

## Warren Students Participate in Discover Manufacturing Contest

Eight students from around Washington County participated in the first Discover MFG! Contest in honor of Manufacturing Day 2020. Warren High School, Waterford High School, and Williamstown High School had students join in, and they had 1 week to complete the design challenge. Sponsored by Appalachian Ohio Manufacturers Coalition (AOMC), the contest was meant to increase high school students' knowledge of local manufacturing careers. Building Bridges to Careers (BB2C) hosted this pilot event and coordinated the contest. and AOMC would like to support more contests around the region this school year.

Since the biggest limiting factor to all events this year has been COVID-19, BB2C decided to hold a 3D design contest in which each contestant would be tasked with designing a part that could help combat the spread of the virus. The BB2C Makerspace had fielded several requests for free-standing plastic barriers and recognized the need for a way to easily and quickly join plexiglass panels together. This was the perfect task for the competition and students were not only

judged on the quality of their designs but also by the ease in which these parts could be manufactured.

The results were nothing short of amazing. Every student's design could have easily been used in the field, which made it very difficult to choose the top 3 winners. In the end, Warren Local students Will Randall, Reed Collins, and Matthew Rauch walked away with \$200 cash, a new 3D printer, and an Oculus virtual reality headset, respectively. (Pictured below)

Unfortunately, we were unable to make the annual Madrigal Dinner happen this year because of COVID restrictions, but we look forward to bringing that event to you again next year.



#### Give Your Child's Eyes a Screen-Time Break: Here's Why...

Children spend more time than ever staring at digital screens—on computers, tablets, TVs, smartphones, and other devices. All that screen time can take a toll on a child's wellbeing, including how their eyes may feel. Staring at a screen for long stretches without taking breaks can cause symptoms such as eye fatigue, blurry vision, and dry eyes. Although children's screen time will understandably increase during the COVID-19 pandemic, the American Academy of Pediatrics encourages parents to do their best to help keep

## **COVID-19 Guidance**

We are all working to keep our students in school. We rely on our parents partnering with us in helping to protect the school community. Below is guidance for some common situations.

#### If a Member of Your Household Is Being Tested for COVID-19

If a member of your household is being tested for COVID-19, ALL students in the home should participate in school virtually and not come into the facility, including sports practices/games, until all test results for the other household member are received, even if they are not having symptoms.

Families should contact the school nurse if your child or a member of the household is being tested. Communications regarding the results should be shared with the school nurse as well. some balance between the digital and real world. Children frequently get so absorbed in what they're doing that they don't notice symptoms of eye strain. Remind them to take breaks. The American Optometric Association recommends the 20/20/20 rule: look away from the screen every 20 minutes, focus on an object at least 20 feet away, for at least 20 seconds. In addition, children should walk away from the screen for at least 10 minutes every hour. A simple timer can help your child remember, and there are even software programs that can help by turning off the screen in regular intervals.



## **USDA Department of Defense Fruit and Vegetable Program**

Warren Local Food Service has chosen to participate in the USDA Department of Defense Fruit and Vegetable Program. USDA DoD Fresh is a partnership between USDA and the Department of Defense (DoD) Defense Logistics Agency (DLA). This program leverages DoD's procurement system to provide a variety of nutritious U.S.-grown fresh fruits and vegetables to schools. **How Does It Work?** Schools receive two types of support from the USDA. The majority of the support is provided in the form of cash reimbursement for the meals served. The second form of support is the ability to order foods that USDA purchases ("USDA Foods") which can make up about 15-20% of the value of the food served in the National School Lunch Program. USDA DoD Fresh is one option that schools can use to spend their entitlement. All produce is required to be grown in the United States.

# Ohio Traffic Laws for a School Zone

Ohio law provides for special rules regarding school zones in the state. These laws spell out precisely what can be considered a school zone, how school zones are marked, the rules that drivers must follow and the penalties drivers face for breaking the state's traffic laws regarding school zones.

Special speed limits are allowed near schools in Ohio. According to Revised Code 4511.21, the speed limit in school zones in the state is 20 mph during school recess and during the opening and closing hours

of schools. Signs designating the start of the school zone are required for the speed limit to be enforceable. Signs indicating the end of the school zone are optional. Signage does not need to include flashing lights, and it also does not need to identify the hours during which the school zone speed limit is in effect.

School zones are allowed only in areas where there is a school that is chartered with the state or a non-chartered school that is approved through the state department of education. School zones do not apply to private daycare facilities when they are not chartered with the state or otherwise approved as meeting Ohio minimum standards. School zones can apply to colleges and universities.

School zones are only allowed in certain geographic areas. They are only in effect for 300 feet before and after a given point. The point can be the school property line, the school building line or a school crosswalk location. The person in charge of roadways for the jurisdiction makes the determination of which point to use for measuring the start and stop point of school zones in Ohio.

A minor misdemeanor speeding offense in Ohio carries a



maximum possible penalty of \$150 plus court costs. Speeding in a school zone receives twice the regular penalty in some counties; thus, speeding in a school zone could warrant a penalty of as much as

\$300 plus court costs. If you are going above 35 mph in a school zone when children are on recess or coming or going from school, then you may be charged with a fourth-degree misdemeanor punishable with up to 30 days in jail and a fine of up to \$250. Speeding violations in Ohio also result in points being added to a driver's license. Points remain on your license for two years. Points for speeding are based on the number of miles per hour over the speed limit the driver is going. If you reach 12 points in a two-year period, the state suspends your driving privileges for six months.

This comes as a result of the lack of larger format artwork and the use of drawing pads and digital format assessments. As with any setback, we can look forward to brighter days and the return of the traditional art exhibits at Warren Local Schools. The students have adapted, the teachers are working beyond personal capacity, and we are dealing with the hand that is dealt to us. With this said, we will be back and stronger in the end.






