- ☐ The highest score is 1600. Average is 1000.
- The SAT is an aptitude test, testing reasoning, verbal abilities, and critical thinking
- □ Score categories:
  - Evidenced Based Reading and Writing
  - Math
  - Optional essay

Given to Juniors as a predictor/practice exam to gauge SAT results. I will go over results with each student and mail home their results.

- ☐ ACT American College Test
- Content-based test-- English, Mathematics,
  Reading, Science, and an optional Writing Test
- ☐ The ACT largely tests English grammar and punctuation.
- ☐ The highest score is 36. 19-23 is an average score
- ☐ The ACT is an **achievement** test—curriculum based, measuring what a student has learned in school.
- Score categories:

  - Science Reasoning
  - Writing optional

# The College Visit!!



- Visit a "maybe" college first
- Schedule interviews with Admission Counselors
- Have questions ready
- Make appointments with financial aid, and potential major/minor departments (if known)
- Visit while students are there
- Ask about scholarships
- Select 3-5 colleges—Don't disregard Community Colleges!!

# Student Responsibilities

- Seek out letters of recommendation as soon as possible- give teachers enough time to write one--about two weeks
- Fill out applications—
  - · common application, SUNY application, etc.
- Listen to/Read announcements
- Remember DEADLINES!!
- Application Fee online or mailed (Fee waivers available)
- Essays—supplemental




# Application Terms





- Early decision = Locked in—Binding commitment
  - Your child agrees to attend the college if it accepts him/her. Can only apply early decision to one college. May apply to other colleges through the regular admissions process. If he/she is accepted by the first-choice college early, your child must withdraw all other applications. Usually, colleges insist on a nonrefundable deposit well before May 1. IF YOU ARE DOING EARLY DECISION PLEASE LET **ME KNOW!**
- Early action—Not locked in—Non-Binding Commitment
  - If your child has been accepted, he/she can choose to commit to the college immediately, or wait until the spring. Under these plans, your child may also apply early action to other colleges. Usually, your child has until the late spring to let the college know his decision.
- Rolling admissions—
  - No specific deadline, applications are reviewed as they are received. Keep in mind that at some colleges and universities, financial aid and housing may be doled out on a first-come, first-served basis, which means that those who wait until the last minute may secure a place in the entering class but not the money to pay for it or a bed to sleep in
- Open admissions/Open enrollment—
  - A policy that permits enrollment of a student in a college or university without regard to academic qualifications.



#### The Federal Government


From federal grants, to federal student loans, to employment through the federal work-study program, the U.S. Department of Education awards about \$150 billion a year to more than 13 million students and is the largest source of financial aid for students. Start by visiting the Department of Education's Office of Federal Student Aid to learn about the different types of financial aid available to you.

To apply for federal aid, you must complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid), a form the government uses to give money for college to students who need it. The online form is available starting October 1, 2017! Complete it as early as you can to ensure full eligibility.



### Financial Aid Process



- Begins after 10/1, every year
- www.fafsa.ed.gov
- Apply for a FSA ID online https://studentaid.ed.gov/sa/fafsa/filling-out/fsaid
- Aid packages Compare packages. Just because cost of attending is high, the package may offset the cost enough to make it as affordable as a less costly college
- Two types of aid—need base and merit based
  - Need-based— Grants, Scholarship—gift aid Work study, loans—self-help aid
  - Merit based—scholarships
- Apply for TAP immediately at end of FAFSA
- CSS Profile—Required by some private schools for institutional awards and grants. <a href="https://student.collegeboard.org/css-financial-aid-profile">https://student.collegeboard.org/css-financial-aid-profile</a>





### Financial Aid Process

When you are getting ready to complete the FAFSA, you can report tax information from a prior-prior tax return.

When possible, use the IRS Data Retrieval Tool in the Financial Section of the form. That page will begin with, "For 202\_\_, have you completed your IRS income tax return or another tax return?"


Once you answer that question using the drop down menu, you will see the following:

You may be able to use the <u>IRS Data Retrieval Tool</u> to view and transfer your tax information from the IRS.

LINK TO IRS
When you select "Link to IRS," you will see the message: "you are leaving the FAFSA site, is that alright?" Click "yes" and then enter the requested information regarding your federal tax return. Once you submit your responses on the IRS form, you will receive a message confirming whether you have or have not successfully linked to your return, and then you will be given the option to return to the FAFSA.

Parents of dependent students should also use the IRS Data Retrieval Tool when possible. The questions

for the parent are the same as those found above for the student.


