On Wednesday, December 13, multiple students participated in the annual Fox Chapel Area High School Shakespeare Recitation Contest, hosted in a combined effort between the Theater Arts classes and the High School QUEST Department.

The students performed monologues of their choice, including selections from "As You Like It," "Romeo and Juliet," "Winter's Tale," "Midsummer Night's Dream," and "Othello," all written by William Shakespeare. While all participants should be proud of their outstanding efforts, there were three winners in the FC contest: Deirdre Roberts, Sadie Lorence, and Nathaniel Meth. Next steps for all participants include a coaching session by professional actors from the Pittsburgh Public Theater in late January, followed by a chance to compete at the Pittsburgh Public Theater on February 7.

The Annual Shakespeare Monologue and Scene Contest at Pittsburgh Public Theater is expected to host hundreds of other students from regional area schools throughout the first two weeks of February. A panel of judges will be there to score the students as they perform the monologues directly on the Pittsburgh Public Theater stage. The contest is open to students in grades 4-12. Select students will be invited to perform in the Showcase of Finalists, which will be held on February 19 in front of a live audience. Though this year's fall play was a small production with just twenty cast members, the audience was treated to a captivating show packed with drama and suspense. Based on true events, Radium Girls follows the life of Grace Fryer, a young woman working as a dial painter in a watch factory during the 1920s. One by one, her fellow workers become sick and die; their diseases are blamed on the paint used and, specifically, the radium ingredient that gives it a luminous quality. When Grace too falls ill, she decides to take her case to court, fighting for the safety of other radium girls and exposing the corruption of her employers.

The production, directed by Ms. Kristiann Josephs, told Grace's story through several different points of view. Some scenes were no more than a few minutes long, so the actors were constantly rotating on and off the stage. However, the plot was easy to follow and never confusing; the stage was darkened to signal each change in setting, and the minimal set design allowed for quick transitions between scenes.

Kieran Bartels delivered a strong performance as Grace, capturing both the fear and determination she felt throughout the trial. Nathaniel Meth as Grace's boss, Mr. Roeder, did the same, portraying a character whose misguided confidence in radium left him a ruined businessman. Perhaps the most powerful scenes of the play were the ones starring Kathryn, Grace's best friend, and Tom, her fiancee - the former played by Alyssa Melani, the latter by Gabriel Fynsk. The viewer becomes attached to both relationships and their unique dynamics and is left heartbroken along with Grace after the death of Kathryn and the breaking off of her engagement. The rest of the cast: Abby Alexander, Anna Aupke, Adam Holmes, Oscar Izenson, Emma Lusk, Sadie Lorence, Christiana Paljug, Xavier Perry, Karl Pil, Olivia Pistella, Duncan Reagan, Preston Rowe, Jonathan Stamy, Ella Tramontina, Ameya Velankar, and Danielle Werner - provided perfect splashes of humor and excitement; their roles added twists and turns to the story and kept the audience on their toes.

All in all, Radium Girls was a fantastic show and the perfect start to this year's season of theater.


# FC Tennis Aces the WPIALS







## WHAT EVEN IS THE AMC?

The Mathematical Association of America's AMC 10/12 exam is a unique opportunity for students to test their mathematical prowess and qualify for

coveted academic avenues. The AMC exam is 25 questions and 75 minutes long, testing for various problem-solving skills including geometry, algebra, and number theory. Juniors and seniors will be tested for more difficult skills than freshman and sophomores. Those who score well on the AMC exam



will qualify to compete in the American Invitational Mathematics Exam (AIME), a three-hour mathematical gauntlet of 15 highly-challenging questions

offered at the high school. High scorers on the AMC can also qualify for the USA Mathematical Olympiad (USAMO), which is geared toward the brightest

math talent in the US.

All students should feel welcome to compete, regardless of mathematical ability or skill. The AMC exam is a short and simple test designed for all high school students. Even for those who won't qualify, the AMC is an easy way for students to push their

mathematical horizons and further their abilities.

# Cross Country's Extra Long Season

2017 was an exceptional year for the FCASD Cross Country team. Both the boys and girls team were section champs this year but a special congratulations to the girls team for finishing second in the WPIAL championships, winning first place in the state championship, and winning third in the Northeast regional championship.

Starting the winning streak, both the girl's and boy's cross country team won their section, which is the first time both teams won the section in the same year. A tremendous feat that demonstrates the dedication to the sport by both the runners and coaches, Mr. Moul, recent receiver of the Pennsylvania Track and Field Association Girls' Coach of the Year award, and Mr. Patterson.

After the success of the section win, the boys cross country team had seven runners who qualified to run in the WPI-AL race: Jonathan Folkerts, Ian Brown, Avery Bursick, Greg Overbeck, Christian Fitch, Ryan Kenyon, and Shane Funk. Christian Fitch finished in 10th place with a time of 16:25 and Ian Brown finished with a time of 17:03, allowing for both boys to qualify for States. Winning the section also put the girls cross country in the number one slot going into the WPIAL race with runners Sarena Seeger, Annika Urban, Caelan Miller, Grace Sission, Brooke Krally, Izzy Doerr, and Anna Folkerts. Caelan finished in fourth place, Annika finished in sixth place, and Sarena finished in eighth place. Unfortunately, although some of the girls had their best times of the season, the girls cross country finished in second place behind Oakland Catholic. However this setback only motivated the girls cross country team in their road to gold.

States was held in Hershey, PA, which is considered to be one of the hardest courses the team had to run. With a second place finish at the WPIAL race the cross country was determined to prove themselves. Coach Moul commented on the girls road to victory saying, "they were a little bit down after losing to Oakland Catholic at the WPIALs, but they showed something in Hershey." The girls cross country team collectively had an impressive race with Sarena Seeger finishing in 11th place in the state with a time of 19:09, followed by Annika Urban, Caelan Miller, Grace Sisson, Brooke Krally, Anna Folkerts and Izzy Doerr. Although none of the runners finished in the top ten, the girls collectively obtained the most points based on the times the girls finished, leading to the impressive first place finish for the girls cross country team. Winning the PIAA championship was a tremendous accomplishment for the girls cross country team and clearly the highlight of their season. Annika, Sarena, and Grace all said, without hesitation, that "the best part of [their] season was winning states." On the boys side of cross country, Christian Fitch and Ian Brown had an impressive race on the Hershey course finishing 30th and 140th in the state respectively.

Finishing first in state qualified the girls cross country team for Northeast Regionals, extending their typical season into the Thanksgiving season. Competing against the top 27 teams in the Northeast, the Lady Foxes ran another impressive race in Wappingers Falls, New York. 





# SAT vs. ACT

s early as freshman year, high school students be-Agin to think about their steps toward secondary schooling and tend to place preparation for college as one of their top priorities for the next four years of their lives. A fractional, yet consternating and anxiety-inducing aspect of these preparations, is an idea dreaded by many - standardized testing. Doesn't the name just sound scary to you? Are you a young high-schooler intimidated by the seemingly insurmountable task of going about these tests? Are you a sophomore or junior overwhelmed by the stress of performing on the SAT or ACT? Are you a parent, concerned with the dauntingness of the whole situation? Or are you braver than all of the above, and just would like to know a bit more about which test is best for you? For anyone who answered positively to any question, fear not, we have your answers. In this article, Fox Tales breaks down the differences between the SAT and ACT, providing a few helpful hints along the way. You don't want to miss this.

So what is each test? The SAT, short for Scholastic Assessment Test, is created and distributed by College Board, a private nonprofit corporation formed in 1899 to expand access to higher education. The Scholastic Assessment Test was recently revamped in 2016, essentially making it more alike to its counterpart, the ACT. The ACT is an acronym for American College Testing, an exam administered by another nonprofit with the same name as the test itself. The two tests are scored differently. The SAT uses a composite score, the sum of your score in math (200-800) and your score in reading (200-800) out of 1600 possible points, and the ACT uses the average of each section after each section has been scaled to be out of 36 possible points.

Should you even have to choose which test to take? That's up to you. Depending upon your skillset, you may choose to focus on one test more heavily than the other, or choose not to attempt the other test entirely. But be warned about taking both tests, as your studying will be spread out to cover twice the amount of studying in the same amount of time, as opposed to focusing that study time and energy upon the one test that's best for you. Often, which test is most heavily advertised to take has less to do with which test is more beneficial to you, and more to do with where in the country you live. For example, Fox Chapel High School offers a free Prac-

tice SAT to all freshman through junior students, but high schools elsewhere, such as schools in the Midwest, give students opportunities to take a Practice ACT.

What separates the two tests more than their background, is their content and how each is administered. The SAT has four sections: reading, writing, and math with and without a calculator. The grand total is a sum of 154 questions in 3 hours, as well as one (optional) writing prompt, to be completed in 50 minutes. The ACT also has four sections, including math, reading, english, and science. The grand total is a sum of 215 questions in 2 hours and 55 minutes, as well as an optional essay, which you are given 40 minutes to complete. The material is the same, and the formatting is very similar. However, the tests are definitely not equivalent. The first major difference between the two assessments is that the ACT is far more time sensitive – more questions to complete, with much less time to complete them.

From experience, the ACT science section is less rote memorization than it is pure data analysis, but depending upon your personal preference, this may be the deciding factor for which test you choose to take. The essays are also different as the ACT asks you to write and support your own argument, whereas the SAT asks you to support an argument that has already been formulated. In addition, the ACT does not have a math section where you are not allowed a calculator, however, this section on the SAT doesn't demand the use of difficult arithmetic, so it's not that big of an issue. Personally, Ι found the reading comprehension questions to be much more straightforward and less confusing on the ACT than on the SAT, and many of my peers feel the same way, though I'm sure I could find someone that disagrees.

Overall, it seems like the SAT is objectively easier, and I have to agree. But before immediately choosing the SAT, consider the fact that when you take either test, you are competing with everyone else who took it. I encourage you to take whichever test gives you the best competitive edge in your college applications. If focused, fast-paced testing is no problem for you, take advantage of what the ACT has to offer. But if you're the type that needs more time to finish each problem, focus your studying on the SAT. Happy testing!

A possible spring photo shoot is in the works. Be on the lookout for a notification about a spring family photo shoot.







curriculum curated by Carnegie Mellon University's School of Computer Science. The topics in the course are the same that would be covered in a college-level Data Structures and Algorithms course, but without the formal level of mathematical proofs that would be present in such a course. The course also continues the study of Javascript and other advanced topics in order to produce a final project. This course is taught by Mr. Klipa, and is a five-day one semester block course, with a prerequisite of a 83% in AP Computer Science.

Another computer science course Fox Chapel

offers is Principles of Computer Science Place-Advanced ment, taught by Mrs. Hollern. If you don't know Mrs. Hollern, she's a very energetic and engaged teacher who is very flexible with students and is always willing to help students do their best. This course is more fo-



cused on fundamental computer science theories, with a moderate amount of coding as well and more theory-based and macro concepts. AP Computer Science Principles is a five-day, one semester block and has a prerequisite of at least a 83% in Algebra II.

As a student currently enrolled in AP Principles of Computer Science, I have found the course to be really interesting and demanding, with a rare assignment needing to be completed outside of the classroom. Mrs. Hollern ensures that students are progressing at a steady pace through the course and that everyone is understanding the material. I highly recommend that students take this course as colleges look very favorably at computer science courses, and the fact that it's an AP with minimal homework is a huge positive.

Here are some scholarship opportunities that will keep the dollar signs from getting in the way of your dream school.

- 1. **Unigo.com** This website is a fantastic resource not only for researching colleges but also for earning scholarship money. It has thousands of different scholarships totaling billions of dollars if you create an account, you can filter through all of them and find ones that suit your interests, grade, gender, and more. Additionally, Unigo holds monthly 250-word essay competitions with prizes ranging from \$1,000 to \$10,000.
- 2. Raise.me What do good grades, accelerated courses, volunteer work, sports, school activities, and college events all have in common? They can all be cashed in for scholarship money at Raise.me! By creating an account on their website and logging your data, you can earn a "microscholarship" for something as simple as getting an A in a class. Although not all schools are partnered with the program, some notable local ones are, including Denison University, Gannon University, Temple University, Washington & Jefferson College, Westminster College, and West Virginia University.

- 3. **Prom Pics** It can't get much simpler than this scholarship from Savvi Formalwear: enter photos from your prom night to win a \$250 Visa gift card. Awards will be given in the promposal, pre-prom, dance, and post-prom categories.
- 4. Chegg Monthly Scholarships What part of college are you most looking forward to? If you could create an ice cream flavor, what would it be? Each month, Chegg.com awards \$1000 to the person who best answers prompts like these in a 600-character essay. Participants must be at least 16 years old to enter.
