# Class of 2022 **4-Year Graduation Rate for** Attending & Accountable Students

**Attending:** All students that attended JDHS, excluding out of district placements and full time UCVTS students.

- Total Graduates: 105 of 109 Students
- Graduation Rate: 96.3%
- Above 95% for past 6 years
- Above 96% for four of the past five years

Accountable: All high school students that the district is accountable for.

- Total Graduates: 112 of 121 Students
- Graduation Rate: 93%

Note: Difference in graduate numbers is comprised of 5th year students and students in out of district placements eligible to remain in school.





Class of 2022 (4 Year Attending)

- Students who met the state assessment-related graduation requirement in both English Language Arts and Math: **108**
- Students who met one or more of the state assessment requirement through the alternative assessment process: 24

# Class of 2021 5-Year Graduation Rate for Attending & Accountable Students

- Total Graduates: 180 of 180 Students
- Graduation Rate: 100%

Accountable: All high school students that the district is accountable for.

- Total Graduates: 193 of 194 Students
- Graduation Rate: 99.5%

# **Special Education Parent** Advisory Group (SEPAG)

Special Education Parent Advisory Groups (SEPAGs) are required for all school districts in New Jersey. The purpose of these groups is to provide opportunities for parents and community members to offer input to their districts on critical issues relating to students with disabilities.

New Jersey Administrative Code states: Each board of education shall ensure that a special education parent advisory group is in place in the district to provide input to the district on issues concerning students with disabilities. 6A:14-1.2(h)







Parents of students with special needs are encouraged to participate in this group to share ideas, provide input, and foster a relationship of collaboration and open communication with the district's Department of Special Services.
