

Coordinator's Corner

Hicksville Public Schools Partnership with Latinos in Action

Hicksville Public Schools has partnered with the Latinos in Action (LIA) Organization to offer ELLs in secondary schools an elective course that addresses the student as a whole, tying academics, leadership, and self-development into a single program. Using an asset-based model allows the class structure to focus on students' strengths instead of their weaknesses. This unique approach empowers our students to focus on four pillars: leveraging personal and cultural assets, excelling in education, serving the community, and developing leadership skills. In order to achieve its programmatic goals, the course considers the organization of diverse committees where students will apply leadership skills, participate in various extracurricular activities, and tutor students within the district's elementary bilingual program.

Instruction is organized into four essential components:

Essential 1: The 30/40/30 model strategically structures the student make-up of the class:

- o 30% High Achievers Expanding, Commanding, and Former ELLs
- 40% The Invisible High Emerging and Transitioning ELLs
- o 30% Untapped Potential Entering and Low Emerging ELLs

Essential 2: The Elementary Partnership pairs participating secondary students one-on-one with a struggling student at a nearby elementary school to provide targeted assistance in core subjects (primary literacy), and serve as role models and mentors.

Essential 3: The Leadership Structure provides each student the opportunity to hold a leadership position and meet during the LIA class period to develop their abilities and the necessary self-confidence to organize, plan, and lead. LIA leadership is organized into two groups: the presidency and the committees. This leadership structure assists the LIA teacher in guiding the vision for the program, motivation for other students, and proper planning and execution of all activities.

Essential 4: LIA curriculum is culturally responsive with the goal of attaining college and career readiness and is also aligned with CASEL's five Social Emotional Learning competencies. The curriculum offers high-quality instruction on postsecondary education readiness, personal development, social and emotional learning, professionalism, and an exploration of one's cultural heritage.

Free Curriculum Resource for Teachers of ELLs

NYC Poison Control Center (PCC) educators presented a L.I. RBERN Tune in Tuesday Webinar about how teachers of English Language Learners can use the Poison Prevention and Medicine Safety Program to teach ELLs about potentially dangerous real-world situations. This ready-made curriculum engages ELLs in English language development practices through multiple modalities such as, role-playing, vocabulary building, as well as listening and speaking, and has been adapted by the PCC to meet the needs of ELLs at differing education levels from elementary through adult and proficiency levels from Entering through Commanding.

The materials linked below include editable Powerpoint presentations for use during instruction, lesson plans, activity recommendations, and materials including reading passages, activity sheets, and links to videos and resources. This curriculum is a perfect addition to the Stand-alone ENL classroom, focusing on authentic experiences that teach ELLs vital information about medicine safety and poison prevention as well as offering the opportunity to engage in multiple-modality activities.
