The Covestro Pittsburgh Regional Science & Engineering Fair (PRSEF), much like PJAS, is an annual science fair where students in grades 6-12 can compete for over \$1 million in awards and scholarships. Students are asked to conduct a fair and controlled experiment, but instead of giving a formal presentation, they put together a trifold amidst the hundreds of other trifolds of other participants. Then as judges approach their trifold, the students will do their best to provide a brief synopsis of their project as the judges ask questions. Students who competed in both PRSEF and PJAS are allowed to use the same project for both competitions. The fair was held in Heinz Field in Pittsburgh March 31 and April 1.

Eighteen students from both the high school and the middle school won awards this year. The following students from

Fox Chapel Area High School won the following awards: Ameya Velankar (freshman) - first place winner in Behavioral and Social Science; Zachary Lakkis (sophomore) - second place in Senior Biology and the Society for In-Vitro Biology affiliate award; Sanjana Harish (sophomore) - Sponsor award from the Arconic Foundation; Moira McCormick (senior) - Sponsor award from the Duquesne University Department of Biological Sciences; and Shania Khatri (junior) received the Mu Alpha Theta affiliate award for her project "Using Bayesian Network Modeling to Locate Breast Cancer Genes" as well as the opportunity to compete in the Intel International Science and Engineering Fair (Intel ISEF) on May 14-19. In ISEF, students can compete for even larger awards, scholarships, and scientific field trips. Congratulations to these students as well as all participants!

Students from Fox Chapel Area High School participated in the 83rd regional competition for the Pennsylvania Junior Science Academy. Those who earned a first place award in the regional competition

qualified to compete in the state competition that took place May 14-16. This year, 11 students from Fox Chapel Area High School attended, accompanied by Mr. Schubert, as well as additional students from Dorseyville Middle School.

Students in grades 7-12 can conduct an experiment and use their knowledge of science and the scientific method to come up with a solution to their hypothesis. Many students focus on real world issues and use PJAS as a platform to spread

ideas and to present innovative solutions. On the first Saturday of February, students gave a formal presentation on their experiment in front of a panel of judges.

Eight Fox Chapel Area High School students recently earned high marks on the 2017 National Latin Exam. Gold Medal/Summa Cum Laude awards were earned by senior Suvir Mirchandani and freshman Claire Fenton. A Silver Medal/Maxima Cum Laude award was given to sophomore Marissa Hardiman. Cum Laude recognition and a certificate was earned by senior David Han.

The National Latin Exam was taken in March 2017. Approximately 149,000 students from 50 states and 16 foreign countries participated.







Five Fox Chapel Area High School robotics teams competed at the 7th Annual Combat Bots Competition on April 26, 2017. The competition was hosted by Pine Richland Area High School. 38 Battle Bot teams from six school districts spent the day team building as they maintained, problem solved, tested, and formulated their game plans.

The Fox Chapel Area High School all-girl combat team "Elphaba" won The King of the Ring rumble. They battled against seven other bots and were the only robot still functional at the end of the three-minute round. "The crowd went wild when Elphaba was declared the winner of the rumble," said Combat Bots coach Kenneth Grimm. "I'm proud of all the teams from FCAHS, their dedication to quality work and many hours spent working after school preparing for the competitions is to be commended." Fox Chapel's team of girls were the crowd favorite as they had to completely rebuild their bot after their second match. The team spent all of their lunch break rewiring the control system and fixing the bot's damaged chassis. They completed all of the needed repairs to compete in the rumble and ended up dominating the competition.

Fox Chapel Area High School robot "Baconator" finished fifth and advanced to the final four in the winners bracket. "Thunder" finished seventh



The flybot is a tiny, flying robot that avoids obstacles by mimicking the way a fruit fly avoids threats and moving obstacles. He has since extended the idea to create a low-cost, intelligent drone to be used in search-and-rescue missions in dangerous environments.

Other well-known teens featured on the list were Sasha Obama, Yara Shahidi, Willow Smith, Amandla Stenberg, and Brooklyn Beckham. Guardian US covers American and international news for an online global audience.

FCHACKS 2017



FOX CHAPEL AREA AGAIN NAMED ONE OF "BEST COMMUNITIES FOR MUSIC EDUCATION"

The Fox Chapel Area School District has been named among the 2017 Best Communities for Music Education. This is the sixth year in a row that the district received this prestigious designation! Fox Chapel Area is one of only 73 in the state of Pennsylvania and one of 527 school districts in the nation chosen for this honor that recognizes outstanding music programs. The districts were selected through a program sponsored by the NAMM (National Association of Music Merchants) Foundation which acknowledges and celebrates schools and districts across the United States for their commitment to and support of music education.

Now in its 18th year, the Best Communities for Music Education program recognizes outstanding efforts by teachers, administrators, parents, students, and community leaders who work together to make music education part of the curriculum. Designations are made to districts and schools that demonstrate an exceptionally high commitment and access to music education. These districts and schools set the bar in offering students access to comprehensive music education. The program evaluates schools and districts based on funding, staffing of highly-qualified teachers, commitment to standards, and access to music instruction. Awardees were selected by representatives of the NAMM Foundation and by researchers at The Music Research Institute at the University of Kansas.

The NAMM Foundation is a non-profit supported in part by the National Association of Music Merchants and its thousands of members around the world. The Foundation advances active participation in music-making across the lifespan by supporting scientific research, philanthropic giving, and public service programs.











MRS. COOPER HONORED BY THE CARSON SCHOLARS FUND

Fox Chapel Area High School orchestra director Mairi Cooper was honored by the Carson Scholars Fund. Cooper received the Fund's Power of Excellence Award at the annual Pittsburgh Chapter of the Carson Scholars Fund Awards Ceremony April 8, 2017, at Heinz Field. Cooper was also Pennsylvania's 2015 Teacher of the Year and is chairperson of the high school's music department. As the award recipient, she addressed the 247 students in attendance at the ceremony who have been named this year's Carson Scholars and those who were renewing their Carson Scholar status. Additionally, retired world-renowned pediatric neurosurgeon Dr. Benjamin Carson was also slated to speak at the event.


Cooper was presented at the banquet by Fox Chapel Area High School freshmen Gwendolyn Davison. Gwen, who was one of Cooper's orchestra students, was named a Carson Scholar in 2016 and qualified to renew her status this year. Additionally, Dorseyville Middle School eighth grader Vivian Shao was also named a 2017 Carson Scholar for the first time. Students are named Carson Scholars and renew their status based on their high academic achievement and their commitment to their communities through community service and they receive a \$1,000 college scholarship.

To date, the Carson Scholars Fund has awarded more than 7,800 scholarships to promising young students in all 50 states and Washington, D.C. This year, 483 students from across the nation were named 2017 Carson Scholars. In addition, 869 students renewed their Carson Scholar status. Scholars across the country will be recognized at seven additional regional awards banquets throughout the spring.



The Carson Scholars Fund was started by Dr. Carson and his wife, Candy, and is dedicated to impacting the nation in a positive way by cultivating future leaders who are academically talented and socially conscious. The fund is a non-profit public charity based in Maryland.










