4 Pirate Pride School's guest readers help 'spark' students' love of books

When the staff at Iddings Elementary School decided to participate in the national program "One School, One Book" this fall, they enlisted the help of some local heroes.

Members of the Merrillville Fire Department jumped at the chance to be a part of a program that educates families and schools on the benefits and importance of reading aloud.

"Being part of the community is very important to us and our department," said Capt. Phil Hasier. "What better way than to engage kids, especially at a time when teachers are struggling to be creative with all the different challenges they faced over the last year or so. So why not help out in some small way when it comes to educating our children?"

Merrillville firefighters embarked on the creation of seven videos to kick off each week of reading the book "Charlotte's Web" for the school. Each video featured a firefighter reading a chapter

within the context of their own jobs.

Capt. Hasier credited Lt. Scott Molchan as the creative genius behind the videos.

"He pitched the idea to have different backgrounds," Capt. Hasier said. "Anyone can sit in a chair and read. What's special about a fireman reading to kids? He said 'let's put some of our stuff in the background,' and he just kept going."

In the video series, Lt. Molchan read his chapter from on top of a fire engine; Firefighter Nick Vansipma read from atop an extended aerial ladder in front of the station; Firefighter/Paramedic Adrienne Hammerstein read her chapter from the inside of an ambulance; and Firefighter Jason Coin read from a building that appears to be "burning" using video special effects.

Lt. Molchan is featured in another video where he starts to read a chapter while dressed in diving gear and "magically" changes into regular clothes when he realizes no one would be able to hear him through his scuba mask.

"We really appreciated the MFD taking the time to engage our students in reading 'Charlotte's Web," said Michelle Coughlin, principal of Iddings Elementary School. "They have been so creative and allowed our students to see different aspects of the fire department that they may not have seen before. The students watched these videos in the classroom and really enjoyed seeing community members reading to them."

Elementary school resource officer Det. Cpl. Allison Ellis and Heather Ulrich from the school corporation's central office staff, who doubles as a

Marsha Pierson hasn't always been the office manager/secretary to the principal at MHS that most people know today.

When she started with the school corporation in August 1992, she worked at John Wood Elementary School in daycare and also as a recess aide. After about four years, she moved to Pierce.

"We have some of the best employees around," she said. "Helpful, hardworking, and compassionate. I also have to mention our administrators are top notch. They expect you to perform at your best, but they also entertain us with their silliness and interactions with one another.

"We work hard, then we stop for a few minutes, listen to a funny story, share a giggle, then back to work," Mrs. Pierson continued. "Our days go by quickly. We are not just coworkers, we are family. I have two sons of my own, but now, I also have a work daughter."

To her, the summer of 2020 served as a prime example of just how amazing her coworkers are.

"Our admins pulled together and worked tirelessly to empty every student locker, package all the books, and label them for pick up," she said. "No air conditioning, just a lot of sweat equity. No complaining, just doing what needed to be done.

"They also spent 12 hours a day, over four days, sitting in the sun trying to give our grads of 2020 the feel of graduation by creating a stage, passing out programs, and posing with the grads for pic-



tures," Mrs. Pierson continued. "The people at MHS really do care about the kids."

After a MCSC career spanning more than three decades, she has set her sights to retire in April 2023. Mrs. Pierson plans to travel with her best friend, her husband, and never again set an alarm.

Entrance/reception area changes for high school visitors

The project has been the topic of discussion for a while, but the opportunity to tackle it came last summer.

The whole project took about six weeks, and the entrance was ready for the first day of school last August!

Transportation adds tracking, contact tracing technology

Parents, if your children ride the school bus, you'll soon be able to tell when they are physically on the bus and when they will arrive home!

The Merrillville Community School Corporation has invested in transporta-

tion technology that will increase the safety of all riders and bring peace of mind to parents. All buses will soon be equipped with Bus Guardian, a technology that will assist with student tracking and contact tracing.

When children board the bus, they will swipe school-issued ID cards that allow drivers to know whether or not they are supposed to be at the stop or even on that particular bus.

On the way home, drivers will also be able to confirm that students disembark at the right stops. With the new technology, accurate ridership reports will be easy for administration to create.



Once the technology is ready to go, parents can download "Here Comes the Bus," a new app for their phones that will allow them to reference the whereabouts of their children.

Bus Guardian will really come in handy with substitute bus drivers and reliable contact tracing for COVID-19.

In addition to contact tracing, the Transportation Department can use the software to create detailed inspection reports for cleaning and sanitizing buses, another important process that will keep everyone safe!

School administrators hope for the software to be up and running next month! Stay tuned for updates!

High school readies welding program for growth

After a school year that challenged both students and teachers with virtual and blended learning, more than 100 Merrillville High School students requested welding classes during the 2021-22 school year, nearly double that of previous years for the school's Career and Technical Education (CTE) program.

Students were ready to get back to hands-on learning, and the recently completed classroom renovation is now primed to accommodate the increasing number of students.

The \$79,000 construction project took place over the last several months, adding student workstations, improvements to shop ventilation, electrical, five new multi-function machines and fume extractors. A Perkins Grant along with funding awarded by the Hobart Redevelopment Commission covered approximately \$45,000 worth of equipment upgrades.


"As a district, we are committed to improving the welding lab for the students," said Bob Phelps, director of technology and CTE. "We increased our capacity to serve our students by removing outdated equipment and adding five more welding bays with new multi-process welders. The students now train in a cleaner, safer lab that meets our post-secondary and industry partners' expectations."

Historically, the introductory class of 12 students required them to take turns welding, but that process made it difficult to satisfy the hands-on requirements for dual credit or the Department of Education curriculum, according to Joe Sokol, MHS welding educator.

"With the expansion of the welding facilities, all of the students can have access to a machine for their entire class period," he said. "Since we offer four welding classes a day, we will be able to accommodate 48 students per trimester."

The Welding II class that maxed out at seven students can now accommodate 12 students.

The MHS welding program will increase dual credit participation during this school year, which means students

will not only earn credit toward their high school diploma, but will also earn credit toward college or trade school, giving them a jumpstart on their future education. In addition, the program will increase the number of welder certifications issued to students.

"We are setting the groundwork to begin implementing the Next Level Programs of Study (NLPS) curriculum in the fall of 2022," Mr. Sokol said.

He added that those requirements will focus on a greater concentration within the CTE Pathways.

"That means transitioning from Welding I and Welding II into specific areas of knowledge," he said. "After completing the Principles of Welding course, students will move into concentrators: Shielded Metal Arc Welding (SMAW) and Gas Arc Welding (GMAW & FCAW).

"Students will gain a deeper understanding of specific welding processes," he continued. "They will be able to pursue more welding qualifications, which will increase their employability and help build a professional resume of skills." He added that as the MHS program continues to grow, so do the relationships it builds with manufacturers and suppliers in Northwest Indiana who seek skilled employees.

"On any given day you can walk in and see Merrillville students of all skill levels on their way to becoming certified welders while still in high school," Mr. Phelps said. "By providing those students with great instruction and professional equipment, we are setting them up for success."

Mr. Sokol began his third year at Merrillville High School this fall. MHS CTE Assistant Principal Mike Knocke credits the educator for the success of the program.

"Mr. Sokol is an enthusiastic teacher who cares deeply about his program and his students," Mr. Knocke said. "He is constantly looking for innovative ways to build up student engagement and is always willing to come in to help our students.

"When you get a teacher that offers

Mr. Sokol even worked over the

The teacher combined his love for education and technical crafts into a welding education career at MHS. After 14 years as a mathematics teacher, he changed careers.

"I pursued a new career in structural steel fabrication," Mr. Sokol said. "I served as a quality control/quality assurance manager, where I earned credentials as a Certified Welding Inspector and Certified Welding Educator.

"I also acquired welding qualifications and certifications in specific processes and positions," he added.

After several years in the QA/QC role, he was intrigued by an opening at Merrillville High School.

"The more I thought about coming back to the profession in a new capacity, the more excited I was at the opportunity," he said. "I am looking forward to building an amazing program for our students."
