This team sport unifies the entire student body and has received amazing support from our students.

FOUR-YEAR ONLINE STUDENT GRADUATES EARLY

One of 18 to Receive Early Diploma

High school graduation ceremony... High school diploma in hand... Commence making dreams come true...

ver since Katelyn Photopoulos was a little girl, she dreamed of being a professional dancer. In January Katy was one step closer to accomplishing her dream as she was one of 18 Fox Chapel Area High School seniors to graduate as part of the school's early graduation ceremony. But Katy's story is a little different from the others as she did all four years of her high school education online through Fox Chapel Area Online (FCAO). She is the first student to go all four years of high school through FCAO as a fully-cyber student.

Katy, a resident of Indiana Township, does it all... ballet, jazz, and modern. But she is also a competitive ballroom dancer, which requires a lot of travel, and she has been dancing since she was two- or three-years-old.

"I'm a dancer and I do Point Park College's pre-professional high school program," Katy

said, explaining that doing FCAO allowed her to dance, while focusing on school at the same time. It's a program that has her dancing and training for long periods each afternoon. She said she dedicated the first three to four hours every morning to completing her online schoolwork. If she needed extra time, she would work on the weekends or on the way to dance competitions.

Katy praises Fox Chapel Area's online program. "I liked my classes a lot," she said on her graduation day. "In the FC online program, you have actual teachers you can contact. They help you a lot to make sure you succeed, even though you aren't coming to school every day. You can also customize how you want to learn, which was really nice."

According to Randi Leonard, Fox Chapel Area's online learning coordinator, Katy made the most of her cyber experience. "She was able to put her energy into achieving her goals of becoming a professional and competitive ballroom dancer while excelling in her online courses. Katy took the time to establish a rapport with her course instructors, meet with teachers and tutors face-to-face as needed, and participate in school events."

Katy said that with other online programs she might have spent a lot of time on her own, teaching herself the concepts with little to no contact with actual teachers. She liked that FCAO offered a completely different experience. She specifically mentioned taking chemistry and how the face-to-face tutoring sessions she had with Fox Chapel Area High School teacher Peter Shiner helped her.

Katy's goal is to become a Radio City Rockette and, for the past two years, she has participated in the Rockettes Summer Intensive program. This is a one-week program where students accepted by audition get to work with the worldrenown dancers and Katy has already developed friendships with some of the Rockettes.

Now that she has finished high school, Katy has started classes at Community College of Allegheny County to get a jump-start on her academic studies. She will attend Point Park College in the fall on scholarship where she plans to major in dance, and may even double major by adding sports, arts, and entertainment management. She also plans to spend her summers in New York City attending the Broadway Dance Center Professional Semester.

Another early graduate was also a fully-cyber student, starting in 10th grade. Eliana Tolentino is a ballet dancer who practices and performs regularly through the Pittsburgh Ballet Theatre. She has been dancing with the Pittsburgh Ballet Theatre School since 2004 and her goal is to be a professional dancer with a ballet company. She has appeared in several ballet performances including "Cinderella," "Giselle," and the "The Nutcracker."

FCAO Online

Fox Chapel Area Online (FCAO) is available to students in the Fox Chapel Area School District in grades six-twelve. Whether a student is fully cyber or "flexes" their schedule to include some in-school and some online courses, the program offers the ability for students to pursue their dreams and interests while receiving a Fox Chapel Area High School diploma. Over the past seven years, the program has grown and is now up to 260 online course enrollments and each course is facilitated by a Fox Chapel Area teacher. The online program is perfect for competitive athletes, students with medical needs, aspiring performers, students with jobs, and students who want to take more courses than their class schedule allows. During the early graduation ceremony, Program Principal John McGee, Ph.D., pointed out that the special day is "not only a milestone for you. It's a milestone for your families." Perhaps, most importantly, he said, "As you go forward, know that we are very proud of you." He also reminded the students that they can always call if they need anything. "Just because you've graduated, doesn't mean you are no longer our kids."

Students who graduate early are also invited back to special events like the prom, and can also participate in the more formal June graduation ceremony with their classmates.

LAUNCH OF NEW SPORT UNIFIES STUDENTS

t's a sport in which mere inches can mean the difference in scoring a point or not, and at times, referees must carefully take a tape measure to make the determination. There is applause after each of the players rolls the ball, aiming to get close to the target called a pallino. "It's going to be close," the announcer says as an athlete rolls a ball through the playing court.

Well over 100 students, teachers, and parents of athletes attended the first-ever indoor bocce match played at Fox

Chapel Area High School on January 25. The newest high school sport, indoor bocce, is unique because it is designed to include an equal number of students with disabilities alongside their peers who do not have disabilities. Part of the **Unified Sports** program offered in Allegheny

County schools and sponsored by Special Olympics, the two teams of eight athletes on the Foxes bocce team hold regular practices and competitions – just like all of the high school interscholastic athletic teams.

Although students with disabilities are included on interscholastic sports teams, they sometimes cannot fully take part. "This gives them the opportunity to participate in an entire sport, in every way with their peers," said life skills teacher and one of the Foxes bocce coaches Anna Hopper.

"They want to do something in school like everyone else."

According to senior Bailey Beal, who watched the Foxes bocce team compete from the stands, "These kids are the best!" She was excited about the great turnout for the first competition.

In the first match of the afternoon, it seemed as though the Shaler Area Titans were going to dominate. Then the Foxes came from behind in the final minutes to tie the match. The match went into overtime, but the Foxes couldn't hold on, and Shaler Area won. Between matches, the high school cheerleading squad performed cheers to help build the crowd's enthusiasm. Once again in the second match, Shaler Area led, but this time the Foxes came from behind, tied, and then defeated their opponent.

Senior Arky Hagan and freshman Jack Nury, both members of Best Buddies, were the announcers who provided the

play-by-play commentary for the home bocce matches. "I just wanted to help out," Jack said. "I thought it was great."

An officer of Best Buddies, Arky agreed, saying, "I thought it was really fun!"

NEW SUMMER PROGRAMS TO BOOST LEADERSHIP SKILLS

hat happens when you combine two widely popular and successful summer learning programs? You create a new learning opportunity that will Empower high school students with skills that last a lifetime! "One of the main purposes of the summer program is to help students learn to communicate well and network, and to help students learn to showcase their skills and talents."

Through a series of interactive, real-life experiences and professional exposure, Empower2018 will offer students the opportunity to learn and practice social, professional, and interpersonal skills. Attendees will also realize their leadership potential, step outside of their comfort zone, and step into their growth zone. "The skills they will acquire are universally coveted by today's employers, regardless of technical skill sets," Mrs. Gibson said.

She continued, "Our program is totally unique, especially in that it can be accessed by students from any school district."

Open to incoming 10th, 11th, and 12th graders, the 13-day comprehensive leadership program will include eight complete Dale Carnegie TrainingTM sessions. Dale Carnegie's "Skills for Success for Young Adults" focuses on five key areas that are



critical for future success. The comprehensive Empower2018 program will earn students two college credits.

A nine-day emerging leadership program is also available for 10th, 11th, and 12th graders that includes four modified Dale Carnegie Training sessions.

In addition to the Dale Carnegie classes, Empower will include a blend of workshops that focus on mindfulness, leadership, executive functioning skills, building a positive digital footprint, professional networking, and more. There will be keynote speakers, active sessions, and networking breakfasts in which the students will interact with professionals from a multitude of career paths in order to practice their new-found networking skills.

Fox Chapel Area High School junior Tori Crittendon, who has already signed up for the summer program, anticipates that it will help her be able to communicate better in a work environment and also help her feel more confident when interviewing and speaking with adults. "I think it's a good résumé builder and it will help me become a better leader. I will be learning things people don't learn until they're actually in a work environment," she said. Freshman Xavier Perry agreed saying that he anticipates the program will help him learn leadership skills that will enable him to be the best that he can be, while still helping others realize their potential for success.

Need-based financial aid is available for the Empower2018 program and there are discounts for families enrolling more than one child. Enrollees also receive a 50 percent discount on the career-related summer Fox Chapel Area Online (FCAO) courses, College and Career Essentials and SAT Prep. The Empower program was developed by Mrs. Gibson; Fox Chapel Area High School Lead Principal Michael Hower; Fox Chapel Area High School social studies teacher Lesley Cowles, Ed.D.; and Fox Chapel Area School District's Online Learning Coordinator Randi Leonard.

Also associated with Empower2018 is FIRST STEP, a five-day preparatory program specifically designed for incoming Fox Chapel Area High School freshmen. Students will practice academic strategies for success including understanding the importance of their cyber profile, discovering their leadership potential, experiencing the value of teamwork, and identifying and utilizing quality resources. Additionally, students will acquire personal, interpersonal, organizational, and learning skills and strategies enabling success in high school and beyond.

"FIRST STEP Empower2018 will focus on the necessities of high school transition, learning skill-sets, thinking strategies and executive functioning skills, and intrapersonal & interpersonal leadership skills," according to high school social studies teacher Lesley Cowles, Ed.D., who is the program's coordinator.

KERR BOOSTER PROMOTES **POSITIVE BEHAVIOR**

err Elementary School third-fifth grade students were treated to a spring booster thanks to the Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) staff and student committees. On February 23, students participated in rock painting and team-building activities, and watched videos created by their fellow students.

The videos, part of the Kerr Kids Care Video Series, featured topics such as dignity, the golden rule, random acts of kindness, and empathy. They were shown to the students and teachers then facilitated discussions on the positive concepts addressed in the videos.

The rock painting was part of the school's "Kerr Kindness Rocks" initiative. The rocks have been placed outside of teacher Stan Strzempek's room as part of a special garden. "When a student is looking for a little positive encouragement, they may visit the garden and take a rock. When he or she no longer needs that rock, they may leave it in the community for others to find, thus paying it forward," Mr. Strzempek said. The idea was the

INDOOR TRACK & FIELD MAKES STRIDES AS **INTERSCHOLASTIC SPORT**

ven though it's called "indoor" track, chances are you'll often see members of the Foxes' winter team braving the elements as they traverse local neighborhoods or, as long as conditions permit, training outside on the high school's track and field. They don't seem to mind the elements too much, nor does coach Tom Moul, who often runs alongside his athletes.

Coach Moul, also a science teacher at the high school, founded the team as a club sport in 2011, and continues to lead it in its second year as a school-sanctioned interscholastic sport. The transition has not changed the opponents they face, but it has eliminated the athletes having to pay meet fees on their own and find transportation to and from competitions. But, even better for the team as a whole, their new status has produced increased commitment among the student-athletes, as well as spurred membership to its highest levels ever.

"Kids are now attracted to the program because, as an interscholastic sport,





it allows them to compete officially, earn athletic letters, and put their accomplishments on their college résumés," says Coach Moul, who also heads up the cross country and outdoor track teams. "Plus, I think many of them have had good success and experiences outdoors in either cross country or track and want to continue training. Of course that's something we, as coaches, encourage, especially for distance runners because their program is designed for them to go from one season to the next, and then peak in mid-May for the WPIAL championships."

If their record-breaking times are any indication, the athletes are way ahead of schedule and week-by-week are shattering more and more records.

Senior Andrew Jeffrey broke the school indoor record in the 60-meter dash, and the boys' 1,600-meter relay team of senior Ben Kronman, junior Korey Simmons, sophomore Evan Kieffer, and freshman Jaques Moye, also made school history this season when they broke the previous indoor record. Additionally, the 4 x 200-meter relay team of Andrew, Ben, Evan, and senior Ryan Weinberger also broke a school indoor record.

The girls also had great success in 2018 and broke a number of school records of their own. Sophomore

Maddy Kieffer broke the record in the 400-meter dash twice, and junior Erasmia Yager set a new shot-put record. The 1,600-meter and 4 x 200-meter relay teams of juniors Abby Baldauf, Marissa Hardiman, and Carolyn Veith, along with Maddy, also made history by setting new school records. So did junior Sarena Seeger (in the 1,600-meter; the 3,000-meter; and the 3,200-meter). Sarena also helped break the record as part of the 3,200-meter relay and the distance medley relay teams that also included junior Annika Urban and sophomores Brooke Krally and Grace Sisson.

The entire crew of record-breaking athletes advanced to the Tri-State Track & Field Coaches Association (TSTCA) meet, including sophomore Christian Fitch, who qualified in the 3,000-meter run, had a great breakout year as a freshman in 2017, and is exceeding expectations again this year. The TSTCA event, which was held February 17 at Edinboro University, is the equivalent of the WPIAL championships in other sports.

At the TSTCA meet the following students medaled: Christian (second place), Sarena (fourth place), Grace (sixth place), and Annika (eighth place) - 3,000-meters; Sarena (fourth place) and Grace (sixth place) - mile; and Andrew (eighth place) – 60-meters.

Based on their times during the season, Sarena and Grace both qualified in the mile for the state meet that was held February 25 at Penn State. This is the first time since it became a schoolsponsored sport that the team has sent representatives to states.

"It was great that Sarena and Grace qualified," says Coach Moul. "They fed off each other and pushed themselves the entire time and had a great race. Sarena isn't even a miler normally, so that makes her performance even more impressive."

"I think the transition into an interscholastic sport at Fox Chapel Area High School certainly has helped by virtue of continuity and what's best for their progress," continues Coach Moul. "Moreover, there is a certain group of kids who absolutely love track and field and love to compete. This gives them the opportunity to do that, while also developing the camaraderie that goes along with being on a team."

Senior thrower Seth Bowman agrees. "We spend so much time together while we're traveling to meets that can be up to two hours away - and then we're there for up to eight hours. That has created a really tight-knit group where we're all working toward a common goal and it's fun because we always cheer each other on."
