The 2020 school year is definitely one that we will not forget due to the challenges associated with COVID-19!

The students are doing a great job wearing their masks and following school protocols to assist in keeping everyone as healthy as possible. It is our priority to keep students and staff safe during this time of uncertainty. Here are a few reminders:

Please remember to check your student's temperature every morning before they leave the home, and keep your student home if their temperature is over 100 degrees. Please do not give your child fever reducing medications such as Tylenol (acetaminophen) or Motrin (ibuprofen) before school. If students require these medications, please keep them home for the day. Random temperatures will be checked in the building daily.

Please also screen your child for symptoms of illness, and keep the student home if they are not feeling well. Students who report to their teacher that they are not feeling will be checked by the nurse/office staff and likely sent home. Please make sure that you are able to promptly pick up your student. This is a year that we must be extremely cautious with illness.

If your child or someone in your house is ill with symptoms of COVID-19, has been diagnosed with COVID-19, has been tested for COVID-19 and is waiting on results, or has been determined to be a close contact of a person with COVID-19, please keep your child home and contact the school nurse for information on returning to school. This includes all siblings who attend WLS. If your child is at

school when information regarding COVID-19 is received, please contact the school nurse immediately.

Please have your child wear a clean mask each school day. Reusable masks should be washed daily. We encouraged parents to place a back-up mask in the student's backpack. If you are unable to purchase a mask, contact the school nurse.

If your child is displaying COVID-19 symptoms at school, he/she will need to wait in a protective isolation area until picked up (within the hour). Please make sure you have a current phone number on file and secondary emergency contact to pick up your child. Sick children **cannot** ride the bus due to possible exposure to others.

Working together, we can decrease the spread of this virus. Please do not hesitate to reach out to your school nurse if you have any questions or concerns. Our goal is to keep your child safe and healthy.



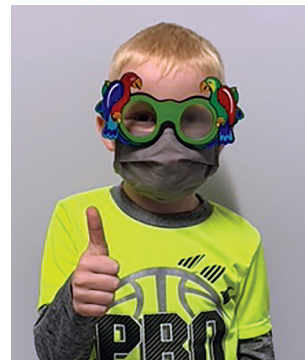
School Health Reminders

Vision and hearing screenings are being conducted by the school nurse for grades kg, 1, 3, 5, 7 (vision only), 9, and 11. Referral letters are mailed home for those

students who have difficulty with the vision or hearing screening. If you receive a referral letter, please let us know if your child was seen by the eye doctor and the results of the exam. Because vision can affect learning, it is important that students who need glasses wear them while in school. If you need assistance in finding an eye doctor or financial assistance for glasses, please contact the school nurse. If your student is currently learning virtually, please contact the school nurse for a hearing and vision screening appointment.

If your child has a new medical diagnosis that requires management at school, please call and update the school nurse.

November is National Diabetes Awareness Month! Some common symptoms of Type 1 Diabetes include the following; increased thirst and increased urination, feeling very hungry although you are eating, weight loss, fatigue, irritability or unusual behavior, and blurry vision. If you are concerned that your child may be showing symptoms of Type 1 Diabetes, please reach out to your medical provider immediately. 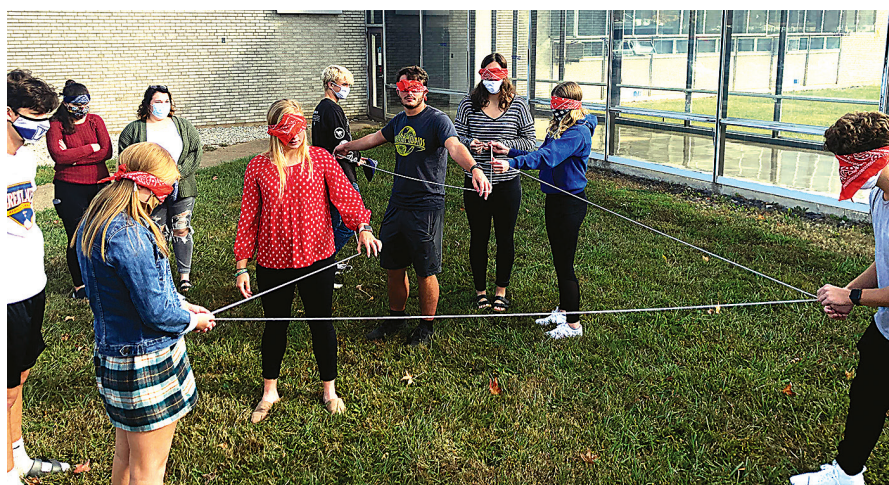

Through shared stories from our instructors and curriculum written through The Ohio State University, our students have gained the knowledge it takes

to be today's leaders. Currently, there are twelve juniors and seniors in the class; next semester, a new group will get the same experience. Students are chosen by a panel of building leaders based on their current leadership rolls, community involvement, and character. Future plans are to include sophomores and freshmen and start a primer class at the middle school level.

2020 was a historic season for head coach, Matt Kimes, and his Warrior football team. A shortened regular season due to the COVID-19 pandemic could not derail the Warriors from what was destined to be a special season. In the six-game regular season, the Warriors finished 5-1 and earned their first post-season appearance in program history. As an 8th seed and playoff host, the Warriors entered uncharted waters and defeated its opening round oppo-

nent, Columbus East, 45-0. This was followed by a dramatic 35-28 come-from-behind home win over perennial playoff team, John Glenn. Unfortunately, the Warriors playoff run ended the following week on the road at St. Clairsville as the hosts handed the Warriors a 26-0 defeat. The Warriors ended the season 7-2; the best record this century, and the first back-to-back winning seasons since the 1998 and 1999 campaigns.

Record Setters

Kurt Taylor rewrote the career records for a Warrior QB; passing yards (Career) 5,526, passing yards (Season) 2,682, passing yards (Game) 476, TD Passes (Career) 55, TD Passes (Season) 27, and TD Passes (Game) 7.

Evan Gandee ends his career with the following records; receptions (career) 174, receptions (season) 73, receptions (game) 19, receiving yards (career) 2,568, receiving yards (season) 1,039, and receiving TD's (career) 23.

The Warren volleyball team, led by first-year head coach Dan Proctor, capped off the 2020 campaign with a 1-1 finish in the post-season. The Warriors defeated McClain 3-0 in the first round before bowing out to top seed, Sheridan. The youthful squad finished with a 3-20 record.

Honors: Haylee Morgan (2nd Team ECOL & 3rd Team All-District) and Lakyn Ellenwood (Honorable Mention ECOL & 3rd Team All-District) garnered post-season honors for the Warriors.

CROSS COUNTRY

2020 was a season of dominance for the Warrior boys cross country team of first-year head coach, Ryan Werry, 2020 ECOL Coach of the Year. Led by Bryson Angelo, Brennan Perdue, Matthew Rauch, Justin Pate, and Andrew Vincent, the boys posted a 75-0 regular season record by finishing first as a team in all 9 races, including the ECOL championships. Junior, Bryson Angelo, joined an elite group of Warren runners by qualifying for the Ohio State Cross Country Championships to be held in Columbus.

The boys received various post-season honors: Bryson Angelo, Matthew Rauch, and Brennan Perdue - 1st Team ECOL & OVAC, and

All-District; Justin Pate - 2nd Team ECOL; and All-District; and Andrew Vincent - 2nd Team ECOL.

The girls cross country team and coach, Ryan Werry, enjoyed a very successful 2020 campaign with 8 Top 5 team finishes. Leading the ladies was Senior Allison Werry, who earned All-ECOL 1st Team, OVAC 1st Team, and All-District honors. Junior, Grace Randall, emerged as a Warrior stalwart, earning 2nd Team All-ECOL, 1st Team All-OVAC, and All-District honors.

7th Grade**

The 7th grade students are doing well and finishing up their personal websites. They coded everything from scratch in HTML to CSS language. We started with the very basics of just adding paragraphs and headings. Other areas included

learning to add images, videos, links to different pages or outside links, and changing the color of anything on their page. Some of the students will start moving on to learning to fly drones and code the drones to do a certain task just by hitting the start button. We will also start getting into our Cue Robots and learning how to code

with basic blocks. We will also jump into JavaScript Language.

My 8th graders started back with refreshers on JavaScript Coding. One of the main goals is to be able to have some kind of game they have created from scratch. First, the students had to review how to code in JavaScript and create a little

still scene. Now, they are all currently working on learning to make objects move on the screen with code to be able to create a game. Last week, we broke out the new Vex IQ robots and started to build those, as well.

**MR. REITER****7th Grade Manufacturing
Operations / 8th Grade
Engineering Principles**

The 7th grade Manufacturing Operations and the 8th grade Engineering Principles classes are off to a great start this school year. We have some new equipment, including two more MakerBot 3-D printers and a Universal 50W laser system. It will be a great year.

The 7th graders started the year examining careers through the Ohio Means Jobs website along

with the Ohio Readiness Seal for career readiness. Students studied basic safety as it relates to PPE (Personal Protective Equipment), ladder safety, blood borne pathogens, and fire extinguishers. Currently, students are studying measurements from a tape measure and

dial calipers.

The 8th graders also examined the Ohio Readiness Seal and moved on to safety topics for hydraulics/pneumatics, electricity, and PPE. From there, they completed a refresher on reading a tape measure and reading a dial caliper. We are now into the main subjects of the class; electricity, mechanisms, hydraulics, pneumatics, and solar power. These subjects are taught via industrial type training lab stands. It will be a great year, because we have great students!



MR. REITER**Industrial Arts (STEM/STEAM)**

The start of the 2020-2021 school year found the start of a new program for our 5th and 6th graders. The class is titled, Industrial Arts, but in reality, it is a STEM class, which stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math. To be even more accurate, the acronym for Warren Middle School is

STEAM; with the importance of Art added.

With the aid of a *Teacher Geek Maker Cart*, the students in this six-week class are given a problem and basic build instructions. They are then tasked with solving the problem in the most creative way possible. This may sound crazy, but emphasis is put on failure and the importance of identifying the

source of the failure in order to make it better; certainly a huge life lesson in itself. Topics include gears, pulleys, wind power, hydraulics, and other topics that support learning in science and mathematics.

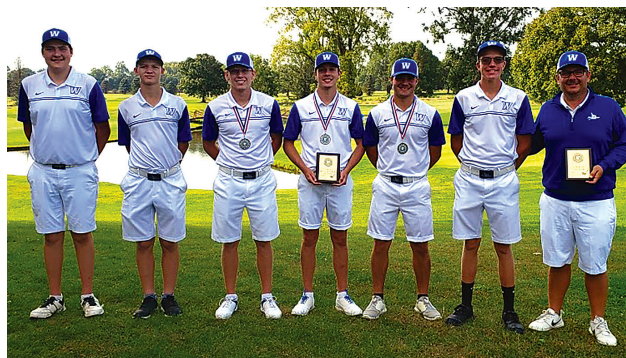

The Warrior boys golf team won the 2020 sectionals with a team score of 324. Seth Dennis was a medalist with a 77, and Caleb Davis was runner-up with a 78. Rounding out the scoring for the Warriors: Chance Weihl - 80, Edward Kehl - 89, and Nathan Heft - 92. This victory put the Warriors

into the D-I district tournament at Eaglesticks Golf Club for the seventh straight year. At the district tournament, the Warrior team finished third, missing the state tournament by 14 shots.

Seth Dennis finished as a medalist runner-up with a 3 over 73; this placed him in the OHSA State Tournament for the second year in a row. Seth finished T45/72 with scores of 86 and 78 at the state tournament.
