 - 2.1 <u>In Recognition of Arts Education Month</u> (Prepared by the Communications Office)
- **WHEREAS** arts education, which includes dance, music, theater, and the visual arts, is a vital part of basic education providing a balanced education for all students; and
- WHEREAS the Board of Education of the San Bernardino City Unified School District joins the State of California in recognizing arts education as an essential and integral part of basic education for all students, kindergarten through grade 12; and
- WHEREAS instruction in the basic skills and knowledge of dance, music, theater, and the visual arts provides development of critical and creative thinking and perceptual abilities that extend to all careers and areas of life; and
- **WHEREAS** experience in the arts develops insights and abilities central to the experiences of life and are collectively one of the most important repositories of culture; and
- where the Board of Education of the San Bernardino City Unified School District concurs with the Arts Education Policy of the California Board of Education, which states that each student should receive a high quality, comprehensive arts education program;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Education of the San Bernardino City Unified School District joins the Joint Rules Committee of the California Senate and Assembly in declaring March 2006 Arts Education Month and encourages all schools in the District to celebrate the arts with meaningful student activities and programs that demonstrate learning and understanding of the visual and performing arts.

- 2.2 <u>In Recognition of Week of the School Administrator</u> (Prepared by the Communications Office)
- **WHEREAS** school administrators are passionate, lifelong learners who believe in the value of quality public education; and
- WHEREAS the title "school administrator" is a broad term used to define many education leadership posts. Superintendents, assistant superintendents, principals, assistant principals, special education and adult education leaders, school business officials, classified educational leaders, and other school district employees are considered administrators; and
- WHEREAS providing quality service for student success is paramount for the profession; and
- WHEREAS most school administrators began their careers as teachers. The average administrator has served in public education for more than a decade. Most of California's superintendents have served in education for more than 20 years. Such experience is beneficial in their work to effectively and efficiently lead public education and improve student achievement; and
- where school leaders depend on a network of support from school communities—fellow administrators, teachers, parents, students, businesses, community members, board trustees, colleges and universities, community and faith-based organizations, elected officials and district and county staff and resources—to promote ongoing student achievement and school success; and
- **WHEREAS** research shows that great schools are led by great principals, and great districts are led by great superintendents. These site leaders are supported by extensive administrative networks throughout the state; and
- **WHEREAS** the State of California has declared the week of March 6-12, 2006, as the "Week of the School Administrator" in Education Code 44015.1; and
- **WHEREAS** the future of California's public education system depends upon the quality of its leadership;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Education of the San Bernardino City Unified School District that all school leaders be commended for the contributions they make to successful student achievement

2.3 <u>Adult Education Week</u> (Prepared by Superintendent)

- WHEREAS the first recorded adult school was sponsored by the San Francisco Board of Education in 1856 with evening classes taught in the basement of St. Mary's Cathedral; and
- WHEREAS community demand for adult education resulted in dramatic growth during the early years of the twentieth century; and
- WHEREAS during the 1920's adult education programs progressed from serving immigrants to meeting the educational needs of all adults; and
- WHEREAS during World War II, from 1940 1945, nearly one million California workers were trained in adult education classes related to civilian defense and military support programs; and
- WHEREAS the 1960's brought federal support to remedy inequities of the educationally disadvantaged with adult basic education and vocational education; and
- WHEREAS San Bernardino Adult School first opened its doors in April 1920, to serve the local community; and
- WHEREAS San Bernardino Adult School provides instruction to over 12,000 adults every year in response to the many different and important educational needs in the community with opportunities in English-as-a-Second Language and citizenship, adult literacy and high school diploma, parenting, career technical education and apprenticeships, and classes for adults with disabilities and older adults; and
- WHEREAS San Bernardino Adult School provides educational opportunities that enable students to achieve their educational goals and bridge to successful roles as productive workers, participating family members, responsible community members, and functional lifelong learners.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Education does hereby proclaim that Adult Education Week, March 12 - 18, 2006, will celebrate the Sesquicentennial Anniversary of Adult Education in California with its theme California Adult Education: Bridges to Success for 150 Years and salutes the administration, teachers, and students of the San Bernardino Adult School and honor their efforts and accomplishments on this day.

4.1 Review and Consider Adoption of a Resolution Approving the San Bernardino
City Unified School District's School Facilities Needs Analysis, Adopting
Alternative School Fees (Level 2) in Compliance with Government Code Sections
65995.5, 65995.6 and 65995.7, Adopting Responses to Public Comments
Received and Making Related Findings and Determinations
(Prepared by Facilities/Operations Division)

With the adoption of SB 50 and Proposition 1A in 1998, school districts that meet certain requirements have the option of adopting alternative school fees ("Alternative School Fees"), also known as Level 2 Fees and Level 3 Fees, in accordance with Government Code Sections 65995.5, 65995.6 and 65995.7. In general, Alternative School Fees, which are calculated for an individual school district, apply solely to residential construction within that school district and are in excess of the Level 1 Fee authorized by the State Allocation Board ("SAB"). Alternative School Fees are calculated per square foot of assessable space ("Assessable Space") of new residential construction in the District as defined in Government Code Section 65995(b)(1), and chargeable covered and enclosed space for all categories of new commercial/industrial construction in the District ("Commercial/Industrial Fees") as defined in Government Code Section 65995(b)(2). The Level 2 Fee, which amount is intended to represent fifty percent (50%) of a school district's school facility costs, applies when the SAB is apportioning State Funding to school districts in California. The Level 3 Fee, on the other hand, is intended to represent one hundred percent (100%) of a school district's school facility costs, but has been suspended. Both Level 2 and 3 Fees are in excess of Level 1 Fees as established by the SAB and adjusted annually.

In order to impose Alternative School Fees on new residential construction within the District, the District must prepare and adopt a School Facilities Needs Analysis ("SFNA") as required by statute. Therefore, pursuant to Government Code Section 65995.5(b), the District has caused David Taussig & Associates to prepare a 2006 SFNA, ("2006 SFNA") on behalf of the San Bernardino City Unified School District ("District"), and prepare such a report as of February 2006, for consideration of adoption by the Board of Education ("Board") on March 7, 2006.

In compliance with Government Code Section 65995.6(a), the 2006 SFNA includes projections of the number of unhoused elementary, middle, and high school pupils generated by various types of new residential units in each category of pupils enrolled in the District. The projection

of unhoused pupils is based on the historical generation rates of new residential units constructed during the previous five years that are of a similar type of unit to those anticipated to be constructed either in the District or the city or county in which the District is located, and relevant planning agency information, such as multi-phased development projects, that may modify the historical figures. In accordance with Government Code Section 65995.6, the 2006 SFNA also contains a calculation of existing school building capacity, calculated pursuant to Education Code Section 17071.10. The existing school building capacity has been recalculated pursuant to Government Code Section 65995.6(a).

Pursuant to the 2006 SFNA, the Level 2 Fee amount has been calculated as \$5.24 per square foot of assessable space for new residential construction within the District's boundaries. The Level 3 Fee amount has been calculated as \$10.47 per square foot of assessable space for new residential construction; however, as noted above, the Level 3 Fee has been suspended as set forth in Government Code Section 65995.7(a)(2).

The 2006 SFNA must be adopted by resolution at a public hearing conducted by the Board of the District. The 2006 SFNA has been on file and available for public review at the District's offices for a period of not less than thirty (30) days prior to the public hearing of the Board. Pursuant to Government Code Section 65352.2(c), prior to the completion of the 2006 SFNA, the Board caused notice and any relevant and available information relating to the potential expansion of existing school sites or the necessity to acquire additional school sites, including a notice of the preparation of the 2006 SFNA and offer to meet to discuss this information, to the planning commission(s) or agency(ies) of the cities and counties with land use jurisdiction within the District. In addition, the 2006 SFNA was provided to the local agencies responsible for land use planning within the District for review and comments during the thirty (30) day public review period. Notice of the time and place of the public hearing of the Board, including the location and procedure for viewing a copy of the 2006 SFNA was also published in at least one newspaper of general circulation within the jurisdiction of the District not less than thirty (30) days prior to the public hearing and a copy of the 2006 SFNA was mailed not less than thirty (30) days prior to the public hearing to any person who made a written request therefor forty-five (45) days prior to the public hearing.

It is appropriate at this time to hold a public hearing.

Conduct public hearing.

Subject to the outcome of the public hearing, staff recommends that the following resolution be adopted by the Board.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE SAN BERNARDINO CITY UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT APPROVING A SCHOOL FACILITIES NEEDS ANALYSIS, ADOPTING ALTERNATIVE SCHOOL FACILITY FEES IN COMPLIANCE WITH GOVERNMENT CODE SECTIONS 65995.5, 65995.6 AND 65995.7, ADOPTING RESPONSES TO PUBLIC COMMENTS RECEIVED AND MAKING RELATED FINDINGS AND DETERMINATIONS

WHEREAS, the Board of Education ("Board") of the San Bernardino City Unified School District ("District") provides for the educational needs for Grades K-12 students within the City of San Bernardino, the City of Highland, and the City of Colton ("City" or collectively "Cities") and the unincorporated areas of San Bernardino County ("County"); and

WHEREAS, the Board has previously adopted and the District has imposed statutory school facility fees ("Statutory School Facility Fees" or "Level I Fees") pursuant to Education Code Section 17620 and Government Code Section 65995(b)(1) and (b)(2), and alternative school fee amounts pursuant to Government Code Sections 65995.5 ("Level 2 Fees") and 65995.7 ("Level 3 Fees") or (collectively, "Alternative School Facility Fees" or "ASFF"), but desires to update its ASFF based upon a current school facilities needs analysis ("2006 SFNA") prepared by David Taussig and Associates in accordance with applicable law; and

WHEREAS, the Board of the District has previously by Resolution elected to participate in the school facilities funding program established pursuant to the Leroy F. Greene School Facilities Act of 1998 ("SFP") for both modernization and new construction projects, and appointed a representative ("District Representative") for the purpose of requesting an Eligibility Determination ("ED") for funding under the SFP; and

WHEREAS, the District Representative caused to be accomplished the completion and certification of the Enrollment Certification/Projections ("ECP") by submission of Form SAB 50-01, the Existing School Building Capacity ("ESBC") by submission of Form SAB 50-02, and the Eligibility Determinations ("ED") by submission of Form SAB 50-03 to the State Allocation Board ("SAB") for approval pursuant to the SFP; and

WHEREAS, the District received notification from the SAB that the District meets the eligibility requirements for new construction funding pursuant to the provisions of the SFP; and

WHEREAS, the District Representative has caused the completion and certification of Form SAB 50-04, the Application for Funding ("AFF"), and prior to the adoption of this Resolution submitted the AFF to the SAB for approval pursuant to the SFP; and

WHEREAS, Level 2 Fees and Level 3 Fees, upon adoption of the ASFF and during the effective period thereof, are applicable to new residential construction in accordance with applicable law, subject to the suspension of Level 3 Fees pursuant to Government Code Section 65995.7(a)(2); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Government Code Section 65995.6(f), ASFF adopted by the Board are effective for a maximum of one year; and

WHEREAS, the District has met the requirements established by Government Code Section 65995.5(b)(3) in that: (i) the District has issued debt or incurred obligations for capital outlay in an amount equivalent to at least thirty percent (30%) of its local bonding capacity, (ii) at least twenty percent (20%) of the teaching stations within the District are relocatable classrooms; (iii) a substantial enrollment of the District's students are on a multi-track, year-round calendar; and (iv) the District has placed at least one general obligation bond measure on the ballot in the last four years and received at least 50% plus one of the votes cast; and

WHEREAS, new residential construction continues to generate additional students for the District's schools and the District is required to provide school facilities for Grades K-12, ("School Facilities") to accommodate those students; and

WHEREAS, the District does not have sufficient funds available for the construction of the School Facilities, including the acquisition of sites, construction of permanent School Facilities, and acquisition of interim School Facilities, to accommodate students from new residential construction; and

WHEREAS, the Board has caused to be prepared the 2006 SFNA dated February 2006, pursuant to applicable law including, but not by way of limitation, Government Code Section 65995.6, prior to the adoption of ASFF; and

WHEREAS, the Board has received and considered the 2006 SFNA which includes all matters required by applicable law, including an analysis of: (a) the purpose of the ASFF; (b) the use to which the ASFF are to be put; (c) the nexus (roughly proportional and reasonable relationship) between the residential construction and (1) the facilities for which the ASFF are to be used, (2) the need for School Facilities, (3) the cost of School Facilities and the amount of ASFF from new residential construction; (d) an evaluation and projection of the number of students that will be generated by new residential construction by grade levels of the District as described by Government Code Section 65995.6; (e) a description of the new School Facilities that will be required to serve such students; and (f) the present estimated cost of such School Facilities; and

WHEREAS, the 2006 SFNA in its final form has been available to the public, for at least thirty (30) days before the Board held a public hearing and considered the adoption of the ASFF, including a response by the Board to written and oral comments, if any, received by the District; and

WHEREAS, all notices of the preparation of the 2006 SFNA and adoption of ASFF, including the offer by the District to meet with any affected local planning agency relating to the potential expansion of existing school sites or the necessity to acquire additional school sites, have been given in accordance with Government Code Section 65352.2; and

WHEREAS, copies of the 2006 SFNA have been provided thirty (30) days prior to the public hearing if such written request(s) for copies were filed with the District forty-five (45) days prior to a public hearing, which was held in a manner required by applicable law at a meeting of the Board of the District relating to the proposed adoption of the 2006 SFNA and ASFF; and

WHEREAS, the 2006 SFNA has been provided to all local agencies responsible for land use planning for review and comment in compliance with Government Code Section 65995.6(c); and

WHEREAS, the District has received, considered and discussed any written and/or oral comments received by the District, and has responded to all comments, which the Board desires to adopt all such written and oral responses as the Board's response(s), if any; and

WHEREAS, as to the approval of the 2006 SFNA and ASFF, Government Code Section 65995.6(g) provides that the California Environmental Quality Act, Division 13 (commencing with Section 21000) of the Public Resources Code does not apply to the preparation, adoption, or update of the 2006 SFNA or adoption of this Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the District desires to approve the 2006 SFNA and adopt ASFF pursuant to Government Code Sections 65995.5 and 65995.7 for the purpose of establishing ASFF that may be imposed on residential construction calculated pursuant to Government Code Section 65995(b), subject to the suspension of Level 3 Fees as set forth in Government Code Section 65995.7(a)(2).

NOW THEREFORE, the Board of Education of the San Bernardino City Unified School District does hereby resolve, determine, and order as follows:

- <u>Section 1</u>. That the Board does hereby find and determine that the foregoing recitals and determinations are true and correct, including not by way of limitation, its adoption of and/or responses to both written and oral comments received by the District, if any.
- Section 2. That the Board does hereby find and determine that the 2006 SFNA meets all applicable legal requirements, and it hereby adopts each of the findings set forth in the 2006 SFNA
- <u>Section 3</u>. That a District Representative made a timely application to the SAB for new construction funding for which it is eligible.
- <u>Section 4</u>. That the District received notification from the SAB that the District meets the eligibility requirements for new construction funding pursuant to the provisions of the SFP.
- Section 5. That for purposes of Government Code Section 65995.5(b)(3): (i) the District has issued debt or incurred obligations for capital outlay in an amount equivalent to at least thirty percent (30%) of its local bonding capacity, (ii) at least twenty percent (20%) of the teaching stations within the District are relocatable classrooms, (iii) a substantial enrollment of the

District's students are on a multi-track, year-round calendar, and (iv) the District has placed at least one general obligation bond measure on the ballot in the last four years and received at least 50% plus one of the votes cast.

- <u>Section 6</u>. That the District has caused to be prepared the 2006 SFNA, which is on file at the District office address and incorporated herein by this reference, which complies with all applicable statutory requirements, including the provisions of Government Code Section 65995.6.
- <u>Section 7</u>. That the Board hereby approves and adopts the 2006 SFNA for the purpose of establishing ASFF as to future new residential construction within the District, subject to the suspension of Level 3 Fees as set forth in Government Code Section 65995.7(a)(2).
- <u>Section 8</u>. That the Board finds that the purpose of the ASFF imposed upon residential construction are to fund the additional School Facilities to serve the students generated by the residential construction upon which the ASFF are imposed as provided in the 2006 SFNA and applicable law.
- Section 9. That the Board finds that the ASFF are hereby established as applicable to the extent set forth herein, and will be used to fund those School Facilities described in the 2006 SFNA, and such fees that these School Facilities are to serve the students generated by the new residential construction within the District as provided in the 2006 SFNA.
- Section 10. That the Board finds that there is a roughly proportional, reasonable relationship between the use of the ASFF and the new residential construction within the District because the ASFF imposed on new residential construction by this Resolution will be used to fund School Facilities which will be used to serve the students generated by such new residential construction in accordance with applicable law as set forth in the 2006 SFNA, and such fees are less than an estimated actual cost of the School Facilities estimated to result from the new residential construction as set forth in the 2006 SFNA
- Section 11. That the Board finds that there is a roughly proportional, reasonable relationship between the new residential construction upon which the ASFF are imposed, and the need for additional School Facilities in the District because new students will be generated from new residential construction within the District, and the District does not have sufficient capacity in the existing School Facilities to accommodate these students.
- <u>Section 12</u>. That the Board finds that the amount of the ASFF imposed on new residential construction as set forth in this Resolution is roughly proportional and reasonably related to, and does not exceed the cost of, providing the School Facilities required to serve the students generated by such new residential construction within the District.
- <u>Section 13</u>. That the Board finds that a separate fund ("Fund") of the District and two (2) or more sub-funds ("Sub-Funds") have been created or are authorized to be established for all

monies received by the District for the deposit of Level 1 Fees, Level 2 Fees and Level 3 Fees (if applicable) imposed on residential construction within the District, as well as Commercial/Industrial Fees and mitigation payments ("Mitigation Payments") collected by the District and that said Fund and Sub-Funds at all times have been separately maintained, except for temporary investments, with other funds of the District as authorized by applicable law.

- Section 14. That the Board finds that the monies of the separate Fund or the separate Sub-Funds, described in Section 13, consisting of the proceeds of Level 1 Fees, Level 2 Fees and Level 3 Fees (if applicable), Commercial/Industrial Fees and Mitigation Payments have been imposed for the purposes of constructing those School Facilities necessitated by new residential construction and as further set forth in the 2006 SFNA, and thus, these monies may be expended for all those purposes permitted by applicable law.
- Section 15. That the 2006 SFNA determines the need for new School Facilities for unhoused pupils that are attributable to projected enrollment growth from the construction of new residential units over the next five (5) years, based on relevant planning agency information and the historical generation rates of new residential units constructed during the previous five (5) years that are of a similar type of unit to those anticipated to be constructed within the District, and/or the County.
- <u>Section 16</u>. That the Board has identified and considered, and/or subtracted, as set forth in the 2006 SFNA, the following information in determining amounts of the Level 2 Fees and Level 3 Fees:
 - (a) any surplus property owned by the District that can be used as a school site or that is available for sale to finance school facilities pursuant to Government Code Section 65995.6(b)(1);
 - (b) the extent to which projected enrollment growth may be accommodated by excess capacity in existing school facilities pursuant to Government Code Section 65995.6(b)(2);
 - (c) local sources other than fees, charges, dedications, or other requirements imposed on residential construction available to finance the construction of school facilities needed to accommodate any growth in enrollment attributable to the construction of new residential units pursuant to Government Code Section 65995.6(b)(3); and
 - (d) the full amount of local funds the Board has dedicated to facilities necessitated by new construction, including fees, charges, dedications or other requirements imposed on commercial or industrial construction pursuant to Government Code Section 65995.5(c)(2).

- <u>Section 17</u>. That the Board has calculated, as set forth in the 2006 SFNA, the maximum square foot fees, charges, or dedications to be established as ASFF that may be collected in accordance with the provisions of Government Code Sections 65995.5(c) and 65995.7(a).
- <u>Section 18</u>. That notice and relevant and available information relating to the potential expansion of existing school sites or the necessity to acquire additional school sites, including notice of a proposed meeting regarding such information, was provided to City and County planning officials or agencies with land use jurisdiction within the District prior to the completion of the 2006 SFNA.
- <u>Section 19</u>. That the 2006 SFNA in its final form has been made available to the public for a period of not less than thirty (30) days, and that the District has made itself available to meet with any affected city or county to discuss the preparation of the 2006 SFNA, pursuant to the requirements of Government Code Section 65352.2.
- <u>Section 20</u>. That the public has had the opportunity to review and comment on the 2006 SFNA, and the Board has responded to both written and oral comments it has received, if any, regarding the 2006 SFNA.
- Section 21. That in responding to written comments pursuant to Government Code Section 65995.6(c), the Board does hereby adopt any and/or all such response(s) made by District staff and/or its consultants as its own response(s), and/or adopts such response(s) as modified by the Board at the public hearing.
- Section 22. That notice of the time and place of the public hearing to adopt the 2006 SFNA ("Hearing"), including the location and procedure for viewing or requesting a copy of the proposed 2006 SFNA has been published in at least one newspaper of general circulation within the jurisdiction of the District at least thirty (30) days prior to the Hearing.
- <u>Section 23</u>. That the District has caused to be mailed a copy of the 2006 SFNA not less than thirty (30) days prior to the Hearing to any person who made a written request forty-five (45) days prior to the Hearing.
- <u>Section 24</u>. That the 2006 SFNA has been provided to all local agencies responsible for land use planning for review and comment in compliance with Government Code Section 65995.6(c).
- <u>Section 25</u>. That the Board conducted the required Public Hearing on March 7, 2006, prior to adoption of the 2006 SFNA and the ASFF, at which time all persons desiring to be heard on all matters pertaining to the 2006 SFNA were heard, all responses to such comments received were made by the Board, if any, and all information presented was duly considered.
- <u>Section 26</u>. That the Board hereby adopts ASFF and establishes the ASFF on new residential construction projects within the District in the following amounts:

- (a) Pursuant to Government Code Section 65995.6, Level 2 Fees in the amount of \$5.24 per square foot of Assessable Space for new residential construction, including new residential projects, manufactured homes and mobilehomes as authorized under Education Code Section 17625.
- (b) Pursuant to Government Code Section 65995.7, Level 3 Fees in the amount of \$10.47 per square foot of Assessable Space for new residential construction, including new residential projects, manufactured homes and mobilehomes as authorized under Education Code Section 17625.
- (c) However, these amounts shall not be imposed on any construction project used exclusively for housing senior citizens, as described in Civil Code Section 51.3, or as described in subsection (k) of Section 1569.2 of the Health and Safety Code or paragraph 9 of subdivision (d) of Section 15432 of the Government Code or any mobile home or manufactured home that is located within a mobilehome park, subdivision, cooperative or condominium for mobilehomes limited to older persons as defined by the Federal Fair Housing Amendments of 1988. Additionally, Level 3 Fees shall not be levied by the District until authorized by Government Code Section 65995.7(a)(2).
- <u>Section 27</u>. That ASFF, upon adoption and during the effective period thereof, are applicable to residential construction in lieu of Level 1 Fees in accordance with applicable law, except that Level 3 Fees are suspended pursuant to Government Code Section 65995.7(a)(2).
- Section 28. That the proceeds of the ASFF increased and established pursuant to this Resolution shall continue to be deposited into those Sub-Funds of the Funds identified in Section 13 of this Resolution, the proceeds of which shall be used exclusively for the purpose for which the ASFF are to be collected.
- Section 29. That the Superintendent, or designee, is directed to cause a copy of this Resolution to be delivered to the building officials of the affected cities and county within the District's boundaries, along with a copy of all the supporting documentation referenced herein, and a map of the District clearly indicating the boundaries thereof, advising such entities that new residential construction is subject to the ASFF increased pursuant to this Resolution, and requesting that no building permit or approval for occupancy be issued by any of these entities for any new residential construction project, mobilehome or manufactured home subject to the ASFF absent a certificate of compliance ("Certificate of Compliance") from this District demonstrating compliance of such project with the requirements of the ASFF, nor that any building permit be issued for any nonresidential construction absent a certification from this District of compliance with the requirements of the applicable ASFF.
- Section 30. That the Superintendent, or designee, is authorized to cause a Certificate of Compliance to be issued for each construction project, mobilehome and manufactured home for which there is compliance with the requirement for payment of the ASFF in the amounts

specified by this Resolution. In the event a Certificate of Compliance is issued for the payment of ASFF for a construction project, mobilehome or manufactured home, and it is later determined that the statement or other representation made by an authorized party concerning the construction project as to square footage is untrue or in the event the zoning is declared invalid, then such Certificate of Compliance shall automatically terminate, and the appropriate City or County shall be so notified.

- Section 31. That regarding the timely provision of a Certificate of Compliance by the District for residential construction, although not required by applicable law, the Board hereby determines that the 2006 SFNA is a proposed construction plan for purposes of requiring payment of ASFF prior to the issuance of any building permit for new residential construction in accordance with Government Code Section 66007, and that all ASFF are appropriated for the purpose of accomplishing such construction plan.
- <u>Section 32</u>. That no statement or provision set forth in this Resolution, or referred to therein shall be construed to repeal any preexisting fee or mitigation amount previously imposed by the District on any residential or nonresidential construction.
- <u>Section 33</u>. That if any portion or provision this Resolution is held to be invalid, the remaining provisions of this Resolution are intended to be and shall remain valid.
- <u>Section 34</u>. That if the Level 2 Fees and/or the Level 3 Fees are held to be invalid (other than the suspension under Government Code Section 65995.7(a)(2)), Statutory School Facility Fees, in amounts determined by applicable law at such time, are intended to be, and shall remain, in full force and effect.
- <u>Section 35</u>. That the ASFF adopted by this Resolution shall take effect immediately upon such adoption and shall be effective for a maximum of one year, subject to the suspension of Level 3 Fees as set forth in Government Code Section 65995.7(a)(2).

6.1 <u>Second Period Interim Financial Report as of January 31, 2006</u> (Prepared by Business Services Division)

Two interim reports are also required during the fiscal year: for the periods from July 1, through October 31 (first period), and from July 1, through January 31 (second period).

6.2 <u>Proposed Amendment to the Student Transfer – International Baccalaureate</u>
<u>Policy (First Reading)</u>
(Prepared by Educational Services Division)

STUDENT TRANSFER – INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE

- 1. High school students seeking to transfer to Cajon High School for the purpose of participation in the International Baccalaureate (IB) Program shall be selected on the basis of this policy. TRANSFERS to Cajon High School for curricular reasons to participate in the IB Program shall be excluded from the provisions of Board of Education Policy No. 5116, Section 6.
- 2. Not more than ten (10) transfers per year shall be granted <u>from</u> any single high school under this policy. No unfilled transfer shall be carried forward to future school years. All students granted transfers shall meet academic standards set by the Superintendent and shall be enrolled in a program leading to a full diploma. <u>Exceptions will be</u>

<u>considered for students who attend an IB Middle Years Program for two or more</u> years and meet all other IB transfer criteria.

- 3. The Superintendent shall initiate the development of a set of criteria for eligibility for transfer under the provisions of this policy and transfer procedures shall:
 - a. Identify students likely to be successful in the IB Program.
 - b. Determine the selection process to be used in the event that the number of applicants meeting the requirement of Section 3a exceeds the number allocated in Section 2. *
 - c. Develop application forms, application deadlines and dates by which students shall be notified whether their application for transfer has been approved or rejected.
 - (1) In the event of a student transferring into the District too late to meet the deadline for applying, the deadline may be set-aside in the case where the incoming student has been in an IB Program in another school outside our District.
 - (2) A student whose application for transfer is not granted may appeal to a person or persons named by the Superintendent. Appeals shall be limited to contention that the academic criteria was incorrectly evaluated; that rejection was based on erroneous student records, or that the application was rejected due to a missed deadline or some other procedural error, when the applicant had in substance met the procedural requirements. Appeals shall not be based on waiver of any point of academic criteria nor waiver of any procedural requirement, except as in 3c(1).
- * A random sample selection process was chosen by the Board of Education. Eligibility criteria are on file in the Educational Services Division.
- 4. The administration shall annually review the effects of this policy and shall make a report to the Board of Education. Such report shall include:
 - a. Number of transfers by school and by year;
 - b. Ethnic breakdown of transfers by school and by year;
 - c. Academic success rate of students who transfer;
 - d. Subjective evaluation of effects of transfers by high school principals; and

- e. Subjective evaluation by the Superintendent or Superintendent's designee.
- 5. Following delivery of the report specified in Section 4, the Board of Education may instruct the Superintendent to draft proposed modifications to this policy or instruct him to make changes in the procedure by which it is applied.

Adopted by the Board of Education: July 21, 1987

6.3 <u>Proposed International Baccalaureate Program Policy (First Reading)</u> (Prepared by Educational Services Division)

INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE PROGRAM

The Board of Education recognizes the value of diverse academic offerings, and it encourages schools to explore opportunities for meeting the needs of all our students. Programs developed and sponsored by the International Baccalaureate Organization (IBO) provide one set of options. The Board of Education directs the Superintendent or designees to create regulations that would guide interested schools in the application for implementing such a program. The criteria and process must be clear and obtainable for each school community that wishes to pursue an IB program. Toward that end, the Board of Education recognizes that sufficient human and budgetary resources must be available to allow successful implementation of approved programs.

Introduction:

Founded in 1968 and currently implemented in well over 100 countries, the IBO offers a set of three "distinctive yet complementary" programs for students in grades K-12. The Primary Years Program (PYP) serves grades K-5; the Middle Years Program (MYP) services grades 6-10; and the Diploma Program serves grades 11-12. Although the specific objectives and approaches of each program vary in order to accommodate the developmental needs of particular age groups, at the heart of the overall IB philosophy is the belief that students learn best when they are actively engaged in mastery of content and acquisition of skills relevant to their lives as individuals and as members of a global community.

The International Baccalaureate Mission Statement:

"Through comprehensive and balanced curricula coupled with challenging assessments, the International Baccalaureate Organization aims to assist schools in their endeavors to develop the individual talents of young people and teach them to relate the experience of the classroom to the realities of the world outside. Beyond intellectual rigor and high academic standards, strong emphasis is placed on the ideals of international understanding and responsible citizenship, to the end that IB students may become critical and compassionate thinkers, lifelong learners, and informed participants in local and world affairs, conscious of the shared humanity that binds all people together while respecting the variety of cultures and attitudes that makes for the richness of life."

<u>Instructional Model</u>:

- Inquiry-based instruction emphasizing critical thinking and fostering independence in learners
- Interrelatedness of skills and integrated approaches to learning in the content areas
- Culminating projects and criterion-referenced assessments
- Internationalism (including the study of foreign language) and multicultural perspectives
- Community-based projects and service-oriented experiences

Relationship of Programs:

The IBO itself describes the three programs as "distinctive yet complementary." No one program is a necessary prerequisite to any other, nor does successful completion of one guarantee automatic entry into another. The relationship among the three programs may be understood as a pyramid. PYP occupies the base, offering a program suitable for all elementary students of widely ranging abilities; MYP sits in the middle, offering greater academic challenges for motivated students; the Diploma program is at the apex of the pyramid, offering a rigorous pre-university course of study leading to externally assessed examinations and the potential for college credit.

The Board of Education agrees that articulation among staff at the three programs is crucial, and further recognizes that adequate staff development and training is required to successfully implement the programs and assure continued authorization by the IBO.

6.4 <u>Teacher Recruitment and Student Support Program Plan</u> (Prepared by Certificated Human Resources Division)

The Teacher Recruitment and Student Support Program (TRSSP), which was authorized under the Budget Act of 2005, provides \$46.5 million for districts to support teacher recruitment and student learning in decile 1-3 schools. Identified districts are eligible to receive \$23.73 per pupil (based on 2004 CBEDS data) at schools that rank in decile 1, 2, or 3. The California Department of Education has calculated the amount of available funds for the San Bernardino City Unified School District to be \$1,109,742. The District met with representatives from the San Bernardino Teachers Association (SBTA) to develop the program plan which must be approved by the local governing board and retained on file. The plan is presented for your consideration.

SAN BERNARDINO CITY UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT Teacher Recruitment and Student Support Program Plan

INTRODUCTION

The San Bernardino City Unified School District (SBCUSD) is the sixth largest school district in California. With a student population of nearly 59,000, the District serves a very diverse group of students who speak nearly fifty (50) languages. Characterized by significant poverty, 80% of

students qualify for free or reduced lunch. Significant enrollment growth, coupled with an attrition rate of nearly 9% has led the District to hire between three hundred (300) and four hundred (400) new teachers in each of the last eleven (11) school years. Thus, teacher recruitment has become an endeavor that is critical to the District's success.

PROGRAM APPROACH

Research is clear that a highly competent teacher is one of, if not, the most critical factors for student success. To this end, the District has worked diligently to remedy particular situations in relation to quality teaching. For example, student enrollment growth and the advent of the Class Size Reduction Program, in the midst of a recognized national teacher shortage, led to the hiring of numerous emergency permit teachers for a period of five (5) years. In March of 2003, the District employed 465 teachers under this type of authorization. Through an aggressive plan focused on moving teachers into Internships or preliminary credentialing, the District now employs only thirty-five (35) emergency permit teachers, a reduction of approximately 93%. A second example revolves around NCLB Highly Qualified Teachers. The initial submission of the District's Federal Programs Consolidated Application in 2004 indicated that 26% of the District's teachers were highly qualified. Again, after implementation of an aggressive campaign to improve this situation, the District's most recent Consolidated Application reflected a highly qualified teacher rate of 86%. The purpose of providing this information is to evidence that the District has a demonstrated track record of success in working toward a first rate teaching force.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The District is poised to use the Teacher Recruitment and Student Support Program Grant to address several critical needs via three (3) specific objectives:

- a) to secure highly qualified teachers in hard-to-find areas (Math, Science, Special Education),
- b) to balance teacher experience levels at low achieving schools, and
- c) to improve retention rates, particularly for decile 1-3 schools.

With these objectives in mind, the District will focus on Category C – Activities to Recruit, Retain, and Support Highly Qualified Teachers. The District worked cooperatively with representatives of the San Bernardino Teachers Association to develop the plan. Activities to be implemented are as follows:

Activity 1 – Increased Recruitment Activities

<u>Rationale</u>: Competition for highly qualified teachers, particularly those in hard-to-fill areas (e.g. Math, Science, Special Education, etc.) remains intense. Enrollment growth, additional retirements due to an aging workforce, and an increasingly shallow candidate pool exacerbates an already existing problem. Given that the Inland Empire is one of the most rapidly growing

areas in the country, the competition for candidates from local colleges/universities is even more fierce. It is, therefore, critical that the District achieve contact with as many qualified candidates as possible. The purpose of this activity is to increase the District's ability to attend out-of-state recruitment fairs in order to come in contact with an increased number of viable candidates.

Activity 2 – Signing Bonuses

<u>Rationale</u>: As stated above, competition for qualified candidates in hard-to-fill areas is significant. To gain an edge on the competition, it is not uncommon for districts to offer incentives for teachers in these categories. To remain competitive in a very candidate-driven market, the District will offer a \$4,000 signing bonus for teachers in Math, Science and certain areas of Special Education. Averaging over the last four years, the District has hired approximately forty-five (45) teachers per year in these areas. Balancing this information with projected needs for the upcoming school year, the District anticipates that fifty (50) teachers will qualify for this incentive in each recruitment season (2005-06 and 2006-07).

Activity 3 – HQT/CSET Completion Bonus

Rationale: As mentioned above, 87% of the District's teachers meet NCLB compliance requirements for highly qualified status. For the remaining 13%, there are two primary conditions leading to non-compliance. The first condition revolves around hard-to-fill areas where teachers still need to be hired prior to Intern eligibility or full credentialing (i.e., Provisional Intern Permit or Short Term Staff Permit). The second condition involves teachers who completed teacher preparation programs prior to the requirement of a federally mandated subject matter examination. They are current teachers (some of whom have already achieved permanent status) who are meeting performance expectations, but are in need of meeting this additional requirement for NCLB compliance. To address these two conditions, teachers who either attain University Intern or Preliminary Credential status or pass the CSET subject matter examination(s) will receive a HQT/CSET Completion Bonus of \$500. In addition, teachers who participate in the District's CSET preparation program will be paid the contractual hourly rate of pay. (The District already reimburses for the cost of one test once the candidate passes and will continue to provide this service.)

<u>Activity 4 – Transfer Incentive</u>

<u>Rationale</u>: In February 2005, the District participated in an extensive Curriculum Management Audit (CMA) conducted by The International Curriculum Management Audit Center from Illinois. A team of twelve (12) consultants participated in a week long visit in which they conducted a thorough audit of all District practices. Finding 3.5 stated in part, "the presence of experienced, credentialed teachers varies widely among schools and frequently results in less experienced teachers serving schools and students of highest needs." In addition, this need was also evidenced in an article by *Education Trust*, highlighting the same imbalance among staff experience levels at schools across the District. To address this identified need, the District will offer an incentive of \$1,000 to experienced teachers (defined as having at least ten years of experience) who are willing to transfer to a school in deciles 1, 2 or 3.

Activity 5 - Stay Put Bonus

<u>Rationale</u>: While attracting highly qualified, new teachers and encouraging existing, experienced teachers to transfer to decile 1-3 schools are important strategies, the <u>retention</u> of experienced teachers currently serving at low achieving schools is imperative to maintaining continuity of program and to balancing staffing levels. To this end, the District will offer a "Stay Put Bonus" to all highly qualified teachers who currently (as of March 1, 2006) teach at a school with a statewide Decile ranking of 1, 2 or 3 and choose to remain at that school throughout the duration of the program (June 30, 2007). Funds not spent in any other category (projected to be approximately \$370,000) will be divided equally among eligible highly qualified teachers.

SUMMARY

The District believes that by implementing the strategies/activities proposed within the Teacher Recruitment and Student Support Program Plan, the established objectives of a) recruiting highly qualified teachers, b) balancing staffing experience levels for low-achieving schools and c) improving retention rates of schools in deciles 1-3 can be met. More importantly, implementation of the planned activities will lead to increased achievement for our students, given that there is no greater support for students than the presence of a competent, highly qualified teacher.

During her career she has been a teacher, a scout leader, and an outdoor education crafts instructor. The cost, not to exceed \$870.00, will be paid from Inghram Elementary School Accounts No. 501 and No. 419.

Davidson Elementary School wishes to hire David and Teresa Doolittle, through CondorMusic, to present "A Musical Tour of the Americas" on May 4, 2006. This presentation furthers students' knowledge of Hispanic, European, African, and Native-American peoples whose cultural influences extend from North to South America. The Doolittles combine their musical talents on a variety of instruments, including the keyboard, guitar, Paraguayan harp, Kiowa flute, Andean charango, accordion, and the Australian didgeridoo, with storytelling skills to inspire and educate.
