

2018 National Merit® Semifinalists/ Commended Student

Three Fox Chapel Area High School seniors have been designated as National Merit Semifinalists, and 13 have been named Commended Students in the 2018 National Merit Scholarship Program conducted by the

National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). The Semifinalists from Fox Chapel Area High School are Albert Liu, Elizabeth Mountz, and Jordan Taxay. The Commended Students from Fox Chapel Area High School are Emilia Bianchini, Christopher Bonavita, Emelyn Broniek, Theodore Faucher, Nicholas Fennell, Wonho Kang, Shania Khatri, Jacob Klein, Margaret Lazzara, Adam Mattioli, Rebekah Polcyn, Lucy Stone, and Jorgen Wu.

All of these students were selected based on their 2016 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT®) scores. Each year college-bound 11th grade students complete the PSAT/NMSQT. About 1.6 million juniors who take the test are automatically enrolled in the National Merit Scholarship Program


and approximately 16,000 advance to become Semifinalists and about 34,000 are Commended. The Semifinalists represent less than one percent of the nation's high school seniors and the Commended Students represent

the top five percent. A Semifinalist must have an outstanding academic record throughout high school, be endorsed and recommended by a high school official, write an essay, and earn SAT® scores that confirm the student's earlier performance on the qualifying test. The Commended Students are recognized for their exceptional academic promise. The Semifinalists now have the opportunity to advance to the Finalist level and compete for

some 7,500 National Merit Scholarship® awards worth more than \$32 million to be offered in the spring of 2018.

The NMSC, a not-for-profit organization that operates without government assistance, was established in 1955 specifically to conduct the annual National Merit Scholarship Program.







Thrival is an annual four-day event produced by the Pittsburgh non-profit, Ascender, and hosted by Live Nation. with the alternative band Two Door Cinema Club performed. The musicians blew away their audiences, leaving everyone in great anticipation for Logic.

Sir Robert Bryson Hall II, otherwise known by his rapper name, Logic, captivated the appreciative crowd with his controversial and political songs and speeches. Logic, as an activist striving for social change, declared the reason why he makes music as he played his hit song, 1-800-273-8255. You've probably noticed that phone number, for the national suicide hotline, is posted on the walls of our school.

He even cried while declaring how hard he has been working for both himself and his fans. "I want all of you to know how incredibly special you are... This is why I make music, I make music for you! It's so much more than just this song. My album, my discography... it's all for you guys, man!" After hours of standing in one condensed place, being pushed around from all directions among thousands of people, I was tired. But when Logic finally appeared on

stage, I totally forgot about the pain in my aching feet and raved on like the pumped up fans around me.

After a long, sunny Saturday afternoon of performances by pretty righteous Ugly God, hardcore metal Missio, the sultry sax sounds of the electro-funk musician GRiZ, and refreshing pop of Kiiara, in floated the late-night headliner, Wiz Khalifa. Wiz rolled onto stage, expressing his love for his home city of Pittsburgh. The Taylor Allderdice graduate lit up the scene

with his smokin' stage presence as he rapped each of his hit songs, like Black and Yellow (one of Pittsburgh's unofficial anthems) and Alright which featured fellow Pittsburgher, Chevy Woods. All the while, flares and confetti were bursting from the set.

WALK TO THE CURE FOR ALZHEIMER'S

Every year, three million Americans get diagnosed with Alzheimer's Disease. Alzheimer's disease is a chronic neurodegenerative disease that usually starts slowly and worsens over time. It is the cause of 60% to 70% of cases of dementia, and it is estimated that sixteen million Americans with be diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease by the year 2050 (alz.org).

On Saturday, November 4th, Fox Chapel Area High School students will participate in raising funds to further the fare, support and research efforts of



Alzheimer's Association. The walk will begin in downtown Pittsburgh at Stage AE and will continue to run its course for two miles. Before the walk begins, FBLA will provide transportation to Stage AE and are hoping to go for lunch after the walk. In order to register for the walk, one needs to sign a waver through their official registration, however, there is no registration fee. FBLA asks everyone who participates to make a personal donation and commit to raising funds in the fight against Alzheimer's. Donations for the event can be made offline by submitting a check or an amount of money by mail or hand-delivering to the local Alzheimer's Association office. Anyone can register,

including children, parents, and even grandparents as long as they sign the waver. Every registered participant will receive a T-shirt after achieving the fundraising minimum of one hundred dollars.

On the day of the walk, FBLA is allowing strollers for the purpose of small children, but are discouraging things like skateboards, bicycles, inline skates, and wheelie footwear. Depending on the walk's location, well-behaved dogs will be welcome but need to be on a leash at all times. The group will walk in either rain or shine weather, but if in the case of severe weather they will cancel. FBLA will also be doing something very personal by giving participants a wristband, in which they will receive a Promise Garden flower. Each specific color will represent a connection to the disease: blue is for someone with Alzheimer's or dementia, purple is for someone who has lost a loved one to the disease, yellow is for someone who is currently supporting or caring for someone with Alzheimer's, and orange is for those who support the cause. To those who enjoy exercise, who are connected to the cause, or who even are just bored on Saturdays, please come to the walk and help spread awareness for Alzheimer's.



We here at Fox Tales are so proud of the members new and old, and we know they are set to accomplish great things in life!





FC's HOTTEST NEW PLACE TO SHOP


















TOP 10 TIPS FOR FRESHMEN

The boys team has had to battle their way through a difficult section, winning or losing most of their games by no more than a couple goals. Although the boys were swept by Central Catholic and Plum, the top two teams in the section, they split a pair of games with third-place Allderdice. In the month of September, they posted five shutouts and have outscored their opponents 32-13. They finished in fourth place in their section and have secured a playoff spot and can prepare for what is hopefully a deep run.

Last year, the boys were eliminated in overtime by North Allegheny - the eventual WPIAL champions - during the first round of the playoffs. The girls team ended their season in a similar manner, losing a hard-fought game to Norwin, who also went on to win WPIALs, in the semifinals. For the girls this year, it's not a matter of whether or not they will make the playoffs, but how far they will go. Throughout the season, they have remained ranked in the top ten teams in the WPIAL, and a double-overtime win against Plum, their section rivals, kept them undefeated in section play. Compared with the rest of their section, the girls seem to be dominating the field, having scored 33 goals while allowing only one goal against the other four teams (Allderdice, Penn Hills, Woodland Hills, and Brashear). Although their out-of-section opponents include Pine Richland, Penn Trafford, and Canon-McMillan, all of whom are in the top five teams in the WPIAL, the girls remain at the top of their section.

FCA Golf Teams Excel



The Boys and girls Golf Team thrived this season. The Boys Golf shot a school record of 174 earlier in the season. The whole team made it through sectionals and juniors Gregor Meyer and Grant Thiele and sophomores Amani DiAmbrosio and Scotty Bitar made it through WPIAL qualifiers. Gregor Meyer, the reigning 2016 WPIAL champ, shot a 77 at Nemacolin Country Club in the finals to advance to State Regionals at Tom's Run. He also set a school record this year by tieing Fox Chapel's nine hole record when he shot a 5 under 31 at the Pittsburgh Field Club.

The Girls Golf Team beat their neighbors, Shady Side Academy, twice during their season but lost to North Allegheny who was their toughest opponent. The team qualified for team WPIALs and one senior, Hannah Conroy made past the first round of individual WPIALs. This is her fourth year qualifying for individual WPIALS.

Both teams continued to WPIALS, with the girls bringing home second place. Even though the boys weren't able to dominate in WPIALS, we appreciate all they have done this season and can't wait to see all they will accomplish next year.







This season for the girls cross country team has been a strong one. The girls have won three meets and have come in second and sixth in the other two, outperforming countless teams. On September 23rd, the varsity team travelled to Hershey to run against teams from across the state in the PIAA Foundation Invitational. They came in second place by only four points, with Caelan Miller placing sixth and Sarena Seeger following close behind in seventh in individuals. Less than a week later they won their section, achieving something that hasn't happened since 2009. With Miller leading and Annika Urban, Sarena Seeger, Grace Sisson, and Brooke Krally following close behind, the girls team has managed to pull off the impressive feat of taking places one through five in that race.

The boys were successful by kicking off their season with a second-place finish at their first meet. At this same meet, Christian Fitch also placed seventh overall. A week later, they placed seventh at the Red, White and Blue Classic, with Fitch and Jonathan Folkerts coming in at the seventh and 23rd places respectively. At the PIAA Foundational Invitational, the team placed eleventh overall, led by Fitch (eleventh) and Folkerts (seventeenth). On September 27th, the boys joined the girls in becoming section champions, with strong performances from Fitch (first), Folkerts (third), Ryan Kenyon (sixth), and Greg Overbeck (eighth).

The teams have one final meet before the WPIALs on October 26th. The girls hope to build off of their second place finish last year, and both aim to continue to the state meet. Good luck to the girls and boys, and congratulations on a fantastic season!



This fall, our theater cast and crew will travel back to the 1920s for their production of Radium Girls, based on a true story about female factory workers during World War I. At the time,

radium had acquired popularity among the medical community; its healing properties were used in everything from cancer treatments to anti-aging methods. However, radium appealed to watch manufacturers

for a different reason: its glow-in-the-dark quality. They added the element to their paint mixtures and hired factory workers, who would later be known as the "radium girls", to draw the numbers on watch faces. Before long, these women became ill; they suffered from tooth decay, exhaustion, brittle bones, and delicate skin. As more and more of these workers were struck down by disease and die from their af-

flictions, the true nature of the miraculous element was questioned: was radium the silent killer?

Radium Girls follows Grace Fryer, a young factory painter, and her legal battle to find justice for her fellow workers. She faces

corruption and greed as she stands up to her employers, doctors, and a nation reluctant to condemn radium. The play will be performed in November. Showtimes and ticket prices will be announced at a later date.

HIGH SCHOOL TEACHER AWARDED GRANT

Pox Chapel Area High School technology education teacher Ken Grimm has been awarded a \$6,000 grant from the Gene Haas Foundation. The foundation awards grants and scholarships for CNC (Computer Numerical Control) machinist training to high schools, community colleges, and trade schools. The majority of Fox Chapel Area High School's grant will be given as a post-secondary scholarship to a student planning a career in the technology arena, such as manufacturing, machining, and engineering. The grant will also be used to help pay for Fox Chapel Area High School students to attend competitions where technology education/CNC machining is highlighted, such as the Technology Student Association (TSA), Skills USA, Combat Bots, and Bots IQ events.

In 1999, Gene Haas founded the Gene Haas Foundation, a 501(c)(3) organization located in Oxnard, California. Haas is the owner of Haas Automation, Inc., America's leading builder of CNC machine tools, which he started in 1983. Haas Automation is now a billion-dollar company.





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
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usic can represent many different things to people. It is a means of communicating one's thoughts f V f L and feelings. It allows people to express themselves through their playing. It is a way to voice one's opinions to the world. However, music is also where we all find common ground. It unites people, bringing them together in a way that nothing else in the world can. Fox Chapel Area School District has had a prevailing music program for many years, with dazzling musicals and fantastic band, choir and orchestra programs, but this year the orchestra program specifically has gone through many changes.

When making music, it is always important for a musician to consider why they are playing or performing. Mrs. Cooper, the FCAHS orchestra director, has allowed her students to ask themselves these questions by applying design thinking, which allows students to take charge. Mrs. Cooper believes that this independence will give the students more initiative to accomplish things that they wouldn't have otherwise. "If you want things to be meaningful for your students, then you have to give your students voice." With this freedom, the students have developed a philosophy for their orchestra around four pillars: giving those who aren't unable to easily hear it access to live music, educating people about string instruments emphasizing the value of music, creating a wider audience for enjoying and celebrating string music, and expressing the sheer joy of music through performance. Orchestra is no longer about the performance. It is solely about sharing and spreading music. Everything is student led, and the students have arranged popup concerts that correspond to each of the four pillars to help share and spread music. They plan to visit a school for the blind, the Environmental Charter School, the Science Center, and Phipps Conservatory.

Although the pop up concerts aren't open to the public, there is a concert on October 25 at Fox Chapel Area High School that will present a preview for these events. The repertoire includes well known pieces such as West Side Story, An American in Paris, and Hoedown, with student soloists and conductors being featured. All of these are American pieces, which is significant to the message that the Fox Chapel Area High School Orchestra is trying to convey in their playing: asking ourselves what it means to be an American, to showcase diversity, and to ultimately use music to change the world.
