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Dear Community,

It has been a long winter, and it is nice to finally have warmer weather and see our campus busy with outdoor activities and events. Spring sports are underway with practices and games, our musicians are rehearsing for the upcoming spring concert series, and students are preparing for end of the year exams. In addition, the roofing construction portion of our Phase VI capital project is well underway. The State Education Department is currently reviewing the architectural plans for the middle school reconstruction, and work is planned to begin next spring.

This May is our annual budget vote and Board of Education Election. The process for developing a school district budget is taken very seriously. A great deal of time has been spent reviewing all expenditures, looking for efficiencies and cost saving measures, assessing student and program needs and determining appropriate staffing. As a result, the Board of Education and the district have developed what we believe to be a fiscally sound budget to present to the community on May 16, 2023.

The proposed 2023-24 school budget of \$99,258,220, adopted by the Board of Education on April 11, 2023, reflects an increase of 4.75% over last year's budget and would mean a 2.77% increase in the tax levy, which is below the district's levy cap of 4.33%. This budget would result in an estimated tax rate increase of .42% for the town of Chili, an increase of 4.92% for the town of Ogden, a decrease of 2.98% for the town of Riga and a decrease of 5.07% for the town of Sweden, due to varied equalization rates (see chart on page 3).

The second proposition on the ballot will be the purchase of eight buses at an estimated cost of \$1,350,000.

The third proposition on the ballot is to authorize the purchase of the property located at 5788 Buffalo Road, near the high school, for a price not to exceed \$285,000. Purchasing this property would provide us with the needed space to create a new exit onto Buffalo Road resulting in a one-way onto campus and one-way exit. This improvement will enhance sight-distance and safety as drivers enter and exit our high school campus.

How we arrived at the budget

Two community budget forums and four Board of Education meetings were held that were dedicated to budget discussions. Principals, directors, instructional leaders and community members were consulted in this process. Each request was carefully analyzed to determine what should be included in the budget. The district worked hard to maintain appropriate class sizes, provide intervention services, address student social-emotional needs and place an emphasis on students' proficiency in English Language Arts and mathematics, including addressing learning loss due to the pandemic.

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Changes reflected in the proposed budget

- State aid
- Retirement salary savings
- Unfunded mandates
- Special Education costs
- Continuation of lottery-based UPK program
- Additional staffing:
 - HS counselor
 - HS physical education teacher
 - Elementary reading intervention teacher
 - Middle school aide
 - Part time district-wide school psychologist
- Maintaining Intervention ESOL, enrichment and social worker positions by utilizing federal funds

Three-Part Expenditure

New York State law requires that all school districts present the proposed budget in three parts that include: Program, Capital and Administrative. The law also states that these three-part expenditures of the budget must exclude propositions or voter-authorized adjustments.

Program

The Program component of the proposed budget includes expenses associated with instructional programs, teacher salaries and benefits, transportation, special education and community services.

Capital

The Capital component contains maintenance costs for buildings and grounds, custodial services, utilities, tax refunds and judgments, capital expenses and debt service.

Administrative

The Administrative component consists of costs associated with personnel, communications, BOCES administration, all administrators, financial and legal services, the Superintendent's Office and Board of Education expenditures.

Proposition 1: Budget


Voters will decide whether to approve the proposed budget of \$99,258,220 as presented by our Churchville-Chili Board of Education for the 2023-24 school year.

Proposition 2: Bus Purchase

Voters will decide on a resolution authorizing the district to purchase eight 66-passenger school buses at an estimated maximum cost of \$1,350,000.

Proposition 3: Capital Reserve

Voters will decide on a resolution authorizing the district to purchase the property located at 5788 Buffalo Road (adjacent to the high school) for a price not to exceed \$285,000.

Voter qualifications

In order to vote you must be:

- A United States citizen.
- At least 18 years of age.
- A resident of the Churchville-Chili Central School District for at least 30 days prior to the vote.

Absentee ballots

Residents unable to vote because of disabilities, illness, travel or other reasons listed as valid under election law, may request applications for absentee ballots by downloading the application from our website, contacting the District Clerk at 293-1800, extension 2300 or in person at our administrative offices located at 139 Fairbanks Road. The district must receive applications by May 9, 2023, at least seven days before

the vote, if the resident would like to receive the ballot by mail. Residents who wish to pick up their absentee ballots in person may apply through May 15, 2023. In all cases, the ballot must be returned to our administrative offices no later than 5 p.m. on May 16, 2023. Ballots received later than this cannot be accepted under education law, regardless of the postmarked date.

Tax Cap Information

As with all districts, the tax cap is calculated using a complex equation. This year the tax levy cap specific to the Churchville-Chili District is 4.33%. With a proposed increase to the levy of 2.77%, the district is below the State's cap. This increase in the levy would result in an estimated tax rate decrease of 2.98% for the town of Riga, an increase of 4.92% for the town of Ogden, an increase of .42% for the town of Chili and a decrease of 5.07% for the town of Sweden due to varied equalization rates.

How many years have you lived in the district? 30 What is your occupation? Teacher

Do you have children attending Churchville-Chili schools? Our children, Zachary and Katherine, are both graduates of the district (2014 and 2017 respectively).

Please list your contributions to or involvement in the community and the community service you have done.

I have served on the Churchville-Chili School Board for the past 12 years. While serving on the board, I have been part of the following committees: Audit Committee, Memorials Committee, Title 1 Parent Advisory Committee and the FLASH Committee.

Why do you want to be a school board member?

I would like to continue my work on the Churchville-Chili School Board to give back to a school district that has provided my own two children a great education. Teachers, administrators and support staff need to be able to identify the needs of students and more importantly, have the tools and resources to make sure that each one of our students can be successful.

Every year, the State, Governor and Board of Regents place new mandates on school districts. In most cases, additional funding from the district is needed to fulfill these mandates. The reality of these mandates is that each result in a variety of expenses to our district. This is not a challenge unique to Churchville-Chili. As a Board of Education, we have been able to oversee the management of these unfunded mandates while keeping the students' learning experiences as the top priority. Our district has been able to continue improving and maintaining our facilities as well as adding new programs and opportunities for students. In the coming years, our district will need to manage potential enrollment growth and the impact of that growth on our facilities, while enhancing universal pre-k and incorporating an alternative education program for students who require a smaller and more flexible school setting to be successful.
