

Black History Month celebration grows bigger, better

At the Merrillville Community School Corporation, Black History Month provides a great opportunity to celebrate one of the corporation's best features: diversity.

Last month, Merrillville schools incorporated lessons on Black history, introducing students to notable figures, events, music, art, and literature.

This year, student lessons spilled over school borders and into the public eye when the Merrillville Town Council invited students to share some of their Black History Month projects at both of their February meetings.

At the Town Council's first meeting of the month, the Merrillville High School Vocalteens performed African American spirituals such as "Wade in the Water" and "Every Time I Feel the Spirit."

At the Town's second meeting, nine students from Merrillville Intermediate School presented their research and projects on famous figures in Black history.

MIS student Christen Crayton led the presentation with some opening remarks: "'Why spotlight and study the history of Blacks in America?' and for that excellent question, I have several good answers."

She continued, talking about how African Americans have taken an active role in the development of the United States along with other races and nationalities.

"But the contributions of Blacks have been largely ignored or, in many cases, misrepresented," she added.

In addition, she pointed out America has a rich legacy of literature, music,

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Kindergarten preregistration for 2022-23 school year to begin April 4

Merrillville Community School Corporation will hold kindergarten preregistration online beginning April 4.

Parents with children age 5 either on or before Aug. 1, can preregister by visiting the corporation website www.mvsc.k12.in.us and entering the requested information. The last day for kindergarten preregistration is May 30.

Once parents preregister their children online, school staff will contact parents to schedule an appointment to come in and complete the registration process.

Parents will need to bring the following documents to their appointments: Certified birth certificate (exceptions for foster children); DCS foster information if applicable; immunization records; proofs of residency (refer to next page); parent/guardian current license or state ID; any or all documents that affect your child's educational placement (Example: IEP, 504 or Psychological Evaluation); copy of last report card or transcript, withdrawal grades, and ISTEP scores; Special Needs Transportation form (SNT) if applicable; and any legal or custodial papers, if applicable.

In order to attend Merrillville schools, families must live within the boundaries of Ross Township, which includes Merrillville and portions of Hobart and Crown Point.

available on the school corporation website.

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What can your school nurse do for your family?

Merrillville School Corporation employs registered nurses at all school buildings. School nurses hold various roles within their schools that benefit students, parents/guardians.

The National Association of School Nurses identifies seven core roles that the school nurse fulfills to foster child and adolescent health and education success.

- Direct care to students
- Leadership for the provision of health services
- Screenings and referrals for health conditions
- Promoter of a healthy school environment
- Promoter of health
- Leadership for health policies and programs
- Liaison between school personnel, family, health care professionals and the community.

After the child's home, their school represents the second most influential environment in a child's life. The role of the school nurse encompasses both health and educational goals.

Some students may face family crises, homelessness, immigration, poverty, and violence, which increases both their physical and mental health needs. School nurses need to be available to address these major health problems experienced by children.

Nurses provide preventive and screening services, health education and assistance with decision-making about health and immunizations against preventable diseases. In addition, school nurses may provide interventions for acute and chronic illness, injuries and emergencies, communicable diseases, obesity, substance use and abuse, adolescent pregnancy, mental health, dental and visual screening, nutrition, and sexually transmitted diseases.

Studies have shown improved student outcome results in schools with full-time nursing professionals.

The school nurse functions as a leader and the coordinator of the school health services team. The team may also include a licensed practical nurse, health aides, clerical staff, school counselors, school psychologist, and other professionals.

School nurses, as part of a coordi-

nated school health program, contribute to meeting the needs of the whole child, supporting their success in school.

Merrillville school nurses are here as an additional resource to assist parents and guardians and close that gap between home medical management and school medical management.

Work to begin on program audit

The Merrillville Community School Corporation will partner with Global Consulting Solutions (GCS), a local firm, to embark on a program audit.

A program audit is a comprehensive process that collects and analyzes data to determine the status of equitable practices in a school district.

The program audit will allow the school corporation to establish a baseline to create and build measurable strategic goals for improvement, plans of action, enhanced policies and practices, and establish mechanisms to consistently monitor and assess educational programs.

Milton Reed, GCS engagement and program manager, will help steer the process through the school corporation.

"I applaud district leadership, and I'm excited to embark on this journey with Merrillville Community School Corporation," said Mr. Reed. "For school districts to continue to make progress, it's important for the board and administrators to understand where things stand right now.

"From that vantage point, we can celebrate/magnify the wins and also address the challenges," he continued. "This work will be characterized by detailed data reviews, anonymous surveys, focus groups and interviews with all stakeholders represented. We know everyone will bring different backgrounds, information and perceptions to the table."

The audit is the first step in

developing the school corporation's strategic plan that will determine the priorities, goals and objectives for the next five years.

The audit will take approximately six to eight weeks and include, among many other things:

open and consistent communication with students, families and staff; site visits; focus groups; classroom walk-throughs; policy reviews and other forensic data analysis.

A random selection of families and students will receive invitations for participation and/or permission slips in the near future.

Mr. Reed said his company will generate a final report that will include findings, opportunities for growth, recommendations, commendations, resources and next steps for the school board and administrators to consider.

In closing, Mr. Reed said, "I look forward to meeting everyone and being a part of the team helping Merrillville schools chart the best path for their students over the next several years."

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statesmanship, courage, patriotism, art, philosophy, and aviation.



"I also plan to spend more time volunteering at Erin's Farm in Hobart and catching up on some reading," she added.



Thirty-four juniors inducted into National Honor Society





"I am proud to represent the Merrillville School Corporation, our present and past coaches and the thousands of athletes that I have had the pleasure to work for during my 44 years as an athletic administrator at Merrillville High School. I thank the Indiana Sports Hall of Fame committee for selecting me to be a proud member."

Though she's been athletic director for 40 years, Ms. Qualizza has been at Merrillville High School since 1978, starting her lengthy career as the assistant athletic director.

Ms. Qualizza was the first female athletic director of a Class 5A high school and the third female athletic director in the state of Indiana. She was also the first female to be voted onto the Indiana High School Athletic Association Board of Directors as a representative of a large school. She served on the IHSAA board for 20 years, the longest term ever held, and she also served on its financial committee.

Ms. Qualizza has been recognized extensively over her career. In 2017, she was named both the Athletic Administrator of the Year and Athletic Director

of the Year by the Indiana Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association.

Other recognitions over the years include District 1 Athletic Director of the Year in 2010, 2002, and 1991; recipient of the National Federation of State High School Associations Spirit of Sport Award, 2009: and National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association Dis-

tinguished Service Award, 2005.

"Janis is an amazing leader in her field, and she is very deserving of this wonderful honor," said Superintendent Nick Brown. "MHS has been blessed to have had her at the helm of its athletics program for so long. Being that March is Women's History Month, you can say she is a large part of Pirate athletics history, making a positive and lasting impact on the program."

Over the years, she developed many aspects of Merrillville High School's athletic program, including the Athlete and Coaches Halls of Fame; handbooks for athletes, coaches and trainers; the Merrillville Pirate Athletic Council; parent brochure; and more.

From 1988-1993, she was heavily involved in the \$55 million building proj-

ect at Merrillville High School that resulted in the school's state-of-the-art athletic facilities.

Ms. Qualizza was certified as an athletic administrator in 1998 and received her Indiana State principal's license in 2002. Prior to her athletic director roles, she spent a number of years teaching physical education/health and coaching at schools in Gary. She continued to coach at Merrillville through 1982.

Ms. Qualizza received her master's in secondary education from Indiana University Northwest and her bachelor's in physical education and health from Purdue University.



MHS Environmental Club makes a difference

Merrillville High School cafeterias have both moved to using reusable meal trays, thanks to the persistence and efforts of the MHS Environmental Club.

On the very first day of the change, the amount of trash collected from meals went from 10 to three bags! MHS administrators estimate that the change to resuables will reduce waste by 50%.

The high school cafeterias had been using single-use Styrofoam meal trays for years. With all of the other schools in the corporation using reusable meal trays, Environmental Club members decided it was time to ask the school corporation's Food Service Department if the high school could use reusable meal trays as well.

"I was excited and scared at the same time," said Food Service Director Angelica Claiborne. "Of course not using Styrofoam is better for the environment, but the high school has not used reusable trays in more than 10 years!"

With Food Service in agreement with their plan, Environmental Club members made a presentation to the Merrillville Community School Corporation Board of School Trustees in January to get their approval to make the change.

The benefits of using reusable trays include saving money, reducing waste, saving the environment and protecting wildlife.

According to their presentation, the school corporation already spent \$16,389 on foam trays this school year alone; meanwhile, 2,150 reusable trays were purchased for \$8,512.42, already saving money.

In addition, the corporation will create less garbage and save additional money on waste hauling.

Styrofoam is not recyclable in Northwest Indiana, and it takes around 500 years to decompose.

In addition, the process to make the Styrofoam produces hazardous waste and air emissions, and there is evidence that the material itself leaches toxins in hot food and drinks, according to the students' presentation.

In order to educate their fellow students on the new lunch procedures, Environmental Club members posted signage in the cafeterias and created announcements and an educational video on the Pirate News Network.
