Kaslewicz Candidate in Presidential Scholars Program

Fox Chapel Area High School senior Elizabeth Kaslewicz has been named a candidate in the 2019 United States Presidential Scholars Program. Approximately 4,500 students from across the U.S., and 99 from Pennsylvania, have been named candidates in this year's program. Inclusion in the Presidential Scholars Program, begun in 1964, is one of the nation's highest honors bestowed upon graduating high school seniors. Students are initially selected for the program based on academic achievement and having scored exceptionally well on the SAT or the ACT. The candidates must then complete an application which includes essays, self-assessments, and secondary school reports and transcripts. Candidates are evaluated



based on their academic achievement, personal characteristics, leadership and service activities, and the quality and content of their essay. About 600 students will be selected as Semifinalists in the program and then students chosen as Scholars



will be notified this spring. Each year, up to 161 students are named U.S. Presidential Scholars. Scholars will be invited to Washington, D.C., in June for an expenses-paid trip to meet with government officials, educators, and other accomplished people. They will also receive the Presidential Scholars med-allion at a special recognition ceremony sponsored by the White House.



Fox Chapel Area High School junior Grace Han recently won third place in the FBI Pittsburgh's 2018-19 HOPE (Heroin Outreach Prevention and Education) PSA Contest. The competition was sponsored by the Pittsburgh Penguins Foundation and the FBI Citizens Academy Alumni Association. For the contest, Grace created a PSA-awareness video entitled "Myths NOT to Live By" that won third place in the Judge's Choice category. Grace was awarded a \$1,500 grant to support the district's AV/media programs, in order to enhance students' learning experiences through community safety projects. She also won five VIP party suite tickets to attend the February 5, 2019, Pittsburgh Penguins' game.

The goal of the Penguins' and the FBI's partnership is to challenge youth to find creative and innovative ways to raise awareness on the dangers of fentanyl and prescription opioid abuse and heroin use. A total of 37 entries were submitted by students from schools across the Pittsburgh area.

Two Fox Chapel Area High School students have been selected as National Honorable Mention recipients of the 2019 National Center for Women & Samp; Information Technology (NCWIT) Award for Aspirations in Computing. The students are sophomore Amulya Garimella and freshman Janise Kim. They are two of 400 winners selected from across the nation, and two of only 12 winners from Pennsylvania. The NCWIT Award for Aspirations in Computing recognizes young women for their demonstrated interests and achievements in computing, proven leadership ability, academic performance, and plans for postsecondary education. Amulya and Janise were chosen from more than 4,300 applicants from high schools representing all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, and all U.S. overseas military bases. Students in grades 9-12 are eligible for the award and a total of 40 winners and 360 honorable mentions were given.

Since 2007, the NCWIT has honored thousands of young women. The national sponsor of the program is Bank of America.

FCAHS/BEATTIE STUDENTS TO BE INDUCTED INTO TECHNICAL HONOR SOCIETY

Three Fox Chapel Area High School students who also attend the A.W. Beattie Career Center will be inducted into the National Technical Honor Society (NTHS). The students are senior Haley Hogan, who is enrolled in Beattie's Health and Nursing program, and juniors Jon "JP" DeLuca, enrolled in Beattie's Emergency Response Technology program, and Elliot McDade, who is also in Beattie's Health and Nursing program.

Thousands of schools and colleges have a chapter of the NTHS, which recognizes outstanding student performance and character in career and technical education. Each chapter has unique standards for induction. A.W. Beattie students must maintain a 3.0 GPA or higher on a 4.0 scale in their home school districts, have at least a 93 percent grade in their career technical education program, miss no more than five days of school, have no disciplinary actions, and be a member of a service organization or participate in an extracurricular activity.

"I am extremely proud of our students," A.W. Beattie School Counselor and NTHS Advisor Kim Zylinski said. "They work very hard in their district as well as their career program to earn this opportunity. These students go on to do great things in the world and often return to Beattie to help continue the school's mission to prepare students to be college and career ready." The 65 Beattie inductees joined 25 students who have been a member of the NTHS for at least one year at a ceremony on March 13, 2019, at the A.W. Beattie Career Center.

"Hard work should be recognized, which is why the ceremony is important," Zylinski said. "It is a reminder that our student body are extraordinary young men and women who possess talents and skills that are valued in today's society."



SAFE2SAY SOMETHING

Educators, parents, students, and community members are now able to submit anonymous tips through Safe2Say Something, a new statewide youth violence prevention program and reporting system.

We want parents and guardians to know that the Fox Chapel Area School District has an approved plan in place for the use of Safe2Say.

The program, which is mandated under PA state law, teaches students, educators, and administrators how to recognize warning signs and signals, especially within social media, of individuals who may be a threat to themselves or others and to say something to a trusted adult or use its anonymous reporting system.

With the anonymous reporting system, it's easy and confidential to report safety concerns to help prevent violence and tragedies.

How It Works:

- ☑ Submit an anonymous tip report 24/7 through the Safe2Say Something system through the website, app, or by phone at 1-844-SAF2SAY (1-844-723-2729).
 - ☑ Crisis center reviews, assesses, and processes all submissions
 - ☑ Crisis center sends all submissions to school administration and/or law enforcement for intervention
- ☑ If needed, crisis center may contact tipster anonymously through the app

FCA STUDENTS NAMED 2019 NATIONAL MERIT ® FINALISTS

Ten Fox Chapel Area High School seniors have been designated as National Merit Finalists in the 2019 National Merit Scholarship Program conducted by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). The Finalists from Fox Chapel Area High School are Justin Breen, Theresa Heidenreich, Rachel Himmel, Elizabeth Kaslewicz, Zachary Lakkis, Mitchell Miles, Annika Urban, Gina Wang, Landon Williams, and Ziya Xu.

These Fox Chapel Area High School students were named Semifinalists in September 2018 and have met all the requirements to advance to Finalist standing in the competition for National Merit Scholarships which will be announced this spring. The students are selected as Finalists based on their Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying

Test (PSAT/NMSQT) scores and other factors, including SAT scores, a student essay, a school recommendation, and having an outstanding academic record throughout high school.

Each year college-bound 11 th grade students complete the PSAT/NMSQT. All the students who take this test are automatically enrolled in the National Merit Scholarship Program and approximately 15,000 advance to become Finalists. The Finalists represent less than one percent of the nation's high school seniors and compete for some 7,500 Merit Scholarships worth more than \$32 million to be offered in the spring of 2019.

The NMSC is a privately financed, not-for-profit corporation.

FC's Logan McKaveney Among Beattie World of Wheels Competition Winners

An FCAHS and A.W. Beattie Career Center senior Logan McKaveney is among a group of students who designed a car that won first place in the World of Wheels Peddle Car Challenge. The contest was held January 8, 2019, at the David L. Lawrence Convention Center and 20 students in A.W. Beattie's Automotive Collision Technology program collaborated on the project, beating out 14 regional schools. This is the second consecutive year that Beattie students won the competition. Students worked on the peddle car for nearly three weeks and got inventive by turning it into a United States Air Force Thunderbird replica. "I'm absolutely excited for them," Automotive Collision Technology instructor Joe Pelesky said. "It's a lot of fun, and these kids loved it. I think at first it was challenging, but it really came together quick."Innovation was key in making the Thunderbird a functional peddle car with all the bells and whistles that you would see on the aircraft. "We used a bicycle and everything under the sun for it," Automotive Collision Technology instructor Pat Ciccone said. "We have a paint gun for the shifter, parts from a Culinary Arts oven. They just developed it from there. We used a lawnmower transmission for the propeller to spin. We used car parts and various things throughout the shop and got really



creative." Logan was involved in the painting and air brushing of the peddle car. He said detailing the peddle car presented a challenge with so many people working on it at different times. "The hard part with everyone working on it is just getting it all to be consistent," Logan said. "That was huge for the peddle car whether it was the painting, the airbrushing, the metal work and more. We had to work together and build off of each other to make our work look as close as possible." Students from all nine school districts (Avonworth, Deer Lakes, Fox Chapel Area, Hampton, North Allegheny, Northgate, North Hills, Pine-Richland, and Shaler Area) who send students to Beattie worked on the car.




winner of over 100 international awards, the musical has emotionally moved over 70 million people worldwide with the sung-through lyrics featuring one of the most memorable scores of all time.


