4.1 <u>Annual Report on Bond Indebtedness---Certificates of Participation (COP)</u> (Prepared by Business Services Division)

To the Officers of San Bernardino Schools Financing Corporation and the Governing Board of San Bernardino City Unified School District

# 1994 COP

On February 8, 1994, the San Bernardino Schools Financing Corporation issued \$12,425,000.00 in certificates of participation for the purpose of financing the construction of the Nutrition Center facility and the rehabilitation of Pacific High School. These COPs refunded \$11,920,000.00 aggregate principal amount of the original 1990 bond issue. In September 2003, the Corporation issued the 2003 COP for the School Facility Bridge Funding Program (Bridge 2) in the amount of \$57,000,000. Proceeds from the issuance were used to prepay the remaining balance owed of the 1994 COP. As a result of the prepayment, there is no outstanding debt obligation for the 1994 COP.

## 2001 COP

On October 1, 2001, the San Bernardino Schools Financing Corporation issued \$29,000,000.00 in certificates of participation (Bridge 1), for the design, acquisition, and construction of up to 63 school facilities. In September 2003, the Corporation issued the 2003 COP for the School Facility Bridge Funding Program (Bridge 2) in the amount of \$57,000,000.00. Proceeds from the issuance were used to prepay the remaining balance owed of the 2001 COP. As a result of the prepayment, there is no outstanding debt obligation for the 2001 COP.

# 2003 COP

In September 2003, the San Bernardino Schools Financing Corporation issued \$57,000,000.00 in certificates of participation for the School Facility Bridge Funding Program (Bridge 2) to finance the acquisition, installation, and improvement of certain school facilities, as well as to provide funds for the prepayment of the 1994 and 2001 COPS. On September 29, 2004, the District issued the 2004 General Obligation Bonds Series A at an aggregate amount of \$45,972,567.99 to prepay the remaining balance

owed of the 2003 COP. As a result of the prepayment, there is no outstanding debt obligation for the 2003 COP.

4.1 Public Hearing and Resolution of the Board of Education of the San Bernardino
City Unified School District Certifying the Mitigated Negative Declaration for the
Proposed Acquisition, Construction, and Operation of the Monterey II Elementary
School #48; and Adopting Written Findings Pursuant to the California
Environmental Quality Act (CEQA); Approving the Project; and Delegating
Authority to Staff to Execute CEQA Documents
(Prepared by Business Services Division)

State regulations require school districts to conduct public hearings to review the findings of Mitigated Negative Declarations with mitigation measures. This is part of the process for a school district to acquire a new school site, approve the project, and proceed with construction. The approval of the Mitigated Negative Declaration for the project will be filed with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, County of San Bernardino, and the State Clearinghouse.

It is appropriate at this time to conduct a public hearing.

## **Conduct Public Hearing:**

It is recommended that the following resolution be adopted:

PUBLIC HEARING AND RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE SAN BERNARDINO CITY UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT APPROVING AN INITIAL STUDY/MITIGATED NEGATIVE DECLARATION AND MITIGATION MONITORING AND REPORTING PROGRAM FOR THE PROPOSED ACQUISITION, CONSTRUCTION AND OPERATION OF MONTEREY II ELEMENTARY SCHOOL #48

WHEREAS, the San Bernardino City Unified School District (the "District") by and through its Governing Board ("Board") has identified the need to acquire a school site on which to construct and operate a new elementary school; and

WHEREAS, the District has identified certain real property located generally on the northeast corner of 9th Street and Tippecanoe Avenue in the City of San Bernardino to acquire so as to construct the proposed K-6 school ("the proposed school site"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the California Education Code, construction of the proposed K-6 school is subject to obtaining approval of the proposed school site by the California Department of Education ("CDE"); and

WHEREAS, prior to obtaining CDE approval and thereafter acquiring the proposed school site, the District must subject the proposed school site to certain inspections and analyses, including environmental analyses; and obtain the approval of the California Department of Toxic Substances Control ("DTSC"); and

WHEREAS, District staff has completed or caused the completion of all inspections and analyses required for the acquisition of the proposed school site, including, without limitation, the preparation of (i) an Initial Study and Mitigated Negative Declaration ("Mitigated Negative Declaration") in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act, Public Resources Code sections 21000 *et seq.* ("CEQA") and its implementing regulations contained in Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations, sections 15000 *et seq.* (the "CEQA Guidelines"); (ii) a final draft Preliminary Endangerment Assessment ("Final Draft PEA") in accordance with Education Code sections 17210 *et seq.*; and (iii) all other analyses and investigations required for approval by the CDE and DTSC; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Government Code Section 65402 the District notified the local planning commission and other local agencies of its intent to acquire such real property; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to CEQA Section 21092.6, the District has consulted the lists compiled pursuant to Government Code Section 65962.5 and determined that the proposed school site is not located on a site which is included in any such list; and

WHEREAS, the District has notified in writing and consulted with the agencies specified in CEQA section 21151.8(a)(2) of its intent to acquire the proposed school site the Mitigated Negative Declaration includes all information needed to make the determinations required by

CEQA Section 21151.8(a)(1), and the District is prepared to make the findings required in CEQA Section 21151.8(a)(3); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to CEQA Section 21151.8(a) (1) the mitigated negative declaration includes information needed to determine if the proposed school site constitutes property defined in CEQA Section 21151.8(a)(1) (A)-(D); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Education Code Section 17215, the California Department of Transportation, Division of Aeronautics ("CDT") has reviewed and analyzed the proposed school site; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to CEQA Section 21151.8(a)(2) the District has consulted with the South Coast Air Quality Management District ("SCAQMD") that has identified no facilities located within one-fourth mile of the proposed school site have been permitted to operate by SCAQMD and which may be reasonably anticipated to emit hazardous air emissions, or handle hazardous materials as set forth in Education Code section 17213(b); and

WHEREAS, DTSC approved the Draft PEA for the Project, concluding that no further environmental investigation or cleanup is required for the proposed school site; and

WHEREAS, the District published and posted notice pursuant to statute and made the Mitigated Negative Declaration available to the public and to all interested agencies for review and comment from November 3, 2005, to December 2, 2005; and

WHEREAS, the Board has considered all comments and correspondence, if any, received in response to the Mitigated Negative Declaration; and

WHEREAS, the Board held a public hearing on December 6, 2005, to receive additional public testimony on the proposed school site, and to consider the Mitigated Negative Declaration; and

WHEREAS, the findings and conclusions made by the Board pursuant to this Resolution are based upon all of the oral and written evidence presented to it and taken as a whole, and not based solely on the information provided in this Resolution; and

WHEREAS, prior to taking action, the Board has heard, been presented with, reviewed, and considered all of the information and data in the administrative record, including the Mitigated Negative Declaration, and all oral and written evidence presented to it;

NOW THEREFORE, the Governing Board of the San Bernardino City Unified School District hereby finds, determines, and resolves, based on substantial evidence in the record, as follows:

1. The Mitigated Negative Declaration reflects the independent judgment and analysis of the District.

- 2. There is no evidence that the Project will have the potential to cause an adverse effect on wildlife resources or the habitat on which such wildlife depends, and the District finds, on the basis of the substantial evidence in the record, that the presumption of adverse effect set forth in 14 Cal. Code of Regs. § 753.5(d) does not apply.
- 3. There is no substantial evidence in light of the whole record that the Project, as revised by the standards, conditions, and mitigation measures enumerated in the Mitigated Negative Declaration which are incorporated into this Resolution, would have a significant effect on the environment.
- 4. The proposed school site does not constitute an area described in CEQA Section 21151.8(a)(1)(A) through (D); the District has consulted with the administering agency in which the proposed school site is located and with the air quality management district having jurisdiction in the area as required by CEQA Section 21151.8(a)(2), and such consultation did not identify any of the types of facilities referenced in CEQA Section 21151.8(a)(2).
- 5. Pursuant to Section 15074 of the CEQA Guidelines, the Project, as revised by the mitigation measures enumerated in the Mitigated Negative Declaration, will not result in a safety hazard or noise problem for persons using the facility.
- 6. The Mitigated Negative Declaration, Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program for this Project are hereby approved and adopted and staff is directed to:
  - a. Prepare and file a Certificate of Fee Exemption with the California Department of Fish and Game via the San Bernardino County Clerk of the Board of Supervisors pursuant to 14 California Code of Regulations section 753.5.
  - b. Prepare and file a Notice of Determination with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of the County of San Bernardino and the Office of Planning and Research within five days of the notice of approval pursuant to Section 15075 of the CEQA Guidelines.
  - c. Keep a copy of the Mitigated Negative Declaration and Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program, and all documents referenced therein at the District offices and available for public review. The custodian of said documents shall be:

5.1 <u>Update on California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE)</u> (Prepared by Educational Services Division)

Dr. Dayton Gilleland, Assistant Superintendent, Educational Services Division, will present an update on the California High School Exit Exam and efforts to support the class of 2006.

5.2 <u>School Assistance and Intervention Team (SAIT) Reports</u> (Prepared by Deputy Superintendent's Office)

Schools participating in the II/USP Program must make positive growth on the Schoolwide Academic Performance Index (API) in either of the two funded implementation years and each year thereafter until the school exits the program, or the school is deemed state-monitored. Education Code sections 52055.5 and 52055.51 require the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, with the approval of the State Board of Education, to impose various sanctions on state-monitored schools. One option is to require the district to enter into a contract with a School Assistance and Intervention Team (SAIT).

The purpose of a SAIT is to investigate and provide intensive support and monitoring to assist state-monitoring in improving student learning.

Three schools in the San Bernardino City Unified School District (Arrowhead, Riley and Parkside) have been identified for SAIT intervention and monitoring. The Principal's Exchange is the state-approved SAIT provider that has been working with these schools.

A brief report on the SAIT findings and recommended corrective actions will be presented by the Principal's Exchange Program Director, Dr. Robin Avelar La Salle, and the three school principals: Joan West, Arrowhead; Sane Mataitusi, Riley; and Tracy Smith, Parkside.

# 6.0 Administrative Reports

6.1 <u>First Period Interim Financial Report as of October 31, 2005</u> (Prepared by Business Services Division)

The Education Code, as updated by AB1200 and AB2756, requires school districts to report on their financial condition at the time of budget adoption and after closing the books with the unaudited actuals. Two interim reports are also required during the fiscal year: for the periods from July 1, through October 31 (first period), and from July 1, through January 31 (second period).

A resolution is contained in the action item section of the agenda regarding the certification by the Board of Education as to the District's ability to meet its financial obligations for the current and the subsequent two years.

- 6.2 <u>Proposed Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students Targeted Instructional Improvement Policy (First Reading)</u>
  (Prepared by Deputy Superintendent's Office
- I. <u>SOCIO-ECONOMICALLY DISADVANTAGED STUDENTS TARGETED</u> INSTRUCTIONAL IMPROVEMENT POLICY

In order to meet the academic needs of low-income students who are identified by their schools as not meeting, or most at risk of not meeting the State's challenging student academic achievement standards, the San Bernardino City Unified School District will provide targeted services designed to increase the number of Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students who meet the State's proficient and advanced levels of student academic achievement.

To that end, in alignment with California's No Child Left Behind (NCLB) performance goals, the District's Local Educational Agency Plan, and the Blueprint for Success, the overarching performance goal of the Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students -Targeted Instructional Policy is to ensure that Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students meet high standards, at a minimum attaining proficiency or better in reading and mathematics.

#### Measurable Outcomes

- 1. Increase the number of Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students who attain proficiency or better in reading and mathematics to the extent that the Socio-Economically Disadvantaged subgroup makes adequate yearly progress each year.
- 2. Build the capacity of teaching, administrative, and support staff to adequately meet the needs of Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students through targeted professional development.
- 3. Increase the high school graduation rates of Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students.
- 4. Increase the four-year college-going rates of Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students.

## Specific Actions in Pursuit of:

#### OUTCOME 1:

#### **Standards-Based Interventions**

Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students will be provided opportunities for extended learning time such as before and after-school tutoring, summer and off-track tutoring, Homework Centers, and math and reading support programs, delivered as elective courses.

## Research-Based Supplementary Materials and Supports

Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students will be provided with ample access to technology/media applications, internet research, a wide variety of library books and resources, and supplemental materials and curricula in both classroom and library settings in order to supplement the limited resources otherwise available to them.

## Parent Involvement

Parents of Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students will be engaged as full partners in the educational process in order to share responsibility for high academic achievement per the District's Parent Involvement Policy. The parent involvement effort will include opportunities for instruction in family literacy and parenting skills such as: Parent Institute, Family Reading, Math, Science, and Social Studies Nights, and "Make and Take" activities for parents.

#### OUTCOME 2:

# Research-Based Professional Development

Professional development for principals, teachers and staff will be used as part of a broader strategy to eliminate the achievement gap that separates low-income students from other student subgroups and will feature applications that have a measurable, positive impact on the academic performance of Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students. Professional development under this section will focus on the following issues: using assessment to inform instruction, appropriately differentiating curriculum, and providing universal access for Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students. Ongoing follow-up coaching will ensure successful transfer between professional development theory and classroom instructional practice.

# <u>Culturally Appropriate Professional Development</u>

Administrators, teachers, and support staff will be trained to deliver and implement programs that support students physically, socially, emotionally, intellectually, and psychologically in environments conducive to learning. These will include programs and strategies designed to address barriers to learning such as attendance and behavior.

#### OUTCOMES 3 and 4:

# **Smaller Learning Communities**

Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students at the secondary level will be encouraged to participate in smaller learning communities, Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID), International Baccalaureate (IB), Advanced Placement Courses, Cadet Corps, Peer Leadership/Mentorship, and other programs that have been proven over time to build positive peer-to-peer and student/adult relationships, increase college-going behaviors, provide support structures for students, and strengthen connectedness between students and the school community.

## Culturally Appropriate Student Support Services

Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students will access a comprehensive array of school-linked services and alternative programs to support students physically, socially, emotionally, intellectually, and psychologically in environments conducive to learning. These will include programs and strategies designed to address student barriers to learning such as attendance and behavior.

# **Educational and Career Planning**

Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students will access a variety of career awareness and planning activities such as career speakers, Career Centers, and Four-Year Educational planning.

Said services will be delivered with sensitivity to the fact that some Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students tend to have more limited knowledge of career and educational options than their middle class peers due to the effects of poverty. Therefore, every effort will be made throughout the system to ensure that Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students are exposed to a wide range of career and educational choices.

# **Funding**

Existing funds, Title I, Title II, TIIG, II/USP, High Priority Schools, and Comprehensive School Reform grants and funds are all suitable sources of revenue to support the achievement of Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students. Sites with multiple funding streams designated to improve instruction and services for Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students will coordinate and integrate services through the school's Single Plan for Student Achievement, Instructional Improvement Plan.

## **Evaluation and Accountability**

Process to monitor, evaluate, and determine program effectiveness and student achievement will accompany all targeted instructional approaches and programs.

Student academic growth will be measured by the percentage of students in the Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Student subgroup who are above the proficient level in reading and mathematics on the State's yearly criterion-referenced assessment.

Professional development will be measured by the percentage of teachers, administrators, and paraprofessionals receiving high-quality professional development and degree and depth of classroom implementation. Degree and depth of implementation will be monitored by administrative walk-through observations, lesson plan observations, and student performance data analysis.

Student graduation rate increases will be measured by the percentage of students who graduate from high school with a regular diploma disaggregated by status as Socio-Economically Disadvantaged.

Four-year college-going rates will be measured by the percentage of students who enroll in four-year colleges and universities disaggregated by status as Socio-Economically Disadvantaged.

# **District Accountability**

The District remains committed to the principles of No Child Left Behind, California's five Performance Goals as stated in the Local Education Agency Plan and the tenants of the District's Blueprint for Success.

Each of these measures requires a system of continual evaluation and program modification to establish improvements in instruction, professional development, counseling and prevention programs as a means of achieving specific academic and support services for Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students.

Therefore, stakeholders will analyze relevant data, current practices, professional development, staffing, and parental involvement, establish performance targets, review available resources, identify specific plans for improvement, and evaluate the effectiveness of planned activities related to the performance of Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students on an annual basis.

6.3 <u>Proposed Amendment to the High School Graduation Ceremonies Policy (First Reading)</u>
(Prepared by Educational Services Division)

# <u>HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATIO</u>N CEREMONIES

It is the intent of the Board of Education that the students in the District who have satisfactorily completed the requirements of the District and the State of California for graduation from high school be honored at a suitable ceremony. Beginning with the graduating class of 2006 and the implementation of the California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE) requirement, it is the intent of the Board of Education that students who fulfill all course credit requirements, but do not pass the CAHSEE, be included in the graduation ceremony.

It is the desire of the Board that such ceremonies be conducted in an atmosphere that is in keeping with the importance of the occasion. It is expected that the audience and graduates will remain seated during the ceremonies, that they will give proper attention to the speakers and other participants during the ceremonies, and that they will refrain from disruptive behavior that will detract from the recognition that each graduate deserves as he/she is individually honored. It is to these ends that this policy is adopted.

- 1. Appropriate graduation ceremonies will be provided to honor graduating seniors at each District senior high school. As a part of the ceremonies, each graduating senior, who has passed the CAHSEE by the date of graduation, will be recognized by having his/her name read and each will be presented a District diploma/diploma cover.
- 2. In that students may have passed the CAHSEE at the time of the most recent administration of the test prior to graduation and not received official verification of passing scores in time for graduation, students that have otherwise fulfilled all other graduation requirements, shall be entitled to receive a "Certificate of Graduation" in lieu of a diploma, and shall be allowed to participate in the graduation exercises in the same manner as diploma recipients.
- 2. In addition to graduating seniors, students who have not met the requirements for graduation but who have earned a State Certificate by passing the California High School

Proficiency Examination shall be allowed to participate in the graduation exercises in the same manner as the graduates. Such students, however, will not have their names listed on the program with the graduates but will be listed separately under "California High School Proficiency Examination Certificates" (Board action May 20, 1976).

- 3. The graduation ceremonies of the comprehensive high schools will begin at 6:00 pm on the last day that students are required to attend school in June.
- 4. A specific number of tickets, suitable to the seating capacity of the facility being used for the graduation ceremonies, will be issued by each comprehensive high school to each of its graduating seniors. Each school will reserve some tickets to be issued to families with special needs. No person will be admitted to the ceremonies without a ticket.
- 5. The facilities that will be used for graduation ceremonies at each site will be decided by the principal. The use of off-campus facilities for graduation exercises must be approved by the Superintendent.
- 6. The District and the individual high schools will work closely with the San Bernardino City Police and the District Police to clarify roles, assignments, and expectations in enforcing the laws and District policy regarding graduation ceremonies.
- 7. In order to participate in the graduation ceremonies, each graduating senior and his/her parent or guardian must sign a contract agreeing to abide by the specified code of dress and behavior for the ceremony.
- 8. A brochure outlining appropriate audience behavior will be distributed with each program at the graduation ceremony. At the beginning of the ceremonies an announcement will be made to the audience directing its attention to the guidelines and briefly outlining the most important points.
- 9. Before being admitted to the ceremonies, each graduating senior will be required to open his/her gown for a verification of appropriate dress and a visual check for outlawed items.
- 10. Representatives from each of the high schools will work together to share ideas and to develop procedures to work effectively with students and parents to best implement this policy.
- 11. School principals, or their designees, may remove or cause to be removed from the ceremonies and/or premises students or others who are in violation of an appropriate law or in violation of a rule relating to graduation exercises. Graduating seniors so removed may be required to pick up their diplomas at a later date than other graduates and they may be required to be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

- 12. The school principal has the right and the power to suspend the graduation ceremonies immediately prior to their beginning or during the ceremonies if, in his/her judgment, allowing of the ceremonies to continue would be dangerous or would not be in the best interest of the graduates, the school, or the District.
- 13. The above policies are intended to apply to the three <u>five</u> comprehensive high schools. The Adult School, <u>Middle College High School</u>, San Andreas High School and Sierra High School, due to the specialized nature and small sizes of their graduating classes, will develop their own procedures in accordance with their individual needs.

ONE: The name of this corporation is SAN BERNARDINO CITY SCHOOLS EDUCATION FOUNDATION.

TWO: This corporation is a nonprofit public benefit corporation and is not organized for the private gain of any person. It is organized under the Nonprofit Public Benefit Corporation Law for public and charitable purposes.

THREE: The specific purpose of this corporation shall be for charitable and educational purposes by providing further educational and athletic opportunities for the students of San Bernardino City Unified School District.

FOUR: This corporation is organized for public and charitable purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

FIVE: Except as provided in Section 501(h) of the Internal Revenue Code, the Corporation shall not:

i. Devote more than an insubstantial part of its activities to attempting to influence legislation by propaganda or otherwise. "Attempting to influence legislation" includes:

- (1) Contacting, or urging the public to contact, members of a legislative body for the purpose of proposing, supporting, or opposing legislation; or
- (2) Advocating the adoption or rejection of legislation, including action by Congress, any State legislature, any local council, or the public by referendum, initiative, constitutional amendment, or similar procedure.
- ii. Directly or indirectly participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of oral or written statements), any political campaign on behalf of or in opposition to any candidate for public office. "Candidate for public office" includes any individual who offers himself or herself, or is proposed by others, as a contestant for an elective public office, whether such office is national, state, or local.
- SIX: The name and address in the State of California of this corporation's initial agent for service of process is Yuri A. Calderon, 701 "B" Street, Suite 1790, San Diego, California 92101.
- SEVEN: The property of this corporation is irrevocably dedicated to charitable purposes, and no part of the net income or assets of this corporation shall ever inure to the benefit of any director, officer, or member thereof or to the benefit of any private individual.
- EIGHT: Upon dissolution or winding up of the corporation, its assets remaining after payment of, or provision for payment, of all debts and liabilities of this corporation, shall be distributed to a nonprofit fund, foundation, or corporation which is organized and operated exclusively for charitable and educational purposes and which has established its tax exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

# 10.3 <u>STAR at Anderson Community Day School</u> (Prepared by Student Services Division)

STAR at Anderson, the elementary community day school for Grades two through six, has successfully functioned on the Anderson School campus for the past eight years. Education Code section 48661 allows the placement of an elementary community day school on a district site if the governing board certifies each year by a two-thirds vote of its membership that satisfactory alternative facilities are not available for a community day school.

The Student Services Division has searched, and continues to search, both available District-owned and other locations, and has found no satisfactory site to house the entire elementary community day school. The need to expand the community day school program has led to the

movement of two upper-grade classrooms to the CID building next door to Anderson School. No more than two adequate classrooms were available at CID, so the lower-grade classroom remains on the Anderson School campus.

Therefore, it is recommended that the following resolution be adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Education certifies that satisfactory alternative facilities are not available for the District's elementary community day school and approves the Anderson School site to serve students in Grades two and three for the 2005-2006 school year.

This theatrical presentation, of multicultural music, blends traditional African percussion and vocals with contemporary sounds, exploring the cultural role of ethnic instruments, dance, and song in the history and language of Africa. Maya Soleil is a group featuring Moye Kashimbi from Zambia and Lora Chiorah-Dye from Zimbabwe, who sing in several native languages of southern Africa, and dance in traditional and modern styles. San Andreas High School wishes to hire Jason Fowler, through UC Regents, to present "Writing Across the Curriculum" on August 25 and 26, 2005. This presentation demonstrates how to use writing in all subjects, help students improve poor writing skills, and gives teachers a chance to practice some of the recommended exercises. Mr. Fowler is a professional fellow and Leadership Committee member of the Inland Area Writing Project, based at the University of California at Riverside, and a teacher, Bridge Colloquium Series Head Teacher, Staff Development Coordinator and Literacy Leader at Nuview/RCC Moreno Valley Early College High School in Nuevo, California. The cost, not to exceed \$1,500.00, will be paid from San Andreas Account No. 502.

# 10.8 <u>Sale of Used District Computer Equipment and Peripherals</u> (Prepared by Business Services Division)

The Purchasing Department requests Board of Education approval to sell surplus obsolete computer equipment and peripherals, including but not limited to, CPUs, monitors, keyboards, mice, printers, servers and storage devices, in accordance with Education Code Section 17545. Most of the computers and printers are not complete working systems.

These computers and peripherals are no longer of use to the District and not suitable for donation, due to their age and lack of software support. During the recycling process, all computer equipment will be destroyed.

Bid 09-05 was awarded by the Board of Education on May 17, 2005, to E-Recycling of California, Paramount, CA, as the highest responsible bidder for the purchase of used District computer equipment and peripherals for recycling.

It is recommended that the following resolution be adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED that the Board awarded Bid 09-05 to E-Recycling of California, Paramount, CA, on May 17, 2005, to include the purchase of additional surplus computer equipment and peripherals for recycling from the District for a one-year term. During the one-year awarded term, the District will present new Board-approved computer and peripheral surplus lists to the awarded bidder with option to buy using Attachment B, Price List, which states the District shall receive \$3.00 per monitor, \$1.25 per CPU, \$3.00 per TV, \$1.25 per printer, \$3.00 per server, \$1.50 per storage device, and \$.05 per keyboard or mouse. All prices include associated cables. Proceeds from the sale shall be deposited into the Unrestricted General Fund.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that in accordance with California Education Code Section 17545, the Board of Education declares the following items as surplus to District needs and are unsatisfactory or no longer suitable for school use: List of Salvage Computer Equipment and Peripherals dated November 21, 2005.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Education authorizes Mohammad Z. Islam, Assistant Superintendent, Business and Finance, to sign said agreement.

# 10.9 <u>Sale of Used District Salvage Equipment</u> (Prepared by Business Services Division)

The Purchasing Department requests Board of Education approval to enter into a contract for auction services to sell used District salvage equipment. In accordance with California Education Code Section 17545, the sale of salvage equipment is permitted to take place when it is determined that items are unsatisfactory or no longer suitable for school use. The District may choose to conduct a sale of such property by contracting with a private auction firm.

A request for proposal for auction services was performed by the Purchasing Department during the week of November 8, 2004. The results indicated that contracting with The Liquidation Company, Fontana, CA, to provide auction services on behalf of the District would provide the optimum returns even after fees were taken out. The auction company's fee is 35 percent of the gross sales for auctions conducted at their facility in Fontana, including the services of a licensed auctioneer, marketing, newspaper advertisements, labor for auction set up, cashier services, bookkeeping, labor for assisting successful buyers in removing their purchases, and assistance with Department of Motor Vehicles paperwork.

Notices of the sale will be posted by the District in accordance with the requirements of California Education Code Section 17545.

It is recommended that the following resolution be adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED that in accordance with California Education Code Section 17545, the Board of Education declares the following items as surplus to District needs and unsatisfactory or no longer suitable for school use: List of District Salvage Equipment dated November 21, 2005, and the District shall give notice of the sale.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that the District enters into an agreement with The Liquidation Company, Fontana, CA, to provide auction services for the sale of District surplus as stated above. Payment to be made to The Liquidation Company, Fontana, CA, in the amount of 35 percent of the total gross sales, less sales tax, for auctions conducted at The Liquidation Company's Fontana facility. Proceeds from the auction shall be deposited into the Unrestricted General Fund.

# 11.1 <u>First Period Interim Financial Report as of October 31, 2005</u> (Prepared by Business Services Division)

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the President of the Board of Education be authorized to certify on behalf of the Board, that the San Bernardino City Unified School District is able to meet its ongoing financial obligations for the current and subsequent two fiscal years.

11.2 Payment Authorization to San Gorgonio High School Associated Student Body
Fund
(Prepared by Business Services Division)

Education Code section 48930 gives the governing board of school districts the authority to control and regulate all the activities of the student body funds under their jurisdiction. The governing board from time to time may exercise its authority under this law to avert a deficit in the fund. This includes but not limited to, authorizing payments of outstanding obligation to vendors or loaning the student body fund the amount critical in meeting the obligation. The latter will normally include repayment provisions in the agreement.

The Board of Education of the San Bernardino City Unified School District exercises its authority under EC 48930 to assist the student body fund at San Gorgonio High School to meet the payment of outstanding liability to student clubs in the sum of \$31,527.86. The ending fund balance has been in a deficit for the past three school years and is a matter of concern and will be an audit exception. A one-time loan from General Fund's unrestricted ending fund balance will be made to the San Gorgonio High School ASB fund. As a condition of the loan, the Board approves a repayment plan in the amount of \$15,763.93 per year for two years from the San Gorgonio High School ASB fund to the General Fund, payable by June 30 of each fiscal year beginning in 2005-06 through 2006-07. San Gorgonio High School has submitted a corrective plan that provided the necessary funds for repayment of this loan.

It is recommended that the following resolution be approved:

BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Education approves exercising its authority under EC 48930 to assist the student body fund at San Gorgonio High School to meet the payment of outstanding liability to student groups in the sum of \$31,527.86.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that the Board of Education approves the payment of \$31,527.86 as a one-time event only with no obligations for repayment by the ASB of San Gorgonio High School. This action can not be considered precedent setting or further obligates the District to take similar in the future.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Education authorizes Mohammad Z. Islam, Assistant Superintendent, Business and Finance, to sign the loan agreement on behalf of the Board.

<u>Improvement Policy (First Reading)</u>
