State of California lawsuit, shared some background information regarding the lawsuit and recent settlement. 3.0 Administrative Reports

3.1 <u>Proposed Student Success Team (formally called "Student Study Team") Policy</u> (First Reading) (Prepared by Educational Services Division)

The Governing Board encourages the collaboration of parents/guardians, teachers, resource personnel, administrators and students in evaluating the strengths and needs of students having academic, attendance, or behavioral difficulties and in identifying strategies and programs that may assist the students. The Superintendent or designee shall establish a Student Success Team (SST) as needed to address individual students' needs.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a process for initiating referrals of students to the SST.

Each SST shall develop intervention strategies to assist the student. Such strategies may include changes in program placement or instructional methods, recommendation of supplemental educational services, parent involvement strategies, behavioral interventions, discipline, referrals to other agencies or resources, and/or other appropriate interventions.

The SST shall monitor the student's progress, evaluate the extent to which the recommended strategies have been implemented, and develop additional interventions as needed.

The SST is a regularly scheduled, structured meeting of general educators, supported by special education and other staff as appropriate. Their purpose is to provide an effective support system in general education that will generate effective interventions for students who are experiencing challenges in learning or behavior difficulties at school. The SST process is designed to meet the needs of all students and result in a team action plan to ensure student success.

The structure of the SST may be designed to fit the needs of individual school sites. Team membership varies according to the needs of the student, but should include the people that can best support the student and the classroom teacher. The majority of the team membership must be composed of general education teachers and should include the following team members: the student's classroom teachers (secondary), an upper grade teacher, and a lower grade teacher (elementary), an administrator, the parent, and the student. The SST should also serve as a peer support system, so the more teacher participation, the greater the benefits. Specialists should be included based on the potential needs of the student, the classroom teacher, and any others providing support to the student.

On June 30, 2005, the Employee Relations Department received the initial proposal from CSEA to bargain over Wages, Benefits, Association Rights, and Drug and Alcohol Use.

7.2 <u>Payment of SANDABS Membership Dues for 2005-2006</u> (Prepared by Superintendent)

San Bernardino County District Advocates for Better Schools (SANDABS) are "superintendents and trustees dedicated to the promotion and advancement of public education through legislation in the State of California." Section 35172 of the Education Code provides for the payment of membership dues from district funds.

A remittance in the amount of \$1,200.00 for 2005-2006 SANDABS membership dues is requested from our district.

 7.3 <u>Payment of San Bernardino County School Boards Association Membership Dues</u> for 2005-06 (Prepared by Superintendent)

In accordance with the bylaws of the San Bernardino County School Boards Association, Article IV, Section 2, each school district that elects to participate shall pay annual dues for membership in the Association. Dues shall be payable July 1, of each year and shall be delinquent October 31. In addition, Section 35172 of the Education Code provides for the payment of membership dues from district funds.

7.4 <u>2005-2006 District Consolidated Application (Part I)</u> (Prepared by Deputy Superintendent's Office)

The Deputy Superintendent's Office requests Board of Education approval to submit the District Consolidated Application for funding Categorical Aid Programs for 2005-2006. The purpose of Part I is to declare the intent of the District to apply for specified State and Federal categorical formula grant funds as well as collect specific data related to the district. The Federal programs are Title I, Part A (Low Income), Title II, Part A (Teacher Quality), Title II, Part D (Technology), Title III, Part A (LEP Students), Title IV, Part A Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities (SDFSC) and Title V, Part A (Innovative). The State programs are AB1113 School Safety Block Grant, Cal-SAFE, Economic Impact Aid, Peer Assistance Review, and Tobacco Use Prevention Education (TUPE).

The application is submitted in two parts. Part I contains the identification of programs in which the District intends to participate, school ranking data, District assurances, as well as 2004-2005 data on student expulsion and truancy information, Instructional Time and Staff Development Reform (ITSDR) staff participation numbers, and the NCLB Highly Qualified Teacher and Paraprofessional status for each school. Part II, which will be submitted in January, will contain District and school-level budget information.

Alessandro Elementary School wishes to hire The Ocean Adventure, through Brown and Company Photography, to present "The Australia Great White Shark Expedition" on June 27, 2005. The multi-image presentation focuses on the great white shark using specimens and models to help students understand sharks and how these predators live within their ocean environment. Students learn the differences between sharks and fish, how sharks' teeth grow, and many other facets of the life of a shark. The presentation includes audience participation, video presentation, and a question-and-answer session to build a depth of understanding for each student. The cost, not to exceed \$545.00, will be paid from Alessandro Elementary School Account No. 419.

7.7 <u>Payment for Services Rendered by Non-Classified Experts and Organizations</u> (Prepared by Business Services Division)

Schools and departments of the District employ persons outside of the classified service or organizations to provide expertise not available in the District for inservice training or consultant services.

The Environmental Safety Office/Risk Management wishes to hire Bill Rosenthal and Associates for an inservice on Hazardous Waste Operations and Emergency Response Training on September 14, 2005. The inservice meets the District's requirement in the training of proper procedures on hazardous waste disposal. Bill Rosenthal has been extensively involved in the diverse hazardous waste industry since 1979, and his waste management career includes working for Mc Donnell Douglas, Whittaker Corporation/Bermite Division and with Northrup Corporation/B-2 Division, the Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County, and Theo-Teller-Busch.
