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High School Students Win Regional Scholastic Writing Awards



Nine Fox Chapel Area High School students recently won awards for their submissions to the 2018 Pittsburgh Regional Scholastic Writing Awards competition. The Silver Key winners were seniors Cara Levicoff and Claudia Simon, juniors Margaret Fletcher and Emma Kazmierczak, sophomore Gwendolyn Davison, and freshmen Amara Ostroff. The Honorable Mention winners were junior Margaret Fletcher, sophomores Annika Gleason and Zeynep Ozkaya (2 Honorable Mentions), and freshmen Allison Carey.

More than 400 entries, spanning a variety of different genres of writing, were received from students from across Allegheny County. The winning students will be recognized at the Regional Writing Awards Ceremony February 24 that will be held in the Frick Fine Arts Auditorium at the University of Pittsburgh from 2-4 p.m. Excerpts from their work will also be displayed as part of the ceremony.

The local competition is sponsored by the Western Pennsylvania Writing Project. The Project is a non-profit, teacher-centered professional development program serving area schools and students for nearly 30 years. It is hosted by the University of Pittsburgh's School of Education and is a long-standing affiliate of the National Writing Project. The group partners with schools and community organizations in its efforts to strengthen academic and public literacy.



Several Fox Chapel Area students recently won awards at the 84th Annual Region 7 Meeting of the Pennsylvania Junior Academy of Science (PJAS). A total of 20 of those students qualified for the state competition.

Fox Chapel Area first place winners were: juniors Vaishavi Agrawal, Zachary Lakkis, Kathryn Schwartzman, Gina Wang, and Ziya Xu; sophomores Rajeev Godse, Zeynep Ozkaya, and Ameya Velankar; freshmen Amulya Garimella, Anthony Nguyen, Jackson Romero, Vinisha Sant, Elizabeth Schwartzman, and Sanjay Seshan; eighth graders Mona Gerges, Janise Kim, Zoe Lakkis, Theodor Urban, and Siddharth Yende; and seventh grader Arvind Seshan. The first-place winners qualified for the state PJAS competition which will be held May 20-22, 2018, at Penn State University (Main Campus).

Fox Chapel Area second place winners were: junior Ji-Yool Moon, sophomores Hanna Chen and Serena Fisher, freshmen Dong Hyun Shin and Nishi Thawani, and eighth graders Nathaniel Mueller and Shrivardhan Thada. The Fox Chapel Area third place winner was eighth grader Connor Zakin.

The following Fox Chapel Area High School students received these special awards in addition to their place awards: Kathryn Schwartzman received a Perfect Score Award and a Duquesne University Provost Merit Award; Gina Wang won a Duquesne University School of Health Sciences Award; Hanna Chen received a Society of Women Engineers' Award; Rajeev Godse won a Duquesne University Program in Forensic Science and Law Award; and Sanjay Seshan won an Innovation Works Award, an American Vacuum Society–Western PA Chapter Award, and an American Society of Civil Engineers–Pittsburgh Section Award.

The following Dorseyville Middle School students received these special awards in addition to their place awards: Mona Gerges received a Perfect Score Award, a PJAS Directors Award for Middle School Biology, and an Allegheny-Erie Society for Toxicology Award; Zoe Lakkis won a Carnegie-Mellon Chapter of Sigma Xi Middle School Researcher Award; and Arvind Seshan received a Perfect Score Award.

The participating students (from several schools from Allegheny and Westmoreland counties) researched their science projects for several months. During the competition, each of the students was required to give an oral presentation on his or her science project in front of a panel of judges. The regional competition was held at Duquesne University February 3.

Student Places Second in PSA Contest

Fox Chapel Area High School sophomore Grace Han recently won second place in the FBI Pittsburgh's annual HOPE (Heroin Outreach Prevention and Education) PSA Contest. The competition was sponsored by the Penguins Foundation and the FBI Citizens Academy Alumni Association. For the contest, Grace created a PSA-awareness video on the dangers of choosing to use opioids in an effort to combat the crisis confronting our region. Her PSA, entitled "Know More to No More," won second place in the "People's Choice" category and featured Fox Chapel Area High School students giving facts and statistics about heroin, fentanyl, and opioid addiction. Grace was awarded a \$2,500 grant to support Fox Chapel Area High School's multimedia program, along with five VIP party suite tickets to attend the January 30 Pittsburgh Penguins' game.

The goal of the Penguins' and the FBI's partnership is to challenge youth to find creative and innovative ways to raise awareness on the dangers of fentanyl and prescription opioid abuse and heroin use. More than 40 entries were submitted from students from schools across the Pittsburgh area.



FC's Battle Bot Team Excels at Regional Preliminary Competition

After two great battles with Pine-Richland, the team finished second and qualified for the PA State BotsIQ competition against 72 teams and 65 schools. We learned a lot about our bot today and what changes need to be made for the state competitions in April. We will be ready!" Fox Chapel's team will be one of the top 6 teams at the state competition, thus increasing the chances of making it to the finals at the PA State BotsIQ competition.

FCA Students Candidates in Presidential Scholars Program




Fox Chapel Area High School seniors Alyssa DiPaolo and Bridget Wang have been named candidates in the 2018 United States Presidential Scholars Program. Approximately 4,000 students from across the U.S., and 103 from Pennsylvania, have been named candidates in this year's program.

Inclusion in the Presidential Scholars Program, begun in 1964, is one of the nation's highest honors bestowed upon graduating high school seniors. Students are initially selected for the program based on academic achievement and having scored exceptionally well on the SAT or the ACT. The candidates must then complete an application which includes essays, self-assessments, and secondary school reports and transcripts. Candidates are evaluated based on their academic achievement, personal characteristics, leadership and service activities, and the quality and content of their essay.

About 800 students will be selected as Semifinalists in the program and then students chosen as Scholars will be notified this spring. Each year up to 161 students are named U.S. Presidential Scholars. Scholars will be invited to Washington, D.C., in June for an expenses-paid trip to meet with government officials, educators, and other accomplished people. They will also receive the Presidential Scholars medallion at a special recognition ceremony sponsored by the White House.

This year, the boys' basketball team proved they were a force to be reckoned with, boasting an overall record of 17-6 and earning a playoff spot for the second consecutive year. After going undefeated in section play in the second half of the season, the boys tied for second place in the section, which earned them the #3 spot in the playoff seedings. In their quarterfinal matchup with Pine Richland on February 24, the boys fell just short of a win, suffering a 66-62 loss and the end of their chance at a WPIAL title; however, because Pine Richland made it to the WPIAL championship game, the Foxes earned a spot in the state playoffs. In their first-round game on March 10, they faced WPIAL champion Penn Hills, whose basket at the buzzer sent the Foxes home with another heartbreaking loss, 54-52.

Although the girls' team missed out on a playoff spot, they ended the season on a strong note, winning four out of their last five games. One of the highlights from this winning streak was avenging their loss to Latrobe earlier in the season; Claudia Guerrieri hit a three-pointer as time expired to send the game into overtime, and the Lady Foxes used that momentum to secure a 60-58 victory. In doing so, the girls knocked Latrobe out of the first-place spot in the section, stripping them of the section title. The team finished the season with a section record of 2-8, and went 9-13 overall.

Both teams had players that were recognized by the Big 56 Athletic Conference by being chosen for an All-Section Team. On the girls' side, Claudia Guerrieri was chosen for the Section 2 6A Second Team; Sarah Scherer received an Honorable Mention. For the boys, both Carson Cohen and Dom McGriff were on the Section 3 6A First Team, while Ben Kelly received a Second Team honor.





STEM in the Elementary School

This February, two FCAHS students once again brought their experience and love for STEM to elementary students in our community. Juniors Courtney Kennedy and Theresa Heidenreich lead a class of eight students at Fairview Elementary school. Continuing with the theme of their previous year's classes (Girls Rock Robotics and Cooking with Chemistry), this year's class was entitled Super Crazy Awesome Wild Engineering.

Super Crazy Awesome Wild Engineering was designed to introduce students to the process of engineering and simple machines (pulley, lever, wheel and axle, inclined plane, screw, and wedge). Courtney and Theresa used Rube Goldberg machines to teach these advanced concepts in a fun and engaging way. Rube Goldberg machines are complicated, multi-step machines that use simple machines to complete simple tasks such as stapling a piece of paper or watering a plant. Courtney and Theresa were amazed to see the teamwork and creativity the students had when making their multistep machines. According to Courtney, they were "using the wall to make ramps and using strings to make zip lines across the room. They were coming up with ideas that I had never thought of, and gaining knowledge about engineering at the same time." By the end of the class the students were following the engineering process with ease and using teamwork to make complicated machines.

This STEM initiative has been going on for three years in the Fox Chapel Area. Getting elementary school kids interested in STEM has been a challenge for many years, but Courtney and Theresa are striving to make STEM fun. By making STEM hands-on and including fun activities, students from FCASD become more enthusiastic about STEM. Next year, Courtney and Theresa plan to continue their efforts in introducing STEM to elementary school students.







SO YOU WANT TO WRITE

A favorite pastime for countless teens today is to sit down and watch shows or movies in some form, whether it's on the ever popular Netflix or just on TV. While all that may appear on the screen are the actors and actresses, there are countless people and careers in the industry. Have you ever been interested in a career surrounding film? Jonathan Green, an executive producer/writer on the NBC show Superstore, can answer some questions about this.

Foxtales: What exactly is your job title right now?

Mr. Green: Executive Producer, Superstore-- "Producer" can mean a lot of things in Hollywood. In this case it means I'm a writer who's gotten old enough that they'll now give me a little more responsibility.

Foxtales: What does a typical day look like in your job?

Mr. Green: I spend most of my day in the writers' room, sitting around a table with 5-10 other writers. When an episode is in its early stages, we're all just discussing ideas, but once someone has written a first draft, we put it up on a screen for the rewrite and everyone pitches ways to improve the story or "punch it up" with funnier jokes. On a typical day, I might also visit the set to check in on the episode we're filming, work with the editors on an episode we've already shot, or meet with various departments (e.g. sets, costumes, props, music) to plan future episodes. And every once in a while it'll be my turn to write a script, so I'll just be holed up with a computer for a week.

Foxtales: What are the best and worst things about your career?

Mr. Green: Best – I get to spend a lot of time joking around with a bunch of funny people.

Worst - The production schedule is pretty demanding, which means the hours can be long and I often have to work nights and weekends. Also, a lot of television shows don't stick around long, so it's not the most stable career - I've had to deal with some long stretches of unemployment.

Foxtales: What advice would you give to high schoolers who are interested in this?

Mr. Green: Write as much as you can, and don't be too harsh a critic of your own writing at first. You get a little better with everything you write. You can also learn a lot by having people perform your writing, whether it's a student play or just a short film you shoot on your phone.

Foxtales: Did you always know you wanted to be in this field? Or when did you realize? *Mr. Green:* I've been a huge comedy fan since I was little, and I had a lot of fun writing and performing in col-

lege. When I graduated, I decided it was worth at least giving TV comedy writing a shot.

Foxtales: What kind of education did you need to get to this spot? Does one need this or can you be successful without it?

Mr. Green: I have an undergraduate degree in English and Psychology, and most TV writers have a college degree -- but it's often in a field totally unrelated to writing or television. It's definitely possible to become a successful TV writer without a college degree. Good storytelling instincts and sharp observation skills can be just as valuable.

Foxtales: Do you think the outlook for this career is stable? What changes do you predict for it? Mr. Green: The entertainment business is constantly changing, most recently with the rise of streaming platforms with shows that are often better than those on network or cable. It's hard to predict what's coming next, but I'd imagine that pretty soon the line between television and the Internet will completely disappear. It also seems like virtual reality technology is becoming advanced enough that soon we all might be experiencing entertainment in a very different way, which would demand an entirely different kind of writing. But I think the career is stable in that there will still be a need for writers in some form. 10.



Foiled Again?

To the surprise of many, our school does indeed have a fencing team [under club sports on the athletics website]. To the surprise of many more, both teams placed this year at the Pittsburgh Interscholastic Fencing Association Championships on March 2, 2018.

The fencing season lasts the entirety of winter with meets and competitions between the local Pittsburgh fencing teams including Oakland/Central Catholic, Alderdice, Pine Richland, Peters Township, Mount Lebanon, Seton LaSalle, Winchester, Bethal Park, Aquinas, and Fox Chapel. After fencing each school during the course of January and February, the top four teams enter the championships. This year for the boys, it was Alderdice, Peters Township, Aquinas, and Fox Chapel. For the girls, it was Alderdice, Pine Richland, Oakland Catholic, and Fox Chapel.

The boys team, led by Captain Nathan Vandemark and by Coach Mark Hirsch, landed at an impressive 4th place in the region against challenging opponents. The boys team had not entered the championships since 2015, and this place was no easy feat.

The girls team, led by Captain Bridget Wang and by Coach Mark Hirsch, also entered the championships this year. Four teams compete but do so in a direct elimination fashion. From the scores and placements from the regular fencing season, the top team and the fourth top team compete, and the second top team and the fourth top team compete. The winners of each match compete against each other, and the winner of that match becomes champion. Fox Chapel (fourth top team) faced Alderdice first and won with a bout score of 5-3. The future and well-being of our generation and our country lies in our hands, so by putting our thoughts into words and our words into action, we can change America for the better and ensure the safety of generations to come.
