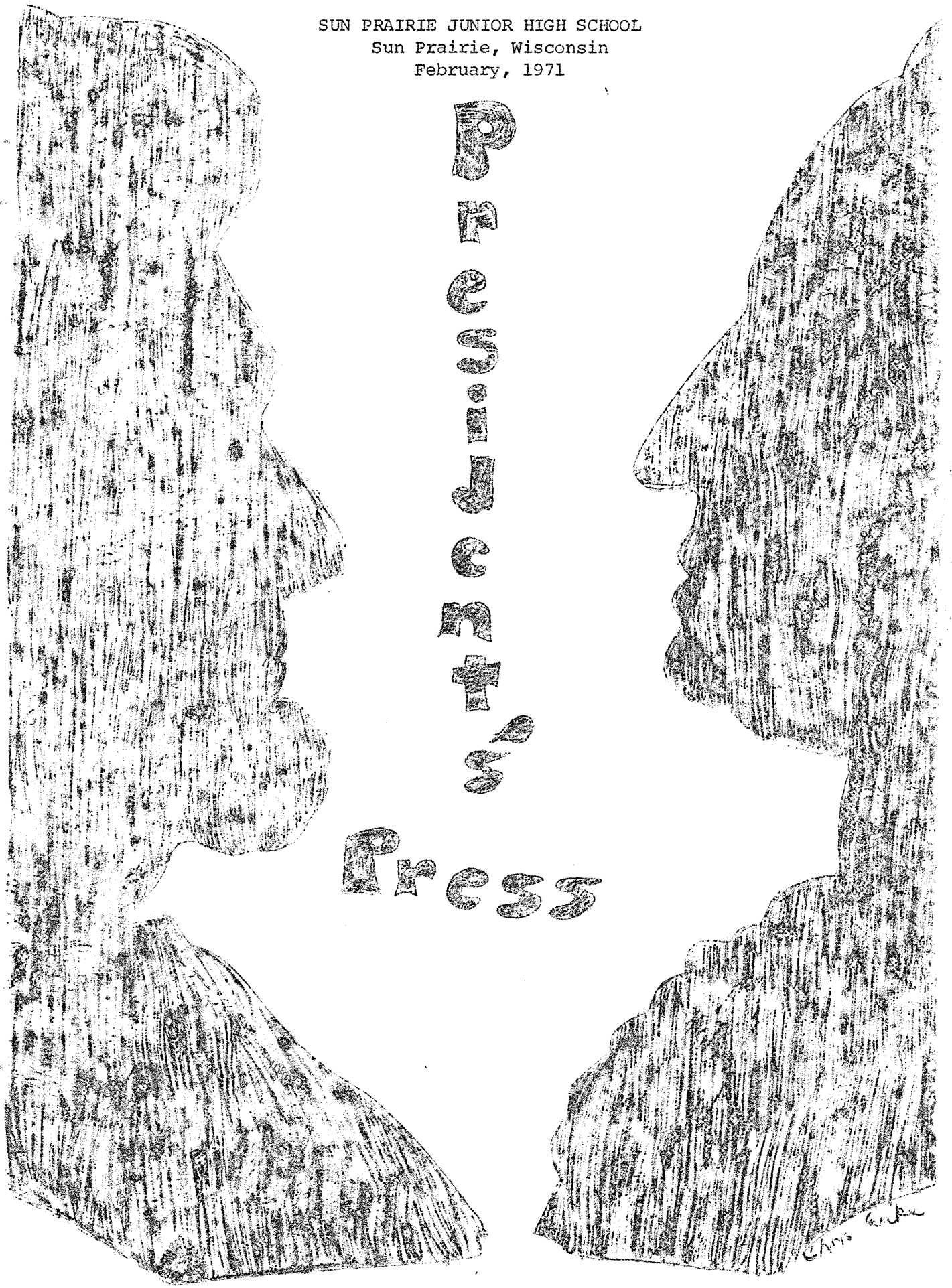

OUR QUESTIONS ANSWERED

I interviewed Mr. Ferriter recently and asked him, among other things, about buses sponsored by parents to take students to away games. He said that there were many factors making this nearly impossible. Buses can be rented from the bus company by anyone, but the people that ride the bus are only insured while they're on the bus. If an accident should happen while the students were off the bus, the blame would fall on the sponsors. Also, very few schools have the capacity for the students that would want to go. Mr. Ferriter mentioned that when wrestlers or basketball players go to other schools, this is counted as part of the school day. This would not hold true for students. Buses are not available until 4:15, so when students got to a game, it would be almost over.

Another question I asked Mr. Ferriter was, "Why is there a Raider Rap group when we have a Student Council?" To answer this, I was invited to attend a meeting of the Raider Rap group. I found that there is a need for both groups. The Student Council is the law-making body of the school, and its atmosphere is like that of a law-making body. The Raider Rap group is a discussion group. The members create a relatively free atmosphere, easy for discussion. These two groups are striving to work with each other, and to bring the faculty and the student body together.

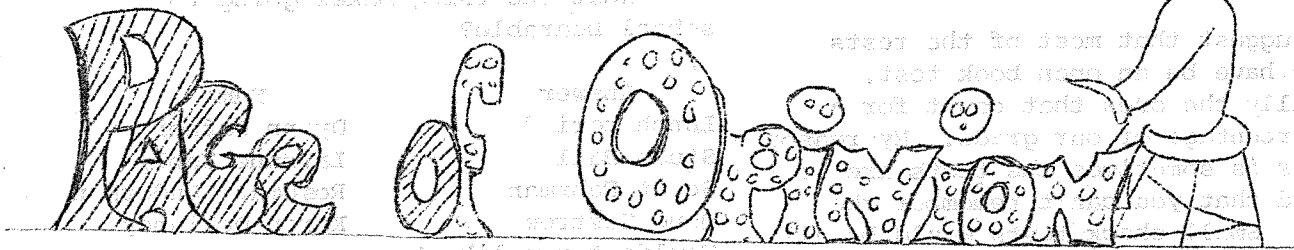
BACKFLIPS, ANYONE?
