4.1 K-12 Textbook and Instructional Materials Incentive Program, Track D – 2006-2007  
(Prepared by Educational Services Division)

California Education Code Section 60119 specifies that the governing boards of school districts are subject to the requirements of Education Code Section 60119 (as revised by Chapter 118, Statutes of 2005 and CCR, Title 5, Section 9531) in order to receive instructional materials funds. The governing board of each district and county office of education is required to hold an annual public hearing and adopt a resolution stating whether each pupil in the district has sufficient textbooks or instructional materials in specified subjects that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the content and cycles of the curriculum frameworks adopted by the state board.

The adoption of designated textbooks for each course Districtwide is an essential part of the development of an articulated, sequential, and standardized curriculum in each subject. The San Bernardino City Unified School District has an ongoing procedure whereby textbooks are continually reviewed and updated by committees that are representative of the school community. Books are reviewed for content and their match with District and State frameworks.

This Public Hearing is being held to enable additional input by parents, teachers, and members of the community, and bargaining union leaders in order to comply with Education Code 60119.

Conduct Public Hearing

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It is recommended that the following resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS, the governing board of the San Bernardino City Unified School District, in order to comply with the requirements of Education Code Section 60119 held a public hearing on September 19, 2006, at 5:30 o'clock, which is on or before the eighth week of school and which did not take place during or immediately following school hours; and

WHEREAS, the governing board provided at least 10 days notice of the public hearing posted in at least three public places within the district that stated the time, place and purpose of the hearing; and

WHEREAS, the governing board encouraged participation by parents, teachers, members of the community, and bargaining unit leaders in the public hearing; and

WHEREAS, information provided at the public hearing and to the governing board at the public meeting detailed the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the San Bernardino City Unified School District; and

WHEREAS, the definition of "sufficient textbooks or instructional materials" means that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home; and

WHEREAS, sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in the following subjects:

- Mathematics
- Science
- History-social science
- English/language arts

WHEREAS, sufficient textbooks or instructional materials were provided to each pupil enrolled in foreign language or health classes; and

WHEREAS, laboratory science equipment was available for science laboratory classes offered in Grades 9-12, inclusive;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that for the 2006-2007 school year, the San Bernardino City Unified School District has provided each pupil in Track D with sufficient textbooks and instructional materials aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks.

### **6.0 *Administrative Reports***

#### **6.1 Lincoln II North – Evaluation of Proposed School Site (Prepared by Facilities/Operations Division)**

Due to the demographic shift in student population, the Facilities Management Department is currently re-evaluating future school sites for their viability. It has determined that the proposed Lincoln II North elementary school site is no longer viable for the following reasons:

- Five current elementary school sites are less than 1.5 miles from the proposed Lincoln II North site, and two additional proposed elementary school sites, Lincoln II South and Wilson II, are both less than 2 miles.
- There is a projected growth of only 5% in the Downtown area over the next seven years, which suggests the need for only two new schools in the area – Lincoln II South and Wilson II.
- With the completion of the other two proposed elementary school sites there would be a projected enrollment of only 175 students at Lincoln II North.

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- The City of San Bernardino has raised concerns regarding this property being used as a school site rather than for potential economic development.

In conclusion, based on enrollment projections, the proximity of existing and proposed elementary school sites, and the City's concerns, we do not foresee a need to pursue the Lincoln II North site at this time.

**Lincoln II North  
Proposed Elementary School Site  
Demographic and Geographic Evaluation

***Location***

The Lincoln II North site is bounded by 13<sup>th</sup> Street on the north, Baseline Street on the south, Arrowhead Avenue on the east, and D Street on the west, with additional parking proposed for the northwest corner of Baseline Street and D Street. The distances to the five closest existing elementary schools are as follows:

Lincoln ES.....	0.06 miles
Riley ES.....	0.56 miles
Jones ES.....	1.17 miles
Bradley ES.....	1.26 miles
Roberts ES.....	1.38 miles

As shown above there are five existing elementary school sites located within 1.4 miles of the proposed site. Current District policy allows for home-to-school busing at a distance of 1.5 miles or greater from a student's home.

In addition to the existing facilities, there are also two additional elementary school sites proposed for the Downtown area of the District. Distances from the Lincoln II North site are shown below:

Lincoln II South ES .....	0.79 miles
Wilson II ES.....	1.63 miles

***Projected Growth***

The proposed Lincoln II North site is located in a geographic area of the District that is currently experiencing flat enrollment trends, with pockets of declining and increasing enrollment. It is an area consisting of older, mature housing stock and apartments, with little vacant land available for residential infill development. The region is projected to experience a 5.0% increase in K-6 population over the next seven years.

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***Site Selection***

The geographic location of the Lincoln II North site makes it difficult to efficiently maximize the student housing benefit gained from its construction, as opposed to Lincoln II South, which provides more options to benefit a greater number of schools should demographic trends change in the future.

***Conclusion***

Based on Facilities Management Department's re-evaluation of future school sites, they are continuing construction of the Wilson II and Lincoln II South elementary school site projects. There is no viable need to pursue the Lincoln II North site at this time.

#### **10.1 Payment of Individual Membership Dues, California Latino School Board Member Association (Prepared by Superintendent)**

Education Code Section 35172 states that the governing board of a district may approve payment for membership for any school under its jurisdiction in any society, association, or organization

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which has for its purpose the promotion and advancement of public or private education. Section 35172 expressly authorizes school memberships in designated organizations. However, the governing board of a school district may determine certain individual memberships are legally appropriate based upon language in Education Code Section 35160.1.

Using the Education Code sections as authority, it is requested that the Board of Education approves payment of annual membership dues to the California Latino School Board Member Association for Teresa Parra and Elsa Valdez, effective July 1, 2006-June 30, 2007. The annual membership fee is \$100.00 per year for School Board members.

It is recommended that the following resolution be approved:

10.2 Intent to Apply for Conversion of Comprehensive School Reform (CSR) Schools to the High Priority Schools Grant Program (HPSGP)  
(Prepared by the Deputy Superintendent's Office)

The Deputy Superintendent's Office requests Board of Education approval to submit the Intent to Apply application for Conversion of Comprehensive School Reform (CSR) Schools to the High Priority Schools Grant Program (HPSGP). Schools that are in Decile "1" or "2" (based on the 2005 Statewide rankings) are eligible to convert from Comprehensive School Reform (CRS) to the High Priority Schools Grant Program (HPSGP). The following schools are eligible for the Conversion to HPSGP: Barton, Davidson, Emmerton, Fairfax, Highland-Pacific, Hunt, Kimbark, Roosevelt, and Urbita Elementary Schools, Del Vallejo Middle School, Arroyo Valley and San Bernardino High Schools.

In this presentation, the FantistiKids, with the help of the students, help their puppet friend, F.R.A.K., come up with ideas for a school project using pretend TV shows to teach five drug safety rules, which help them to stay safe and healthy. The FantastiKids’ comedy/drama/musical teaching shows were developed by experts in education and entertainment, providing a fun way to stimulate and direct elementary students’ interest in critical health and safety issues. Throughout the year, the District is advised by federal, state, and local agencies of program entitlements and any additions and/or reductions in funds available for already approved programs. The following programs requested by the Board affect the restricted portion in the budgets of District's funds. In order to adjust the program budgets, it is necessary to have Board of Education approval.

The unrestricted program, Jones Start-Up (JNS), was not included in the 2006-2007 approved budget. Beginning in 1989-90, the State redefined the state aid that counts toward school district Gann limits to be "the amount which fills up a district's Gann limit." Consequently, only districts with extremely high levels of property taxes will be over their Gann limits.

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The District's actual appropriations limit for the 2005-06 fiscal year is \$254,842,418.65. The District's estimated appropriations limit for the 2006-07 fiscal year is \$260,006,402.71.
