### TRAC Teamwork · Regulation · Awareness · Community

In April, we are continuing our work with Relationship Skills. We are taking a deep dive into Friendship and what healthy friendships look like and feel like. Students are assessing themselves on the type of friend they are currently, and setting goals for the kind of friend they would like to be. Within the scope of friendship, we will be looking at how situations/disagreements escalate and the steps/signs of the escalation. Then we will reverse the steps and focus on how to de-escalate common situations. We will also touch on "size of the problem and size of the reaction", as these are common sources of disagreement and hurt feelings within friendships. My main focus throughout this unit is what I can do within my own control in order to have healthier and more meaningful friendships, rather than trying to change the other person. This will lead us into our last unit of the year which is Responsible Decision Making.

## KIDS' CORNER FIFTH GRADE WATER WARRIORS

On Wednesday, March 15th, 2023, I, along with six of my classmates and our inspiring class teacher, Ms. Conn went to Encinitas City Hall to advocate about water conservation. We made our presentation to the City Council and the San Dieguito Water District Board. We took turns presenting about how people use water in our city, ways in which water is wasted, and how everyone as a community could save more water. We presented data from research we conducted on water use during hand washing in our school, as well as an experiment to test for leaky toilets in our homes. We offered suggestions about water conservation based on these data.



The Water District Board members told us that they appreciated our presentation and that we actually taught them about how to do a home test for a leaky toilet—it was so neat to teach grown ups something new! In case you are interested in doing the test yourself, the procedure involves putting easter egg dye in your toilet tank and waiting to flush for 12 hours. If the toilet bowl water is the color of the dye after the wait time, then you, my friend, have a leaky toilet! To prepare for this important presentation, we presented our slides to our class, and they gave us pointers on how we could make our slides and speeches better. The whole class helped us finalize our final draft, and I just want to thank everyone who helped us prepare.

For each of us, this was the first time we had spoken about an important topic to policy makers and we are so proud to have had the opportunity to do that, and to make a difference in our community. Our families came to watch, support us, and take billions of photos. I'm really proud of us as a team, and I believe that anyone can help -even a group of kids in elementary school (in this case the best elementary school in the world) to change our society for the better!
