Students in grades 6-9 enjoyed a Hudson Valley Shakespeare Festival modern take on Romeo and Juliet.


The performance was made possible through grants from the Haldane School Foundation and the Haldane Arts Alliance.

Haldane Debate Team Takes First Place at Bard College

On March 3, eight students from Haldane's Debate Team travelled to Bard College, where the Bard Debate Union hosted a high school tournament attended by five schools from the Hudson Valley. Motions (topics) were provided many weeks beforehand to allow for research and preparation.

Haldane's Debate Team meets every week at the Butterfield Library (new




members always welcome!) for brainstorming sessions or practice debates. The format we use is called "world schools," and each member of opposing teams of three deliver their own 5-minute speech. Because each debater has a designated speaking time, each speaker gets their time to shine, so the emphasis is less on making a lot of noise and more on the actual argument.

The motions at hand for the Bard tournament had to do with: whether Puerto Rico should seek independence, whether mockery should be discouraged in political discourse, and whether countries should push for energy self-sufficiency. These topics got us to research areas we might not delve very deeply into on our own, and the opinions that we held going into the experience were not always those we ended up with after hearing strong arguments and evidence for multiple sides.

At the tournament, we competed against high school teams from other schools, and got to socialize with some very intelligent and interesting people. The judges were coaches from the different schools, as well as members of Bard's own debate team. It was the first time this yearly tournament had been held in person since the February right before the pandemic, so for some of us, this event felt like a long-awaited reunion with live debate events. We had a pizza lunch half-way through the afternoon, and at the end of the tournament awards were distributed. The top 10 speakers and top 5 teams were given a gavel or medal.

From Haldane (the smallest school at the tournament), Keira Shanahan (10th grade) received 5th place speaker award, and Haldane A, which was Colin Hopkins (11th grade), Marc Firpo (10th grade), and me, Helena Kottman (11th grade), won 1st place team overall. I am immensely proud of my whole team's hard work and talent. I wasn't able to watch my teammates' debates because I was competing myself, but the practice debates we held at our meetings always produced interesting conversations and I am consistently impressed by my teammates' critical thinking and argumentative skills. It has been particularly rewarding to watch my younger teammates grow in their confidence and abilities, and develop a passion for debate.


