



Six Fox Chapel Area High School students were recently selected for prestigious bands that performed as part of the Pennsylvania Music Educators Association (PMEA) Conference.

The conference was held April 3-7, 2019, in Pittsburgh.

- •NAfME All-East Honors Band Fox Chapel Area High School seniors Hannah Kim and Glenna Van Dyke and junior Jacob Rendall were selected by audition to perform with the 2019 National Association for Music Education (NAfME) All-Eastern Honors Band. The band was made up of approximately 160 of the top student musicians from Connecticut, Delaware, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, and Vermont. The Eastern Division Conference was held in conjunction with the PMEA Conference.
- •*PMEA All-State Wind Ensemble* Senior Megan Hayes was selected by audition to perform with the 2019 PMEA All-State Wind Ensemble. The band was made up of approximately 80 of the top student-musicians from across the state of Pennsylvania. The All-State Festival was held in conjunction with the PMEA Annual Conference.
- •*PMEA All-State Concert Band* Two students were selected by audition to perform with the 2019 PMEA All-State Concert Band. The students are senior Alexander Perez and sophomore Joey Wang. The band was made up of approximately 160 of the top student-musicians from across the state of Pennsylvania. The All-State Festival was held in conjunction with the PMEA Annual Conference.



Winning a championship in any sport is an incredible challenge that requires months of preparation and dedication spent perfecting the minute details of the game. Winning back-to-back championships is rare, and only an exceptional group of players can make it happen – but winning four consecutive championships? It's a feat that seems impossible, but it is exactly what our boys' tennis team has accomplished with their victory over Shady Side Academy at the WPIAL team championships on May 8th. The Foxes became the first 3A team since Upper St.Clair (2004-2007) to win four WPIAL titles in a row, sealing their legacy as the best boys' tennis program in Fox Chapel history.

This year's senior group - Shan Hassan, Jay Kashyap, Jared Nord, Robby Shymansky, and Brandon Wei have led the team through their historic run, kicking off their careers at Fox Chapel by capturing the school's first boy's WPIAL tennis title in 2016. In addition to their team success, this class of seniors can boast great individual achievements. Robby Shymansky has an impressive individual track record with four section titles, three WPIAL gold medals, one WPIAL silver medal, one PIAA silver medal, and one PIAA bronze medal. The doubles team of Jay Kashyap and Brandon Wei earned a third-place finish at the WPIAL doubles championship this year; Kashyap and Wei placed third in sections; Kashyap placed third in section doubles in 2018; and Nord placed second in section doubles in 2017.

Although the Foxes were eliminated in the semifinal round of the PIAA playoffs, it was their only loss this season: they maintained a perfect record throughout the regular season and the WPIAL playoffs.

HOSA – Future Health Professionals is a national career and technical student organization endorsed by the U.S. Department of Education. The Fox Chapel Area High School HOSA - Future Health Professionals charter was established four years ago, allowing students in all grades to join the club right here at the high school. Senior Rachel Himmel placed 2nd in the Medical Math knowledge test and the team of Gina Wang and Vishi Agrawal placed 2nd in the CERT skills (emergency response) paper test and practical testing. 




STUDENTS PLACE IN STATE FBLA COMPETITION - THREE QUALIFY FOR NATIONALS



Next, Hedda Sharapan was also a producer on the show, having been there since the very first taping in October 1966. She also works on the new series, acting as a child development consultant. Finally, behind the scenes, David Newell was director of public relations for the Fred Rogers' show, however you would probably recognize him as Mr. McFeely, the speedy delivery man, who made many memorable appearances throughout the years.

Ms. Morris, a student teacher for Mr. Aires, was the one who put this all together and made the connections, after taking a course called Psychology in the Media. Mr. Devlin has been in touch with producers of the new Fred Rogers movie, starring Tom Hanks as everyone's favorite neighbor. They may also be interviewed for their opinion on Fred Rogers' legacy and what he means to us today.

How Technology and Education Didn't Collide (at CES 2019) By Ben Cagan

This past January the annual Consumer Electronics Show, or CES as it will be referred to from now on, took place in Las Vegas, and as always, major tech companies, and up and coming startups, came to stake their place in the future of technology. Technology has always found its history directly tied in with the educational industry, and presumably this would continue to be the case this year. In the 1980s, Acorn Electronics developed personal computers for the BBC to put in schools all around the UK. Last decade, Apple developed easier to use computers and helped supply them to American schools, a trend Google continued. Google developed their drive file storing software which allowed students and teachers to collaborate on assignments. And as you know from the high school, Mimio smartboard technology has allowed for more involved and detailed teaching in schools. However, true to its name, CES continues to focus more and more on consumer products. After searching through the big headlines and smaller products covered from the event, I found two key similarities between many of them.

Every year a lot of the big trends seem to be the same. Thinner and higher resolution televisions, AI, self-driving cars, and new smartphone tech. LG refined prior announcements from last year with their wall-paper-like TV displays, while Samsung announced displays using a technology known as Micro-LED, which has the visual benefits of an OLED (Organic LED) display, but has a far longer life, and also allows for the elimination of bezels and the ability to shape the screen to other forms and size. Beyond this, manufacturers have also begun showing consumer level 8k screens, even though 4k screens still have a lot of room to grow in the market place, at least when it comes to American adoption. The prices show just how unready for the market these displays are, with the lowest being \$5,000, going up to \$15,000. Beyond this, AI and self-driving cars seem to show an increased attention each year, but not in any way that surprises. Devices using Amazon Alexa, Google Assistant, and other similar services, were on display, such as Temi, an assistant that also doubles as an Echo Show. As expected, car manufacturers brought self-driving cars as well: BMW, Lyft, Kia, Toyota, Nissan, etc. And of course, there were plenty of smartphones. Robot smartphones, foldable smartphones, 5g smartphones, the works.

Every year companies love to chase the future with nothing to show. It took years for 4k TVs to be at a price feasible for consumers, and that extensive development time could continue to be the case for 8k displays. This was also the case for 5g. Each company in the cellular field, and many other companies, brought 5G to the show, and each in their own way. Verizon brags that they are the first to bring it to market, but AT&T claims that they already have. This is a bit debatable, however, as it seems they just rebranded their current 4G LGE service as 5GE, with little proper explanation of what that actually means. Samsung promised 5G support for the Galaxy S10, and finally a few months later other companies have followed, but that means nothing with no network to support it. AT&T and Verizon's true 5G coverage still remains minimal, and T Mobile doesn't plan to launch until later this year.

5G highlights a key issue with CES. Companies try to chase the future without looking at their own capabilities and seeing if it's truly possible to do what they promise. That leads to promotion being extended for years, as internal development carries on, until these concepts finally become reality. And as this happens, there lies education and technology. Absolutely none of the major companies had any major education focused products to show. As technology slowly progresses, education slowly becomes less of a factor as companies focus more and more on the consumers, and as schools continue to increase investments into technology, they will have to find a way to make technology more relevant to education.

Fox Chapel Area Again Named One of "Best Communities for Music Education"

The districts were selected through program sponsored by the NAMM (National Association of Music Merchants) Foundation which acknowledges and celebrates outstanding efforts by teachers, administrators, parents, School Board members, and community leaders who have made music education part of a well-rounded education. made to districts and schools that demonstrate an exceptionally high commitment and access to music education.


Another School Trip to Our Nation's Capital: AP Edition

GIRLS' OUTDOOR TRACK

This season of outdoor track was one for the record books, with the girls team securing five school records. Leading the pack with three of those records was senior Kate Carnevale, with a 12.36 in the 100m and a 25.50 in the 200m. Also, she was the first Fox Chapel girl to ever break one minute in the



400m (one lap) with a time of 58.64 seconds! Grace Sisson, a junior, was incredibly close to being the first girl to break 11 minutes in the two-mile, with a time of 11:00.62 seconds. Luckily, she still has another year to do so. Perhaps most impressive was the girls 4x400m relay team, comprised of freshmen Kaylee Uribe, Elena Perez, Carlie Barnett, and sophomore Domenica Delaney. Their time was 4:03.79!

In addition to a stellar outdoor season, the girls team also had an additional eight school records in indoor track this year! The most incredible person from this season wasn't an upperclassmen, or even in high school for that matter – it was seventh grader Laura Carter. This year she ran a 5:20.06 in the mile, shattering the middle school's previous record and being only 15 seconds behind the high school record, set by senior Caelan Miller last year. Even more impressive was her time of 2:27 in the 800m (two laps); another middle school record. What's insane about this time is that it is a mere 1.5 seconds behind the current high school time, set all the way back in 2013 by Emma Slevin. She still has another five years to drop two seconds. Her times have already started surpassing her two brothers, both dedicated members of the high school's cross country and indoor/outdoor track teams.


When asked what her favorite event was, she couldn't decide. Either the 800m because, "it's shorter than the mile," or the mile because as one of the students on the middle school track team said, "once Laura and Sydney run [the mile] you know the meet has started." Her goals for next season include a sub five-minute mile and breaking the high school 800m record, because, "heyyyy... Why not?" In the upcoming cross country season, she plans to, "just get first place in everything."

Overall, a great season for the Fox Chapel girls' track, and hopefully many more to come!

STUDENTS CHOSEN FOR HONORS ORCHESTRA


Several Fox Chapel Area High School students were selected to perform with prestigious Pennsylvania Music Educators Association (PMEA) orchestras.

Our principal, Mr. Howard was there for the send off and provided a bucket of candy to sustain us during the event. Our PRSEF coordinator, Mr. Patterson was also at Heinz Field to greet and



encourage us during the day's activities. PRSEF has been a Pittsburgh tradition and is the third oldest International Science & Engineering Fair (ISEF) affiliated science fair in the United States. It provides students from grades 6-12 the opportunity to pursue a research


project from one of 21 categories and share their results within a poster board forum.

During the event, judges engage with the student researchers using the Socratic method to seek their understanding and learnings from their projects. According to a March 2019 letter to Rajeev from the College Board's Senior Vice President, AP and Instruction, Trevor Packer, Rajeev's achievement, "was so superior that it falls into a very select category... We applaud your hard work, diligence, and enthusiasm..."

math teacher Antoinette Payner, ent in her AP Statistics class, said

Fox Chapel Area High School math teacher Antoinette Payner, who described Rajeev as a top student in her AP Statistics class, said she is proud of his "incredible" accomplishment.

"Rajeev is an incredibly intelligent and talented young man. Not surprisingly, he picked up the material quickly, was helpful to his peers, and has a natural curiosity for learning," Mrs. Payner said. "I am thrilled this amazing feat happened to such a nice student."

Advanced Placement Exams are scored on a scale of 1 to 5, where 5 is equivalent to an A in the corresponding college course. Rajeev not only received the top score of 5, but he was one of only two students (amounting to 0.001 of 2018 AP Statistics Exam takers from around the world) to earn every point possible on the difficult assessment.

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

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


