

SUPERINTENDENT SCHLEIZER TAKES THE HELM



t its meeting on January 6, the East Maine School District 63 Board of Education approved the appointment of **Dr. Shawn Schleizer as the District's new Superintendent of Schools.** Dr. Schleizer, who currently serves as the District's Associate Superintendent, will replace Superintendent Dr. Scott Clay, who retires on June 30.

Dr. Schleizer joined the District in 2010 as Melzer Elementary School Principal. In 2014, he was promoted to Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources, moving into his current position in 2017. Previously, Dr. Schleizer served as Assistant Principal for both Elmwood Park CUSD 401 and Evanston/Skokie School District 65 – and as Principal at School District U-46. After receiving his bachelor's degree in kinesiology from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, he earned a master's degree in planning and social policy administration from Harvard University. Dr. Schleizer completed his doctorate in educational leadership at National Louis University.

"We are delighted to be able to build upon Dr. Clay's legacy of student-centered excellence here at the District," notes Board President Alexandra Brook. "Dr. Schleizer has been a key part of our leadership team for more than a decade and an integral part of our success. His in-depth knowledge of D63, ability to build and manage an outstanding staff, and unwavering commitment to ensuring that every student receives an equitable education is exceptional. We look forward to a smooth transition, and to taking our District to the next level."

Laying the Groundwork

Dr. Schleizer's many years here have given him a deep knowledge of the District. But he spent this spring building on that knowledge base to better prepare for this new role.

At the top of the list: meeting with Board of Education members, parents, and employees to solicit key stakeholder feedback. He also introduced himself to the larger community, attending school and community events, and meeting with elected officials and local leaders.

Moving Forward

So what's on the new Superintendent's plate? Key objectives include:

• Leading a District-wide **strategic planning process** that will chart our course for the next three to five years.

Sadly, all good things must come to an end. As June rolls into July, we say goodbye and good luck to Dr. Clay. After 19 years of service to our District, 13 years as Superintendent, he will retire—and the transition of leadership to Dr. Schleizer (see page 1) is underway.

D63 AWARADED GRANT FOR BILINGUAL EDUCATION



District 63 is one of only 47 Illinois school districts to receive a 2022 Illinois State Board of Education Bilingual Education Award, designed to provide

high-quality supplemental services to districts serving a large number of English learner students.

The \$25,000 award—the highest level of funding provided—will be used to support students (and their families) who are new to the U.S., as well as English learners with special needs.

DR. JHOON 'JAKE' CHUNG • ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF HUMAN RESOURCES

Dr. Chung, formerly Superintendent of Salt Creek School District 48, began his career in the Aldine Independent School District near Houston. In 2004 he joined Schaumburg CCSD 54 as Principal, first, of its Lincoln Prairie School and then of its Hoover Math and Science Academy. At Arlington Heights District 25, Chung served as Principal of South Middle School beginning in 2012, moving on to become the District's Assistant Superintendent of Personnel and Planning, where he remained until taking on his role at Salt Creek in 2019. After receiving a BA in elementary education at the University of Iowa, Chung earned his MA and doctoral degree in educational lead-

ership from National Louis University. A 1998 Sallie Mae Foundation First Year Teacher of the Year award recipient, he received a 2019 Distinguished Alumni Award from the University of Iowa, where he currently serves as the Dean's Advisory Chair for the College of Education. Dr. Chung also serves as Education League of Illinois Membership Chair and on the DuPage Illinois Association of School Administrators Executive Committee.

LINDSAY SUDOL • ASSISTANT DIRECTOR OF TEACHING & LEARNING

Ms. Sudol comes to D63 from Schaumburg District 54, where she had served as a 5th/6th grade magnet program teacher since 2013. She began her career as a K-5 gifted program teacher at Pinellas County School District in Largo, Florida, moving on to Chicago Public Schools, where she worked as both a general education and special education teacher. Sudol also served as a summer program teacher for Northwestern University's Center for Talent Development. She holds a BA in elementary education and an MS in exceptional student education from State University of Florida—and earned an MA in principal preparation from Concordia University.



TIMOTHY MACKIN • GEMINI DEAN OF STUDENTS

Mr. Makin comes to the Gemini team from St. Charles CUSD 303, where he has served as Dean of Students for North High School since 2020. A licensed clinical social worker, Mackin also works with Barrington Behavioral Health and Wellness as a therapist/clinician. He began his career in education as a social worker at Wheeling CCSD 21's Cooper Middle School, ultimately moving into the Dean of Students role there. Before kicking off his education career, Mackin was an Associate Producer with the *Judge Mathis* television show. A graduate of Illinois State University, where he earned his BA in communication, Mackin holds an MA in educational leadership from Concordia University—and an MSW from Aurora University.





Ms. Eiseman has been working with Glenview CCSD 34 since 2003, beginning her time there as a teacher at Hoffman School and moving on to serve as both an Instructional and Literacy Coach. She holds a BS in elementary education from Illinois State University and an MA in education curriculum & instruction from National Louis University.
