4.1 Review of the Charter Petition for Classical Kids Charter School (Prepared by Student Services Division)

District staff review of the charter petition for Classical Kids Charter School indicates that the petition does not contain reasonable comprehensive descriptions of all the element requirements for the establishment of a California charter school as stipulated in California Education Code sections 47605-47608.

Education Code section 47605 requires that the petition be signed by a number of parents or guardians of pupils equivalent to at least one-half of the number of pupils that the charter school estimates will enroll in the school for its first year of operation or that the petition be signed by a number of teachers that is equivalent to at least one-half of the number of teachers that the charter school estimates will be employed at the school during its first year of operation.

Findings: The petition does not comply with Education Code section 47605. The petition does not contain the required signatures of teachers that the charter school expects to employ for its first year of operation. However, the petitioner states in his letter to the Superintendent and the San Bernardino City Unified School District Board of Education that the proposed charter school will target Inghram Elementary School students. This letter is included in the petition. The petitioner does not provide in the petition an interest of the Inghram Elementary School parents of having their students attend this proposed charter school. The petitioner also states in this letter that the proposed charter school could operate as an independent traditional school on the Inghram Elementary School campus. This proposal does not conform to Education Code section 47605 (2), which states that a petition that proposes to convert an existing public school to a charter school must submit a petition to the governing board of the district for review after the petition has been signed by not less than 50 percent of the permanent status teachers currently employed at the public school to be converted.

Requirement Element 1: The charter must contain a description of the educational program of the school, designed, among other things, to identify those whom the school is attempting to educate, what it means to be an “educated person” in the 21st century, and how learning best occurs. The goals identified in that program shall include the objective of enabling pupils to become self-motivated, competent, and lifelong learners.

Findings: The petition states that the students will be offered a very special curriculum called **Core Knowledge**. According to the petition, **Core Knowledge** tries to develop cultural literacy in a way that is systematic but leaves room for creativity for both teacher and student. This curriculum eliminates the gaps and repetition that characterize a curriculum in which textbooks and programs are selected more or less at random.

This curriculum does not address the California standards in language arts and mathematics. The sequence of the history and social science curriculum does not match the framework and standards for these academic courses. The K-3 curriculum is a combination of resources from multiple publishers. The petition does not mention how this curriculum from multiple resources offers a sequential program with a scope and sequence. The petition does not provide procedures for monitoring English learners for two years after being reclassified to proficient in English and how teachers will differentiate ELD and core curriculum instruction. The petition states that the proposed charter school shall be deemed a public school of the district that grants the charter. However, the petition also states that it reserves the right to join a SELPA either on its own or with a grouping of charter school LEA's as a consortium. This process would require a material change based on the petitioner's final decision of how services will be provided to Special Education students.

The petition does not meet this element requirement.

Requirement Element 2: The charter must contain the measurable pupil outcomes identified for use by the charter school. "Pupil outcomes," for purposes of this part, means the extent to which all pupils of the school demonstrate that they have attained the skills, knowledge, and attitudes specified as goals in the school's educational program.

Findings: The petition lists numerous formative assessments including classroom tests, portfolios, student presentations, projects, and teacher observations on student progress. It also lists the summative assessments of the CST, CELDT, annual essays, and student transcripts. The petition states that the charter school will exceed API growth targets and achieve 600+ API points at the first year of testing and improve that score in each of the annual growth targets provided by the AYP. The petition continues to refer to Inghram School as per the statement, "never achieved at the school since recordkeeping started." The petition lists these assessments, but does not respond to the NCLB reporting requirements of responding to the academic achievement of the targeted subgroups. The petition does not provide a process by which staff can analyze data to improve instruction. It does not mention how this data will be used to establish a staff development program to improve instruction.

The petition does not meet this element requirement.

Requirement Element 3: The charter must contain the method by which pupil progress in meeting those pupil outcomes is to be measured.

Findings: The petition states that the charter school will use the API as a primary measure of school success and will strive to exceed the API average of the San Bernardino City Unified School District's elementary schools the first year and meet or exceed its growth target each year thereafter. The petition states that the charter school plans to use Edusoft to guide instruction and develop benchmark assessments. The petition states that the assessments will be used to accelerate instruction or provide enrichment opportunities for students who are making

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appropriate progress, those who are not, and those who are excelling. The petition states that the charter school will provide several resources to students who need extra assistance and/or time. The assistance mentioned is a tutorial program staffed by parents, other students and local college students. The petition does not mention AYP to measure pupil progress which is a NCLB requirement. Also, the petition is not clear as to how teachers will differentiate instruction to meet the needs of students who are excelling and for those students who are not making adequate progress.

The petition does not meet this element requirement.

Requirement Element 4: The charter must contain the governance structure of the school, including, but not limited to, the process to be followed by the school to ensure parental involvement.

Findings: The petition states that the board of directors of Classical Kids, Inc. shall be the governing board of Classical Kids Charter School. The petition states that the governing board shall exercise final authority on all matters concerning the charter school. The bylaws indicate under Article VII Section 2 that their board of directors can change the principle office or the principle business office in California from one location to another; cause activities to be conducted in or outside California; and designate a place in California for holding any meeting of members. This practice does not foster parental involvement or access to the board of directors. The petition does not describe the Brown Act compliance. It does not cover conflict of interest in the petition.

The petition does not meet this element requirement.

Requirement Element 5: The charter must contain the qualifications to be met by individuals to be employed by the school.

Findings: The petition states that the charter school will recruit for qualified teachers that meet all state credentialing requirements in core subject areas and NCLB qualified teacher standards and who are committed to the school's mission. Documentation of teachers' teaching certificates, permits, or other documents issued by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing will be maintained in the personnel file of each teacher.

The petition meets this element requirement.

Requirement Element 6: The charter must contain the procedures that the school will follow to ensure the health and safety of pupils and staff. These procedures shall include the requirement that each employee of the school furnish the school with a criminal record summary as described in Education Code section 44237.

Findings: The petition states that the charter school will adopt and implement a comprehensive set of health, safety, and risk management policies. It states that these policies have been developed in consultation with the existing corporation's insurance carriers. The petition provides a comprehensive list of applicable health and safety policies for students and staff. The petition, however, does not provide in sufficient detail the process to be used to complete the Education Code requirement. The petition does not address procedures for ongoing TB clearance requirements.

The petition does not meet this element requirement.

Requirement Element 7: The charter must contain the means by which the school will achieve a racial and ethnic balance among its pupils that is reflective of the general population residing within the territorial jurisdiction of the school district to which the charter petition is submitted.

Findings: The petition states that it will strive, through recruitment and admissions practices, to achieve a racial and ethnic balance among its pupils that is reflective of the general population residing within the territorial jurisdiction of the San Bernardino City Unified School District. The petition states that it will make measurable recruitment efforts and outreach programs during an open enrollment during the first year prior to opening the school. The school will engage in ongoing recruitment and outreach efforts annually which are comparable to the first year of the charter and will furnish the District annual documentation of ongoing recruitment.

The efforts to recruit students to achieve a racial and ethnic balance responds to this element requirement but deviates from the intent to serve Inghram students as the petitioner states in the letter to the Superintendent and the Board of Education. If Inghram students are the targeted group, the petition does not mention this group in this element.

The petition does not meet this element requirement.

Requirement Element 8: The charter must contain admission requirements, if applicable.

Findings: The petition states that admission to the proposed charter school will not be based on ethnicity, national origin, gender, disability, or residence of the student or his/her parent in the state of California. The proposed charter school programs, admissions policies, employment practices, and other operations will be nonsectarian. The petition states that the school would conduct a random public lottery when the number of students interested in enrolling in the school exceeds the number of spaces available.

The petition needs to revise its intent to serve Inghram students to meet this element requirement.

Requirement Element 9: The charter must contain the manner in which annual, independent, financial audits shall be conducted, which shall employ generally accepted accounting principles,

and the manner in which audit exceptions and deficiencies shall be resolved to the satisfaction of the chartering authority.

Findings: The petition contains reasonable revenue and expenditures projections and the petition does meet the five percent reserve. There is no reference made for the charter school reporting calendar which includes the interim reporting twice a year, budget report, unaudited actuals, and attendance reporting. There is no mention about who is going to be the auditor and a firm has not been disclosed in the petition. Also, there is no mention about what financial system and attendance accounting system will be implemented for the charter school.

The petition does not meet this element requirement.

Requirement Element 10: The charter must contain the procedures by which pupils can be suspended or expelled.

Findings: The petition provides a comprehensive description of the application of the Education Code on suspensions and expulsions and includes due process procedures for students with disabilities. However, the petition does not mention discipline procedures for students with 504 plans.

The petition does not meet this element requirement.

Requirement Element 11: The charter must contain the manner by which staff members of the charter schools will be covered by the State Teachers' Retirement System, the Public Employees' Retirement System, or federal social security.

Findings: The petition states that all full-time employees will be eligible to participate in a qualified retirement plan including, but not limited to, STRS, PERS, and the federal social security system based on their eligibility to participate. The charter school cannot have options with STRS. The petition does not mention health benefits.

The petition does not meet this element requirement.

Requirement Element 12: The charter must contain the public school attendance alternatives for pupils residing within the school district who choose not to attend charter schools.

Findings: The petition states that no student may be required to attend the charter school. It states that students who choose not to attend the school may attend the schools in the district they reside or pursue an inter-district transfer in accordance with existing enrollment and transfer policies of their district.

The petition meets this element requirement.

Requirement Element 13: The charter must contain a description of the rights of any employee of the school district, upon leaving the employment of the school district, to work in a charter school and any rights of return to the school district after employment at a charter school.

Findings: The petition states that District employees or non-district employees who leave their district to work at the charter school shall not have automatic right of re-employment unless otherwise granted by the District in accordance with district policy and applicable collective bargaining agreements.

The petition meets this element requirement.

Requirement Element 14: The charter must contain the procedures to be followed by the charter school and the entity granting the charter to resolve disputes relating to provisions of the charter.

Findings: The petition refers to the Education Code for revocation and renewal of the charter school. However, on disputes the petition limits public comment by District and open session discussion by the District's Board of Education. The dispute resolution process is lengthy and can take up to 35 days to begin the resolution process and then proceed to mediation and arbitration. The petition does not state if arbitration is binding and what the next step is if no resolution is found.

The petition does not meet this element requirement.

Requirement Element 15: The charter must contain a declaration whether or not the charter school shall be deemed the exclusive public school employer of the employees of the charter school for the purposes of the Educational Employment Relations Act [Chapter 10.7 (commencing with Section 3540) of Division 4 of Title 4 of Title 1 of the Government Code].

Findings: The petition states that the charter school will be deemed the exclusive public school employer of record of the employees of the charter school for the purposes of the Educational Employment Relations Act (EERA). It further states that the charter school recognized the employees' rights to organize under EERA provisions to organize for collective bargaining. The petition does not indicate understanding of employee rights and the charter school's responsibilities in the event employees are represented under EERA.

The petition does not meet this element requirement.

Requirement Element 16: The charter must contain procedures to be used if the charter school closes. The procedures shall ensure a final audit of the school to ensure the disposition of all assets and liabilities. Immediate notification will be provided to the chartering district regarding any considerations of closure.

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Findings: The petition addresses the date of closure, the notification to parents and students, the transfer of student records to the sponsoring district in accordance with FERPA, and outlines the completion of an independent final audit within six months after the closure of the school. The petition names the board as the contact entity to which reasonable inquiries may be made regarding the closure. The petition does not provide a name of the contact person. Also, the petition does not provide a timeline for each step for resolution.

The petition does not meet this element requirement.

Conclusion:

It is recommended that the following resolution be adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Education adopts the findings regarding the charter petition submitted by the Classical Kids Charter School.

It is further recommended that one of the following resolutions be adopted:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Education approves the charter petition submitted by the Classical Kids Charter School.

Or

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Education denies the charter petition of the Classical Kids Charter School.

This will complete the requirements set forth in Section 3547 of the California Government Code, which states that, "All initial proposals of exclusive representatives and of public school employers, which related to matters within the scope of representation, shall be presented at a public meeting of the public school employer and thereafter shall be public record."

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6.2 Acknowledge Receipt of Initial Contract Proposal From Communications Workers of America
(Prepared by Certificated Human Resources Division)

Section 3547 of the Government Code requires that all initial proposals of exclusive representatives must be presented at a public meeting of the public school employer. At that meeting, any interested parties shall have the opportunity to comment on the proposal. Now is the time for such public comment from any interested person or persons.

On May 6, 2009, the Certificated Human Resources Division received a revised initial proposal from CWA, as follows:

CWA Proposal to San Bernardino City Unified
April 21, 2009

ARTICLE I- RECOGNITION

Section 1 – Union’s Representative Unit

The District hereby acknowledges the Communications Workers of America, hereby after referred to as Union, as the exclusive bargaining representative for all day to day, **former**, long term, resident and retired substitute teachers.

ARTICLE IV – UNION RIGHTS

Section 7 – Pre-School Orientation

The Union shall be given one (1) hour on the agenda of any District-wide, pre-school orientation program for new substitute teachers to explain the Union’s activities.

ARTICLE VI – CITIZENS’ COMPLAINT PROCEDURES

Section 1 – Investigations

The District shall be responsible to provide the union member with a copy of the original written statement and/or a written statement of the substance and specific allegations of the complaint with the complainant identified.

Section 2 - Exclusions deleted.

ARTICLE VIII – PERSONNEL FILES

Section 1 – Inspection

Materials in personnel files of employees shall include both positive and negative comments. Negative comments after eighteen months are not held against the substitute. These comments

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may serve as a basis for affecting the status of their employment, are to be made available for inspection of the persons involved.

ARTICLE IX – PROTECTION AND SAFETY

Section 2 – Safety Equipment

Substitutes shall have access to a walkie-talkie when performing duties while out on the field.

Section 3 – Student Behavior

A substitute may suspend a student from his/her class for the day following reasons set forth by the District. He/she shall, as soon as reasonably possible, report the suspension to and send the student to the principal for appropriate action.

Section 5 – Safety Training

Upon request, the District will provide training on how to subdue assaultive pupils, legal use of force and use of conflict intervention skills.

ARTICLE X – Wages

Section 1 – Day-to-Day Substitution

July 2009 through June 2012 - Wages to remain the same except for the following:

- 1) COLA wages will now include Substitute Teachers
- 2) Any wage or benefit increase for either CSEA and/or SBTA will produce a like increase for the substitute teachers of CWA.

NEW - The union proposes the addition of Former San Bernardino Teacher as a new job title within the contract between San Bernardino City Unified and the Union.

In recognition of their experience and credentials, former San Bernardino teachers are those who had worked as a regular teacher for the District and had not yet reached a regular teacher status and have been pink-slipped.

Wages would be open to negotiation.

Section 7 – Minimum Day

The substitute scheduled to work on “minimum days” who works less than three hours shall be paid for one-half day, and if the substitute works more than three hours, he/she shall be paid for one day.

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Substitutes who work at a school site where there is a minimum teachers day shall report to work twenty (20) minutes prior to the start of the teaching day and shall remain at their work site fifteen (15) minutes following the end of the regular last class or period after the students are dismissed from the class.

ARTICLE XV – TERM OF AGREEMENT

Section 1 – Duration

Except as otherwise provided herein and in Section 2 below, this agreement shall remain in full force and effect from July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2012, and from year to year thereafter, unless modified or amended pursuant to the following provisions.

Section 2 – Re-openers

No negotiation re-openers for the 2009-2010 school year. For the 2010-2011 and 2011-2012 school years the parties may mutually agree in writing to re-open one article.

Section 3 – Successor Negotiations

No sooner than March 1, 2012 and no later than April 1, 2012 proceeding expiration for this agreement, the Union shall present its initial proposals to the District. At a date to be determined by the Parties, the Union and the District shall commence meeting and negotiating for a successor agreement. Any Agreement reached between the Parties shall be reduced to writing, and if ratified by the Union and adopted by the Board of Trustees, signed by both Parties.

It is recommended that the Board of Education receives the initial contract proposal from the Communications Workers of America to the District.

6.3 **Public Disclosure of Memorandum of Understanding Between San Bernardino City Unified School District and the San Bernardino Teachers Association (SBTA)**
(Prepared by Certificated Human Resources Division)

On April 30, 2009, SBTA ratified the following Memorandum of Understanding that provides for a permanent work year reduction effective July 1, 2009.

**MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING
SAN BERNARDINO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT
AND SAN BERNARDINO TEACHERS ASSOCIATION
March 17, 2009**

This Memorandum of Understanding is made and entered into this 17th day of March 2009 between the SAN BERNARDINO CITY UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT (hereinafter referred

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to as “District”) and the SAN BERNARDINO TEACHERS ASSOCIATION, SBTA (hereinafter referred to as “Association”).

WHEREAS, this MOU is to address the reduction in work year days for Certificated Employees:

IT IS HEREBY AGREED as follows:

As a result to the Governor’s budget cuts, SBTA and the District agree to the following:

1. It is expected that all groups (SBTA, CSEA, and Management) will make contributions to the District’s budget crisis either through a reduction in work year or a reduction in work force.
2. The Association agrees that all certificated employees will reduce their work year beginning the 2009-2010 school year by three (3) days to assist in addressing budgetary concerns. The reduction shall be permanent unless subsequent negotiations determine otherwise.
3. The three (3) day reduction in work year shall not impact service credit for unit members contributing to the State Teachers Retirement System (STRS) or Public Employees Retirement System (PERS).
4. The District and the Association agree to maintain four (4) teacher preparation work-days.
5. Non-teaching and Permit (Preschool and Child Development Center) bargaining unit members shall schedule the three day reduction in work year in advance with the immediate supervisor, consistent with the needs of the District.
6. The District will not require unit members to provide services to the District during those three (3) days.
7. Staff members may participate in additional non-mandatory staff development days scheduled by the District during the school year and shall receive compensation for such services pursuant to the Collective Bargaining Agreement.
8. The reduction in the work year as a result of the three (3) days shall be equalized so as to have a minimal impact on the employee’s monthly wages. The remaining sections of the Collective Bargaining Agreement addressing per diem wages and hourly rates shall not be affected.
9. Article XII – Health and Welfare Benefits and Article XIII – Retiree Health Insurance shall be adhered to and shall not be impacted by the elimination of the three (3) days.
10. Upon ratification of the reduction of the work year (3 days) by the Association membership the District shall take action to reduce layoffs for the 2009-2010 school year and to maintain a twenty-two to one (22:1) pupil-teacher ratio for K-3 Class Size Reduction for the 2009-2010 and 2010-2011 school years unless additional reductions to the District’s budget are necessary.

11. Once the expected financial contributions are realized, or should the District's financial outlook improve prior to that time, the District and Association shall meet to negotiate the impact of those savings and/or improvement.

This is a permanent modification to the Collective Bargaining Agreement effective July 1, 2009.

6.4 Amendments to BP 5145.12 Search and Seizure (First Reading)
(Prepared by the Employee Relations Division)

As necessary to protect the health, safety and welfare of students and staff, school officials may search students, their property and/or district property under their control, and may seize illegal, unsafe and prohibited items. The Board of Education requires that discretion, good judgment and common sense be exercised in all cases of search and seizure.

Individual Searches

School officials may search individual students, their property and district property under their control, when there is a reasonable suspicion that the search will uncover evidence that the student is violating the law, Board policy, administrative regulation, or other rules of the district or the school.

Any search of a student, his/her property, or district property under his/her control shall be limited in scope and designed to produce evidence related to the alleged violation. Factors to be considered by school officials when determining the scope of the search shall include the danger to the health or safety of students or staff, such as the possession of weapons, drugs, or other dangerous instruments, and whether the item(s) to be searched by school officials are reasonably related to the contraband to be found. In addition, school officials shall consider the intrusiveness of the search in light of the student's age, gender, and the nature of the alleged violation.

Employees shall not conduct strip searches or body cavity searches of any student. (Education Code 49050)

Searches of individual students shall be conducted in the presence of at least two district employees.

The principal or designee shall notify the parent/guardian of a student subjected to an individualized search as soon as possible after the search.

(cf. 5145.11 - Questioning and Apprehension)

Student Lockers/Desks

The principal or designee may conduct a general inspection of school properties that are within the control of students, such as lockers and desks, on a regular, announced basis, with students standing by their assigned lockers or desks. Any items contained in a locker or desk shall be considered to be the property of the student to whom the locker or desk was assigned.

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Because lockers and desks are under the joint control of the student and the district, school officials shall have the right and ability to open and inspect any school locker or desk without student permission or prior notice when they have reasonable suspicion that the search will uncover evidence of illegal possessions or activities or when odors, smoke, fire and/or other threats to health, welfare or safety emanate from the locker or desk.

Use of Metal Detectors

The Board believes that the presence of weapons in the schools threatens the district's ability to provide the safe and orderly learning environment to which district students and staff are entitled. The Board also believes that metal detector searches offer a reasonable means to keep weapons out of the schools and mitigate the fears of students and staff.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures that ensure that metal detector searches are conducted in a consistent manner that minimizes or eliminates arbitrary and capricious enforcement by school officials.

(Prepared by Business Services Division)

This is an amendment to the resolution that went to Board on May 5, 2009, regarding the Cole Elementary School closure. Education Code Section 41422 authorizes maintenance of apportionment in instances when one or more schools must be closed because of extraordinary conditions. The San Bernardino County Public Health Department recommended the closure of Barton Elementary School, Lytle Creek Elementary School, and Shandin Hills Middle School for one day on May 5, 2009, and the closure of Cole Elementary School for four days from April 30, 2009, through May 5, 2009, as precautionary measures for yet to be confirmed cases of the swine flu.

In order to disregard the days in the computation of ADA, and obtain credit for instructional time and instructional minutes that would have been offered pursuant to the Education Code Section 46200, et seq., the Board is required to certify by Affidavit that Barton Elementary School, Lytle Creek Elementary School, and Shandin Hills Middle School were closed for one day on May 5, 2009, and that Cole Elementary School was closed for four days from April 30, 2009, through May 5, 2009, because extraordinary conditions existed.

It is recommended that the following resolution be adopted:

The texts were evaluated based on the criteria provided by the Reading/Language Arts Framework, the match to the District and State Language Arts Standards, English Language Development Standards, universal access, assessment, program organization, and instructional resources/materials to attain standards. After a lengthy review of each program's materials, the committee prepared reports that were posted on the District web page and sent to sites.

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Teachers in Grades K-12 were given the opportunity to review all materials. Materials from each publisher were on display at every school site. The teachers in Grades K-12 voted on the program they felt met the needs of the students in the San Bernardino City Unified School District. The votes were counted and verified by Representatives from Elementary and Secondary Education and SBTA.

The teachers in Grades K-12 recommend that the following resolution be adopted:

10.52 Emergency Repairs for Flooding at Cajon High School
(Prepared by Facilities/Operations Division)

On May 11, 2009, it was determined that the rubber hose used to connect the deionizer water tank to the backflow split which caused the flooding of the B-wing over the weekend. The flooding impacted the normal school functions of 31 classrooms. To prevent further disruption to the education programs at Cajon High School, the District's insurance carrier, Southern California Risk Management, hired Padgett's Cleaning and Restoration, Inc., a licensed and experienced cleaning and restoration contractor to make the necessary repairs. The District also wants the ability to hire other companies to complete the job. All costs, less the District's deductible amount of \$5,000.00, will be paid directly by Southern California Risk Management to all contractors.

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Public Contract Code 20113 relieves the Governing Boards of school districts from bidding requirements when emergency repairs, alterations, work, or improvements are necessary to permit the continuance of existing school classes or to avoid danger to life or property. Board of Education unanimous approval is required for an emergency request to the County Superintendent of Schools asking for the approval to enter into any necessary contract(s) in writing or otherwise on behalf of the District for the performance of labor and furnishing of materials or supplies for this purpose without advertising for or inviting bids. Board Policy 2122b allows the Superintendent to take emergency actions to ensure the safety of students. It also requires the Superintendent to request Board authorization during the emergency period.

It is recommended that the following resolution be adopted:
