



















FCA Gets Creative: Artist in Residency Project

ox Chapel Area High School is building its own giant. With the help of local artist Laura Jean McLaughlin, more than 400 students in the FCA Art Department are planning to spend months creating an interactive, outdoor, and playful statue that will tower at 11 feet tall. Its installa-

tion by the campus fish pond will be the culmination of an almost year-long program that allows aspiring young artists to interact with a successful professional.

The process began on October 27th in the large group instruction room, where students played a game traditionally known as "The Exquisite Corpse." This creative exercise was inspired by artists from the Surrealist Era. It begins by folding a piece of paper into four sections. One person draws a section of the body, head to shoulders, shoulders to waist, waist to knees, or knees to feet, and then passes the folded sheet. After all four sections have been blindly drawn, the paper is unfolded to reveal an eclectic "person." The game was played multiple times until the art

department staff had

enough illustrations to choose the best twenty. From there, students took a vote on their favorite sketches and have started bringing their ideas to life with the help of Ms. McLaughlin.

Ms. McLaughlin then spent 20 days in the fall

with the school's art classes to help the students create the components required for installation. The statue is planned to be four large cubes that will rotate on a concrete base. Each cube side will feature either a mosaic that depicts one section of the drawings or a mirror. While the

with students to create distillictive mosaics.

meticulous work of creating and mounting large mosaics has the potential to discourage experienced and new artists alike, Ms. McLaughlin says the project has been very rewarding so far. "It's just a wonderful art program. There are teachers who are really knowledgeable...and the students have been fun to work with. It's been a positive, nurturing environment."

Additionally, when asked who would be most amused by a piece suited for a funhouse, Ms. McLaughlin attested, "Anyone would enjoy it! People like to interact with things. It's a different experience every time you turn it." She contends that "this process is the perfect example of community" because everyone in the school district, regardless

of their role in the statue's creation, will be connected by mutual enjoyment.

for a delicious and much anticipated breakfast of bagels, egg sandwiches, coffee, fruit, and more.

All AP students recognized took a large group photo; separate group photos were taken for those who have completed three to seven AP exams. Students that completed their first AP exam last spring were given an honorary certificate as well. In addition, a plaque honoring the AP scholars will be hung in the hallways of Fox Chapel Area High School. The plaque will divide the scholars into multiple categories; Platinum, Gold, and Silver AP scholar recognition will be bestowed to those who have completed eleven, nine, and seven AP exams respectively with a minimum GPA of 4.0.

In short, the district has acknowledged that AP students deserve recognition for their intense studies and desire to gain a depth of content in specific areas of education. Students work at rapid paces in those classes and must balance their course loads with extra-curricular activities, sports, and social life. Successful completion of these fierce, college level courses prepare students to become tremendous workers in college and beyond.

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Summer Seminar Program Creates Better Freshmen

While the transition from middle to high school is sometimes a considerable paradigm shift for upcoming freshmen, Fox Chapel Area High School does its utmost to ensure that incoming students feel welcomed and secure in their new environment. Some ninth graders do not need much assistance and adjust well to the transition from middle to high school. One freshman even shared that the transition "isn't as bad as everyone says it is. The only major difference is the larger workload." However, others feel that the move across the two schools is challenging. "I had trouble adjusting to the early start time and all the homework," one student said. "I felt really overwhelmed at the beginning." In an effort to make certain that all students feel confident, the high school has introduced the Freshmen Summer Seminar.

Freshmen Summer Seminar is a transition program that has been recently implemented at the high school in order to better prepare middle school students for life at the high school. Fox Chapel Area has offered the Freshmen Summer Seminar course multiple times over summer break for the past three years, with individual seminars lasting for four three-hour days. This year, sessions were offered from 9 a.m. to noon July 13-16, 20-23, 27-30 and on Aug. 3-6. There was a cost associated with the program; students paid a flat fee of \$75 in order to attend. Financial assistance was also available for any student in need.

The core purpose of the Freshman Summer Seminar program is to prepare students for a curriculum more rigorous than that of Dorseyville by focusing on the improvement of executive functioning skills. Program attendees spend their sessions determining strengths and weaknesses in their study habits and working to improve classroom and homework skills. Dr. Cowles, director of the seminar program and a social studies teacher at FCAHS, remarks, "students who understand how they learn and use decisive strategies to comprehend information should perform well in challenging high school level courses." This was evident in the seminar's main lessons, which covered basic reading comprehension, note taking strategies, and the analytical writing process in an effort to provide students with a skill set that could be taken into any classroom. As Dr. Cowles attests, "This program will afford students the foundational academic learning skill sets to perform at the high school level upon entering on the first day."

Career Club Allows Exploration

Camp Allegheny Cultivates Great Memories



FCAHS Students Compete in Calcusolve

Seven students in grades 9 and 10 travelled to the Soldiers and Sailors Museum in Oakland for the annual Calcusolve competition, a math competition designed to challenge individuals in complex math problems. The competition is composed of nine rounds of problems for the students to solve in a certain amount of time. Two of the rounds are to be solved in groups in fewer than ten minutes. Ten points are awarded to groups who submitted a correct answer. The other seven rounds are designed for individual students to solve in under five minutes. At the end of five minutes, those who have not submitted an answer are provided a hint and provided an additional three minutes to give an answer to the judges. Five points are awarded to the individuals who submitted the correct answer in the original time allotted. Three points are awarded to individuals who submitted the correct answer after receiving the hint. A maximum of 35 points could be gained by individuals, which could count toward the team's score. At the end of the competition, certificates and trophies are awarded to the top three teams as well as the top three individuals.

The student competitors from Fox Chapel Area were Wonho Kang, Sarthak Navjivan, Albert Liu, and Arnav Gupta, Bridget Wang, Chris Bonavita, and Brandon Wei.

The first round was a question for the team:

If
$$a + b = 1$$
 and $a^2 + b^2 = 2$, then $a^3 + b^3 = ?$

Both teams were given ten minutes to solve this problem, and both teams answered with a correct answer of 5/2. The next seven rounds were for individuals, in which FCAHS's students performed very well.

The final round was for teams:

@ is defined as a set composed of $\{15, 115, 215, 315... 2015\}$. If two numbers were pulled fom set @ and set as the ordered pair of (x, y), then how many pairs are there where x<y.

Both teams answered with the correct answer of 210. Unfortunately, neither team placed in the top three nor did any individuals make honourable mentions or top three. However, one of our teams did place sixth, and the other did place tenth. Regardless, events such as Calcusolve are a great way to engage in friendly competition with like-minded peers from other schools and help to build the skills and confidence needed to succeed in subsequent competitions.

An Alternative, Well-Paved Route for Students at A.W. Beattie



Students brought in paper, coloring books, reading books, pencils, markers, art supplies, board games, educational posters, and many other types of supplies to be mailed to Louisiana.

Further action to help school districts similar to the conditions of Ms. Schoenecker's is being taken for a school district in Tennessee, where another friend of Ms. Cooper taught for the organization of Teach For America.

hree new faces are gracing the halls of FCAHS this year. Fox Tales interviewed them to find out who they are, what they stand for, and how many times they have gotten lost.

Ms. Krista Matonak, Math Teacher

Ms. Matonak grew up in Butler, PA. She completed her Math degree as well as a Masters of Education at Slippery Rock University. Prior to arriving at FCA, she taught for three years at Butler Intermediate High School. She is teaching Algebra I and Algebra II this first semester and is happy to be working so much closer to her home in Allison Park. The biggest difference between teaching at FCA and at Butler is the length of classes (45 minutes per period in a 7-period day). Transitioning to an 80-minute period was an adjustment but she feels it is great in terms of instructional value.

"It is always fun to see personalities show in class and be able to work with that in instruction," Ms. Matonak says. "I can't say that I am nervous about anything specific. Mr. Peter Shiner, Physics Teacher



All of these students were selected based on their 2014 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) scores. Each year college-bound 11th grade students complete the PSAT/ NMSQT. About than 1.5 million juniors who take the test are automatically enrolled in the National Merit Scholarship Program and approximately 16,000 advance to become Semifinalists and about 34,000 are Commended. The Semifinalists represent less than one percent of the nation's high school seniors and the Commended Students represent the top five percent. A Semifinalist must have an outstanding academic record throughout high school, be endorsed and recommended by a high school official, write an essay, and earn SAT scores that confirm the student's earlier performance on the qualifying test. The Commended Students are recognized for their exceptional academic promise. The Semifinalists now have the opportunity to advance to the Finalist level and compete for about 7,400 National Merit Scholarships worth more than \$32 million to be offered in the spring of 2016.

The NMSC, a not-for-profit organization that operates without government assistance, was established in 1955 specifically to conduct the annual National Merit Scholarship Program.







There are 255 student members of the FCAHS National Honor Society, For students to be considered for admission to NHS, the first step is to maintain a minimum 3.50 unweighted, cumulative quality point average.
