schools once a month from January through April on written tests in biology, chemistry, and physics. Each team and student is ranked against schools throughout the state. Highlands teams have placed 1st or 2nd in each of the meets held this year. Northern Highlands recently hosted the final competition of the year on April 21.



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## A Cappella Wins for 6th Year in a Row

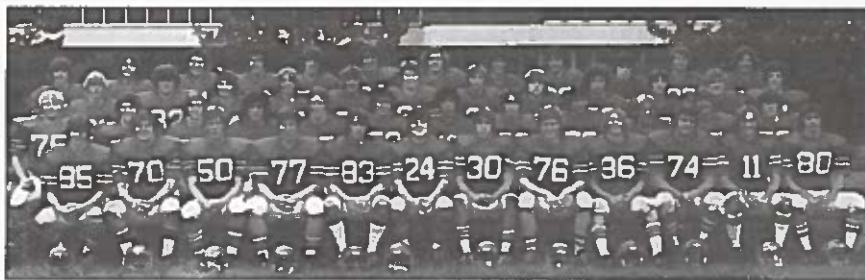

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## Valedictorian and Salutatorian Named

Principal Joseph Occhino recently announced this year's Valedictorian and Salutatorian. Valedictorian James Ding and Salutatorian Jonathan Song are both members of the Northern Highlands Chapter of National Honor Society. Both have earned High Honor Roll each year of high school, and are National Merit Scholarship finalists. These outstanding students have earned several other honors and awards over the last four years.

Every year in high school, James qualified for the American Invitational Math Exam (AIME), the most prestigious high school math competition. James received the Certificate of Excellence in English, the Excellence Award for Limitless Devotion from the S.O.L.V.E. club (Students Obtaining Leadership Values Effectively), and was named student of the month twice. Outside of the classroom, James has been an outstanding community member. Every Sunday since his freshman year, he has volunteered for his town's Special Needs Sports Program. James coaches football, basketball and baseball to 25 children over the year. He is passionate about helping others, especially young children, and playing sports. He also took the opportunity to volunteer as an English teacher in a summer camp hosted by the AIDE Foundation in China. In addition to his community work, James has been conducting math research under

the guidance of a professor at Louisiana State University for the past two years. He also serves as the president of the math club, vice president of the chess club and is a member of the NJ Science League.

Jonathan is also a very caring person who is always interested in helping others. Two years ago he developed "TechTime for Seniors" a technology program which helps senior citizens with the use of technology. He conducts classes at the local library, teaching the senior citizens how to use laptops, cell phones, tablets, etc. This program has been so successful that Jonathan has recruited other students to run the program at other libraries in the area. Last year, Jonathan was awarded the Prudential Spirit of the Community Local Honoree award for this program. Jonathan attended Boys' State this past summer. He won a few elections as a party politician and rose up the ranks to eventually become the Attorney General for the 2015 New Jersey Boys State program. This experience highlighted Jonathan's persuasive skills, his effectiveness at writing speeches, and his ability to use his personality and his intellect to get the job done.

Northern Highlands DECA had 46 students attend DECA's International Career Development Conference (ICDC) held in Nashville, TN in April 2016. Of the 46, 43 of the students ranked 1st, 2nd, or 3rd in their respective DECA events at the State DECA Conference that was held in Cherry Hill, NJ on February 24-26. The events ranged from projects to team events and individual events.

Two of the NH DECA chapter projects (Public Relations Campaign and the Community Service Project) took 1st place honors. The Public Relations Campaign, "Address Your Stress" promoted healthy ways for teens to deal with stress. The beneficiary of this year's Community Service Project was ECLC, a school in Ho-Ho-Kus for severely challenged children.

## Entrepreneurship Simulation

The Northern Highlands 2015-2016 Entrepreneurship Class took part in an online retail entrepreneurship simulation this year. To help prepare students, Ms. Lara Henawi, the owner of Ludovica, a small retail store in Westwood, met with the class prior to starting the simulation. She shared her firsthand knowledge of opening a store as a young entrepreneur while managing being a college student. During the entrepreneurship simulation, students worked in teams of two to manage a small clothing store and faced "real life" situations along the way. Some of the decisions students had to make involved ethical issues, community support and staffing problems. The six-week simulation included decision-making and allowed students to expand their knowledge in areas such as operations, pricing, marketing, staffing, finance, and teamwork skills.

## Students Excel in Math Competitions

On November 21, 2015 the following students participated in the Andrushkiw Mathematics Competition at Seton Hall University: Grace Chong, Eric Ding, James Ding, Max Lishko, Nam Lu, Sasha Makarovskiy, Alex Rashduni and Tiffany Tong. The competition consisted of a 16 question exam, completed in 90 minutes. James Ding and Eric Ding, placing 3rd and 5th respectively. During the competition, Mr. Cristian Aldea, mathematics teacher, participated in professional development and attended a workshop entitled, *Statistics: Fair Game or Cheating?*

On December 9, 2015, 72 students participated in the 39th annual AMTNJ Mathematics Competition. The 45-minute exam consisted of 15 questions from Algebra to PreCalculus. The Northern Highlands team consisted of the following top scorers: James Ding, Eric Ding, Jongung Park, Connor Courtney, Shlok Goyal and Tiffany Tong. Northern Highlands team received a 3rd place trophy in the Gamma division (schools with more than 1250 students). James Ding received honorable mention.

On February 2, 2016, 39 students participated in the 67th annual American Mathematics Competition (AMC) which was sponsored by The Mathematical Association of America. This prestigious contest consisted of 25 challenging multiple-choice questions without the use of a calculator. Two Northern Highlands students, James Ding and Jongung Park, scored in the top 2.5% and were invited to participate in the American Invitational Mathematics Examination (AIME) on March 3, 2016. This contest consisted of 15 questions during a 3-hour period. Contest results will be received at a later date.

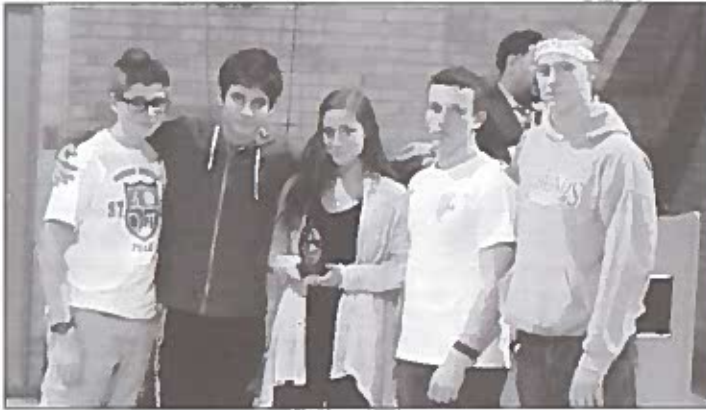


## STEM Team Finds Success

The STEM Team recently competed at the North Jersey League competition at Bloomfield High School on March 4th. Both teams placed 1st and 3rd among the eight schools that participated.

The STEM competition encompassed a problem to build a device that would use sustainable power, generate electricity and be dependable and stable. The competition involved building a new innovative wind turbine that would stay above the earth's surface in the jet stream with an electric generation turbine that would be tethered to the ground. CAD drawings of possible solutions and final designs as well as a physics lab on Magnus force/effects were required. Judging the designs were engineers from the US Army's Picatinny Arsenal.

On Tuesday, May 24th Northern Highlands will be hosting the Grand Finale of the NJ STEM League. Twenty one schools will be participating from all over North Jersey. Approximately 175 people will be involved in this event. This will be a paperless event where all the documentation, drawings and judging will be done online and in real time. The league has grown from five schools at the inaugural competition in November of 2014 to over 25 schools presently represented.



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
